C-CA BACKS PROJECT

Airstrip Sought Here

The executive director of the Texas Aeronautics Commission--who was told at Austin that he couldn't get to Olton by air--did it Tuesday.

Of course he had to get special permission to land here--from the state highway patrol. His landing strip was Highway 70, just east of the Co-Op Gin.

The landing, which came off smoothly, accomplished what it was supposed to--dramatize Olton's need for a small airport, or airstrip.

Residents here looked on in surprise as Cliff Green, the TAC director, and his party taxied along the highway past the Co-Op Gin, turned left at Givens Texaco and headed for the square, accompanied by police escort.

Green was invited here by the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. He was greeted by C-CA President James Hall and Mayor M.T. James, Jr.

Shortly after his arrival, Green spoke at a meeting of the Olton Lions Club, explaining the growth of air travel in Texas and the advantages of having a hometown airstrip. "They told us at Austin you couldn't get here from there--by air. We did," he said, adding his thanks to highway patrolmen, Police Chief Emmett Burrows and others who escorted the plane.

Residents did a double take as the four-place Mooney Mark 21 rolled toward the square and parked there during the noon hour.

Green was accompanied by Jimmy Miller and Johnny Gant of Miller's Flying Service, Plainview. Gant piloted the craft.

After showing a film at the Lions meeting, Green outlined the growth of aviation in the state: 14,300 employed in aviation in 1947, compared with 65,000 in 1961; 2,500 active civil aircraft in 1945 and 7,500 in 1962; and 375 airports in 1945, compared with 1,150 in 1961.

"The reason I'm here," Green said, "is that we need airstrips in every sizable town in Texas."

"Air roads can mean the same thing to your economy as farm to market roads," he declared.

The Texas Aeronautics Commission, he said, helps towns such as Olton build airports, lending advice as to location, construction and improvements.

"Sometimes sites can be difficult to find," he said, "especially if you must buy land."

In most cases in small towns however, enterprising commit-

tees usually are able to find someone to donate the land. He named Paducah as a recent example.

All that is needed, Green said, is a strip of land about 150 feet wide running about the length of a section line.

A north-to-south strip is preferred, with landing area of at least 3,500 feet needed.

"All we are talking about," he said, "is an air road to your town."

Green said airstrips or airports can be built with matching funds from the federal government, or by help from the state.

But the "best bet," he said, is to "do it yourself so that you're not obligated to either

the state or federal government."

Some towns have been able to recruit help from their county equipment, or other locally supplied means for starting an airstrip, Green said.

He stressed the idea that an airstrip is a public facility, for use by anyone, bringing easier access to the community for people doing business here, as well as its use by local people.

As an example, he pointed out that agricultural spray planes could be of better service in this area with a strip available.

Following the meeting, Green and his party looked over areas near Olton for possible sites. They were accompanied by Chamber of Commerce Manager Melvin McReynolds and other interested persons.

Among local pilots who were on hand on the Lions meeting to express an interest in the project were Otis Hair, Herb Owens and Leo Smith.

Harvest Delayed After Cold Snap

While residents shivered under temperatures as low as 28 degrees this week, farmers welcomed the cold but could have done without the moisture.

A light snow Saturday morning melted rapidly and left fields soaked.

Harvest reports lagged behind the normal expected for this area.

However, the six local gins reported a total of 10,832 bales ginned. This is up over 3,000 bales from last year at this time, when 7,315 bales ginned were reported.

This is a sharp contrast with the 26,808 bales ginned reported at this time in 1960.

"It's going to be a while before we harvest," Mrs. Elmer McGill said Tuesday. The McGills farm three miles south and two and a half west of Olton.

Mrs. McGill said they had ginned no cotton and reported their crop outlook as "fair."

"Beautiful," is the way Mrs. C. C. Curry described their crop seven miles north and three west of Olton. She said they were through with their feed and had about 117 bales of cotton out.

