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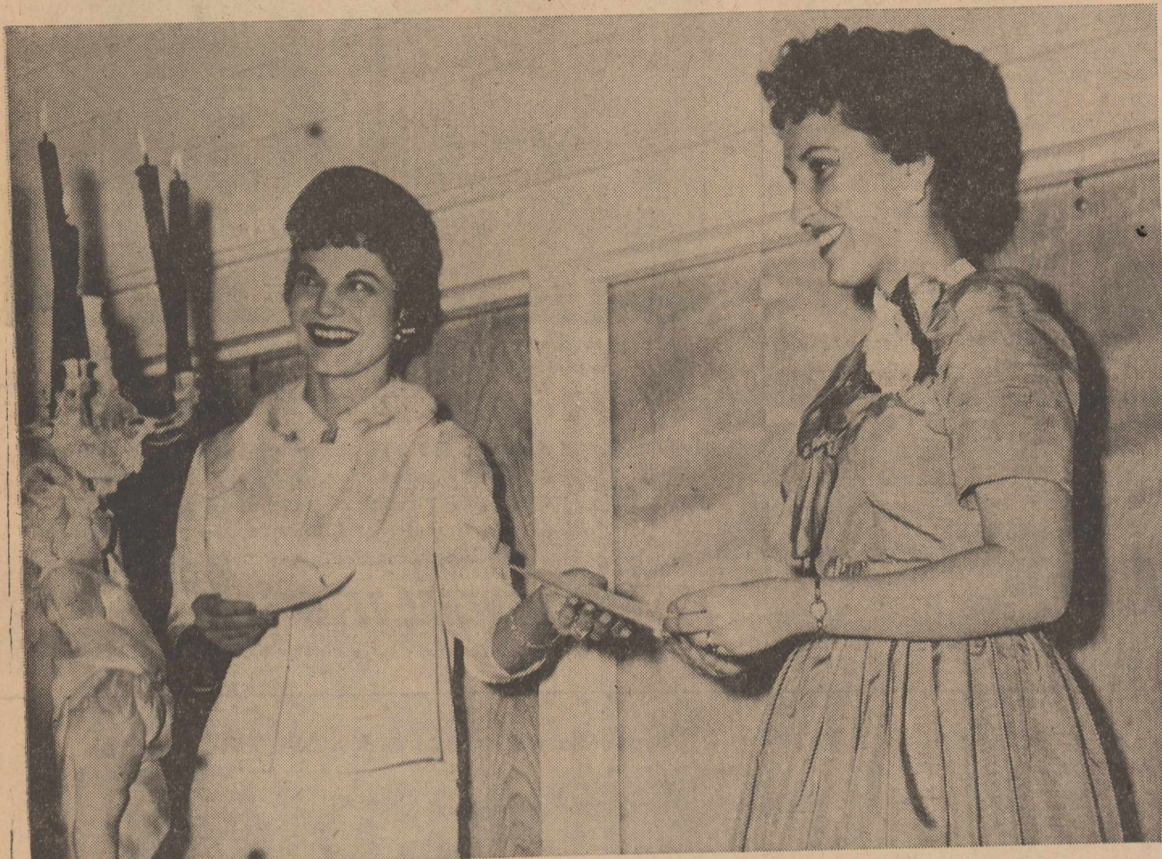

Gayle was named for this award on the basis of a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by senior girls. She will receive an award pin and her paper will be submitted for competition in the state Homemaker of Tomorrow contest.

Miss Sharon Smith, high school junior, received The Olton Enterprise Award for "Homemaker of the Year." Sharon was elected to receive the honor by FHA members. She was judged on aptitude in homemaking skills and written work, and upon her outstanding work as an FHA member.

Dr. Basil Johns and a Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture committee on civic affairs met with the council to study paving needs of the town.

Dr. Johns is chairman of the committee. He acted as spokesman for the group. The doctor has long been a proponent of more pavement for the town.

Candidates for the feminine honor were Janice Campbell, Pat LaFrance, Gayle Machen, and Sue Witten, all seniors. Nominated for King were Gary Johnson and Gary DeBerry, sophomores; Wendell Scribner and Robert Priest, juniors.

The co-captains of the girls team, Sharron Dennis and Gayle Machen, crowned the King. Both the King and Queen were presented gifts and glittered crowns. Paul Montgomery and Wendell Scribner crowned the Queen.

Kenneth Prestridge, president of the OHS Student Council, acted as master of ceremonies. He introduced the candidates and all members of both the boys and girls teams.

