

## School Board Begins Hunt For New Man

Olton's school board, which met in a marathon session Monday night, will interview several candidates Saturday morning for the superintendent's position.

Supt. Joe Harper, who accepted a similar post at McKinney last week, submitted his resignation officially Monday night. It is effective July 1.

The board then tackled the job of naming a new superintendent, discussing plans until after midnight.

Rather than open the post to all applicants, the board chose to accept applications by invitation only.

Half-a-dozen candidates were expected to be invited to meet with the board Saturday morning.

Although discussion of ways to proceed on the hiring of a new superintendent dominated the meeting, the board found time to take action on several items, among them:

1. Accepted resignations from Supt. Harper and Mrs. Harper; Elmira Williams, Thelma Madson and Claudius Williams, teachers in the Bohner School; James Baldwin, as-

stant coach; Evelyn Maxey, homemaking teacher; Betty Samples, first grade teacher; and Robert Samples, junior high teacher.

2. Renewed the contract of Dorman Thomas, school business manager, and set his salary for the year at \$6,500, an increase of \$500 over last year.

Supt. Harper, in submitting his resignation, commended the board for its work, saying it was "through your understanding and leadership" that the school system has been able to make strides forward in the past three years.

"Since I have been here, I cannot remember even one dissenting vote. You have all worked together," he added. "I hope that where I will be going, I will have the same backing of the board and the same good relationship with the students."

Harper, who said he was leaving with regret, challenged the board not to let the school program lag, saying he thought the system has an excellent start on a long-range program of improvement.

## Feed Grain Acreage Set For County

Grain sorghum acreage for Lamb County has been set at 229,000 acres under the 1961 feed grains allotment program, according to L.D. Aten, county ASC manager.

Aten said Wednesday that approximately 50% of the Lamb County farmers had appealed their acreage base by presenting documented proof that their 1959-60 acreage was higher than the acres allotted by the state ASC committee.

Each county is subject to a 5 per cent increase in acreage at the option of individual farmers.

The new feed grains bill which was signed by President Kennedy March 22, is to prevent a further buildup of the feed grain surplus and to reduce the costs of handling the feed grain program.

Grain growers have three alternatives under the new program:

1. Divert 20 per cent of their 1959-60 average acreage to conservation practices and receive 50 per cent of the diversion production in cash or kind.

2. Divert 40 per cent of their two-year average acreage and receive 60 per cent of the diversion production in cash or kind.

3. Reject the entire program. Non-compliance farmers will not be eligible to market their 1961 grain production under the government price supports.

# Busy Officers Wrap Up Theft, 2 Liquor Cases

## Two Youths Face Felony Theft Cases

A series of events—some related, some not—led officers on a trail which broke a six-week-old tire theft case and two separate liquor cases here this week.

It started during the week-end and happened this way:

1. Questioning of two Olton youths—19-year-old Arno Hall and 21-year-old James Whitefield—led to charges being filed in a theft of tires and wheels from Thompson Chevrolet Co. here about six weeks ago.

2. Later, about 7:30 Sunday evening, Hall was involved in a one-car accident north of Olton. The driver of the vehicle, Hall became the target for more interrogation.

3. District Attorney Jack Young of Muleshoe moved into the tangled series of events Monday morning. Questioning of Hall by Young and officers led to a liquor law violation complaint being filed against and Olton Negro man, Perry Lee (Center) White.

Results were: Hall and Whitefield were charged in Justice of the Peace Bill Thomas' court with felony theft. Both went free later on \$1,000 bond.

White was charged in county court with sale of whiskey. He was jailed at Littlefield Wednesday.

Completely separate from these events was the filing of another liquor case against Olton Negro Will Allen.

Allen was charged with possession of whiskey for purpose of sale.

Officers said they found a half-gallon of corn whiskey and a half-pint of straight whiskey in Allen's auto. Allen later pleaded guilty in county court and was fined \$100 and costs.

