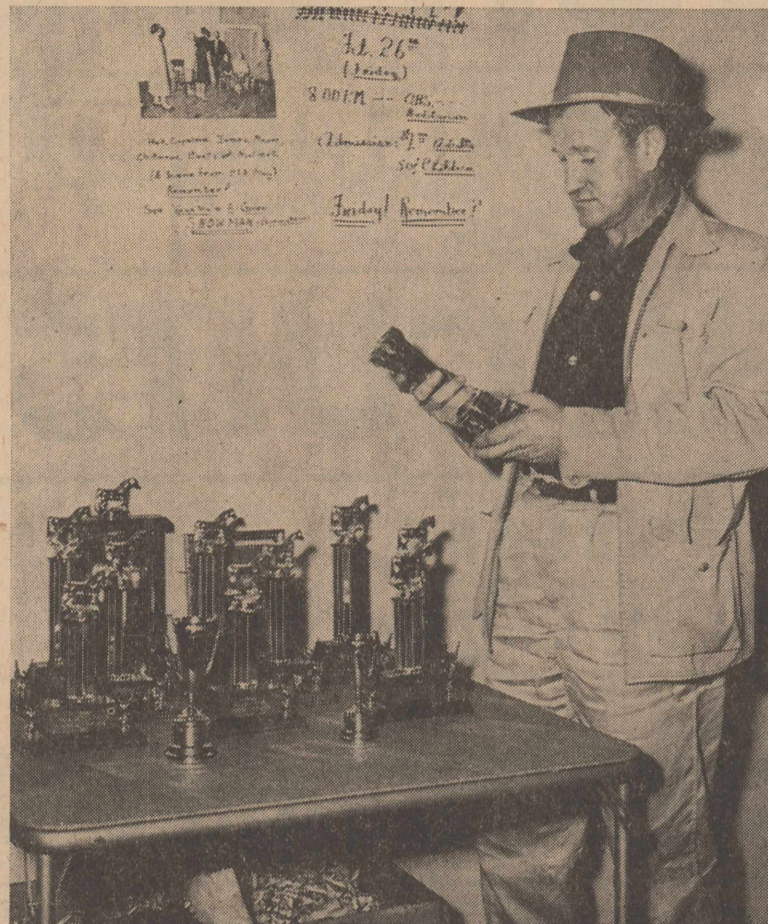

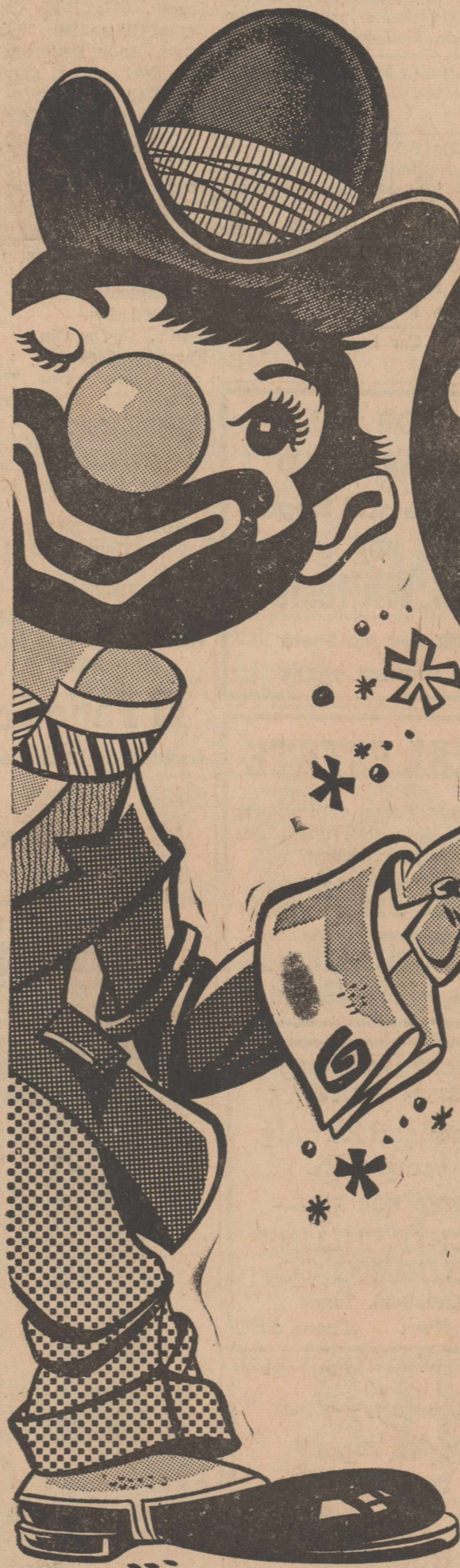
The Cadet Band played "Port 25," "Little English Suite," "Carnival for Trombones," "Beginners Stomp," and "March of the Meteorites."