"This is a test of Olton's spirit," the doctor told members of the council. "If we are ever going to grow and amount to anything we need to do some paving now."

Also in the group which discussed the issue with the council were Emmett Harper, Chamber president; Wayne Cooper, Chamber manager; and Barton Prestridge, Claude Carothers, H. B. Maxey, Jr., Henry Cowart and Parley Meyers.

"If we aren't willing to dig down into our pockets and do some paving," Dr. Johns asserted, "Then we're not going to be willing to do some other things we need to do."

In such a paving project the city would be required to participate in the cost a minimum of 10 percent. Cocosensus of opinion at the Tuesday night meeting was that the city should participate at least 20 percent.

Councilman Major James noted that a bond company representative has advised the council that the city now is in financial shape to vote a bond up to \$150,000.

Councilman Fred Thompson said a bond issue of \$60,000 with the city participating at a rate of 20 percent would provide 75 blocks of paving, curbing and guttering on 40-foot streets.

Members of the Chamber committee agreed to seek expert advice on such items as cost per front foot of proposed pavement as well as many other aspects of the project. Following this study, an effort will be made to acquaint townspeople with the findings.

In other business, the council hired Ernest Holland of Paducah as night policeman. Emmett Burrows is chief of police.

Council members voted to keep the city hall open at noon as a convenience for the public.

The council formally accepted the resignation of Carl Hooper, who was elected mayor in a special election last month and then declined the office.

The council also called a city election for April 5. Deadline for filing for office in that election is March 5.

Terms of three councilmen expire in April. They include A. D. Adams, T. M. Campbell and Major James. Also to be elected is a mayor to serve out the unexpired term of Mayor Hooper, who resigned.

Mr. Hooper was elected to that office to serve out the unexpired term of D. Y. Ray, who resigned effective in December.

One-Act Play Cast Selected

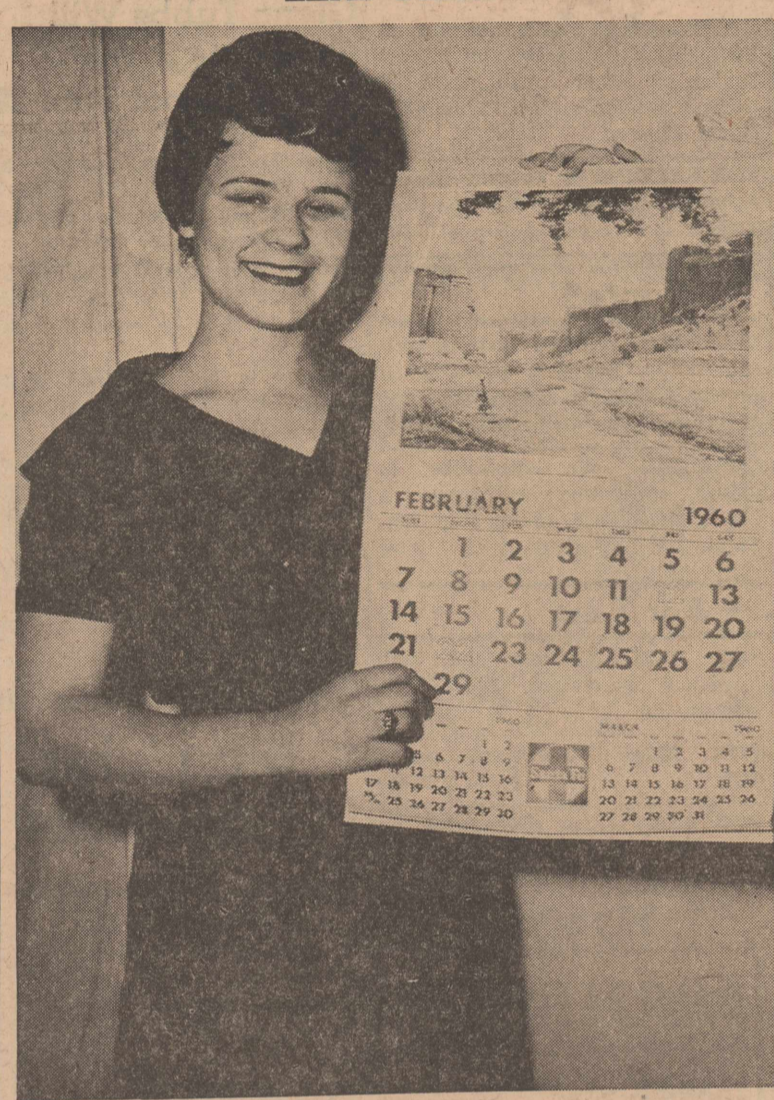
Olton High School's one-act play for competition in Interscholastic League contest has been selected. TIL Contest is scheduled for March 22.