Mrs. Curry reported they

are getting about one and a half bales to the acre.

"We'll be pulling Christmas," Mrs. Cloys Fancher northeast of town, reported.

The Fancher farm is in an area which has been hard hit by hail.

"We've got all our crop out but a little cotton," Douglas Giles, four miles northeast of town, said Tuesday. "Our feed wasn't too good," he added.

"It looks real good," Mrs. J. P. Nafzger, three miles south and fourth east, said.

She said they had pulled 15 bales by hand.

"We lack about 30 acres," Bert Stewart said Wednesday. "It isn't very good after the hail," he added. Stewart farms three miles west and one north of Olton.

North of Olton, Mrs. O.E. Patterson said it is "Still wet and drying slow."

She said they hoped to start stripping Friday and they haven't pulled any cotton yet.

L. S. Johnson, who farms northeast, said he had all his feed out and had hand pulled about 50 bales.

"It'll probably be about two weeks before we start machine harvesting," he said.

One suggestion which they have received is the purchase of a chain link fence around the cemetery.

Suggestions may be given to any member of the committee.

Chamber Members To Meet, Plan Work

Director Election Scheduled

Got a pet project? Something that you are particularly interested in or would like to see in Olton? Then this is your chance to be heard.

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will hold its annual membership meeting next Thursday Nov. 29 at 7:30 p.m. in the school lunchroom.

The meeting is open to the general public as well as the entire membership of the Chamber.

"I can't stress to much how important it is for all Chamber members--anyone who is interested in Olton, for that matter--to be at this meeting," Melvin McReynolds, CC-A manager said Tuesday.

New Chamber directors will be elected at this meeting, a change in the by-laws will be presented and projects for the year decided.

Suggestions will be taken from anyone attending as to what the projects should be.

"If anyone has some ideas for improvements they would like to see in Olton or something new they would like to have here, this is the time to let us know," McReynolds said.

The projects decided on will determine the committees to be set up for the year. This will be done shortly after the meeting.

The change in by-laws to be presented concerns the term of office for directors. If the change is approved, four directors will be elected. If not approved, six directors will be elected.

"The main purpose of this meeting," McReynolds said, "is set up the program of work for next year."

He stressed that this is the backbone of the Chamber.

He listed objectives of the Chamber, generally, as community or area economic development, civic or community improvement and governmental or good citizenship activities.

Under business development activities come such things as attracting new industry, building agriculture and developing retail trade.

Community development includes numerous areas such as city beautification, park development, educational program, downtown development, safety programs, aviation development, health and transportation.

Good citizenship includes "Get Out The Vote" campaigns, political education, economics discussion and the business climate program.

McReynolds said he plans to have as many people as possible working on Chapter projects next year.

"We are open to all suggestions and ideas," he said. "Just come on out and tell us what you want to see done in Olton."

Dixie Kendrick got 19 for Hart, while Connie Popejoy hit for 14.

