## Teacher Changes, Plans For School Year Get OK

### Smart Takes New Mexico Coaching Job

Olton School Board members returned decisions on a series of school business transactions July 11 at a board meeting in the high school.

Two new teachers were named and another resigned as the group met.

Robert Lewis Nickerson will join the high school staff as assistant football coach and boys' basketball coach. Miss Sandra Meadows will instruct junior high and high school physical education classes and coach girls' high school and junior high basketball teams.

Assistant football coach Jeff Smart resigned his position here to become head football coach at Springer, N.M., High School.

The 1961-62 school calendar was approved. Registration for the fall term is set August 24-25. Superintendent Johnny Clark said the calendar "is subject to change by the school board at any time due to weather conditions or other abnormal events."

A date was set for a Public Hearing of the school budget for 1961-62. The hearing will be held August 8 at 8 p.m. in the high school. Clark said anyone interested is invited to attend the session.

The board appointed Elmer Moore textbook custodian. Clark said a list of books from which new textbook selections will be made, is being studied.

Olton State Bank was designated by the board as the depository of school funds for the next two years.

The superintendent said to complete the school faculty needs three fifth grade teachers, a fourth grade, a junior high math, a junior high science and high school home

### In Tornado Weather

## When You Hear The Big Siren, It's Time To Head For Cover

How should you determine when it's time to head for the cellar when "tornado weather" threatens Olton?

In an effort to correct some misunderstanding on what the sirens mean when bad weather approaches, the city has set up the following warning system:

1. When the area is placed under tornado alert, police cars will be dispatched throughout the community, their sirens wailing.

2. This is only a first alert warning, however, and does not mean that families should pack up and head underground. The

police car sirens mean, simply, that the City of Olton is under an alert.

3. Once the police car sirens are heard, residents should be on the alert for the sounding of the big siren at the fire station.

4. When you hear the big siren, it's time to head for the cellar. That means a tornado has been spotted and is headed in the general direction of Olton.

The only other time the big siren will be sounded will be in case of fire, or a firemen's meeting.

## First Cucumber Loads Roll Into Olton Sheds

The doors of the cucumber harvest swung open this week in the Olton area as 36,511 pounds of cukes roled into the Brown-Miller processing shed Monday and Tuesday.

Another bumper cucumber crop is expected here this year. About 350 hands flooded into local cucumber fields. An employee at Olton Co-Operative Producers said he expects almost that many more Mexican nationals to be picking cukes here by next week.

There are 642 acres of cukes under contract here with Brown-Miller Co., Texarkana, and Dalton's of Ft. Worth. The Brown-Miller shed opened Monday at Straw Gin and the Dalton shed will open today at Olton Co-Op Gin.

Harvest was slow early this week as farmers waited for young cukes to fully mature. The peak of the harvest is expected in about three weeks.

Harley Miller, who has 15 acres of cukes, said he will begin harvest Friday. "My cucumber crop looks good this year," he added.

Harvest began Wednesday at the Art Nafzger farm, W.R. Bean is raising the cucumber crop there. Mrs. Nafzger said an agent from a processing shed checked the cukes this week and said "it looks like a real good cuke crop."

Some other area farmers who

began harvest this week are Pau Burrus, Bob Copeland, J.M. Machen, Clovis Potet and P.A. Nafzger.

Potato harvest got underway about July 4 and is expected to last about two more weeks. Harvest of spuds slowed this

week after rains drenched fields last weekend. Thurston Tollett, J.B. Williams and Archie Sorley are harvesting this week.

About 500 acres of potatoes were raised in the Olton community this year and almost 300 acres have been harvested.

## Smart Helped Lead Ponies To 4 Titles

After helping lead Olton High School's football team to two District crowns and two Bi-District titles, Jeff Smart, assistant football coach, has resigned.

Smart, 39, took the coaching position here in 1953 and saw the Mustangs march to District championships in 1953 and 1955, and Bi-District crowns in 1959 and 1960.