A straw vote was taken to determine the desires of ORC members concerning a building program at the recreation center. Results showed the members present were in favor of a building program.

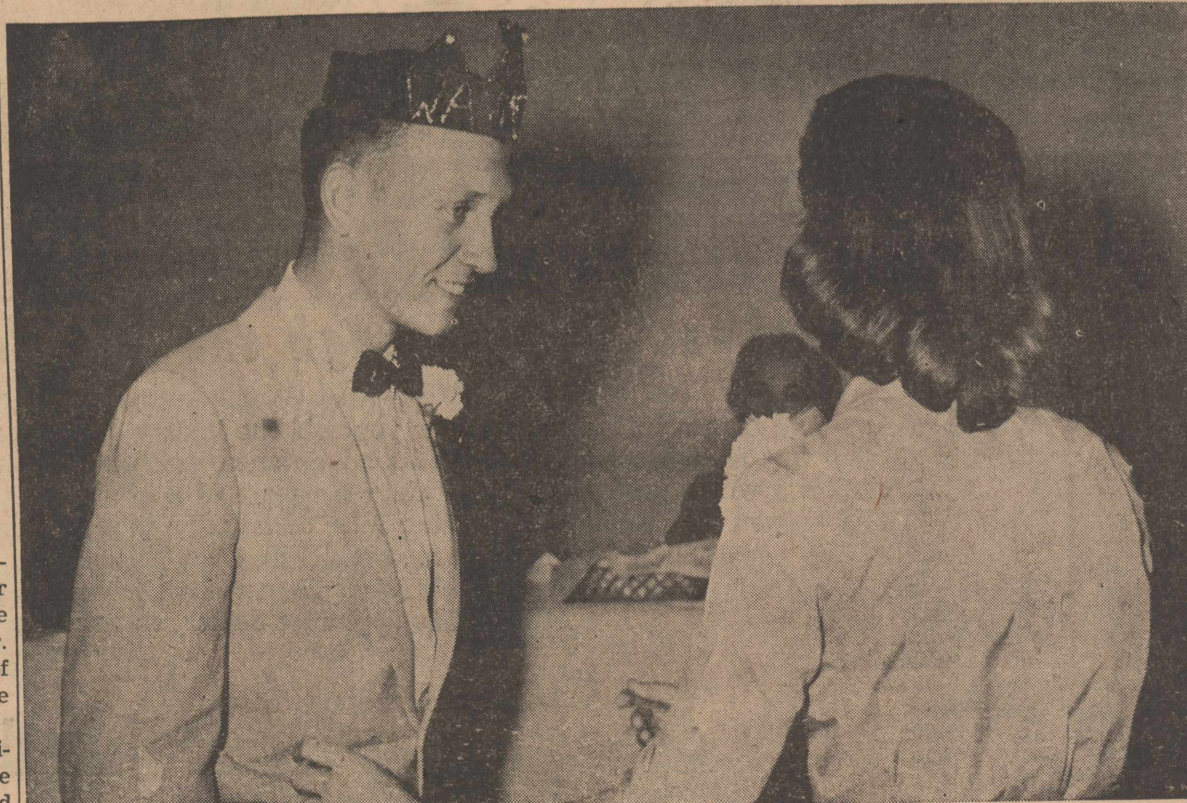
Olton People's Relative Dies

Mr. Fuchs was 83 years of age. He had been ill for several months. Funeral services were held in First Methodist Church of Ruidoso, Wednesday afternoon.

