### C-C Taking Students For Course

Registrations for "Freedom Seminar," a six-week course designed to present the facts on Communism's threat to the American way of life, are now being taken at the Olton Chamber of Commerce office.

The six one and one-half hour sessions will be held in the Olton School Cafeteria Feb. 6, 13, 20, 27 and March 6 and 13. Classes will begin at 7:30 p.m.

A registration fee of \$10 will cover both tuition and materials used in the course, which is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and the Olton P-TA.

C.L. Kay, vice-president for public services at Lubbock Christian College, will be instructor of the course.

The six sessions are entitled "The Battle Ahead," "The Structure of the American Way of Life," "The Threat of Communism," "The Threat of Socialism," "The Profit System" and "How To Save America--Your Responsibility."

Glenn D. Reeves, Littlefield school superintendent, said of the course:

"The real value of this program, the depth to which it penetrated, the challenges accepted by our citizens and the minds stirred to think, can never be measured accurately. This very program, presented to every young person in America, is the strength needed to defeat Communism."

Objectives of the course are: 1. To build economic and political leadership; 2. To compare and contrast Soviet economic power with our capitalistic system; 3. To develop a conviction of the soundness of America free

### C-C Obtains Dynamic Speaker For Banquet

Dr. Leon Hill of Amarillo, the speaker obtained by the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for its annual banquet, is widely acclaimed as "one of the southwest's most dynamic" after-dinner speakers.

Dr. Hill will address Olton Chamber members Friday, Feb. 3, at 8 p. m. in the school cafeteria.

A retired Baptist minister, Dr. Hill still does evangelistic work in the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

But he has gained most of his fame as a humorist, traveler, philosopher and author.

He addressed 211 non-church groups last year. He has written two books, "Words Fitly Spoken," a humor-packed volume, and "On Preaching," a book giving the modern approach to preaching for pastors and evangelists.

Born in North Carolina in 1904, Dr. Hill was graduated from Atlantic Christian College and Baptist Seminary, Binghamton, N. Y. He attended Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, and Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth. He held pastorates in Mineral Wells and Amarillo.

### About 70 Blocks Due For Paving

Olton property owners whose lots are included in the city's paving program will get their chance to say "yea" or "nay" to their portion of the project, Friday night at 7 at the city hall.

That's the time set aside for a hearing on the project, at which the city council will listen to any protests or suggestions from property owners.

The hearing climaxes almost a year of work toward street improvement here. Once it is out of the way, the council can go ahead with other details and finally, actual construction.

Hodges and Tierney of Lubbock, contractors, probably will begin construction in late February or early March.

Paving costs to the property owner are \$4.30 per front foot on "front" lots, or those where streets run in front of homes, and \$3.95 per foot for "side" lots, those where streets are at the sides of homes.

In its ordinance ordering the improvements, the city lists about 125 blocks of paving, but not nearly that many are expected to be paved.

About 70 blocks are expected to come through the property owner hearing and go through to actual construction.

The council will determine after the hearing the number of blocks in which the greatest interest is shown, or in which a majority of the property owners want paving.

Cost of the paving program will run about \$300,000, if 70 blocks are paved. The city will bear about \$65,000 of that cost, or about 20 per cent.

This \$65,000 comes from an \$80,000 bond issue approved last September by the voters. The other \$15,000 is earmarked for seal-coating (about \$6,000); new street maintenance equipment (about \$4,000 worth) and other, miscellaneous costs.

## Witt Lacewell Tops Lamb In Grain Yield

Olton farmer Witt Lacewell was announced Tuesday as Lamb County's champion grain sorghum producer for 1960. Lacewell received a plaque from the DeKalb Agricultural Assn. Inc. at a luncheon at the Caprock Hotel Lubbock.

He produced 10,451,222 pounds per acre of DeKalb F-63, to lead county winners in the annual DeKalb contest.

Lacewell planted his top yielding sorghum in 38-inch rows.

Seven other Olton farmers were ranked second through eighth in Lamb County, giving Olton a sweep in county grain sorghum production. In addition, two Olton area farmers were ranked high in Hale County results.

Second for the Olton area, and fourth in Hale County, was O. J. Lee, who produced 8,630.20 pounds per acre off DeKalb C-44a.

