Texas Sesame Growers To Hold Meeting Monday

Texas Sesame Growers, Inc., will hold a special meeting in Olton next Monday to help farmers of Lamb County plan their 1960 sesame crops, Robert L. Parker, executive vice president of the organization, announced this week.

The meeting will be at 7:30 PM at Olton Farm Supply Store, local Sesame dealer. County Agent Bill Kimbrough will be in charge. Mr. Parker will be on hand to discuss crop and market prospects for 1960. He will be accompanied by Bill Wimberly, manager of Texas Sesame Growers Inc., High Plains plant at Muleshoe, and Ray Hodges, Sesame field man.

"Market prospects for the Sesame which will be produced this year are the best in several years," Parker said. He pointed out that two factors combine to make the market bright this year. The first is that sesame seed consumption in this country is increasing, and the second is that the 1959 crops, both in the US and in South and Central America, were shorter than expected last year.

"These conditions combine to put us in a very good market position this fall," Parker said. "New products are using an ever-increasing amount of Sesame seed, and more new uses are being found all the time. Any way we figure it, it is going to take more Sesame to supply the demand in 1960."

Mercury In Nose-Dive To 10-Below

It was cold Wednesday night. The mercury dropped to the vicinity of 10 degrees below zero.

It all started Monday night when a whistling norther hit the Plains dumping little more than a trace of snow.

Heavy snowfall hit the area Tuesday night and continued through most of Wednesday. High temperature reading Wednesday was in the vicinity of 18 degrees.

The mercury plunged Wednesday night. The US Weather Bureau at Lubbock reported a 13 degree below reading.

There was little wind Wednesday night.

Olton received an estimated four to five inches of snow during the flurry. Streets and highways were extremely slick, but officers here said no accidents had been reported in the area this week.

Grand opening of the show is scheduled for 10 o'clock Friday morning. Judging of rabbits and poultry is set for 11 o'clock Friday morning. Elmo Hall will judge these divisions.

Judging of swine will be at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon. Judging of sheep will be at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Judging again this year will be L. M. Hargraves of Texas Tech.

Olton will play host to an area livestock judging contest at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. FHA awards will be announced and the FHA cake sale will take place at 11 o'clock Saturday morning.

Fat steers will be judged at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Auction of animals shown will be held at 2 o'clock.

Showmanship and clean pen awards will be given by Olton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture with two awards in each category.

Trophies for grand champions will be awarded by Olton Farmers Union.

TO SUPPLY NEEDY IN EMERGENCY

Olton Ministers Plan Storehouse

Plans for a store house for storing staple goods to be distributed to the needy of the community in times of emergency were discussed Monday at a meeting of Olton Ministerial Alliance.

President of the alliance is Rev. J. W. Douglass of the Nazarene Church.

Stored in the building will be such items as butane, groceries and clothing.

Committee members appointed to work out arrangements include Rev. Roscoe Trostle of the Valleyview Church; Rev. Glen Godsey, pastor of Trinity Baptist Mission; and Rev. Jean Palsler, pastor of the Assembly of God Church.

The committee will look for a suitable location for such a store house. When the building is ready, people will be asked to donate canned goods, foods, clothing and other items needed by indigent during times of emergency.

"The alliance thought this would be a help to local businessmen," declared Rev. Glen Godsey, secretary of the group. "They are

forever being asked to donate such items for the needy. If we could put this plan over, they would not be asked so much."