Assistant coach here eight years, Smart will resume duties as head football coach August 11 at Springer, N.M., high school.

Smart, his wife, Pat, and their two children, Jennifer, 6, and Cindy, 4, will leave Olton about August 1.

As a member of Olton High School faculty, Smart taught world and American history, civics, drivers education and business math. Besides coaching football, he coached girls' basketball and track.

In 1957 Smart coached the Region I, Class A championship mile relay team for Olton. The relay squad also won first in the Amarillo relays.

Smart served under head coach Joe Turner seven years and present head coach Walter Bryan the past year.

He was graduated from Spur High School in 1940 and Mrs. Smart finished there in 1949. After graduating from high

school, Smart served in the United States Marines until 1945, when he received a medical discharge, after being injured in World War II.

Smart then enrolled at Texas Tech and transferred to Highlands College, Las Vegas, N.M., where he received the BA in physical education in 1950.

Smart took his first position with a school when he came here in September of 1953. He was married in November the same year.

Next summer he plans to study for his masters degree at Highland.

The Smart family attends the Methodist Church and Mrs. Smart is a member of the local order of the Eastern Star. He is a member of the Olton Lions Club.

### JP Replacement Pending After Thomas Resigns

No replacement had been named Tuesday to replace W.E. Thomas Jr., who resigned as Olton Justice of the Peace for Precinct One.

Thomas' resignation was accepted by the Lamb County Commissioners Court at the monthly meeting in Littlefield July 10. The resignation became effective the same day.

County Judge Pat Boone Jr. said Tuesday that he was "looking for anyone who is interested in replacing Thomas."

A replacement is expected to be named at the next meeting of the Court.

Thomas said he resigned because "the position at times interferes with my private business." He had been appointed to fill the JP position vacated by the death of F.L. Burrow.

Thomas commended V.L. Smith Sr., deputy sheriff in Olton, for "the fine manner in which he handles the office of deputy sheriff in our community."

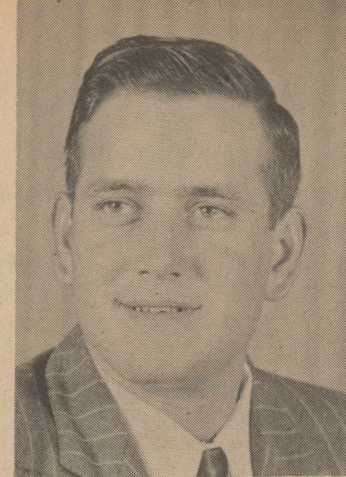

## Woman Dies In Auto Crash Returning From Honeymoon

One person was killed Friday near Tucumcari, N.M. in a head-on auto crash involving cars driven by a Hart man, John B. Lilly, 34, and a couple from Maryville, Ohio.

Killed in the accident was Mrs. Richard Gruenbaum, 22. Her husband, 23, was listed in good condition in Cannon Air Force Base hospital near Clovis, where he is being treated for head and chest injuries. Lilly, suffering a broken hip and arm, was treated in Tucumcari General Hospital and transferred to Plainview Hospital Sunday by Parsons ambulance.

The crash happened on U.S. Highway 66 about three miles west of Tucumcari.

The Gruenbaums were traveling east on the highway when Lilly's half-ton pickup, traveling west, veered into the path of the couple's car, according to state police officer John Tony.

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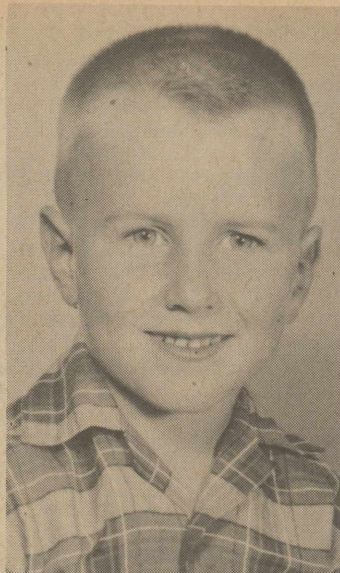

