Two-year-old Robin Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Gene Brown, remained in critical condition Tuesday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, after being hit by a car here Saturday afternoon.

Police Chief Emmitt Burrows said the accident occurred at the G.H. Bley Service Station in the south driveway. He termed the mishap as an "unavoidable accident."

Driver of the car was Larry Don Alexander, about 20, who is employed at Jeffrey Lumber Co.

A witness said the boy and his mother stopped at the station and the car hit the boy as he dashed across the driveway to his father, who was inside the station.

"The boy was too short for the driver to see. He was only a foot in front of the bumper when the man started the car," a witness said.

"I yelled, but the driver didn't

hear me before he took off. It was too late. Both a front and rear wheel of the car passed over the boy. Then I ran to call the ambulance," the witness continued.

After being given emergency treatment at Community Hospital the victim was taken by Parsons ambulance to Methodist Hospital, where he underwent surgery as a result of a fractured skull.

The boy remained on the critical list Tuesday afternoon, but was reported to be improving.

ORC Board Sets Club House Rule

C. The directors have set the following fees: 1. Minimum Fee---\$10.00 2. 20 to 50 People---\$15.00 3. Over 50 People---\$25.00 This is in addition to a \$10 Key Deposit to insure the return of key and leaving of the Building and premises in good condition.

ARTICLE NO. 3 The closing hours of the Lounge Area shall conform to the golfing hours, except when an evening activity is scheduled-then the Lounge Area is to be vacated thirty minutes prior to the scheduled activity.

ARTICLE NO. 4 The proper use of the Club House will be in accordance with the obligation and discipline-Article X of the Constitution and By-Laws- with this addition: "Any person or organization failing to comply with the policies may be denied the future use of the facilities."

Tom Rosses Pioneer Alaska Homestead

There are still places in the United States where television and electricity have not reached, a Sears and Roebuck catalog takes the place of shopping centers, and the spirit of the pioneer remains.

This is true in the "Land of the Midnight Sun"--Kenny Lake, Alaska, where a former Olton family, the Tom Rosses, is homesteading 160 acres of land. Ross also purchased 160 acres of the tree-covered wilderness.

The Rosses moved on their homestead, located in a plateau of the Cooper River Valley, in February of 1960 and began clearing the land. Spruce, aspen and diamond willow trees are natives of the land.

After spending 11 months pioneering their land, the Rosses made the 4,000 mile return trip to Olton in December of 1960. Ross returned to his Alaskan farm in May of this year.

His wife, Aleda, and children, Elisa Ann, 3 1/2, and Tommy, seven weeks, remained here with Mrs. Ross's parents.

Woman Burned By Pan Of Hot Flaming Grease

An Olton woman was severely burned while attempting to quench a pan of flaming grease last Wednesday at her home in west Olton.

The woman, Miss Willena Gordon, was cooking dinner when the grease caught fire. While attempting to run to the door to throw the flaming grease into the yard, she slipped and fell, sending hot grease over parts of her body and setting a nearby curtain afire, according to her brother, Fred Gordon.

The injured woman's father, G.C. Gordon, who was in the back yard at the time of the mishap, rushed into the house and extinguished the flaming curtain by throwing water on it.

Miss Gordon then ran to the home of a neighbor, Dr. Lynn Fite, who gave her emergency treatment for what he termed apparent third degree burns. He said, however, it takes 24 hours to determine the definite degree of a burn.

The victim then was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock by Parson's ambulance.

Gordon said the left side of his sister's body was badly burned, but reported her in fair condition Friday. He expected her to be dismissed from the hospital sometime this week.

Progress Hindered, Says C-CA

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Wednesday began circulation of a petition addressed to District Judge E.A. Bills, asking the court to take immediate action to sell the old courthouse square property.

Directors of the C-CA endorsed the petition Tuesday morning at a regular meeting. Non-development of the property "tends to hinder the progress of the town of Olton," the petition reads.

It asks that Judge Bills accept the highest bid "now in your possession."

