THE CRACKER CRUMBS

Rarely is a woman more attractive upon a soapbox than behind a dishpan. Nevertheless, after hearing a statement made the other day, I am sorely tempted to take an unbecoming stance atop a depleting box of new blue Cheer.

I have little hope that any preponderance of good will result, but Carry Nation felt better after airing her views, and maybe her later-day and less exuberant counter-part will also.

Someone made the accusation recently that "teenagers today are irresponsible, disrespectful, untidy, ill-mannered and have no regard for others' property."

This accusation would make anyone closely associated with teenagers break out in a purple rash. The very idea of categorizing a group of individuals into one "untidy lump" as if they were a brand of cattle . . . just because the individuals happen to be the same age.

Teenagers cannot be categorized as "a group" or as "just teenagers per se" anymore than men or women or parents or anything else can. One cannot generalize by stating all teenagers' habits are bad . . . or good. Each teenager must be judged on his own merit and as an individual.

It is true that "one bad apple can spoil the whole barrel", but it is not so with people . . . and it should not be so. If the popular opinion always proved to be true, teenagers would have "gone to the dogs" long ago. But for some reason or other those teenagers of a few years back who were accused of the same things, have become fine upstanding citizens and leaders.

Only those who actually "went to the dogs" are the ones who today mercilessly criticize the younger ones.

The very fact that teenage crimes, misdemeanors and delinquency are newsworthy proves they are a rarity, and not the commonly accepted practices of most teenagers.

Of course there are those teenagers who discredit their own

imaginings and self-sufficiencies by admitting to "being bored"; who never seem to have "anything to do." These are the ones, like adults with the same lack of initiative, who end up in trouble or with bad reputations because they use their spare time indiscriminately.

The most common complaints of teenagers, however, are "I'm too busy," "There's too much to do," and "There are so many outside activities, I don't have time to get my lessons."

These "too busy" students . . . students who participate in many voluntary projects and activities . . . are not the ones who make the front pages. By the very nature of their beings they will find time to get their lessons; will succeed in the things they attempt; and will not have nervous breakdowns, as they are so often threatening to do. It takes time and energy to work oneself into having a break-down . . . and these "too busy" students don't have the time nor energy to spare.

"Herd thinking" is a common trait of students in their teens. But this does not have to be a bad thing. When leaders of the "herd" are the right kinds of leaders, the followers have very little chance of doing the wrong things.

On the other hand, "herd thinking" is not a trait singular only to teenagers. This inane, often vicious habit, verily hounds all of us in almost every phase of life. The herd says, "This is the fashion; this is the way it is done." So, fashions in clothes, homes, automobiles, manners, memberships and thousands of other things are followed and done as the herd has dictated.

We are not any less susceptible to the idea of "going along with the crowd" than are the teenagers who are constantly accused of it.

If one parent mistreated her children, did not attend to her duties, kept an untidy house and

Paul M. Belcher At High Plains Research Center

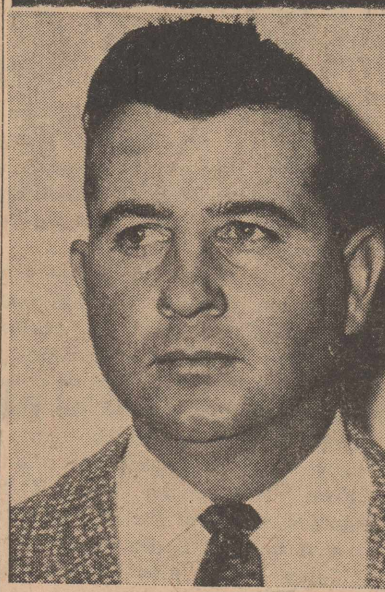
Paul M. Belcher will assume duties as Laboratory Technician at the High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, on February 15.