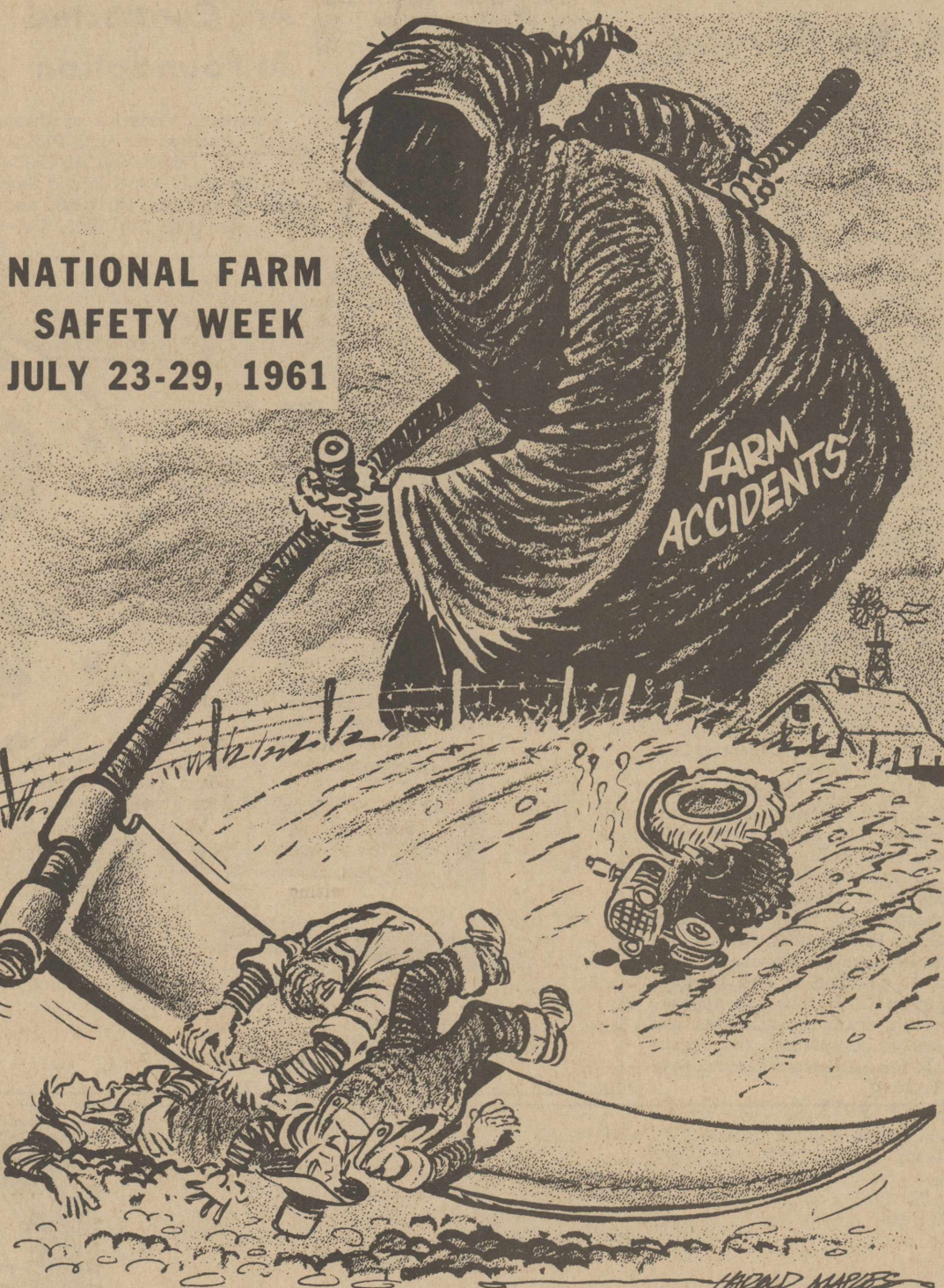
### THREE LATIN

### Farm Safety Should Be A 'Year 'Round Job'

We Americans seem to need an official "week" each year to remind us of things we really should practice every week of every year.