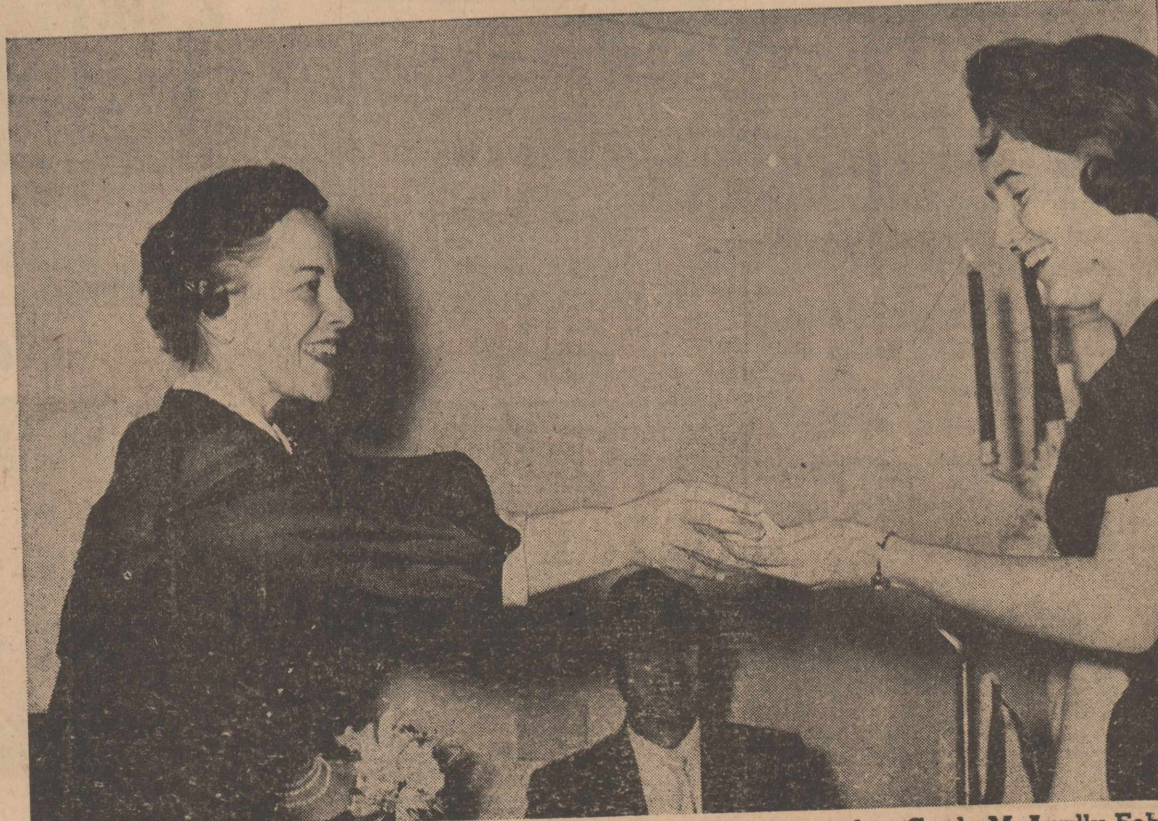

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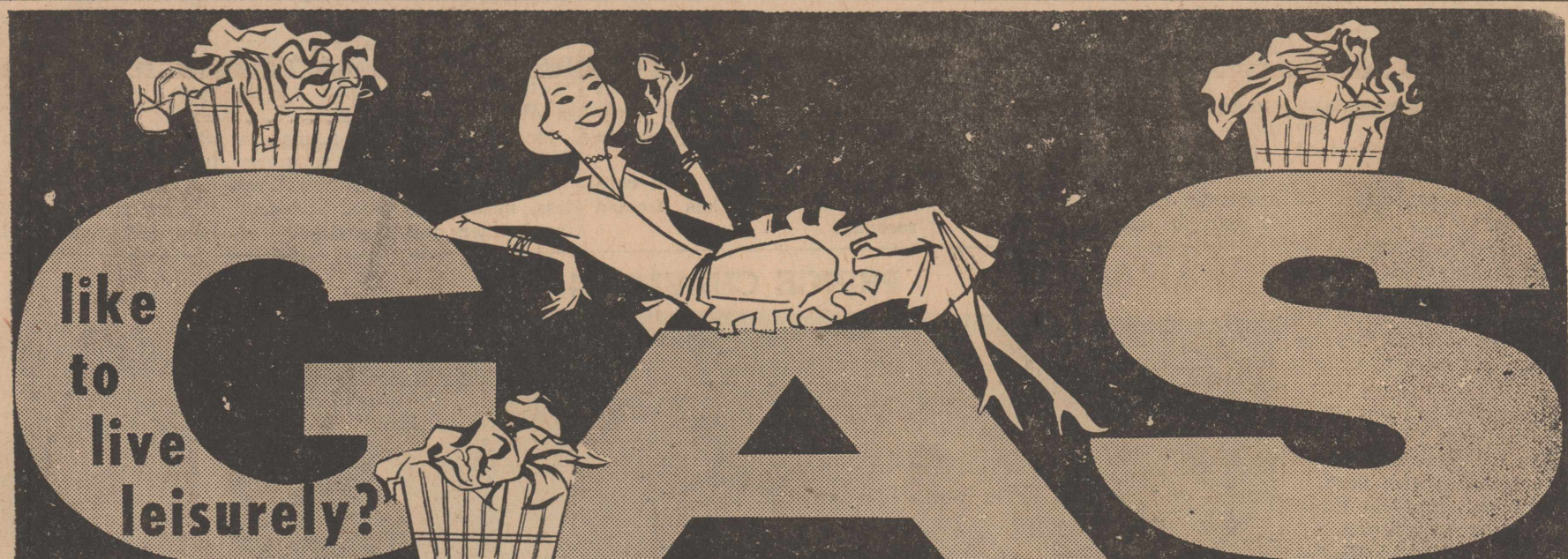
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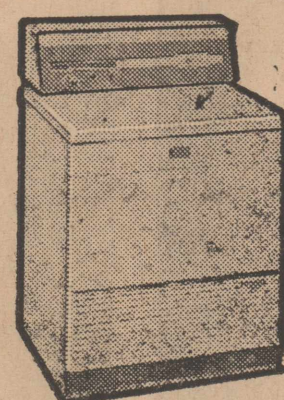
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Rehearsals Are Begun On Play