The county's top corn grower was Leslie Kennedy of Olton, who produced 95.84 bushels per acre of DeKalb 1002.

Other Olton farmers and their grain yields were: R. H. McAfee, 8533.57 pounds; F. A. Roberson, 8,282.27; L. C. Elkins, 7,866.50; J. W. BudHuck-

abee, 7,656.09; W. A. DeBerry, 7,620.59; Don Huguley, 7,531.75; and Raymon Carson, 7,508.16. R. G. DeBerry was 10th in Hale County with 7,911.87 pounds per acre.

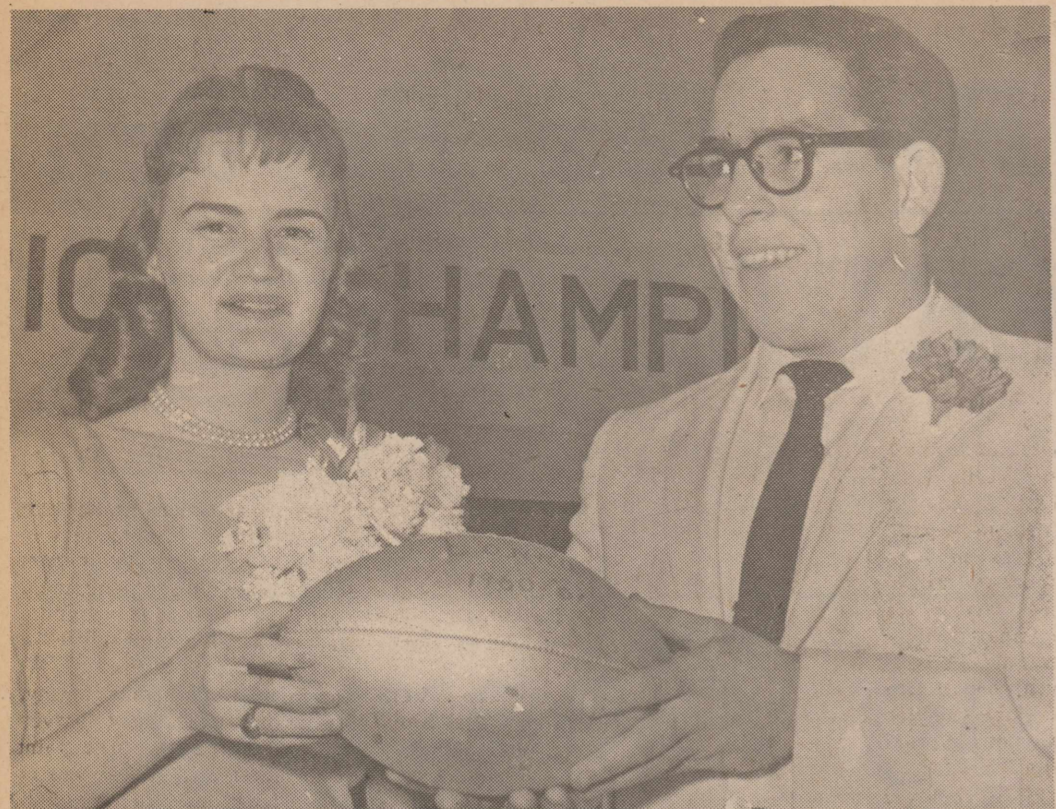

## NOTICE! To Parents Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1961 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 28 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone Superintendent or the School Tax Office No. WE-8-4411 and ask for a census blank.
2. Call in person at the school Tax office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it by your child next day to the teacher. Thank you.