There's nothing wrong with the idea—the official reminder usually proves helpful—but too many people will substitute one week's observance for a year's practice.

National Farm Safety Week, to be celebrated July 23-29 this year, is a perfect example of a "week" that should be considered a continual part of rural life. Especially is that true in this area in which agriculture plays such a leading role in our economic life. It is just plain good sense to avoid the suffering and economic losses resulting from farm accidents.

Co-sponsored on the national level by the National Safety Council and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and on the state level by the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Farm Bureau and the Extension Service, the 18th annual Farm Safety Week has as its theme, "Safety Is a Family Affair."

The Olton Enterprise is glad to be among the many newspapers helping in the campaign to draw attention to the need for the year around observance of safety practices on the farms and ranches.

Accidents in American farm homes take about 2,700 lives a year, according to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, and some 3,400 persons are killed each year doing farm work. This is in addition to the 4,700 farm residents who die on the highways in nonwork accidents.

If we think of safe practices as a means of doing things, rather than as a set of "do's and don'ts," accident prevention will become a way of life—a way of life that will preserve the lives of farm families.

Let's make every week Farm Safety Week.

ernor Daniel has designated it as Farm Safety Week in Texas. Many county judges in Texas are issuing similar proclamations. Pigg said, Theme of this year's observance is "Safety Is a Family Affair."

In his proclamation, President Kennedy called attention to the fact that more than a million farm residents are injured and thousands are killed each year in accidents, and that these accidents bring suffering and sorrow to our farm families and inflict heavy economic losses upon both the farm community and the nation.

Governor Daniel's proclamation pointed out that a vigorous farm accident-prevention education program will be conducted during this week by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Safety Association.

"I urge all Texas farm families to increase their vigilance against needless accidents and further encourage interested organizations and individuals to participate in this program," the Governor said in designating Farm Safety Week in Texas.

Selected for farm safety emphasis this year are two critical areas: rural highway

and farm machinery safety. Motor vehicles claimed the lives of 5,300 farm residents in 1959, including 4,700 nonwork deaths.

Recent studies show that more than one out of ten fatal accidents to rural residents involves farm machinery other than tractors and motor vehicles. About 1,000 persons are killed each year in farm accidents, one-third of which occur on public roads.

The president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council notes that a different phase of farm and home safety will be emphasized each day during Farm Safety Week: Sunday, reverence for life; Monday, agricultural chemicals; Wednesday, prevent falls; Thursday, highway safety; Friday, farm machinery; and Saturday, recreation safety.

Pigg said the failure of rural people to observe safety in their daily living is a chief contributor to their safety record. He said this record includes a disabling injury accident every 32 seconds and a death every 45 minutes to farm residents of the nation.

The Council president said that even though farming activity hits a high mark at this time of year, a greater share of farm accidents occurs during the crop cultivating and harvest season.