THE CRACKER CRUMBS

A greeting card manufacturer estimates Americans will buy more than 500 million valentines to be sent to the "one and only true love" February 14.

With the application of my own method of lower-order mathematics, I deduce that to be about two and one-half times as many Valentine love missiles as there are Americans.

It would seem then, that several somebodies are certainly "two-timing" several somebodies, and-or we surely are a bunch of fickle lovers!

At any rate, this proves there are a considerable number of Americans who "care enough to send the very best!"

Aside from providing (1) very pretty and bright decorative ideas for parties, banquets, etc., and (2) another attractive sales gimmick cued to snare the very young and very sentimental . . . Valentine's Day actually holds very little significance.

No one seems to know exactly how the custom of sending valentines originated. The most reliable accounts, however, credit a Roman priest, Saint Valentine, with the idea.

It seems St. Valentine was a pious philanthropist who frequently made the rounds from house to house trailing his toga and leaving food and gifts on the doorsteps of the poor. This was a much appreciated gesture and came to be copied by other priests and a few wealthy Romans.

St. Valentine became a symbol of love, friendship, and anonymous giving. Thus, on the day of his death, Feb. 14, a day of festival was set up to recognize the generosity of the revered old Saint. The red heart which came to be dubbed "valentine" symbolized the loving heart of the priest.

The use of flora, fauna and twittering fowl in connection with valentines came about because of the closeness of the Valentine celebration to the blossoming of spring.

Both Chaucer and Shakespeare refer to the observance of St. Valentine's Day as the day in

early spring when birds first choose their mates.

The custom long prevailed on that day of drawing lots to decide which young men and women should be each other's "valentine" during the ensuing year. The couple thus drawn exchanged gifts, and in some cases were even regarded as "engaged."

Later the custom of giving presents on Saint Valentine's Day became confined to men. (which is really a rather good idea.) However, this custom of valentine giving has fallen into disuse in the country of its birth, and only Americans, romanticists that we are, still send flowers, cards and candy on February 14.

If this seems a rather garbled account of the valentine origination, the reader might consult his own encyclopedia. No two versions seem to be the same, and all accounts are about as garbled as the preceding one.

However, this observance, as groundless as it may seem, serves one purpose. It gives school children a much-needed break in the long unexciting period between Christmas and Easter. It is an important day in primary grades when the big boxes be-decked with fading crepe paper and glue streaks are finally opened. The boxes have been purloined from papa's hat closet, and lovingly fashioned by inexpert little hands.

Each child mistakenly considers the number of valentines he receives a clue to his immense popularity. Little do the children realize teacher has made lists of names of every child in the room for every child in the room!

Teachers are "pounded" with box after box of that sticky American institution "the chocolate covered cherry". They are, needless to say, very appreciative and flattered, in spite of the caloric content.

Once during my teaching career, a very sweet and charming little second-grader presented me with a box of delicious looking chocolates. She waited until I had produced the proper vocal "oohs and ahhs" and then informed me in her candied little-girl voice, "Don't worry if they don't taste too good. I got them out of my sister's drawer and they're left over from last year."