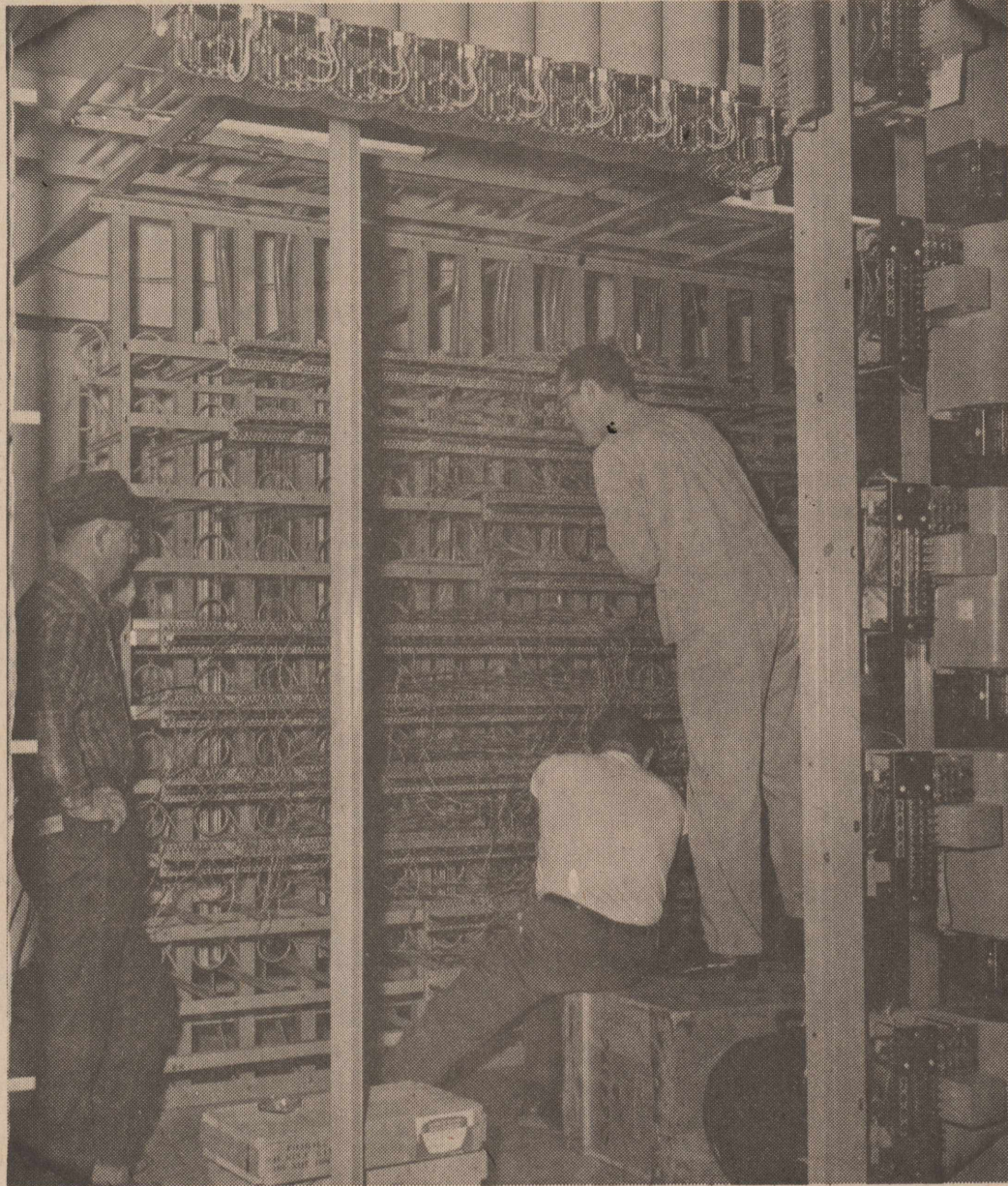
"How should I know?"

## New Numbering Plan Due For Phones Here

Olton telephone customers will be using a new numbering plan in April, when the city's new central office equipment is cut into operation.

Known as the All Numerical Numbering Plan (ANC), each telephone number will be composed of seven digits, R.E. Saunders, district manager explained that the new system will replace the familiar four digit numbers currently used in Olton.

The new system also supersedes the old two-letter, five number (2L5N) system inaugurated when the telephone industry first launched its program to permit operators and/or customers to dial direct from one city to another.

Saunders pointed out that the 2L5N system is being replaced as rapidly as possible in order that all number combinations appearing on the telephone dial can be utilized.

"The old 2L5N system requires a prefix such as PO or SH," Saunders stated, "however, because no words in the

English language begin with the letter combination WX or WY or JK or JL, telephone numbers beginning with 99 or 55 could not be utilized, thereby limiting number assignments."

As the number of customers being assigned 2L5N numbers throughout the nation increased, the necessity of using all possible number combinations on the dial also increased.

