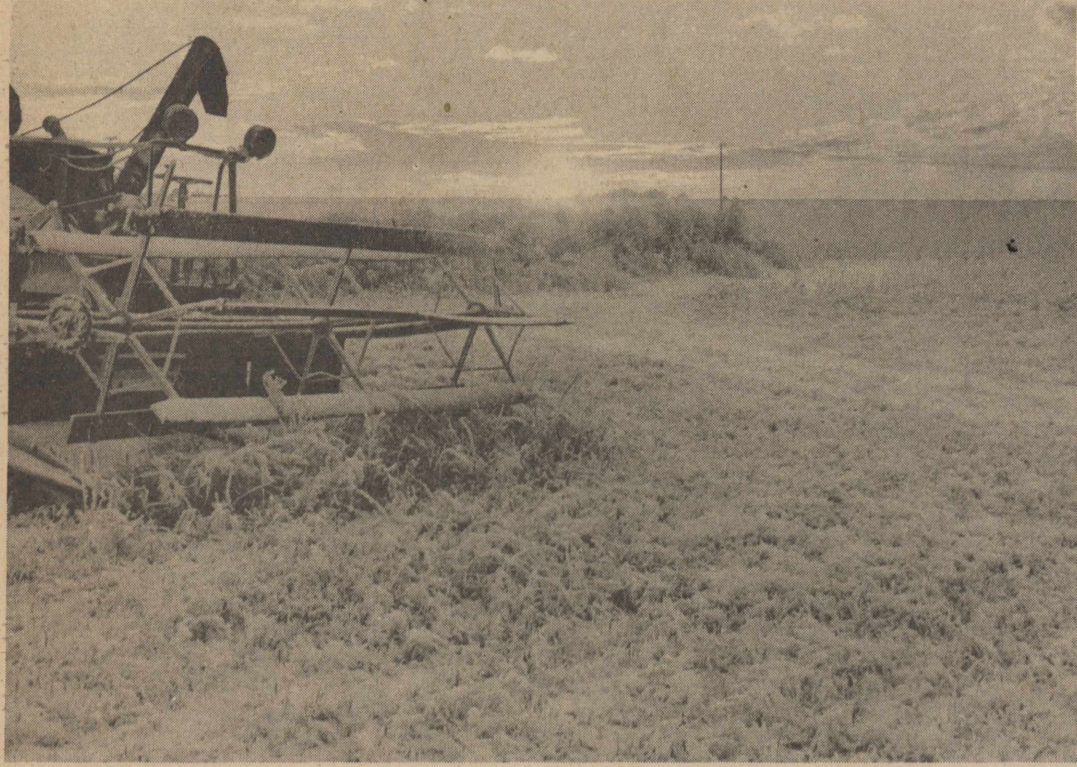


Snow Puts Area In Deep Freeze

Mercury Dips To Zero Mark

Olton's 1961 cotton crop appeared this week to have turned into a 1962 crop as snow and ice continued to plague farmers and stall gins.

Some gins in the area were caught up while others still had some cotton which was brought in before the bad weather.

Four Olton gins said Wednesday they had ginned 23,995 bales with 340 more bales weighed in.

All agreed that they would still be ginning come next year with an estimated 60 per cent of the crop now in.

Snow started here last Thursday morning with drizzle and cloudy skies continuing over the weekend. More snow came Monday and temperatures dropped to the zero mark Monday night. The snowfall totaled three to four inches.

Some families were without electricity Monday night and parts of Tuesday. Most, however, were prepared for the heating problem with supplementary gas stoves or fireplaces.

Ralph Glover, Southwestern Public Service, said they had some service off but had no serious trouble.

Phone service was disturbed Tuesday with delays on most out of town calls and some area phones out.

Clearing skies Wednesday gave little hope to the farming situation as more snow for the area was predicted for Wednesday night.

Son's Act Puts Stop To Beating

James Piper, Negro, common-law husband of Mrs. Richard Lee Porch, was in a Littlefield hospital Wednesday where he was taken after he was involved in a stabbing here last Thursday.

The stabbing occurred at the home of the couple late Thursday afternoon.

Richard Porch, 12-year-old son of Mrs. Porch, told Deputy Sheriff V.L. Smith that Piper was choking and heging his mother so he "stuck this knife in him up to the handle and he stopped."

