Man Dies, 3 Hurt In Bus-Truck Crash

Fieldton Resident Victim Of Mishap

Fifty Bohner School students, always anxious to get home after a day at school, could look back this week and be doubly thankful their Tuesday afternoon bus ride ended when it did. For at 4:35 p.m. after Driv-

er James Steptee had delivered the children to their homes, Olton School Bus No. 14 overturned after a collision involving a pick-up truck.

When the crash came, two persons were aboard the bus and two others were in the pick-up. The toll: one dead and three

injured, one seriously. Berry Allen Ball, 74-year-

old Fieldton resident, was fatally injured in the mishap, which occurred four miles west and one south of Olton at the intersection of two unpaved county roads.

Ball was a passenger in the pickup, driven by his son, Ver-non B. Ball, 49, Littlefield, who was in fair condition Wednesday at Littlefield Hospital.

The injured in the bus were Steptoe, 29-year-old Bohner teacher, and a student, 14-year-old Mary Helen Mack daughter of Percy Lee Mack. Mary Helen had stopped at

her home during the route and was returning to Olton to join friends for an out-of-town trip.

The bus had started with 51 students and was returning to Olton after completing the route.

Jackson said the truck skidded 12 feet and hit the bus breadside. The bus careened 105 feet and overturned, landing rightside-up. The impact broke the rear wheels and axle from the frame of the vehicle.

The pickup came to rest about 25 feet from the point of impact, stopping in a barrow ditch.

The 14-year old girl was thrown from the bus after the crash, somehow coming out safely although in the path of the rolling vehicle. Steptoe stayed in the bus until it came to rest.

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Demonstration Has 40 Heifers On Wheat With Self-feeder

In a test designed to produce beef at lowest possible costs Olton Farm Supply has begun a self-ieeder demonstration with 40 crossbreed heifers. The cattle pictured have been put on wheat pasture at the Cloys Fancher farm three miles east and two north of Olton.

Average weight of the cattle at the start of the project three weeks ago was 323 pounds per head. After two weeks in dry lot, the cattle weighed 370 pounds per head. They were wormed with Purina Cattle Wormer and vaccinated just prior to going on pasture.

The cattle will be on a 65% grain ration with hulls, supplemented by Purina Steer Fatina, from the self-feeder. Intake of this ration will be limited by salt.

You're invited to inspect the progress of these heifers during the next 60 days while they are on pasture.





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