"In some areas," Saunders said, "we are running out of possible letter prefixes."

As a result of this realization, a study was undertaken in Wichita Falls, Texas, to determine whether assigning seven digit telephone numbers proved satisfactory to customers and operators. Conclusion of the extensive study was that the ANC plan not only was satisfactory, but even eliminated some previous dialing errors resulting from confusion between the numeral "1" and the letter "I" and numeral "zero" and the letter "O."

All Olton numbers will begin with "285." Saunders indicated that installation of the new central office equipment for Olton is proceeding on schedule.

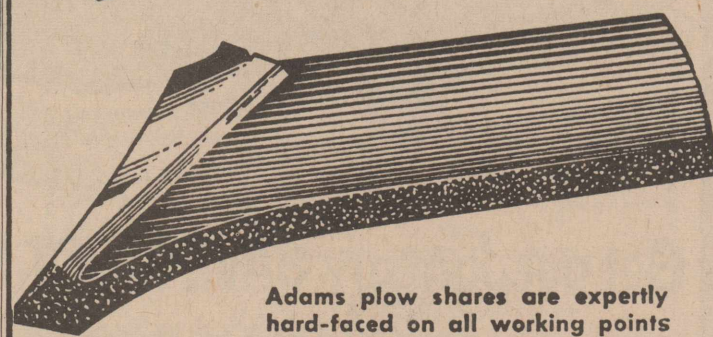

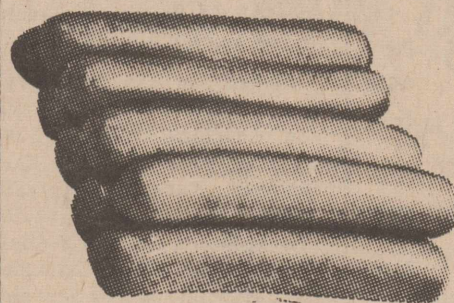

### Co-Op Gin Participates In Research

Olton farmer Clovis Poteet has been named a director of the Texas Vegetable Growers Council for the South Plains area.

The council was born Jan. 10 in San Antonio, marking the organization of the first statewide vegetable growers group in Texas.

The organization resulted from a series of conferences and meetings covering a two-year period.

Its purpose, according to Clyde Singletary, Texas Extension Service horticulturist, is to promote production, distribution, consumption and continued improvement of Texas vegetables.

Henry Van De Walle, San Antonio, was elected president; Carl Schuster, San Juan, vice president and Marcus Dingler, Pecos, secretary-treasurer, of the Council. Raymond Higginbotham, Hereford; Ben Burch, Hempstead, Herbert Partridge, Munday and Poteet were named directors, representing their respective area councils. All are outstanding producers, Singletary said.

President Van De Walle emphasized to those attending the state meeting the need for making each area council a strong and active organization. "This," he said, "can be done if every commercial vegetable grower is given an opportunity to become a member of their area council and if they know the values and benefits which can come from their support. Our State Council can be no stronger than our area organizations, and our effectiveness in carrying out our purpose needs full grower support."

Plans were made for area meetings during the next 3 months and any grower who becomes a member during the next 90 days--dating from January 10, 1961--will be a charter member.

## Poteet Named To Post

Olton Coop Gin is one of 11 gins in the state to have cooperated in a special moisture research program which will study the effect of moisture during the ginning process on cotton's spinning qualities.

Lloyd Graham is manager of the gin.

At the request of the Texas Cotton Giners Association, the Cotton Research Committee of Texas instigated this research program. The Cotton Economic Research Department at the University of Texas was assigned the project and will publish both moisture and spinning data on the 1959 and 1960 crops.

This study represents one of the most comprehensive surveys on moisture and fiber quality data with over 300 gins participating in the survey.

Through a statistical sampling process only a few of the gins in the state were asked to custom gin a bale of cotton in which three separate levels of moisture were ginned in lots of approximately 150 pounds each within the bale. These

bales were then shipped to the Pilot Spinning Plant at the Textile Research Laboratories, Texas Technological College, and were spun into yarn. This spinning is conducted through a cooperative contract with the Cotton Research Committee of Texas.

Due to the size of the three separate spinning samples within each bale, it was possible to run 5000-spindle hour tests per bale. This number of tests was sufficient to predict the accurate mill performance for

each level of moisture.