At a hearing Saturday morning, County Judge Pat Boone Jr. ruled the boy was justified in his action to protect his mother.

Hospital attendants said Wednesday Piper was ready to be released.

He was taken to the hospital by an ambulance from Parsons Funeral Home.

Trailer Trouble Aired At City Council Meet

City Had No Part In Issue--Council

Words sometimes have double meanings and the term "fallout" fell into that category here Tuesday night at a regular city council meeting.

The council listened attentively to facts brought out by the students' survey on radioactive fallout and asked for a copy of the findings, for further study.

Shortly after that, another group indicated that some farmers may have "fallen out" with city hall recently, apparently due to a misunderstanding over enforcement of the new law on cotton trailers.

On the cotton trailer misunderstanding, the council immediately moved to make its position clear.

Mayor M.T. James said the city had "nothing to do with" tickets given recently by state officers on cotton trailer violations.

Appearing before the council were farmers Paul Nafzger and Roger Bartling, and Elvis Hatley, who places bracero labor in this area.

Nafzger said he had heard there was to be a special meeting on the cotton trailer misunderstanding and that he was one of those "really interested" in getting to the root of the cotton trailer troubles.

Hatley said he had heard bracero labor problems would be discussed.

Nafzger said that, in his own particular case, he had heard "my name was turned in" as a farmer who didn't have license tags on his trailers.

"I'm not gonna buy any licenses, because I haven't got any trailers," Nafzger said. "There's some around with my name on them but they aren't mine."

Mayor James asked if Nafzger could call any names of anyone who might have "turned you in."

"I'm not going to call any names," Nafzger said, "because I can't be for sure."

James pointed out that the city receives no revenue from cotton trailer license tags, and that the city would have no reason for wanting to turn farmers in for not acquiring tags.

A check of the city corporation court docket showed that no tickets had been issued by the city on cotton trailer violations.

Nafzger said some farmers were under the impression that state officers were tipped off by someone from city hall. "If anyone (at city hall) did, he stepped out of line, because there certainly were no orders to that effect," said Lynn Fite,

MAN HURT AS TRUCKS COLLIDE

Arthur Lee Johnson, 20-year-old Olton resident, was reported to be in satisfactory condition Wednesday at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, after he was injured last Friday in an accident involving two trucks owned and operated by Olton Co-Op Gin.

The accident occurred on FM 168 about 3.5 miles south of Spade early Friday afternoon.

Johnson was injured when the truck he was driving slammed into the side of another truck driven by Sylvester Martinez. The Martinez truck was out of control at the time of the accident.

Martinez was not injured. Highway Patrolman Bill Angel said Martinez was driving an empty semi-trailer truck north when the right wheels ran off the road. The should-

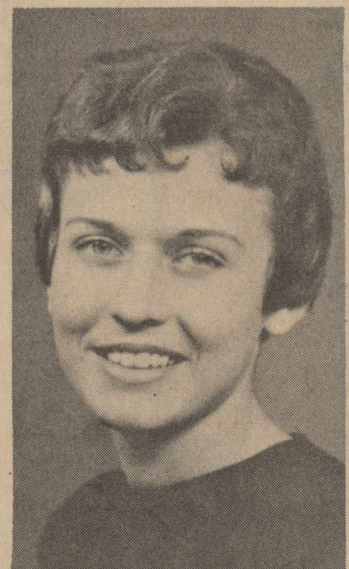
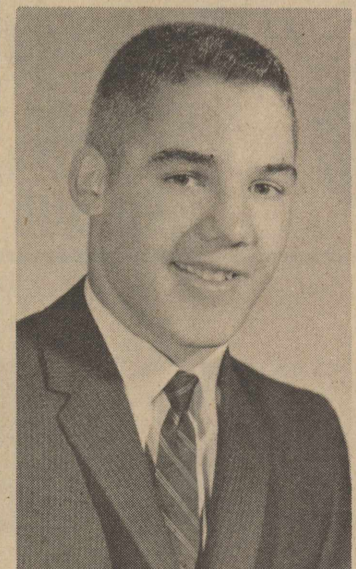
er of the road was muddy and Martinez lost control of the truck which Johnson was driving south.