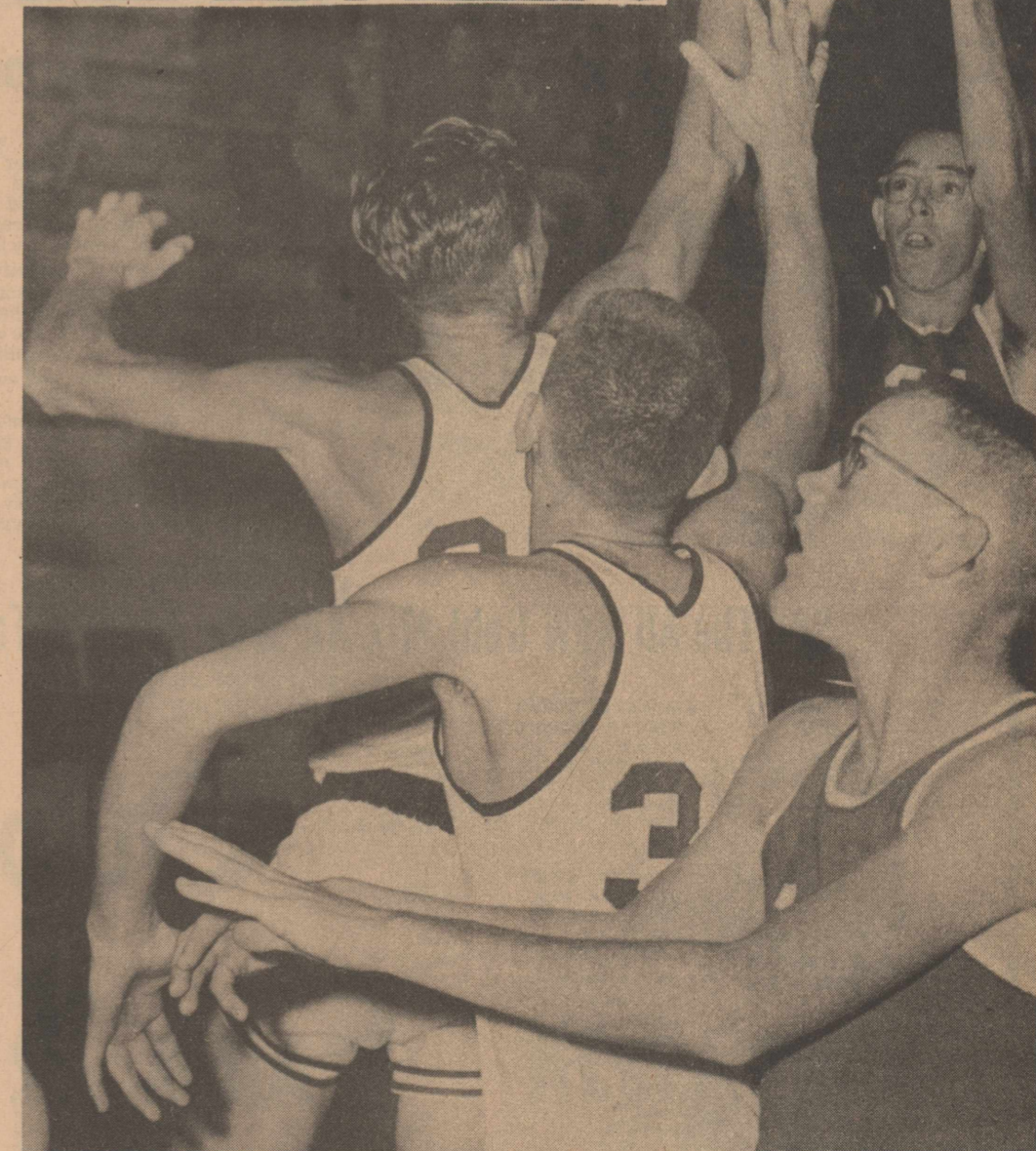
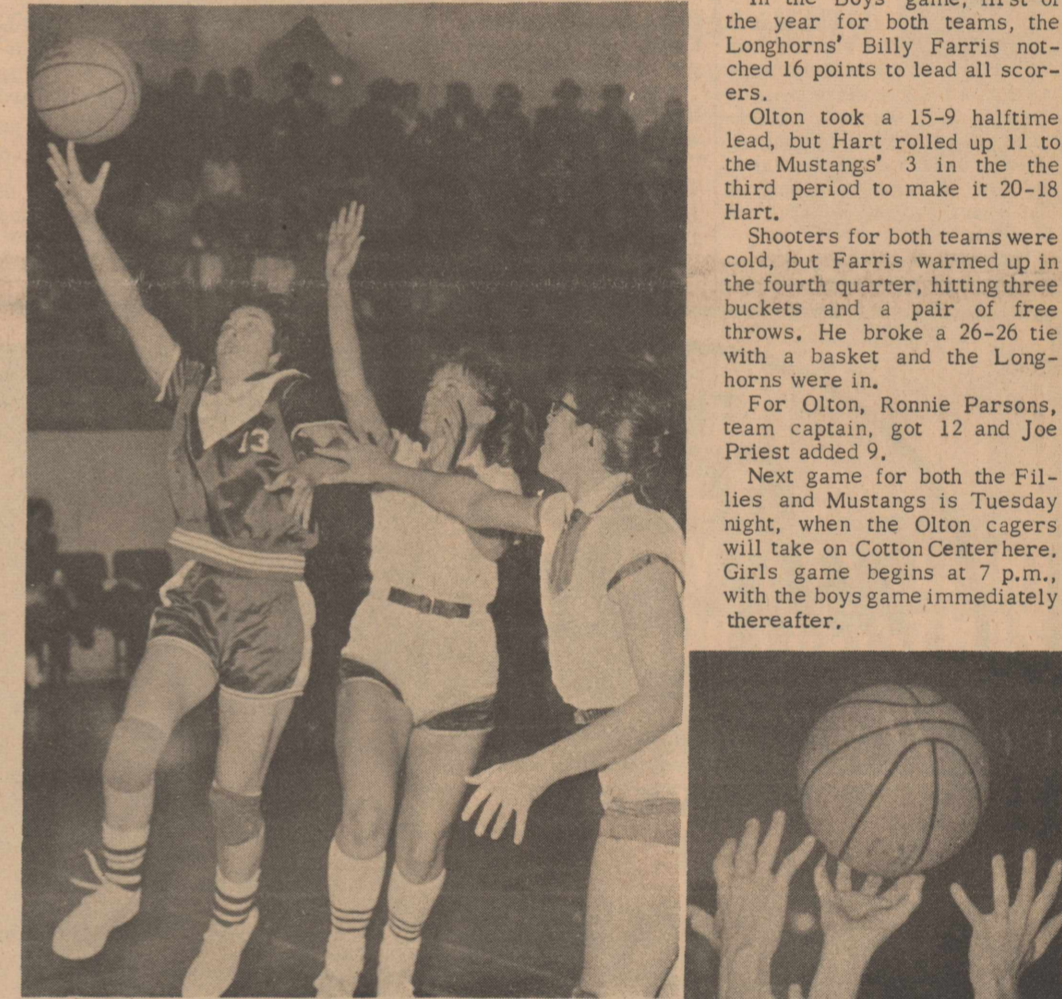
In the Boys' game, first of the year for both teams, the Longhorns' Billy Farris notched 16 points to lead all scorers.