The varied investigations sent all phases of law enforcement into action. Deputy V.L. Smith and other officers from the county sheriff's department City Police Chief Emmett Burrow, District Attorney Young, highway patrol officers and State Liquor Control Board men all had a hand in the questioning.

Wednesday morning, while officers were wrapping up their probe of the events involving Hall and Whitefield, they were summoned to Olton Farm Supply, which was burglarized sometime Tuesday night.

A tire theft case in Plainview Tuesday night of last week, officers learned, involved four, possibly five Olton boys.

None of these was charged in Hale County, but some of them appeared before a grand jury at Plainview Wednesday. Disposition of that case could not be learned late Wednesday.

However, investigators here questioned four boys from that group and later implicated Whitefield and Hall in the Olton tire theft.

Stolen from Thompson Chevrolet were four new tires and wheels. All were recovered by officers and returned.

Following Hall's accident Sunday evening more interrogation of the youngster led to liquor law charges being filed against Center White.

Still another Olton man, as yet not facing charges, was implicated. This man, according to District Attorney Young, acted as a "go-between", procuring liquor from White and passing it on to a buyer.

## Horne Invited Back

### 'Red Danger' Talk Set Tuesday Night

America is "at war", fighting for its very life.

The enemy, declared Howard Horne of Littlefield, district manager of Southwestern Public Service, has us duped to the point that we're apathetic.

That in brief was the gist of a talk by Horne to the Lions Club here Tuesday.

Those who heard him liked what he had to say well enough to invite him back.

Horne was asked to speak at a meeting of the general public here Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the high school auditorium.

The program is being sponsored jointly by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and the Farm Bureau.

Besides speaking on the dangers of Communism, Horne will show films of Communist activities, revealing how far the Reds have come in their quest for world domination.

"Since 1939," Horne told the Lions Club, "the Communists have taken over 24 nations."

As he described America's apathy at home, Horne pulled no punches.

"I wouldn't be surprised if maybe—just maybe—President Kennedy hasn't started thinking that Mr. Khrushchev

is a Communist," he said.

The Russians, Horne continued, once predicted the fall of the U.S. to the Communists in 1973.

"Khrushchev now says they're ahead of schedule... it's only 100 months away. That means 1969."

Horne described America's attitude toward Communism as that of a football coach who wasn't interested in winning. "What if your coach told an opposing coach that he wouldn't try to score, that he'd only try to keep the opposition from scoring?"

Then he declared: "If that happened in Olton and you found it out, you'd run your coach, superintendent and school board out of the county before sunset."

## Burglars Hit Farm Supply, Get No Cash

Burglars hauled off various equipment and a cash register from Olton Farm Supply sometime Tuesday night, but they found no money in the till.

The break-in was discovered early Wednesday morning when Owner Don Spain prepared to open the store for business.

The intruders entered through a rear door after smashing a small hole in it, reaching through and unlocking it.

Taken in the break-in were four lawn mowers, five sets of wrenches, two rotary tillers, and adding machine and the cash register.

Spain said the cash register contained only a few pennies.

The burglars moved a safe from the bookkeeper's office to a loading dock at the rear of the store, apparently intending to haul it away.

However, the safe was found Wednesday morning on the ground. It had been opened and rifled, but nothing was believed missing.

It was the second burglary in a year at the store. Deputy V.L. Smith and Police Chief Emmett Burrow are investigating.

## Two Hospitalized After Car Flips On F M 168

A speeding auto went out of control, knocked over fenceposts like matchsticks and overturned in a farm field north of Olton Sunday evening, sending two Olton area residents to the hospital, with one serious injuries.

The accident occurred about 7:30 p.m. three miles north

of Olton on FM 168, demolishing an auto driven by Arno Hall, 19-year-old Olton resident.

Most seriously injured in the mishap was Jim Coleman, 26, who still was in Plainview Hospital Wednesday evening with back and internal injuries and cuts and bruises. Physicians feared for a time

that surgery would be necessary, but late Wednesday Coleman's condition was said to be improved and surgery was not contemplated.