Angel said that Johnson apparently went to the right of the road as he saw Martinez skidding. The Johnson truck hit the Martinez truck in the right door and fender, causing it to turn around and head back south.

The point of impact was about nine feet from the pavement in the west ditch. Johnson's truck came to rest about 50 feet from the road, spilling the contents, cottonseed.

Martinez's truck stopped about 25 feet off the road. Johnson's truck was completely destroyed and heavy damage was done to the other.

Johnson was taken to a Littlefield hospital. He was transferred to Lubbock Tuesday.

Student Survey Shows Few Building Shelters

A survey by Olton High School science students shows Olton is not prepared for a radioactive fallout warning and that most people aren't concerned about it.

Results of the survey were reported Tuesday night at a city council meeting.

The survey was a project of a class taught by James Caley. Presentation at the council meeting was by Ilene Flatt.

"There is hardly a town that would not receive fallout if a bomb was dropped in its area," Miss Flatt said.

A total of 155 homes were visited, with these answers coming to the following list of questions:

1. Do you think nuclear war is likely? Not Likely-21.3%, Possible -59.3%, Probable -19.4%.

2. Should preparations be made for radioactive fallout? Should prepare- 69.2%, No Use to Prepare-30.8%.

3. Do you have a plan to prepare against fallout? Have Plan- 20.3%, No Plan-79.7%.

4. Do you have a fallout shelter? Yes-1.5%, No-98.5%.

5. Do you plan to build one in the next six months or year? Yes-32.8%, No-67.2%.

Forty-three per cent of the families questioned said they have a storm cellar at present.

Miss Flatt said such cellars could be made into fallout shelters at small costs.

"Something needs to be done," she said, "to make our citizens realize the danger. It is our duty to make them wake up, face reality and take action."

A report from the OHS science department Wednesday said radiation count of snow measured by new equipment at the school showed 800 counts per minute.

This was less than half the count shown in a measurement taken from snow before Thanksgiving. This count, 1800 c.p.m., was taken after Soviet Russia set off its huge nuclear bomb in tests.

Science instructor Caley said the normal count, from no specific source, is 12 per minute.

EDITORIAL

With less than two weeks until Christmas, the majority of the food, toys and clothing for needy families of Olton is still to be collected.

The Welfare list names 41 families in this community who will need food for Christmas. These families have a total of 215 children.

It will take approximately \$6 to feed each of these families.

This program has been frequently criticized on the basis that some of these families don't appear to really need the help.

"They drive a nice car but their kids are ragged."

"They always seem to be able to buy a bar of candy or a coke."

In many cases, these things are true. However, do those of us who are more fortunate have the right to judge?

Do we know how we might react under the same circumstances?

Is it possible that for some of these people life might be so miserable that some sort of luxury is necessary to make the rest of it bearable?

This does not mean we condone foolish spending. But what if your child had to dress in rags, couldn't do the things the other children do and was constantly "looked down on"?

If you had a nickle to buy him a bar of

candy as a special treat, what would you do?

We must remember, too, that many of these people have not had the advantages that we have had. Some of them have little education.

It has been said that they do not want any education. Some of the older children in school seem to close their minds and refuse to be educated, it is said.

In many cases, it is remarkable to us that they are able to learn anything at all. Most children go to school well dressed, well fed and eager to learn.

There are those few, however, who must go in rags, with no breakfast, perhaps no lunch and then must go home to living conditions that could hardly be described as satisfactory.

How can we expect a child to be eager to learn in a situation like this?

We do not feel that it is our place to criticize, but rather to attempt to understand.

If we do give to those who do not need it, the only reason for concern is the possible harm we might be doing them. It isn't likely to harm the giver.

We feel, that in this case, the number of those who do need and would appreciate our help, would more than balance any harm we might do.

Mustangs Win Consolation In Basketball Tournament

The Littlefield Wildcats basketballers came from behind in the last quarter to win over Olton 65-52 in a game here Dec. 5.

The Mustangs led in this game from the start until the last quarter when Littlefield scored 28 points and Olton scored 7. Littlefield was trailing 48-37 when they went into the final quarter.

Johnny Schenck had 23 points for Olton and Gary Johnson had 15. George Jones contributed 7, Ronnie Parsons 4 and George Phillips 3.

Olton had a 30-18 margin at half-time, but were outscored 19 to 13 points in the third quarter and then were beaten out completely in the final quarter of the game.