Leadership Clinic Is Held In Olton

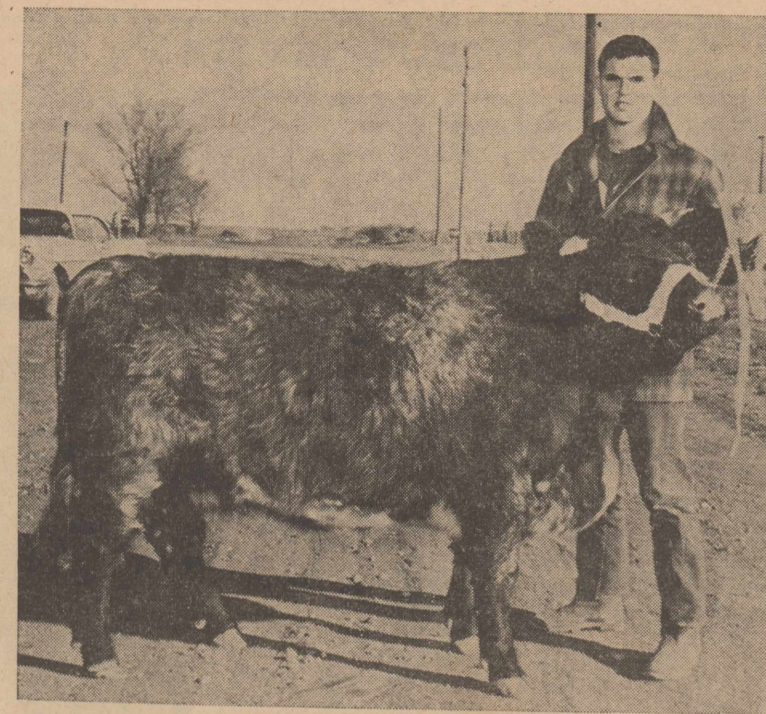

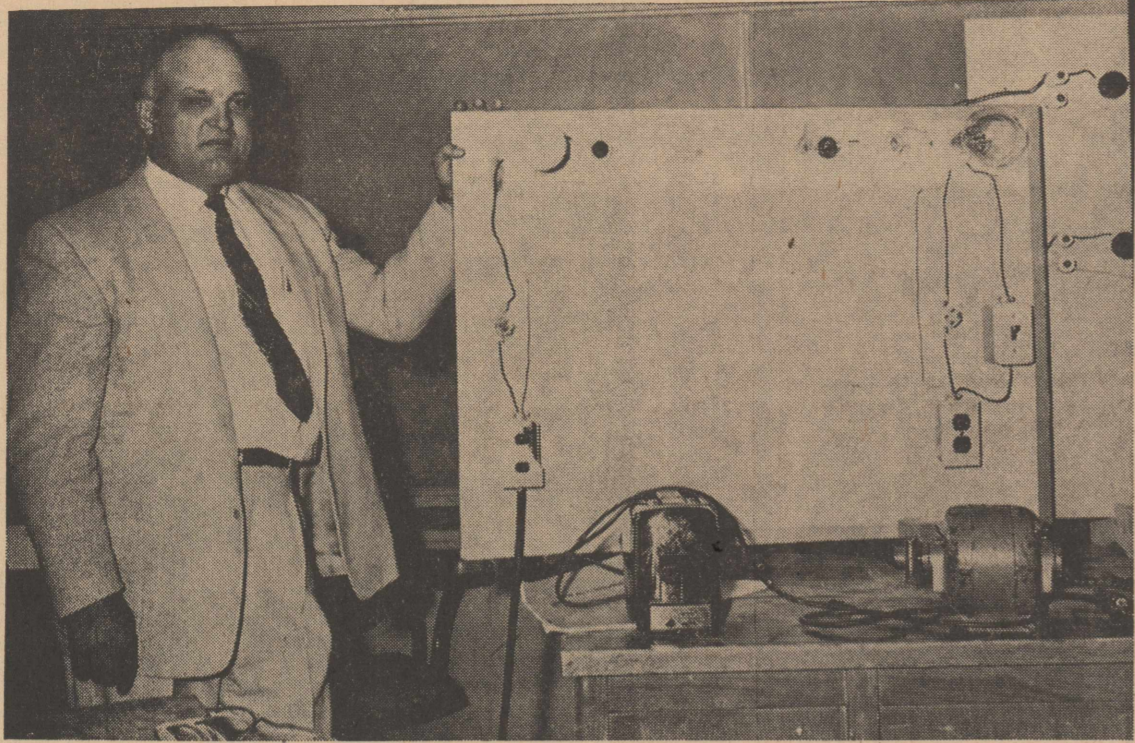
Farmers should have contracts signed by this weekend, Mr. Poteet said.