The other person hospitalized after the wreck was Janie McDermitt, 19. She was treated at Plainview Hospital for cuts about the head and left the hospital Tuesday.

Hall and another passenger, Benny Coleman, 15, received minor cuts in the accident. Neither was hurt seriously enough to require hospitalization.

Investigating officers said Hall received a ticket for exceeding safe speed.

The auto knocked down seven posts as it careened down a fence line, then overturned one complete turn, landing on its wheels.

Bill Angel, Littlefield highway patrolman, investigated the mishap.

## Sides In Capitol For Testimony On Sugar Beets

Truitt Sides representing the Olton Sugar Beet Assn, left Wednesday for Washington where he will testify before the Agriculture committee of the House of Representatives on possible sugar beet acreage for the Olton area.

According to Dick Whiteley, Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture manager, Sides will testify Thursday and Friday and return to Olton Saturday.

Representatives from various parts of the nation will testify before the committee requesting one-third of the Cuban quota be turned over to US farmers to be grown by them.

The extension of the present sugar law has been brought down from 21 months to 15 months.

Congressman George Mahon pointed out that this will cause the agriculture committee to act upon a law sometime this year.

## Appetites Good

### Area Residents Buy Food At Fast Clip

(Special to the Enterprise) NEW YORK, May 17—The individual Lamb County resident spent more money for food in the past fiscal year than did people in most parts of the United States.

On a weekly basis, food expenditures locally were at the rate of \$5.97 per person per week.

This was solely for food purchased for home consumption. It does not take into account the amount spent in restaurants.

By way of comparison, the outlay in other parts of the United States was \$5.52 per person weekly. In the West South Central States, it came to \$5.05.

Figures on food consumption and on the amount of money that went for that purpose during the year are contained in data released by the Department of Commerce, the Department of Agriculture and other sources.

They show that the average American has a sturdy appetite. In the past year he consumed no less than 1,488 pounds of food, nearly 29 pounds a week.

What makes up his weekly diet? The principal items are meat, 2.8 pounds, milk products, 8.0 pounds, eggs, a half dozen, vegetables and fruits, excluding potatoes, 7.9 pounds, cereals and baked goods, 2.8 pounds, and fats and oils, including butter and margarine, nearly a pound.

In Lamb County, the total amount of food consumed in 1960 is estimated at 32,438,000 pounds.

Among non-farm residents, the reports show, the use of meats and vegetables is somewhat higher than it is among farm dwellers. As to other kinds of food, however, farm residents consume more.

In Lamb County, assuming normal buying conditions, 26 percent of the food dollar goes for meat, poultry and fish, 23 percent for fruits and vegetables, 19 percent for dairy products and 16 percent for cereals and baked goods. The remaining 16 percent is divided among the host of other food items.

A lamb sale, immediately followed by a weaning pig sale, will be held Saturday in the FFA stock show barn.

The sales are sponsored by the Olton Swine Breeders' Association and the Olton Sheep Breeders' Association.

Seventy-five to 100 head will be up for sale in the lamb sale and 100 to 125 head in the pig sale.

Lambs in the sale are Southdown, Shropshire, Hampshire, Dorset, Fine Wool, Fine Wool Cross and Suffolk.

Boars, gilts and barrows will be shown in the pig sale. They are Hampshires, Durocs, Spotted Polands, Berkshires, Poland Chinas and Chester Whites.