Here is the complete text: "To Honorable E.A. Bills, District Judge, Littlefield, Texas.

"We, the undersigned, citizens of the town of Olton, constituting a large segment of Olton, do hereby petition and request you as final arbiter, to accept the highest bid or offer now in your possession for the Old Court House Square Property.

"We state that this property is an eyesore to Olton and that this property should be sold so that it may in turn be cleaned up and developed. We also state that the non-development of this property tends to hinder the progress of the town of Olton.

"We also state that we believe that the large segment of Olton wishes this property to be sold and that there are people who do not live in Olton and have no interest in the progress of Olton who are the ones holding up the sale of this property."

The square property has been in receivership since September, 1958, as a result of a suit filed by Dr. B.J. Souders against Drs. James and Lynn Fite.

Souders and the Fite brothers once were partners in operation of an osteopathic hospital on the square property. Souders and Dr. James Fite have since moved away, but Dr. Lynn Fite maintains a practice here.

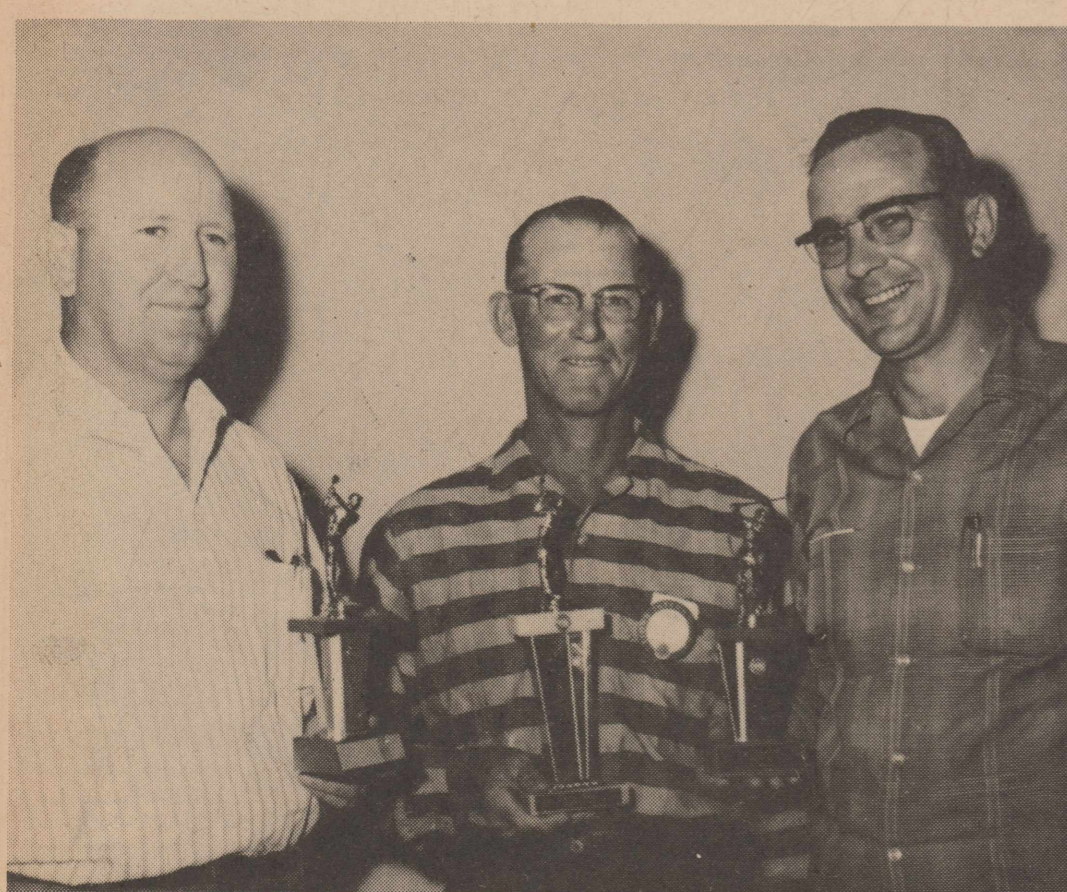
The judge ordered the one-time hospital and land up for bids almost two years ago. At a hearing several months ago, the court turned down a bid of \$13,500.