All of the cooperating gins are to appear in a report under code names and each individual gin will receive a complete fiber and spinning report on their particular custom-ginned bale.

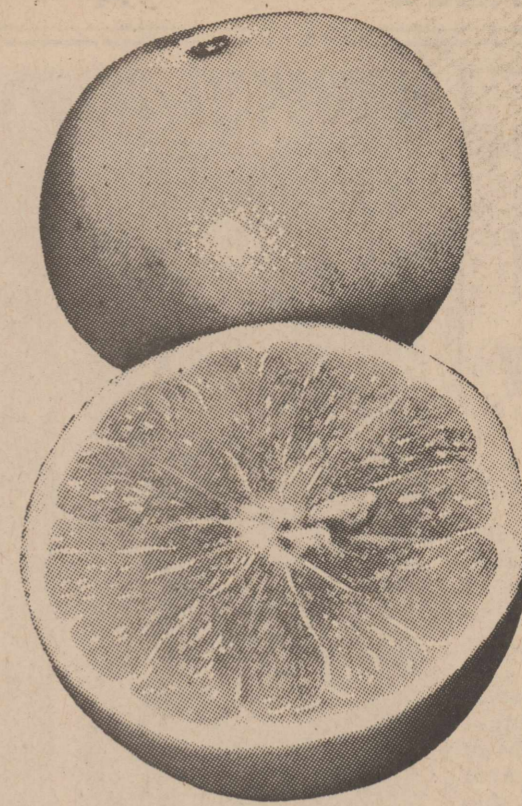

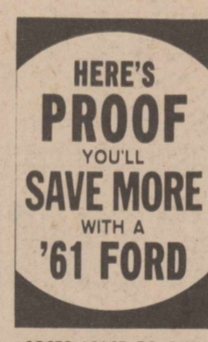

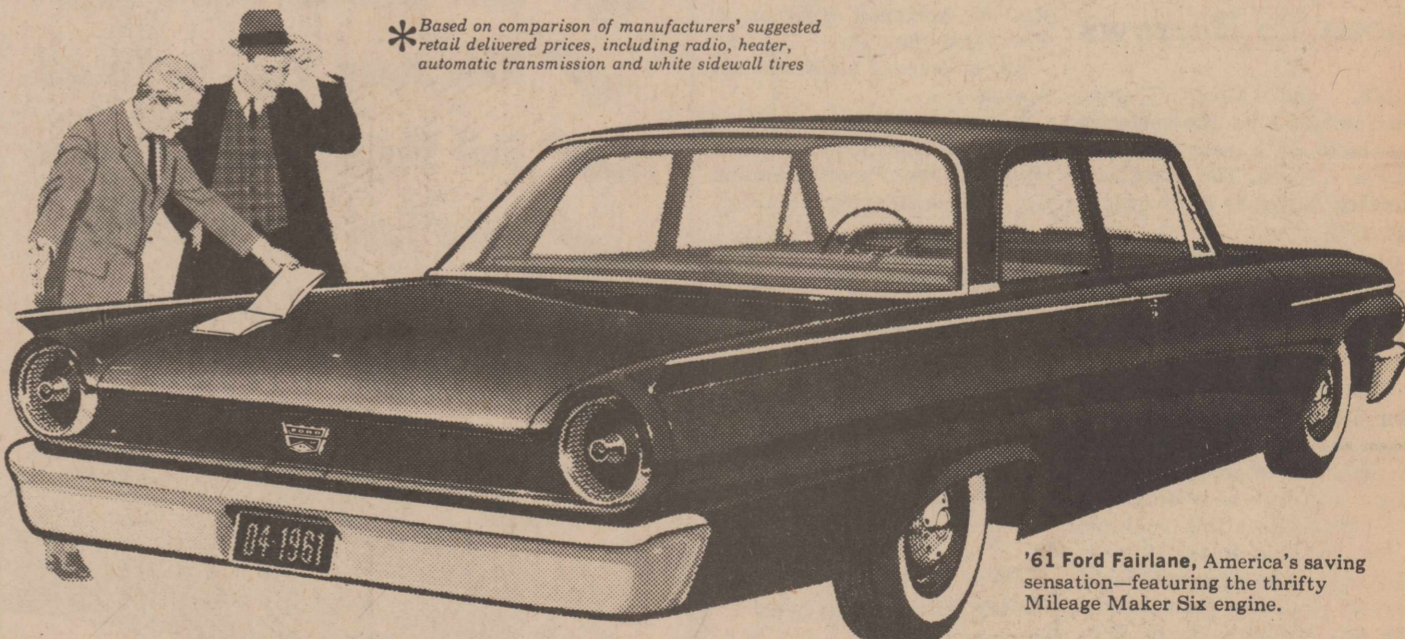

NOTICE OF HEARING ON SPECIAL BENEFITS TO BE RECEIVED FROM PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENTS, AND ON OTHER MATTERS WITH REFERENCE THERETO, WHICH HEARING IS TO BE HELD IN THE CITY HALL OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS, BEGINNING AT 7 O'CLOCK PM, ON JANUARY 27 1961.

TO ALL OWNERS AND TO ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY ABUTTING THE STREETS OR AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS, HEREINAFTER NAMED, WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH, AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES AND TO THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS (INCLUDING THE OWNERS AND ALL PERSONS OWNING OR CLAIMING ANY INTEREST IN OR LIEN UPON ANY PROPERTY LYING OUTSIDE OR PARTIALLY OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS OF SAID CITY, WHICH PROPERTY ABUTS ANY OF SUCH STREETS, AVENUES OR PORTIONS THEREOF WITHIN THE LIMITS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH AT A POINT WHERE A PART OF THE BOUNDARY OF THE CITY OF OLTON IS UPON OR ALONG SUCH STREET OR AVENUE, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER SUCH STREET OR AVENUE AT THAT POINT LIES WHOLLY WITHIN, PARTIALLY WITHIN AND PARTIALLY WITHOUT OR WHOLLY OUTSIDE THE CITY OF OLTON, AND TO ALL OTHER PARTIES INTERESTED IN ANY OF SUCH PROPERTIES, INCLUDING THEIR AGENTS AND ATTORNEYS);

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED that the City Council of the City of Olton, Texas, has determined the necessity for and ordered the improvement of certain streets and avenues or portions thereof hereinafter described within the limits hereinafter defined, the nature of which improvements is hereinafter generally set forth; and that said City Council has approved and adopted the estimate, statement and report of the City's Engineer and has taken other proceedings with reference to the making of such improvements, all of which are of record in the Minutes of the City Council of the City of Olton, and has by ordinance ordered that a hearing be held, and notice thereof given, NOW THEREFORE,

PURSUANT TO SAID PROCEEDINGS AND SUCH ORDINANCE, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:-

I  
That a hearing shall be given to the owners and to all

persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property abutting the streets and avenues or portions thereof of the City of Olton, Texas, hereinafter named, within the limits hereinafter set out, and to all other interested parties including their agents and attorneys (including the owners and all persons owning or claiming any interest in or lien upon any property lying outside or partially outside the city limits of said City, which property abuts any of such streets or avenues or portions thereof within the limits hereinafter set forth at a point where a part of the boundary of the City of Olton is upon or along such street or avenue, regardless of whether such street or avenue at that point lies wholly within, partially within and partially without or wholly outside the City of Olton and all other parties interested in any of such properties, including their agents and attorneys), before the City Council of the City of Olton, Texas, which hearing shall begin on the 27 day of January, 1961, at 7 o'clock PM, and shall be held in the City Hall of Olton, Texas, at which hearing all of said owners and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, shall have the right to be heard on any matter as to which hearing is a constitutional prerequisite to the validity of any assessment sought to be imposed and to contest the amounts of the proposed assessments, the lien and the liability thereof, the special benefits to the abutting properties and the owners thereof by means of the improvements for which all of such assessments are to be levied, the accuracy, sufficiency, regularity and validity of the proceedings and contracts in connection with such improvements and proposed assessments, or concerning any matter or thing connected therewith. The said hearing may be continued from time to time and day to day until a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the said assessments or proceedings, and the City Council shall have the power to and shall correct any errors, inaccuracies, irregularities and invalidities, and shall determine the amount of assessments and all other incidental matters and shall have the power by ordinance to close such hearing, and by the same or by a later ordinance or ordinances to levy such assessments before, during or after the construction of such improvements, but no part of any assessment against abutting properties shall be made to mature prior to acceptance by the City by ordinance of the improvements abutting the property for which the assessment is levied. It shall not be necessary to levy all of the assessments at one time or by a single ordinance, and said hearing may be closed as to each portion of a street or avenue constituting a unit of improvement (as such units are designated below), after a fair opportunity for hearing has been afforded to all desiring to contest the assessments proposed to be levied against the owners and their properties