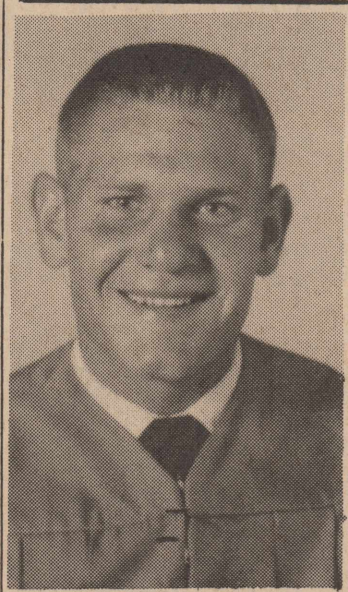
**Sorority Meets At Muleshoe**

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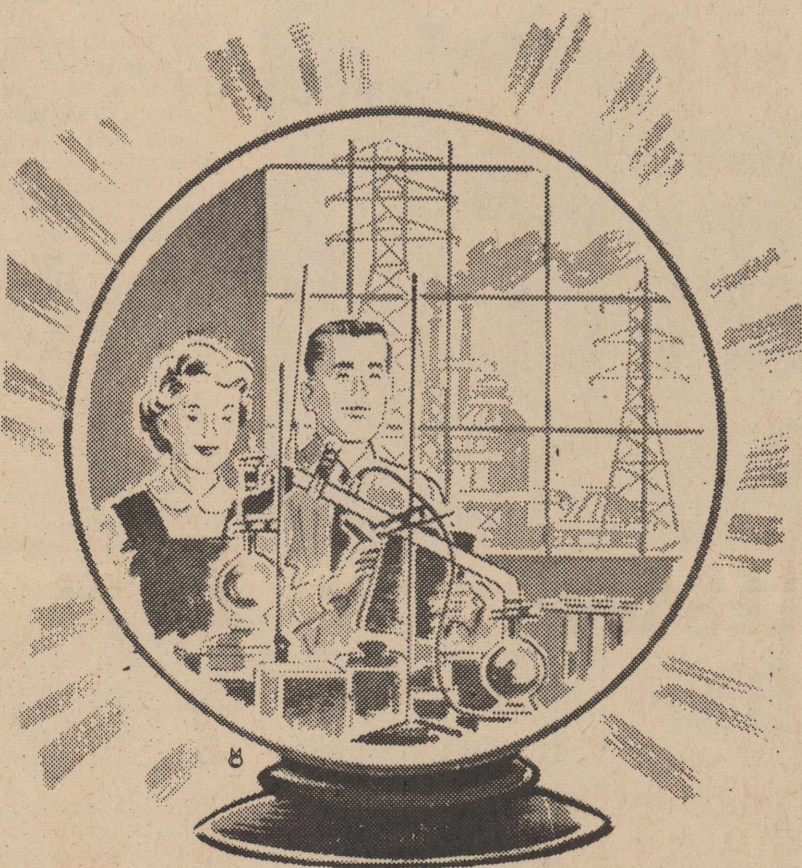
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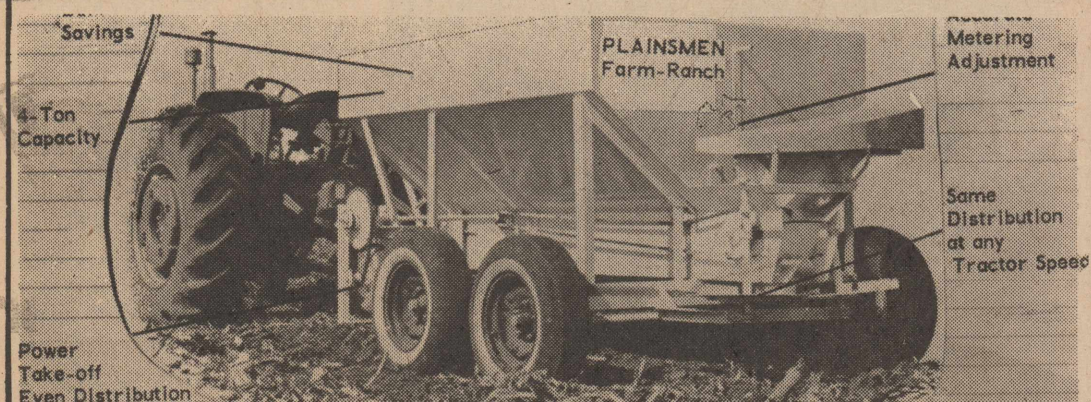
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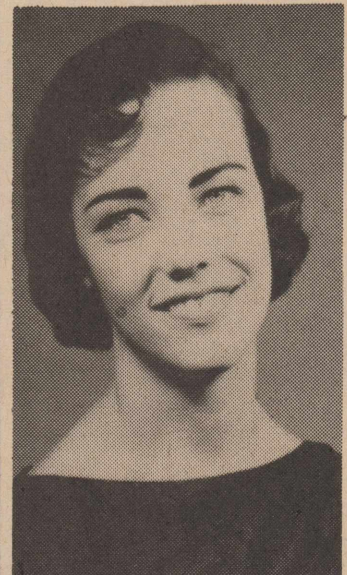