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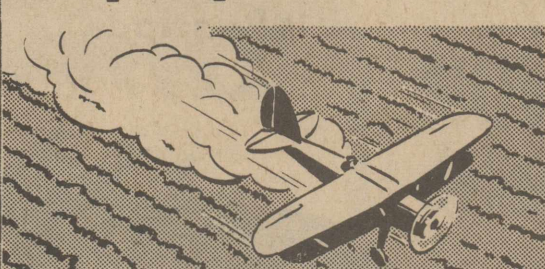
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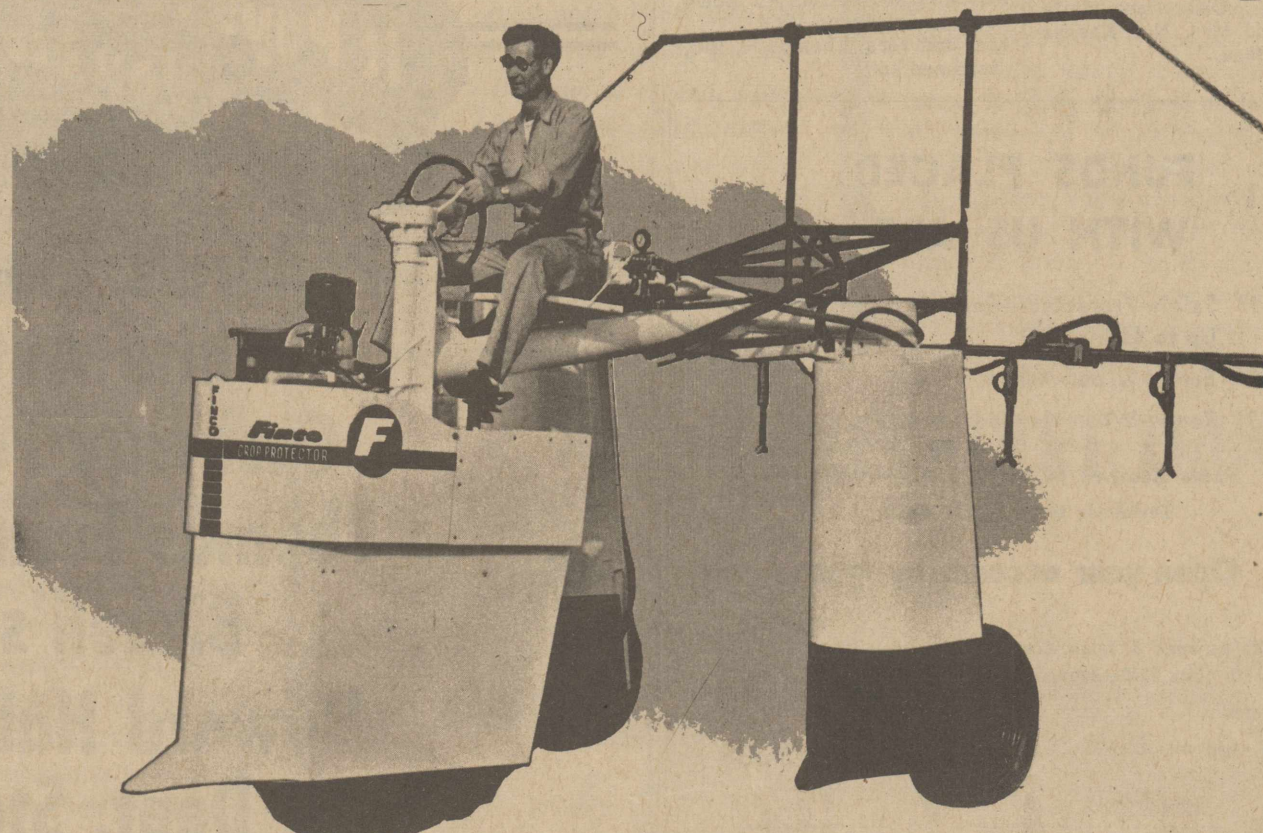

854 Capitalists Reported In Lamb County By Survey

NEW YORK—Lamb County, it appears, has its full quota of capitalists.

The number of local residents owning stock in publicly-held corporations adds up to 854, according to the latest tabulation, based on data gathered in 1959 and 1960.

This represents a considerable increase in the county's share-owning population since 1956, when similar surveys were made. At that time, there were not more than 383 stockholders locally.

The findings represent breakdowns that were made of national surveys taken by the New York Stock Exchange, the University of Michigan and others to discover who owns American business.

As of 1959, they show, there were 12 1/2 million people in the country with money invested in common stock. Preliminary figures indicate that the number is now close to 15 million.

There is a considerable variation throughout the United States in the proportion of the population owning stock. The South Central States, which have been lowest in this respect, are now achieving the most rapid increase.

In Texas, approximately 3.9 percent of the population are stockholders, the report shows.

This compares with 3.3 percent in the South Central States.