Receiver is Billy Hall, Littlefield attorney. Hall said in mid-May that he had received eight bids on the property in the preceding 30 days.

Besides endorsing the square petition, the C-CA heard a report on efforts to get a land-

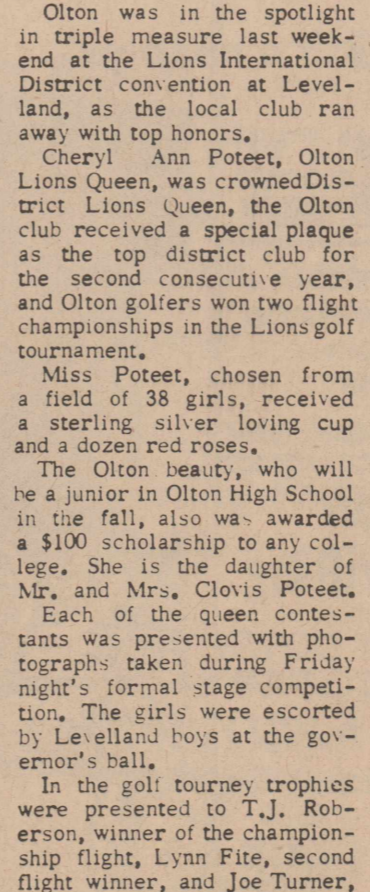

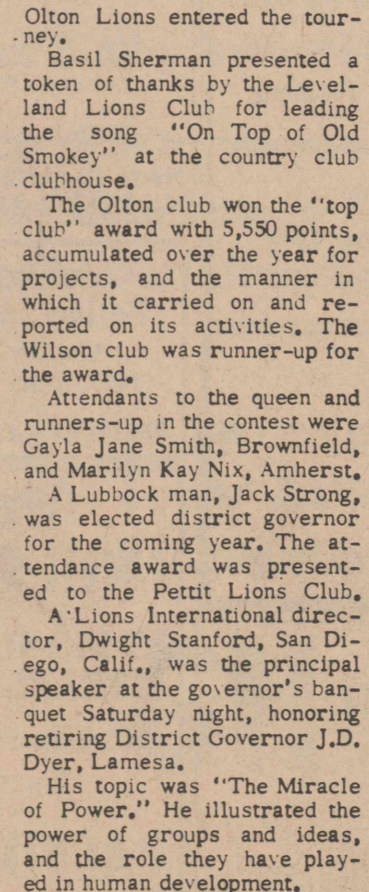

In order to receive a patent on the land he is homesteading, the Ross family must live on the farm seven months a year, and clear and plant 20 acres within five years. Mrs. Ross said they have already cleared 10 1/2 acres, and "plan to make a real grain farm on the land, and raise barley and wheat."

Elevation there is about 1270 feet above sea level. The soil is about 15 to 16 inches in depth generally, the upper five to six inches being almost black.

"Everything we need is ordered from a catalog. The women just wear blue jeans and shirts," said Mrs. Ross.

A typical evening of entertainment there might seem somewhat different from the bowling leagues and drive-in movies that Olton people enjoy.

"In Alaska we don't have a television, or even electricity, so we just visit," commented Mrs. Ross.

The Rosses haul water in shortening barrels from the nearest village, 25 miles away. One of the barrels froze last winter, and after remaining in the house for a week, it still did not melt.

A one-room plywood cabin, 14x30, covered in black tar paper, serves as the Rosses' home. "We plan to get some bark from the saw mill and cover the outside of our house to make it warmer," said Mrs. Ross.

Surprises are plentiful for the Rosses in the land of the howling wolves and hungry bear. Upon returning from a trip to Anchorage, they discovered a bear had chewed off two corners of their house.