### Notaries Public Must Re-Qualify

Secretary of State Frank Lake announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

Lake emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1961 and May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

**TWO-WAY PROPOSITION**

We in the small-town business field are well past the time when shoppers bought their goods at home purely out of loyalty for the old home town. Shopping-at-home is a two-way street. The businessman, along with the shopper, must cooperate in this matter. And it is the merchant, not the customer, who must take the initiative to keep people trading at home. Plainview and Lubbock are so near to us that we will get nowhere if we simply ask people not to drive to one place or the other. Shoppers don't think in terms of how many miles or how much gas or expense is involved; they merely think of how many minutes it takes to get there on modern highways. Making people feel guilty will not stop them from shopping trips. Promotion of the "shopping-at-home" practice will help, but it will take more than that. For one thing, it's going to take a selling job. Merchants must promote the idea that they have new items coming in all the time that are as good as can be found in a larger city. Local merchants have a strong weapon in providing the "extras" of friendly, personal service that can't be bought at any price in a large, unfamiliar city. Customers believe that a merchant has a responsibility to keep a variety of the latest merchandise in stock just as merchants believe the customer has a responsibility to support local business rather than those in nearby larger towns. Local Olton merchants can fulfill their obligations by adopting many "tools" used by the big operators, such as using plenty of store signs and decorations and advertising that "excites" the buyer into buying. If we can't excite people into buying here at home—they will go elsewhere. Local Olton merchants are no doubt convince they offer just as good merchandise as anyone, plus superior personal service. What we need to do is to cooperate and coordinate our plans, ideas and actions and convince local and area shoppers that Olton is their shopping center.

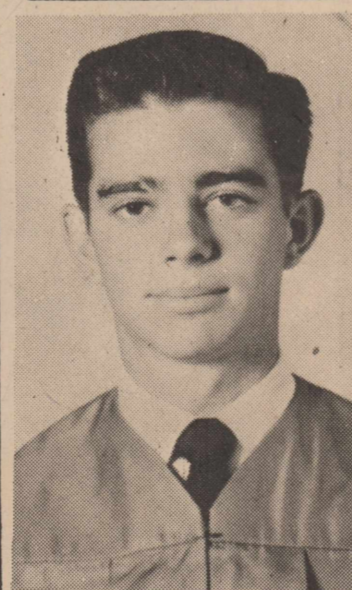

**Lamb Has Eight Rural Accidents In Month Of April**

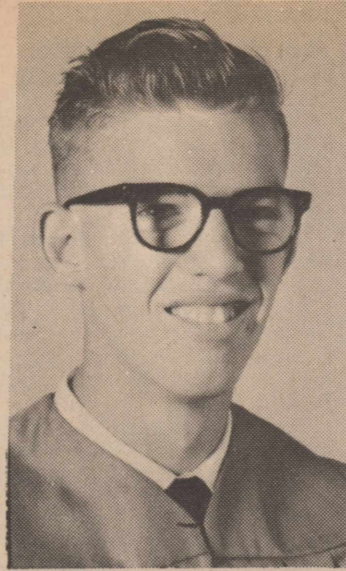

## Cotton Producers Institute Committee Names 5 Here

Five Olton men are included in the Lamb County group of the High Plains Founders Committee for the Cotton Producers Institute, Roy Forkner of Lubbock, chairman, announced today.

