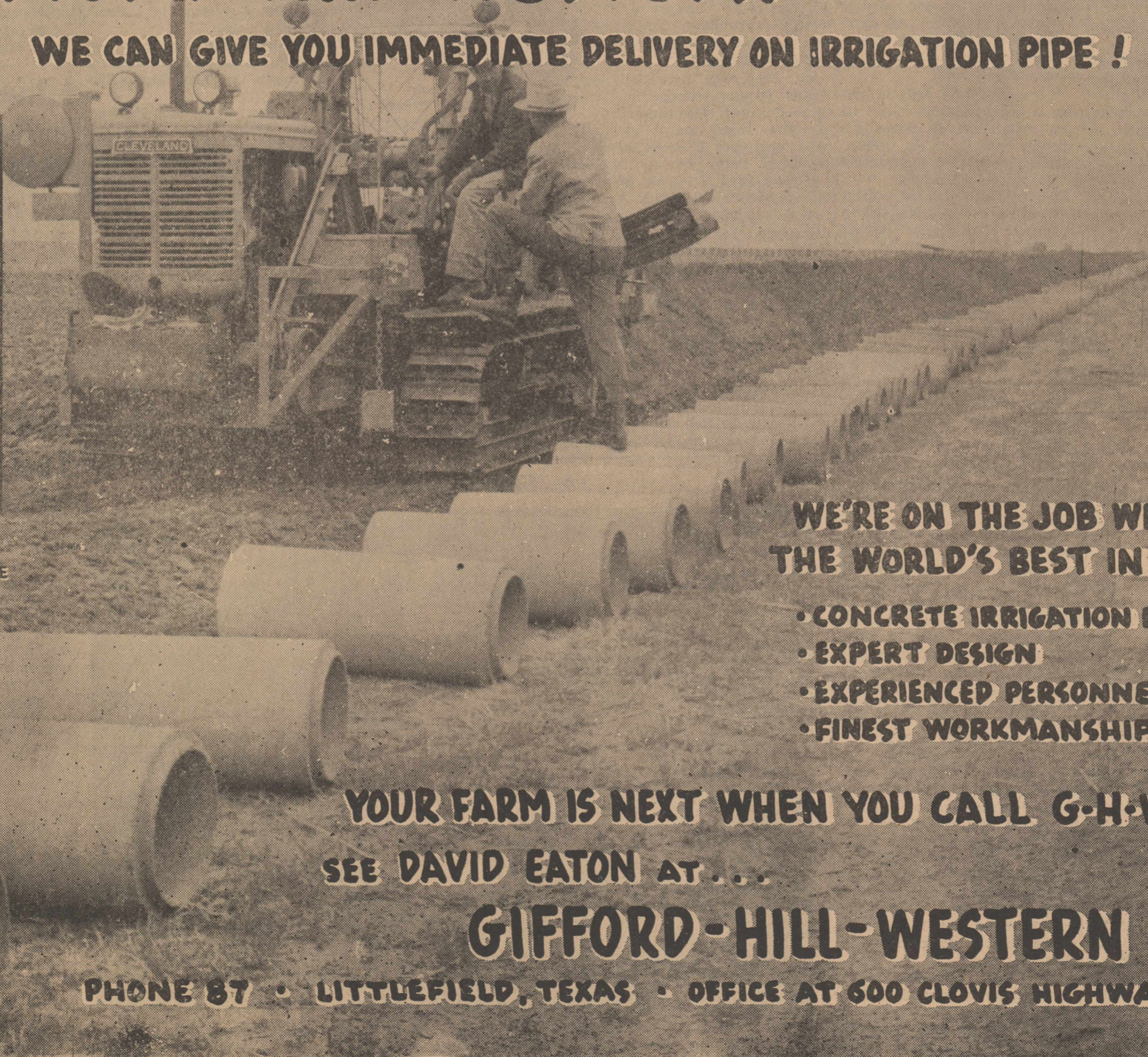

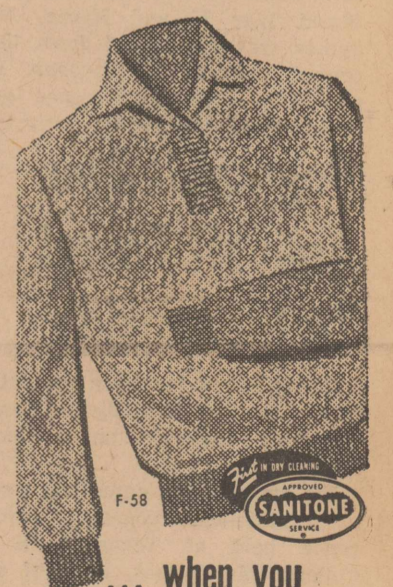

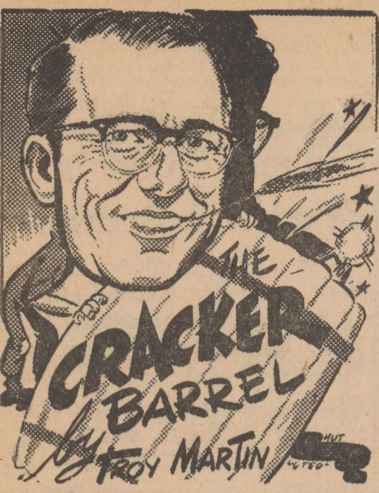

We talked to an Insurance man friend of ours this week and learned that a considerable savings on insurance can be realized by building a home in town rather than in the country. This is in spite of city taxes.