Littlefield also won the "B" game 36-27. Rusty Sherman was high point man with 8 while Jimmy Jones and Sam Roden both had 7.

In the Abernathy tournament, Dec. 7, 8, 9, Olton won a consolation trophy by winning two and losing one.

In the first round of the tournament, Olton lost to a "hot shooting" Slaton team 64-32. Gary Johnson had 21 points

and capped. He not only lacks the aptitude for learning, but he is running the chance of falling prey to disease germs.

A youngster who is allowed to go to school suffering from a cold or the flu, runs the risk of serious complications. These troubles may develop into pneumonia, or if his resistance is low, signs of tuberculosis may appear.

However, when a slight illness is promptly and properly cared for, the child is usually well in a day or so.

The teacher can also be alert to notice if a child isn't feeling well. Of course, she is not expected to diagnose disease, nor is it her province to give health examinations, but she can recognize the common signs of pallor, a cold, and fever.

For his own protection and of other children in the classroom, a sick child should not be allowed to stay in school. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health).

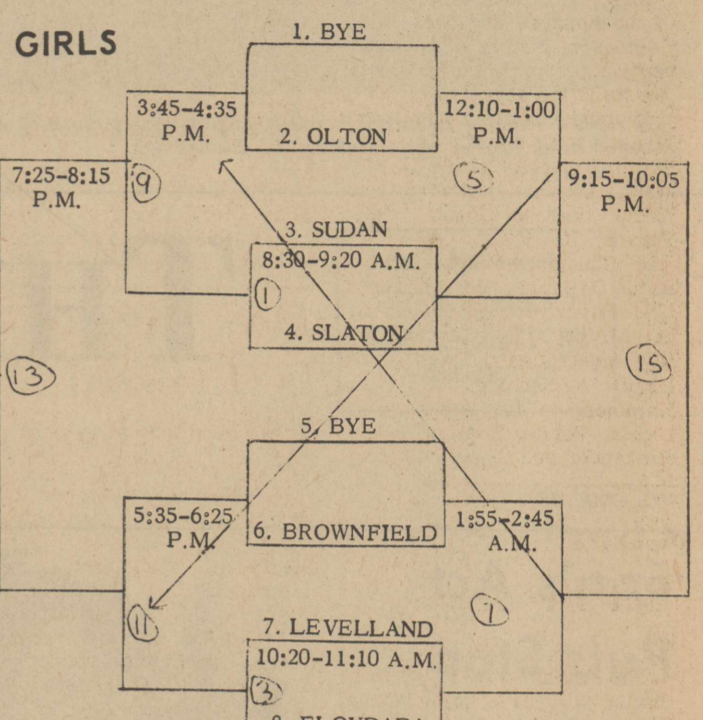
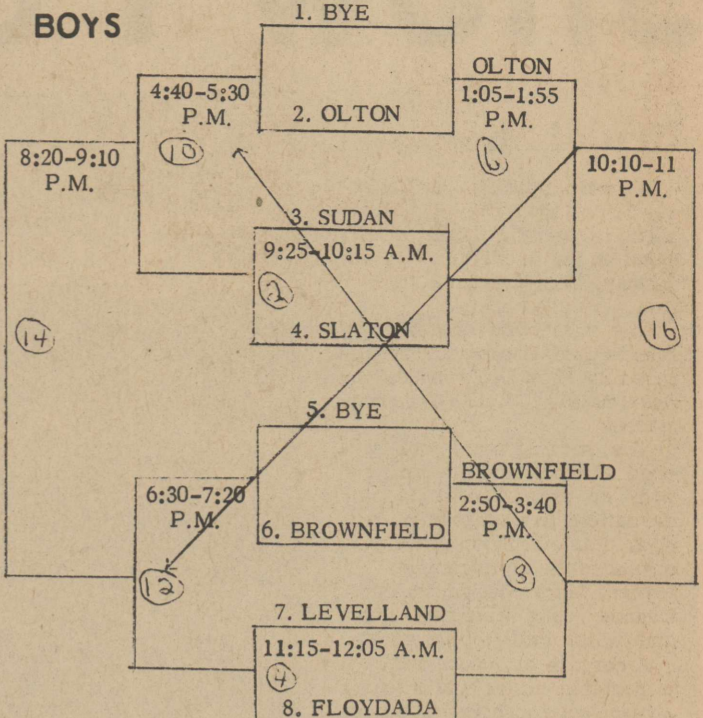

Colds, especially a child's cold, should never be neglected.