The growing urge to own common stock is attributed by G. Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange to a higher level of personal income, to a rising stock market and to a greater public understanding of the investment process. Added to this, he says, has been the concern over inflation.

Tests On Wheat Are Conducted At Foundation

Seventeen varieties of wheat were tested at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway during 1960-61. Wheat was planted October 15, 1960, and harvested June 24, 1961. Del-

bert Langford, associate agronomist, said the wheat project was an intrastate wheat variety test made in co-operation with Dr. I.M. Atkins, agronomist in charge of small grain research in Texas at Texas A & M College.

The pre-plant fertilizer application was 300 pounds of 10-30-10, applied October 7. A top-dressing of 30 pounds of nitrogen from ammonium nitrate was made in March.

The wheat was not grazed.

Yields of the different varieties were: Improved Triumph, 85.9 bushels; Super Triumph, 85.5 bushels; Tascosa, 77.0 bushels; Early Blackhull, 76.8 bushels; Concho, 76.6 bushels; a hybrid MQ-ORO x Wichita, 70.6 bushels; Kaw, 68.7 bushels; Kharhof, 67.5 bushels; Triumph, 67.3 bushels; Crockett, 66.4 bushels; Comanche, 65.5 bushels; Red Chief, 63.1 bushels; Wichita, 62.1 bushels;

Mrs. Curtis R. Wilkinson of Littlefield will represent the South Plains District of Lutheran women at the ninth biennial convention of the International Lutheran Women's Missionary League, which will convene July 26 and 27 in Pittsburgh, Pa. There are over 203,000 women throughout the United States and Canada, belonging to the Lutheran Women's Missionary League.

Mrs. Wilkinson's husband is formerly of Olton. This league is an auxiliary organization within the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, a church body numbering close to 2 1/2 million members. More than 500 delegates and several thousand guests are expected for the gathering which will include visitors from every state of the United States, provinces of Canada and foreign countries.