C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation, announced today. Mr. Henry Allen of Allen Bros. stated in making the research request of Allen Bros. and the Institute, that "there is a great need for a potato that meets the specific gravity and other quality requirements of the potato chip industry." The Foundation is conducting this testing program as a part of its search for crops which will add to the area income and permit greater diversification of farm crops and in developing industry. 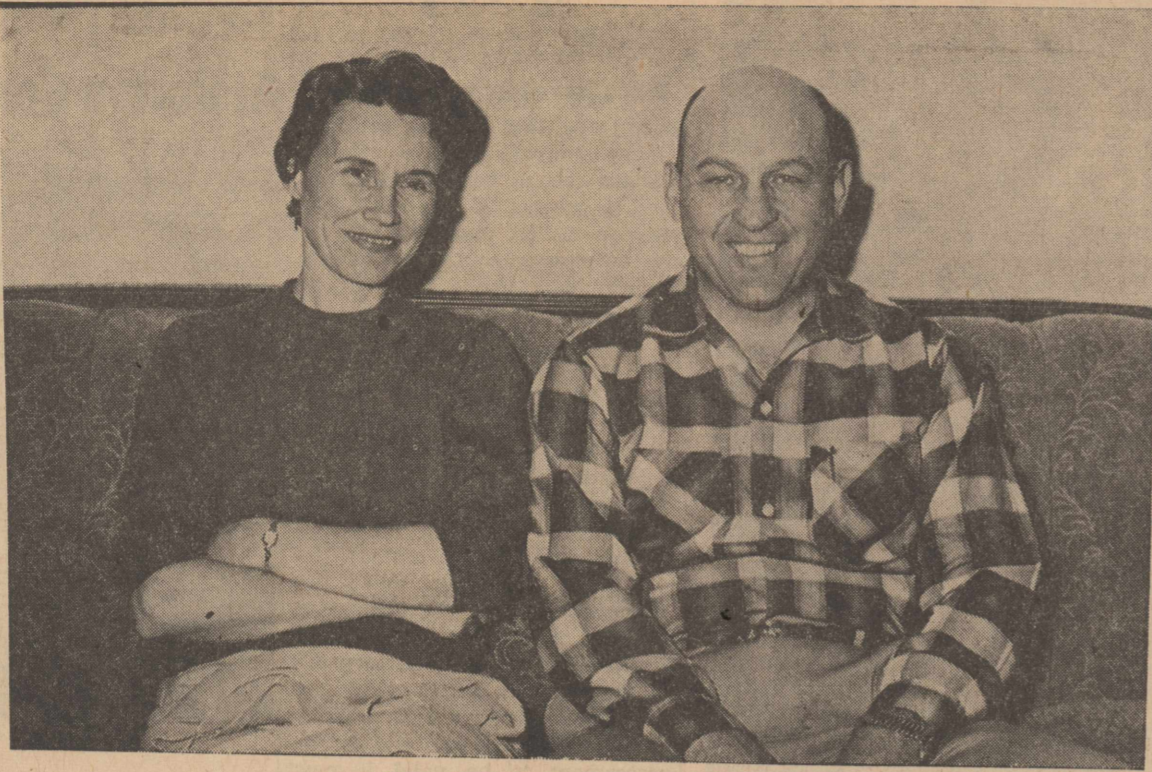

COUPLE MOST IMPRESSED BY MOUNT VERNON

Keeping Up With The Joneses Not Easy On Trip To Capitol

Visiting Washington, DC, leaves a person with a keener sense of pride in being an American.