But how many times have you heard a parent mention that Junior or Susie "have the sniffles" but they "seemed" well enough to go to school.

And what's more they will continue to go to school as long as they're able to walk, and only when they become

seriously ill does the careless parent call the family physician.

But by that time a good many children in Junior or Susie's classroom have become exposed, thus setting up a chain of sickness and time lost from school.

And with the threat of the various types of flu hanging over the State, the common sense protection of keeping a child home when he or she is not feeling up to par makes more sense than ever.

A child who is sent to school feeling tired, perhaps because of inadequate meals, is handi-

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Traffic Safety Plans Outlined

A stepped-up traffic safety and enforcement program was outlined recently by the Highway Patrolmen in the Littlefield District by Sergeant D.S. Lawson, in charge of the district and Capt. E.L. Posey, in charge of the Lubbock region of the Patrol.

The Lubbock area received the Fleet Safety Award as being the safest area in the state and the Littlefield District received the award as being the safest district in the area. The awards will be presented at a banquet to be held in Lubbock later this month.

The eight Patrolmen in the district heard Lawson tell of the board state program which begins Sunday and aimed at decreasing the number of persons killed on Texas highways from now until the end of the year.

Therefore, he continued, these factors will comprise the program:

1. Field personnel throughout the state are being instructed to redouble their efforts to remove reckless and dangerous drivers from the highways.

2. Field personnel throughout the state are being ordered to step up their programs of stopping motorists to check their driver licenses.

3. The use of radar will be greatly increased by the addition of numerous new units which will augment the radar equipment already in use.

"These measures are being implemented as our part of what we hope will become an overall drive on the part of everyone concerned to prove that something can be done to reduce the loss of life and property in traffic accidents," Lawson said.

"Now that we know we have lost ground in November, we can only look to an intensified program of traffic safety during December to save as many lives as possible," Capt. Posey commented. "And this will not be an easy job, because the toll of 218 deaths during December, 1960, was low for that month of the year, and we will have to beat that in order to halt the trend toward a higher death toll in 1961."

Capt. Posey said field personnel are being instructed to do everything possible to bring

about the maximum voluntary compliance with traffic laws quickly.

"While these measures are being implemented by our department," he stated, "it follows that we must again call upon motorists to join in this all-out drive for a safer 1961 by obeying the laws and rules of safety."

Sunday, December 10, has been designated by Governor Price Daniel as "Safety Sunday" to mark the opening of the annual Statewide Christmas-New Year's traffic safety campaign.

In a special proclamation, the Governor said that "Experience... indicates that the solution to the traffic problem lies in the hands of the individual driver," and urged all citizens "to join in a united effort to awaken the conscience of every driver."

"Safety Sunday" is an important phase of a year-end campaign designed to hold the 1961 Texas traffic death toll below the tentative estimate of about 2,280 recently announced by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