"Our dog is part wolf, and won't bark at the wolves. I knew the wolves wouldn't hurt me, but I never got close enough to find out," she said laughingly.

Mrs. Ross saw a bear approaching her house one day, and feeling it was too close for comfort, she fired several shots to scare it away. When asked if she often used a gun, she replied, "All I know about a gun is to just squeeze the trigger, but I wouldn't dare go out without it."

The wilderness did not seem to frighten Mrs. Ross though, she and Elisa spent nine weeks by themselves last year, while Tom worked in Anchorage. She said the only thing that frightened her was a truck load of Indians who were driving by, and began to shout and wave. "They were only being friendly," she said laughingly.

While in Alaska the Rosses experienced temperatures from 40 degrees below zero to 80 above. In winter the sun rose about 9 a.m. and set about 3 p.m., while in summer it came up about 2 a.m. and went down about 10:30 p.m.

"I saw a cabbage that weighed 40 pounds at the Alaska State Fair in Anchorage. It looked like a washtub," Mrs. Ross commented.

It was quite a common site for the Rosses to have three or four families, who were looking for land to homestead, to camp in their front yard. "Once we had three tents and a school-bus in our yard---it looked like a carnival," joked Mrs. Ross.

She went on to say, "There are more Texans than anyone else up there, but we met people from almost every country. Our nearest neighbors are about a half-a-mile away." There are about 30 homesteaders in the area.

Ross summed up his stay in Alaska by saying, "I am

Crops Continue To Look Good

Crops in the Olton area continued to look good this week as they escaped threatening hail storms, which lashed across the South Plains.

Storm clouds sent local residents scurrying to cellars Saturday afternoon, as tornadoes dipped and hail battered nearby towns.

"I just knew I saw a tornado, after I heard the siren. I just left my basket of groceries in the store and headed for the cellar," said Mrs. Gene Mitchell.

Clouds dumped about an inch of rain at the Bill Langford farm, a mile south of Olton, but only sprinkles were reported north of town. Rains totaled about half an inch east and west of Olton. No hail was reported by local farmers.

Barley began to roll into Olton elevators this week, as local farmers got the harvest into full swing. United Elevators reported four loads that totaled about 40,000 pounds. Sanders-Paris elevator said it received about 100,000 pounds of barley from local farmers.

Several farmers who began barley harvest are Earl McClain, Billy Griffins, Doug Giles, Elmer McGill, Bill Langford, Quinton Redinger, Glen Peterson and M.G. Brown.

A load of wheat also was taken to United Elevators, but officials said it was too wet. Wheat harvest is expected to start rolling next week.

Insects have moved out of most cotton fields, according to area farmers, but they are still "watching closely in case the bugs return."

Most farmers agree that their cotton "looks good and is growing fast."

Farmers completed most of their planting this week, except for a few vegetable crops.

A WHILE BACK the Enterprise printed a story in which Chet Huntley, the TV news commentator, denied a charge by the Cinema Educational Guild, Inc., that he is a communist.

Huntley is among about 100 stars listed in the tract by the CEG. The CEG is run by Myron Fagan.

While denying that he is a communist, Huntley pointed out: "It (the tract) contains the names of some who I am sure either were or are communists; but it (the tract) is a deliberate kind of blackmail in respect to myself and others."

Mrs. J.W. Huckabee, Rt. 1, Olton, has gone a step further and written Dr. F.W. Mattox of Lubbock Christian College, requesting additional information on the CEG.

Dr. Mattox referred her to a letter he received from the House Un-American Activities Committee, which reads, in part:

"A check of the files of the committee... reveals that 53 of the persons whose names are listed in the tract have been identified in public testimony before the committee as having been members of the communist party. Two of these denied under oath that they had been members."

Dr. Mattox wrote: "I talked to Pat Boone (the singing star)

...while they were here, and they say that this tract is unfair, but they also say that many of them (listed in the tract) are known to be communists or communist sympathizers."