This statement came recently from Mr. and Mrs. Owen Jones, who have just returned from the nation's capitol. They visited Washington as a part of a 33-person delegation of Farmers Union

members. They left Wichita Falls Feb. 5 by chartered bus and returned Feb. 15.

While in Washington they visited with legislators and went sight seeing in the capitol and surrounding area. Two days of driving were re-

quired for the trip. It was rainy all the way. Other area people in the group include Levi Ben-night and Theron Morrison of Hart.

"Washington is a scenic place," Mrs. Jones reported, "a city of parks, memorials, statues and monuments. Mrs. Jones was impressed with the beautiful tidal basin in the center of the city. It is surrounded with Japanese cherry trees.

Places they visited include Jef-ferson Memorial, Iwo Jima Monu-ment, Tomb of the Unknown Sol-dier, Christ's Church in nearby Alexandria, Va., Washington Monu-ment, Lincoln Memorial and Mount Vernon.

Mrs. Jones was impressed with the changing of the guard at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. "I never had a more humble feeling in my life, if that is the word for it," she reminisced with feeling.

"The guard never turns to right or left," she went on. "There never is an off beat in his step. It seemed very reverent to me."

One of the guards was a boy from Roscoe, she said. Mount Vernon, home of the country's Father, was most im-pressive to Mrs. Jones. "He had everything that was required by a community in those days," she declared. "At Mount Vernon there is a smokehouse, a cobbler shop and a spinning plant."

Washington maintained a bot-anical garden at his home. There were orchards for fruit for the homes. Laundry was done on a community basis in a wash house. Cast iron pots and brass vessels actually used in the old days still may be seen there.

Restored Mount Vernon is operated by Mount Vernon Ladies' Association. The couple visited Washington National Masonic Memorial. In-side is the replica of the original lodge room where Washington presided as worshipful master.

They visited the Department of Agriculture and heard a panel discussion. "They didn't offer any solution to our problems nor do I think they realize the situation," Mrs. Jones declared. "It just made us mad and disgusted."

They toured the Department of State and the Department of Jus-tice.

They were awe-struck by the operation at the Bureau of Print-ing and Engraving, where the nation's money rolls off the print-ing press. Between 27 and 35 million dollars, mostly dollar bills, are printed each day. Average life of a bill is 13 months.

Mrs. Jones described the Library of Congress as a gorgeous build-ing covering 13 acres. It has 250 miles of book shelves containing every book ever copyrighted. There they saw the Gutenberg Bible, first ever printed, and also saw the original copy of the Declaration of Independence.

They saw Senator Ralph W. Yarborough. He made them a "nice talk" and was very cour-teous. He said he is against high interest and is for federal aid to education with controls of schools remaining at home, of course.

Congressmen George Mahon and Sam Rayburn came out as de-finite opponents of federal aid to education.

One of the highlights of the trip was on the return home when the group was snowbound at Fayetteville, Tenn. They stayed in private homes there as all public accommodations were full. "We were treated royally," Mrs. Jones declared.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones say that their association with other farm people who made the trip made the jaunt worthwhile.

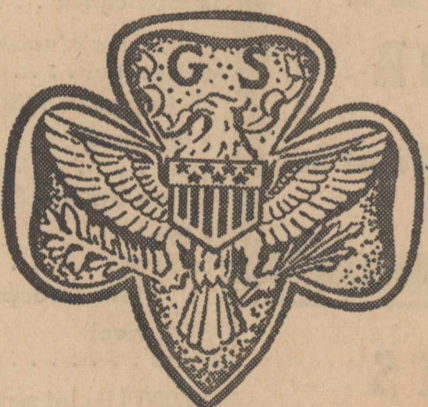