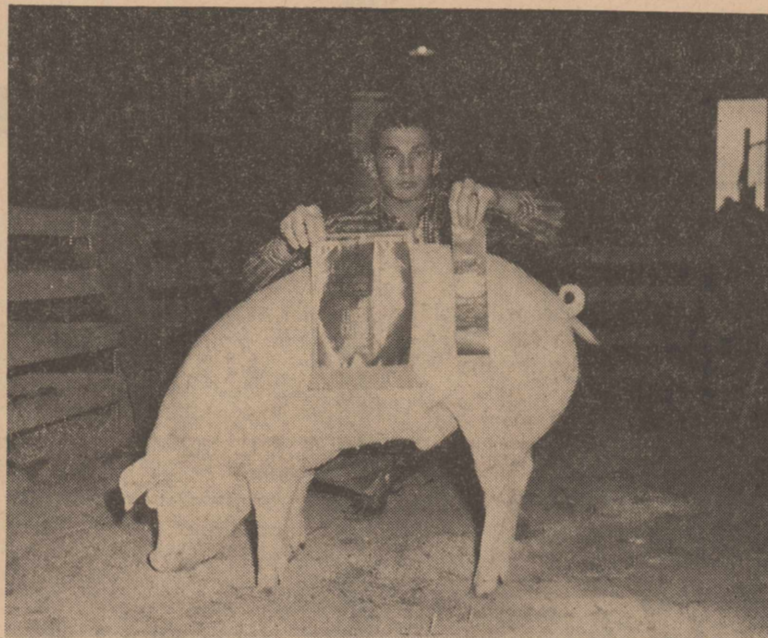

Weed Control Research At HPRF Station



DALE PRICE

Weed control research is a new program at the High Plains Research Foundation for 1960, with flame cultivation being the first phase of the program.

Dale Price, Agricultural Engineer, is the new member of the Foundation staff to conduct the weed control research program. Mr. Price is a 1954 vocational agricultural graduate of Texas Tech and has taught in this field in Texas. The Gotcher Engineering Company of Clarksdale, Miss., is furnishing the flame cultivator and basic education in weed control. Gene Bumpus and W. R. (Bill) Taylor are underwriting the project and the Warren Petroleum Company is furnishing the propane.

The flame cultivation experiment will include cotton, grain sorghum, corn, sesame, soybeans, castor beans, and possibly onions and potatoes.

The project will cover many angles of eliminating weeds and labor. New techniques in cultivation, planting, and harvesting of individual crops will undoubtedly be discovered.

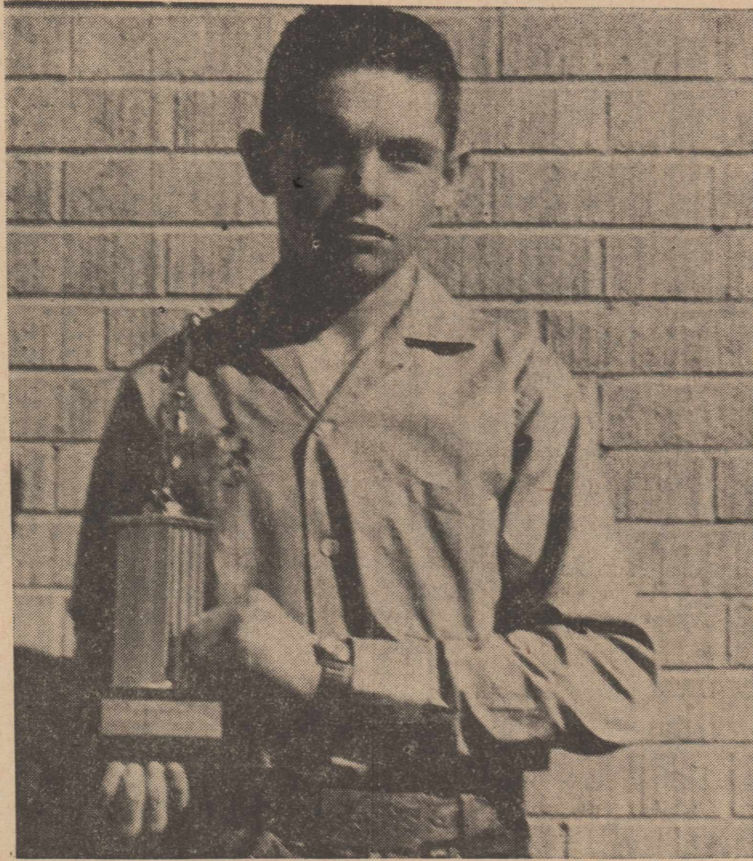