They are J.B. James, Elmer McGill, H.G. Walker, W.E. Miller and W.L. Hackler.

Others included in the Lamb County group are J.D. Smith, Littlefield; Roy McQuatters Sr., Spade; R.D. Nix, Sudan; F.M. Smith, Sudan; Delvin Batson, Amherst.

Billy W. Clayton of Spring-

lake is a member of the committee.

Mr. Forkner said committee members in their respective areas will sponsor and help organize efforts to acquaint cotton growers with the program and aims of the Institute.

The Institute is a new, voluntary business organization of cotton growers. Its aim is to expand the total market for U.S. cotton in ways that will expand acreage, production, and profits for the grower, Mr. Forkner explained.

"Program of the Institute centers around research and promotion," he said. "Through research we can lower production costs and improve fiber quality and thus overcome the one-billion-dollar inefficiencies now existing. Research can also give cotton improvements in consumer qualities which will enable it to compete in additional markets totaling five million bales. In promotion, cotton desperately needs a national advertising campaign directed to consumers."

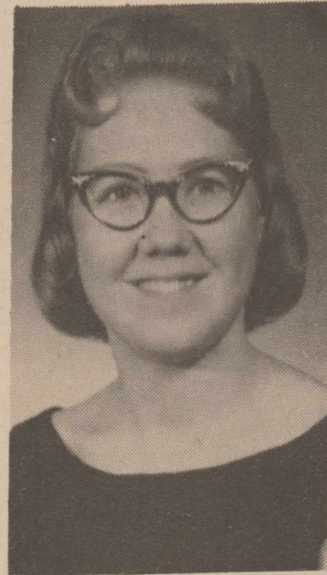
For the Institute, Mr. Forkner envisions up to a 10-million-dollar research and promotion fund to expand the market for cotton.

"World fiber consumption is tending to rise at a spectacular rate," he explained. "If U.S. cotton can maintain its present share, projected expansions in world fiber demand will give us a 20-million-bale market in seven or eight years."

Mr. Forkner pointed out that bigger markets do not necessarily mean bigger profits to cotton growers.

"If we are to earn larger profits, we must lower our unit cost of production, improve quality, and sell cotton products more aggressively," he stated.