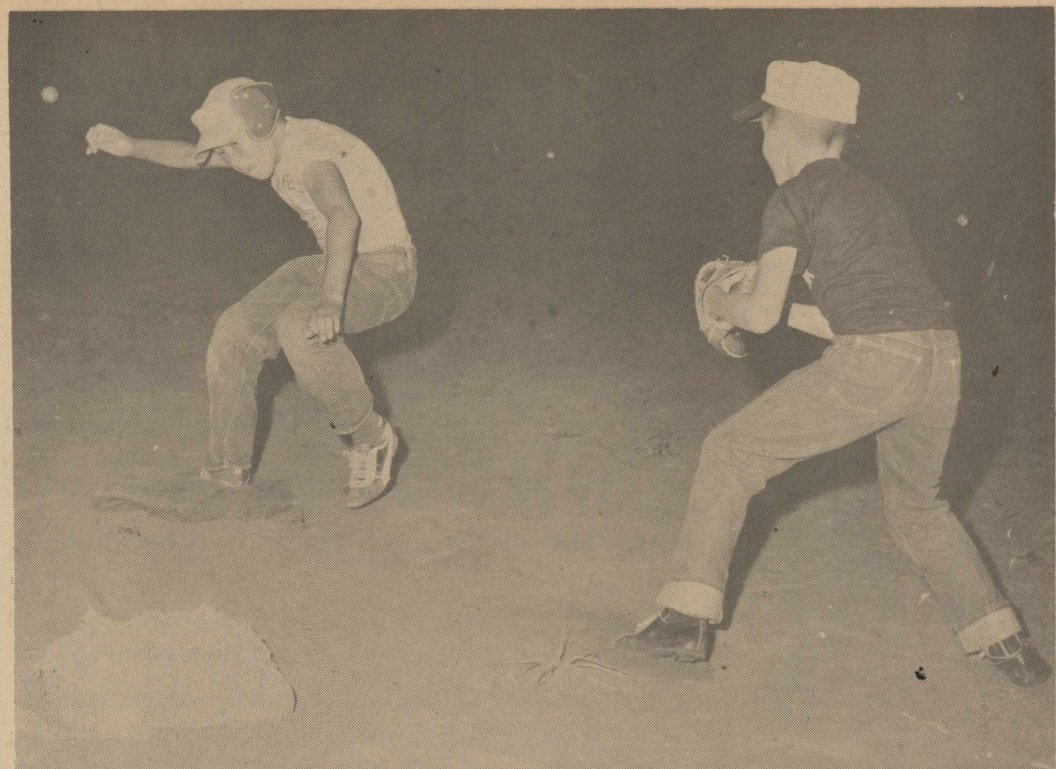

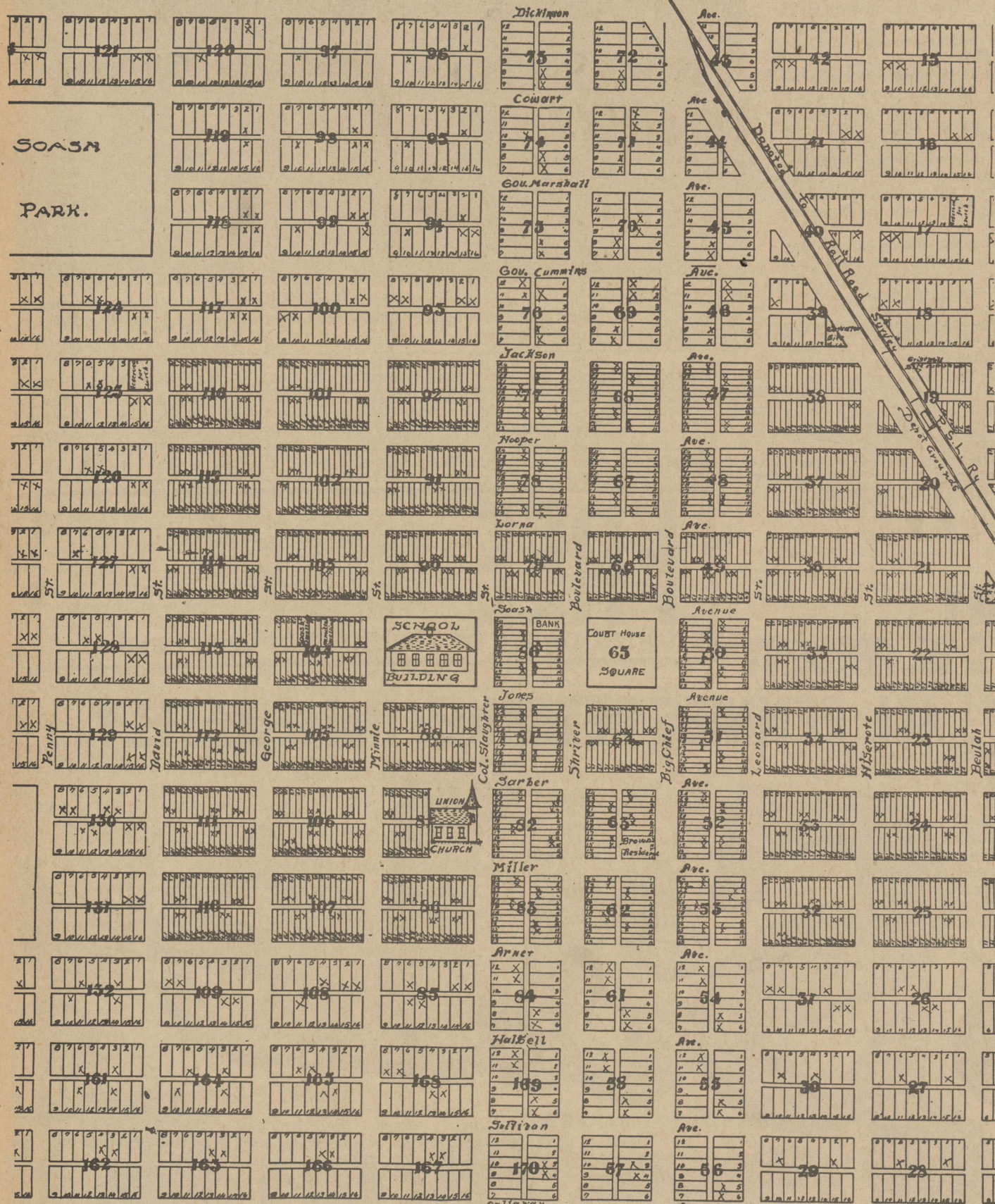

## Pioneer Recalls When Olton Was Only A Dream

An eighty-three-year-old Olton pioneer, Mrs. E.N. Burrus, moved to this area 61 years ago when the town of Olton was still a dream.

She and her late husband helped give birth to Olton in 1908, and along with other settlers, nursed it along through the years.

The late E.N. Burrus moved to this vicinity in 1899 from Floydada, after he and Mrs. Burrus were married in 1898. He built the first house in this area, about five miles southwest of the present town site.

Mrs. Burrus joined her husband here in 1900, when there was nothing here but prairie and ranch windmills.

"There wasn't even an Olton thought of when I came here," Mrs. Burrus commented.

The Burruses homesteaded two sections of land, breaking about 30 acres of it for farmland. He planted the first cotton to be grown in this region, in 1904. The 10-acre cotton crop was taken to Matador to a gin.

"We didn't raise any cotton after that for quite a few years, because the variety of cotton then didn't mature fast enough," said Mrs. Burrus.

"We raised mostly maize and corn, since livestock was the chief money crop, and we had to feed them," she added.

In 1900 Mrs. Burrus gave birth to a son, Roy, who would have been the first child born in Lamb County, if Mrs. Burrus had not returned to Floydada to have the child.

It was about this time that Olton got its name according to Mrs. Burrus. Settlers here decided they wanted a post office, suggesting a name for the post office.

A rancher, Doc Powell, and his wife had a small son named Olton. The couple sent in the child's name, and suggested the post office here be called Olton. And so it was.

"The post was located in the home of a rancher named Brown. He also sold a few groceries such as sugar and flour," said Mrs. Burrus.

About 1902 a survey was made across this area for a railroad that would have run from Lubbock, across here, and on north.