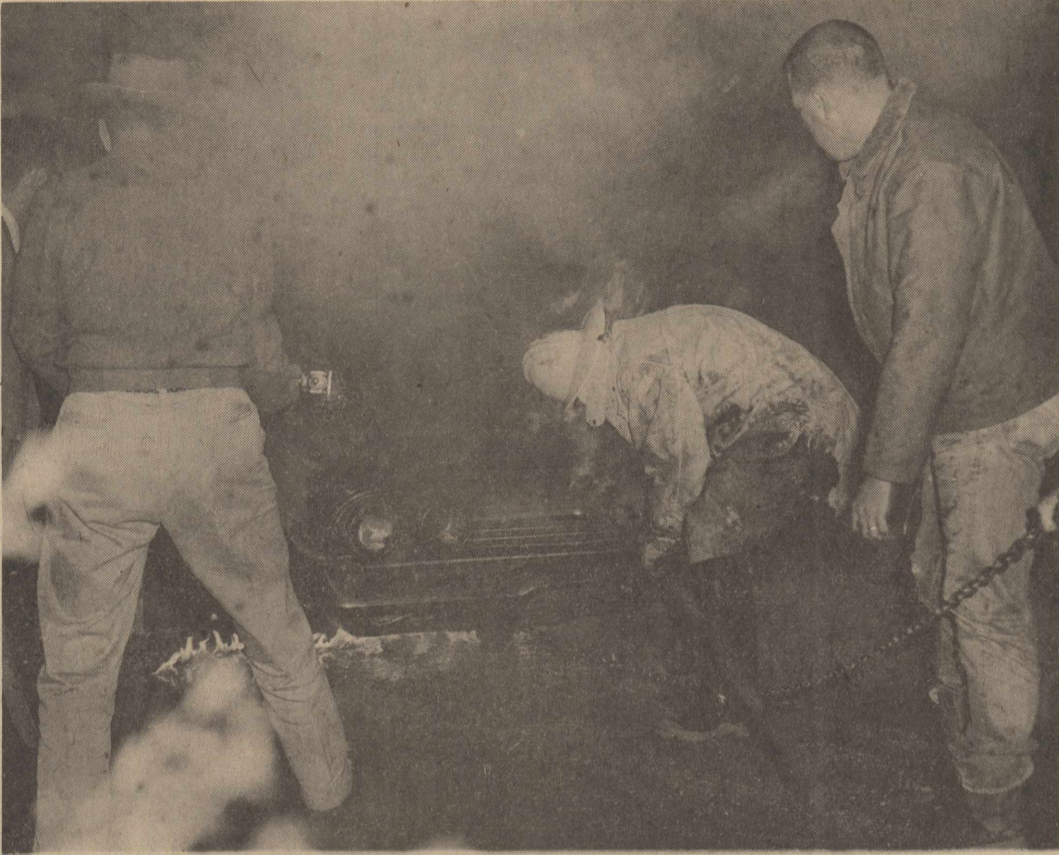

Endorse This Check, Please

Most people today have checking accounts. As negotiable instruments, checks allow you to transfer money easily.

Two main ways to negotiate checks: by delivery or by endorsement and, now and then, by assigning them.

For checks made out to "cash" or "bearer," delivery alone negotiates them. It's not a good idea to make out checks this way. An holder can cash the check without endorsement—a thief, a finder or some other unauthorized person. A merchant cashing it may still have you sign the check for identification.

You negotiate checks made out to named payees by endorsement. There are several kinds:

1. A blank endorsement: The endorser just signs his name, usually a poor idea. Anyone getting hold of it can negotiate it by delivery. As the endorser, you may have to pay if it bounces.
2. Special endorsements say who gets the money. On the check's back, you may write "pay to the order of John Jones," followed by your name. If Jones cashed it, he must sign it, a way to show that he got the check.
3. Some endorsements cut off further negotiations: You sign a check, "for deposit only," "for collection only," "Pay to Joe White only." This means no further negotiation.
4. Qualified endorsements remove endorser's liability if the check bounces. Here you write "without recourse" on the check's back and sign your name.

When would you use such a check, suppose you are collecting funds for your club, a debt for a friend, or a business associate. The debtor makes out the check to you. You have no stake in the check; you just want to pass it on to its rightful owner. But you may have to endorse it, though you don't want to guarantee it. Should the check bounce after negotiation to other people you don't want to hold the bag as an endorser. The qualified endorsement solves this problem.

5. A conditional endorsement limits the rights of the person getting the check. "Pay to the order of John Jones, upon completion of my home." It calls upon John Jones to honor this condition. But such an endorsement does not always work. Jones can still negotiate it or cash it at a store or bank. Only he is subject to the condition, not the store or bank. Such an endorsement may at least fix your rights between you and Jones.

When you endorse a check (except "without recourse"), you guarantee that it is good, even though the first maker may make a stop payment or deny that the reasons for making the check exist.

Bill Of Rights Day Set

December 15 is observed each year as "Bill of Rights Day" throughout the United States. What does this important "document" mean to us? The American "Bill of Rights", consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791, specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today. Among the most familiar of our constitutional guarantees are those relating to freedom of religion, speech, and of the press. The same article protects the rights of peaceable assembly and the privilege of petitioning the government for redress of grievances. Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation. The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; and against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation. He is also secured against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no person may be deprived of live, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, or due process of law. The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights." Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time. Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people." The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people." Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.