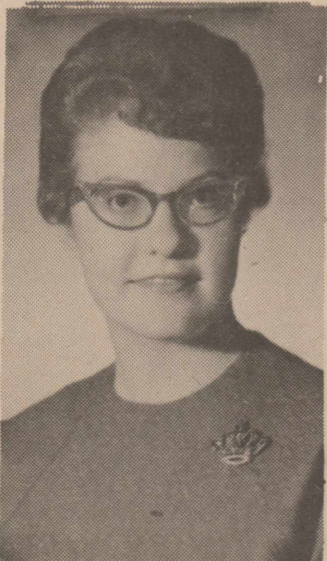

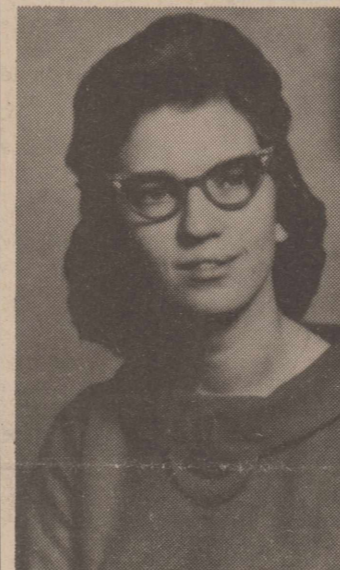

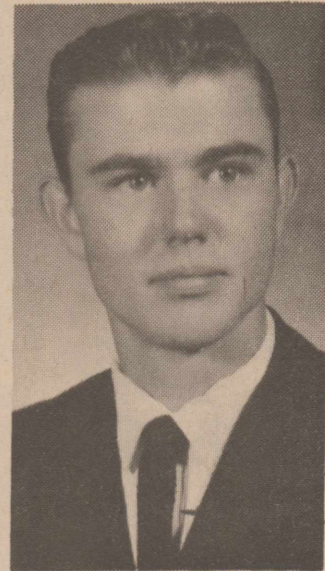

**Research Foundation Extends To Grasses, Legumes**

The High Plains Research Foundation is extending its private enterprise research program into the field of grasses and legumes. The Board of Trustees of the Foundation, realizing the need for additional grasses and legumes that could be used in farming and ranching throughout west Texas, recently approved the new research program. This research endeavor is being initiated to develop improved varieties of grasses and legumes that would be adapted to both dryland and irrigated farming and ranching. The Foundation has received international recognition through the cooperation of scientists from all over the world. These scientists have sent direct to Halfway not only the grasses and legumes but also many varieties of crops for the Foundation's research program. Included are: cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, sesame, corn and peanuts. Sixty-six different crop and range grasses, and one-hundred and fourteen legumes have just been planted in the new research program. Some of the seed came from the Central Rainland Experiment Station in Anglo-Egyptian Sudan. Others from Amman, Jordan; Montpellier, Herault, France; Morocco; and Johannesburg, South Africa. Included also are grasses and legumes from throughout the United States. "These new programs are a part of the search for new crops for the area," Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist, said when he announced that the grasses and legumes planting had taken place.

Recipe Of The Week

Oatmeal cake is the favorite of the family of Mrs. Homer Curry who furnished the recipe for this week. Pour 1 1/2 cup hot water over 1 cup oats. Let stand. Cream together: 1 cup brown sugar 1 cup white sugar and 1/2 cup shortening, then beat in 2 eggs. Then sift 1 1/2 cup flour with: 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 teaspoon soda 1/2 teaspoon salt Add dry ingredients to sugar and shortening mixture, then add oats and beat well. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes in a loaf or long pan. Icing: 3/4 stick oleo 3 tablespoons condensed milk 3/4 cup brown sugar for one minute. Then all 1 cup coconut and either 1/2 or 1 cup of nuts, depending on the person. Pour over baked cake and brown lightly under the broiler.