"I can remember watching them survey for the railroad from my window," stated Mrs. Burrus.

"But it wasn't the railroad that is drawn on the map of the tentative town site. That railroad was merely a dream," she went on to say.

About 1905 a one-room school was built near what is now Olton, according to Mrs. Burrus. It was called "Burrow College."

Mrs. Burrus related the story behind the school's name as follows: "One winter an old burrow backed up by the window of the school and froze to death. So from then on the kids always called it "Burrow College."

A wagon and team of horses were used by area settlers then, as they went to Hereford, Plainview or Hale Center to get mail and haul groceries.

In the words of Mrs. Burrus here is how Olton was founded, and progressed.

"As years slipped by a big rancher, C.C. Slaughter, who owned Running Water Ranch decided he wanted a town here. "He gave a block of land

**Demonstration On Soils Is Set**

A demonstration on how to lower pH in alkaline soils will be held on the Delwyn Jones farm, 1 1/2 miles southeast of Olton Friday at 1 p.m.

Dick Whiteley, Olton C-CA manager, announced the demonstration.

The term pH is used to determine if a soil is acidic or alkaline, with 7.0 pH being the neutral point and all soils testing below this are acidic, and all above are alkaline.

Bill Womack, Lubbock, will conduct the experiment. Results of it may be obtained from him at 3709 28th St., Lubbock.

Soil on the Jones farm has been tested and has a pH from 8.0 to 8.3 percent. In the demonstration the pH will be brought down to the neutral point of 7.0 percent.

The chemical mixture to be put on the soil will continue contain 32 percent sulfuric acid held in dry silicate gels.

The mixture will be put on the soil in varying amounts to determine the best amount for soil in this area.

Tests also will be run on the soil in ten days, then in three weeks to determine the amount and rate the pH of the soil lowers.