abutting on the portion of each such street or avenue constituting a unit of improvement; and the City Council shall then have the power to levy such assessments against such abutting properties and against the owners thereof, as provided herein and in the prior proceedings of the City Council herein referred to. No assessment will be made against any abutting property or the owner thereof in excess of the special benefits to such property and its owner in the enhanced value thereof by means of such improvements as determined at such hearing. All of such owners, claimants, and other interested parties, their agents or attorneys, are hereby referred for further information to the proceedings with reference to said improvements on file and/or of record with the City Secretary of the City of Olton, and particularly to the estimate of the City's Engineer, and to the proposed assessment roll wherein the exact amount proposed to be assessed against each abutting property and the owner thereof is set forth; said City's Engineer's estimate and said proposed assessment roll being on file in the office of the City Secretary.

II  
The nature of the improvements for which assessments are proposed to be levied and to which this notice relates is the filling, grading, raising, paving, repaving of said streets or avenues or portions thereof within the limits herein stated, except where there is existing paving which can be utilized, and by the construction or reconstruction and the realigning of curbs and gutters where adequate curbs and gutters are not now in place, and by the construction of such other necessary incidentals and appurtenances as the City's Engineer has found to be necessary or advisable, all as shown by the plans and specifications of the City's Engineer, and by widening where necessary so as to attain the paved width from back of curb to back of curb which is set out below, utilizing existing paving where practical; said paving to consist of a triple inverted penetration asphalt surface course on a six (6") inch compact caliche flexible base, the exact nature of such improvements being more particularly shown in the plans and specifications which are on file in the office of the City Secretary of the City of Olton.

III  
The streets and avenues or portions thereof to be improved within the limits fixed by the City Council are listed below as they have been divided by the City Council into separate and distinct improvement units. There is stated in connection with the listing of each street or avenue or portion thereof within the limits herein defined constituting each improvement unit

the estimated amount or amounts per front foot to be assessed against the owner or owners of properties abutting such street or avenue or portion thereof and against such properties, the estimated total cost of the improvements as to each improvement unit, and the width of paved surface to be attained from back of curb to back of curb.

Where one side of a street or avenue has existing paving which can be utilized and there is no such existing paving abutting the property on the opposite side of the street or avenue, no portion of the cost of the improvements will be levied against the property abutting the side of the street upon which there is existing paving which can be utilized; similarly, where there is existing curb and gutter which can be utilized abutting certain properties no assessment for curb and gutter will be levied against such properties.

The City Council has determined that the strict application of the front foot plan or rule in apportioning the cost of the improvements will result in injustice or inequality in those particular cases where as shown on the City map all or some of the abutting lots in the unit abut the street or avenue being improved along the side of such lots (i.e., lengthwise), which lots meeting such description are hereinafter referred to as Side Lots, unless the City pays a greater portion of the cost of the improvements abutting such lots than it pays toward the cost of the improvements of lots which abut endwise, such lots being hereinafter referred to as Fronting Lots. It has, therefore, proposed that a different rate per front foot be established for the improvement of that portion of each such street or avenue abutting Side Lots than for the portion of such street or avenue abutting Fronting Lots. For this reason, the proposed amount to be assessed per front foot is shown in two (2) separate columns below, one such column reflecting the amount to be assessed per front foot against Side Lots and the owners thereof, and the other such column reflecting the amount to be assessed per front foot against Fronting Lots and the owners thereof, included in the front foot assessment rate in each unit as shown below is the sum of \$1.65 per front foot for curb and gutter. Where there is existing curb and gutter which can be utilized the front foot rate will be reduced by the sum of \$1.65 per front foot.

There is included in the estimated amount to be assessed against abutting properties and the owners thereof a proportionate part of all costs incidental to the construction of the improvements.