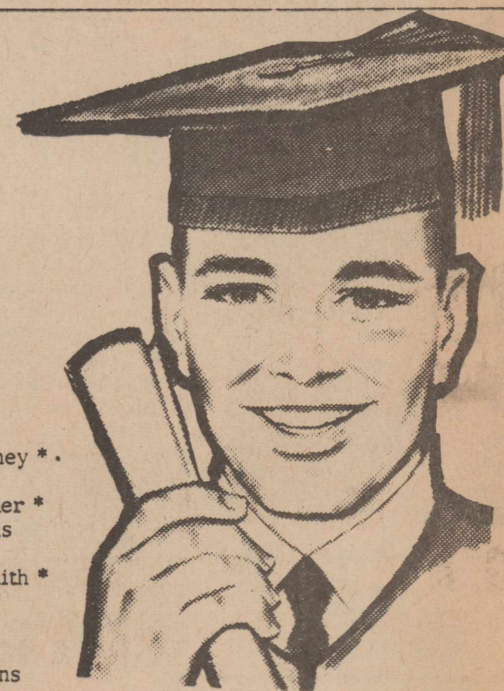

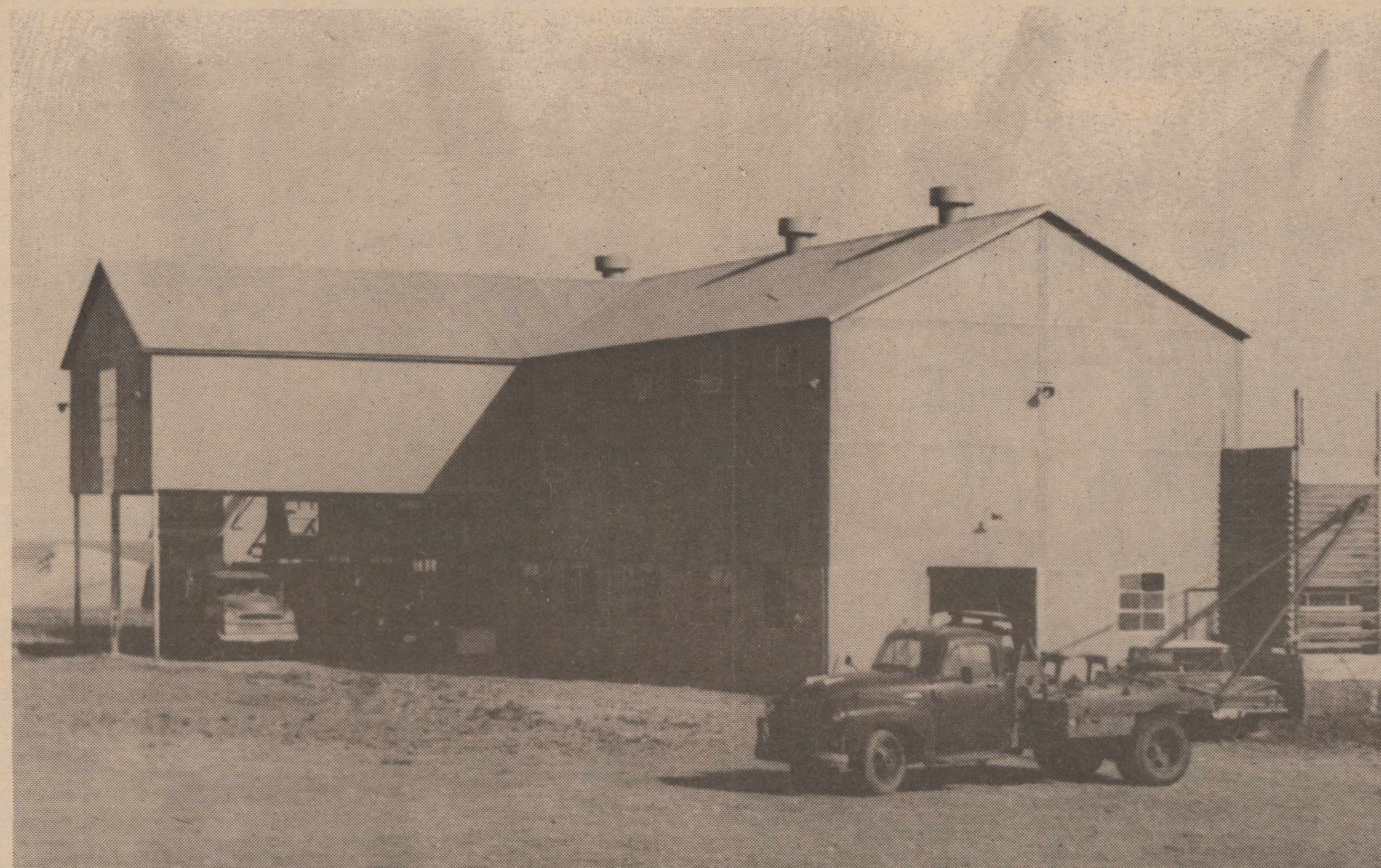

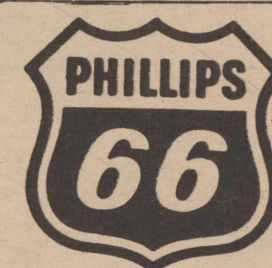