Ordinary insurance on a \$30,000 home in the country runs \$1,101 for five years, while the same policy runs only \$624 in town, he told us. This represents a savings of almost \$100 a year in insurance premiums. City taxes on such a

home (when the home is absolutely new with no depreciation taken) would run \$137.50 a year.

The home owner has saved \$100 on insurance so he's out only \$37.50 a year for the conveniences of living in town—such niceties as streets, proximity to school, shopping area, sewer and water facilities.

Now sewer and water facilities bring up two more points in favor of living in Olton. We don't believe that anyone would contend that he could dig a well and maintain a water system in the country for anything even approaching the figure of \$5 a month. Ask anyone who has ever had trouble with a septic tank just how much a good sewer system is worth.

All this discussion is leading up to something else. Olton's street system is a disgrace. We need to do some paving and street repair and we need to do it now!

Olton can and MUST float a street improvement bond. We could have paid another \$50 in city taxes this year with what we've spent and will spend on front end alignments on our automobile as a result of driving on our chug-hole infested streets.

One of the town doctors told

us recently that his car became mired down on a city street while he was on the way to make a house call. It didn't happen at the outskirts of town either. It was just off Main Street.

Olton has gained about 1,600 population in the past 10 years with very little effort exerted toward that growth. If we can improve our town to the point we grow even an additional 1,600 in the next ten years, here are some of the things it will mean. There will be another 200 homes built here valued conservatively at \$4,000,000. There will be a number of new businesses which we estimate would come to at least another \$3,000,000. This would bring in more than \$30,000 additional tax revenue to the city annually, not to mention extra revenue for the school system and an over-all strengthening of the city's economy. Aside from the fact that we can get ourselves out of the mud now, we ask you: WOULDNT IT BE GOOD BUSINESS TO GIVE

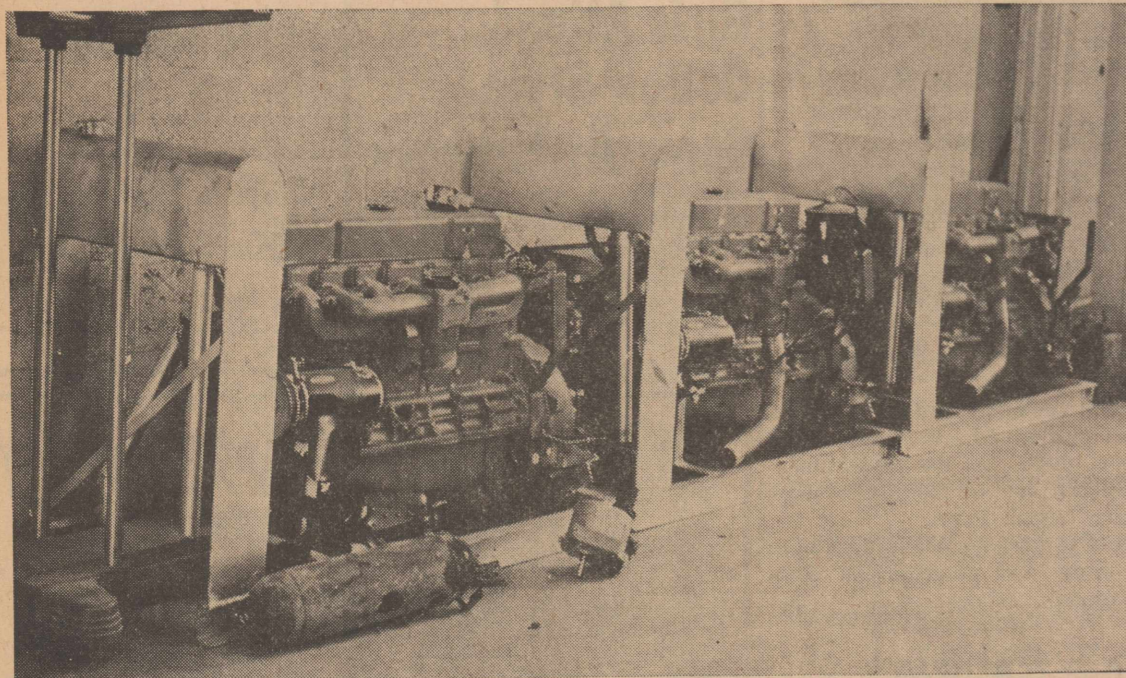

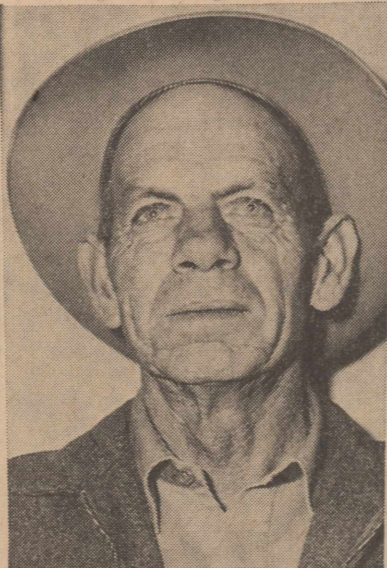

Approximately 250 persons attended the show, which was held in the high school auditorium.