"I think it is sufficient for us to know that the communists are all out to take the world, and that all of us must be very careful to preserve our freedoms," said Dr. Mattox.

I'M INCLINED to agree with Dr. Mattox. We know the communist goal and we should be doing everything we can to stop the Reds.

What worries me, however, is the fact that so many people accept what they read in any sort of pamphlet to be the whole truth.

When we do this, we throw aside the old principle of American justice that a man is innocent until proven guilty.

I think that Mrs. Huckabee is probably going about it in the right way. She must have

had a doubt about the CEG tract, or she wouldn't have written for more information about it.

Another step in the right direction is the action taken this week by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The C-CA soon will distribute locally a booklet describing ways that citizens can help in the fight against communism.

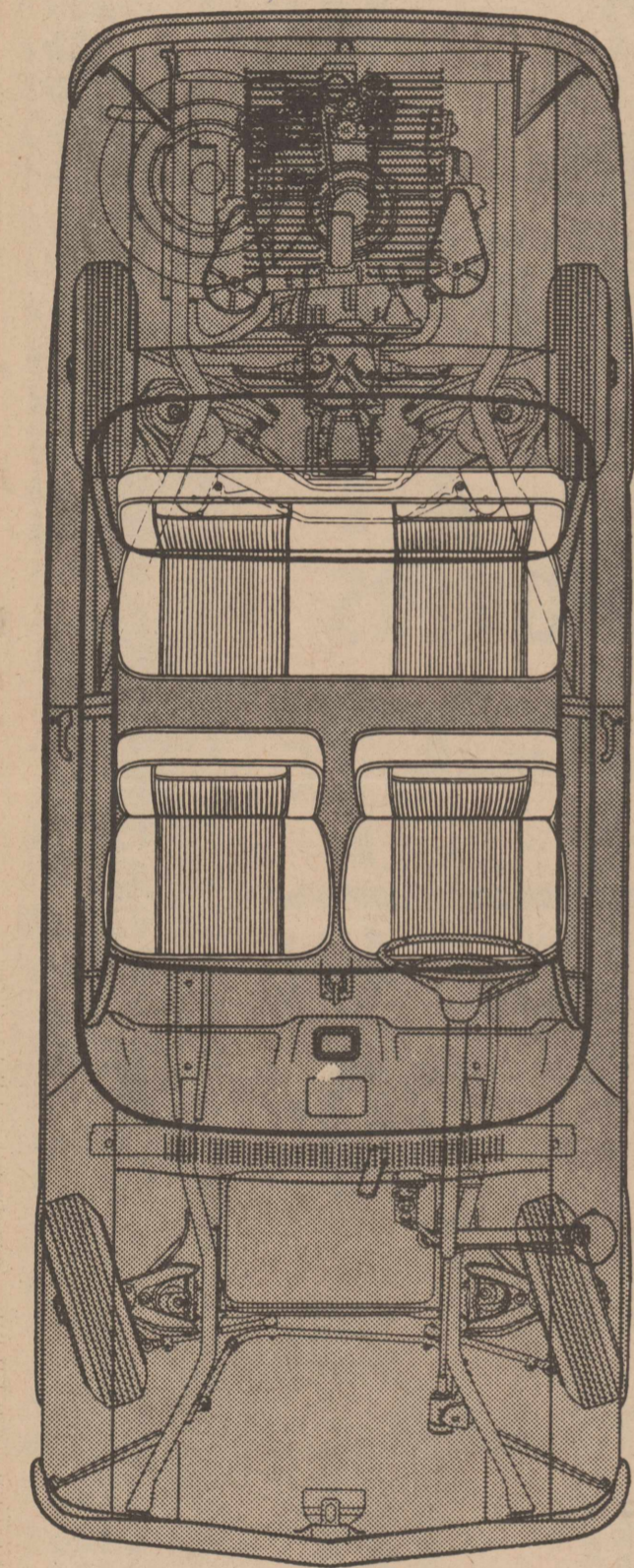
Chamber Writes Letter to Officials