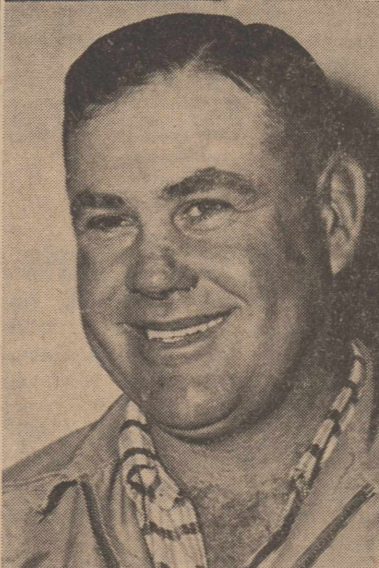
The stage was decorated to resemble a winter scene, and participants in the show were dressed in colorful outdoor clothing.

**OLTON FARMER MAKES GOOD
 USE OF PRETTY WEATHER**



M. G. Fisher who farms north of Olton took advantage of warm weather last week to give his 1960 cotton crop a good start. He is shown above as he was applying Mathieson Ammo-Phos 16-20-0 at a rate of 200 lbs. per acre.

Here is how you can make a good cotton crop in 1960 by following these 10 cotton profit pointers from Doane Agricultural Service.

Pre-irrigate to depths of 6-7 feet. Sub-soil if necessary to get water penetration.

Fertilize. Use enough. Place to side and 2-4 inches below drilled row.

Plant after soil temperature reaches 58° at 8-inch depths at 8 a. m. on three consecutive days.

Treat seed and/or soil with fungicide and systemic insecticide where early season insects are a problem.

Plant population should be 30,000 to 40,000 per acre, 3-4 plants per foot of row, 40-inch rows where cotton's mechanized. If precision planting is practiced, use 12-15 pounds seed per acre.

Count insects. Make checks of terminal growth and further down on 100 plants daily. Get insecticides out when needed. A few hours' delay can put harvest a week to 10 days late.

Irrigate deeply, using special pains early in the season to keep water balance right for early fruit setting. More first picking cotton.

Defoliate IF it increases your machine harvesting efficiency, improves grade of lint, reduces boll rot or leaf stain.

Machine harvest. Cost per bale, not cost per acre, will tell you why.

Sell, knowing grade and staple of the entire crop. Your Association usually warrants your support, but keep a line on bids made by all buyers.

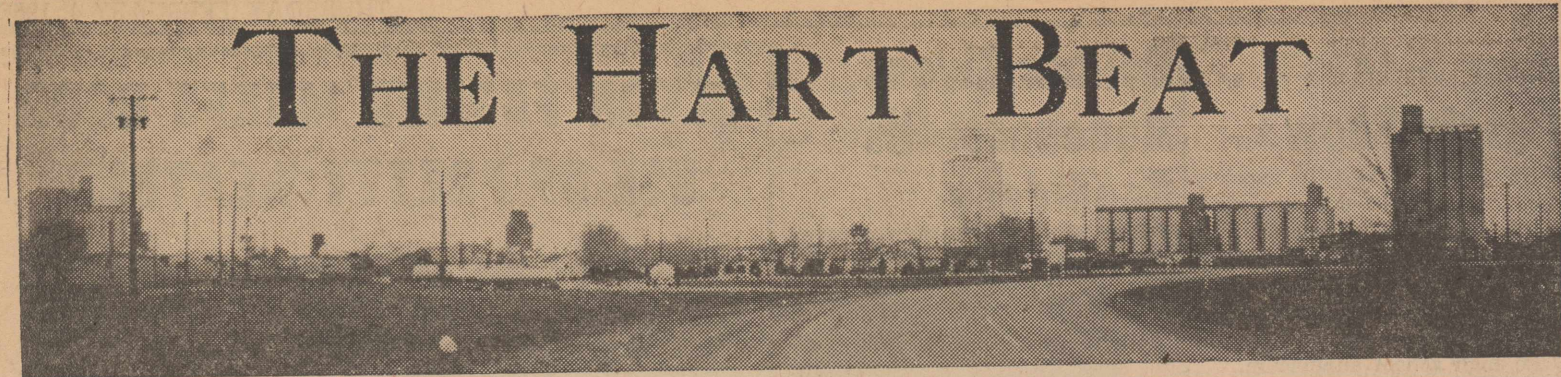