Recipe Of The Week

CRANBERRY RELISH
By Mrs. W. G. Finney

4 medium oranges
2 lb. Cranberries
2 medium apples, cored but unpeeled
4 cups sugar
Put oranges, apples and cranberries through food chopper. If you like you may use enough of the orange peel to give the relish just a hint of the flavor, being sure to trim the white

pulp from the rind and discard, as this has a tendency to be bitter. Then add sugar, mix well and put into plastic or glass and freeze, if glass jars are used, leave space for expansion.

This recipe makes four pints. Mrs. Finney usually makes enough at one time to have to use through Thanksgiving and Christmas. Its delicious with fried chicken during summer months, and other dishes. Mrs. Finney makes a cranberry topping and serves on slices of angel food cake or freezes as a salad or dessert.

CRANBERRY TOPPING
1 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup sugar
1 (8 1/2 oz.) can crushed pineapple drained
1 1/2 cup cranberry relish. Partly thawed and drained.
Whip cream (add sugar slowly) until stiff.

Fold in Pineapple and relish but do not blend completely. Makes about one quart.

CRANBERRY MINCEMENT pie
3 cups ready to use mincemeat
1 cup cranberry relish
1 unbaked 9 inch pie shell
Combine mincemeat and cranberry relish. Pour into pie shell and bake at 400 degrees for 35 minutes.

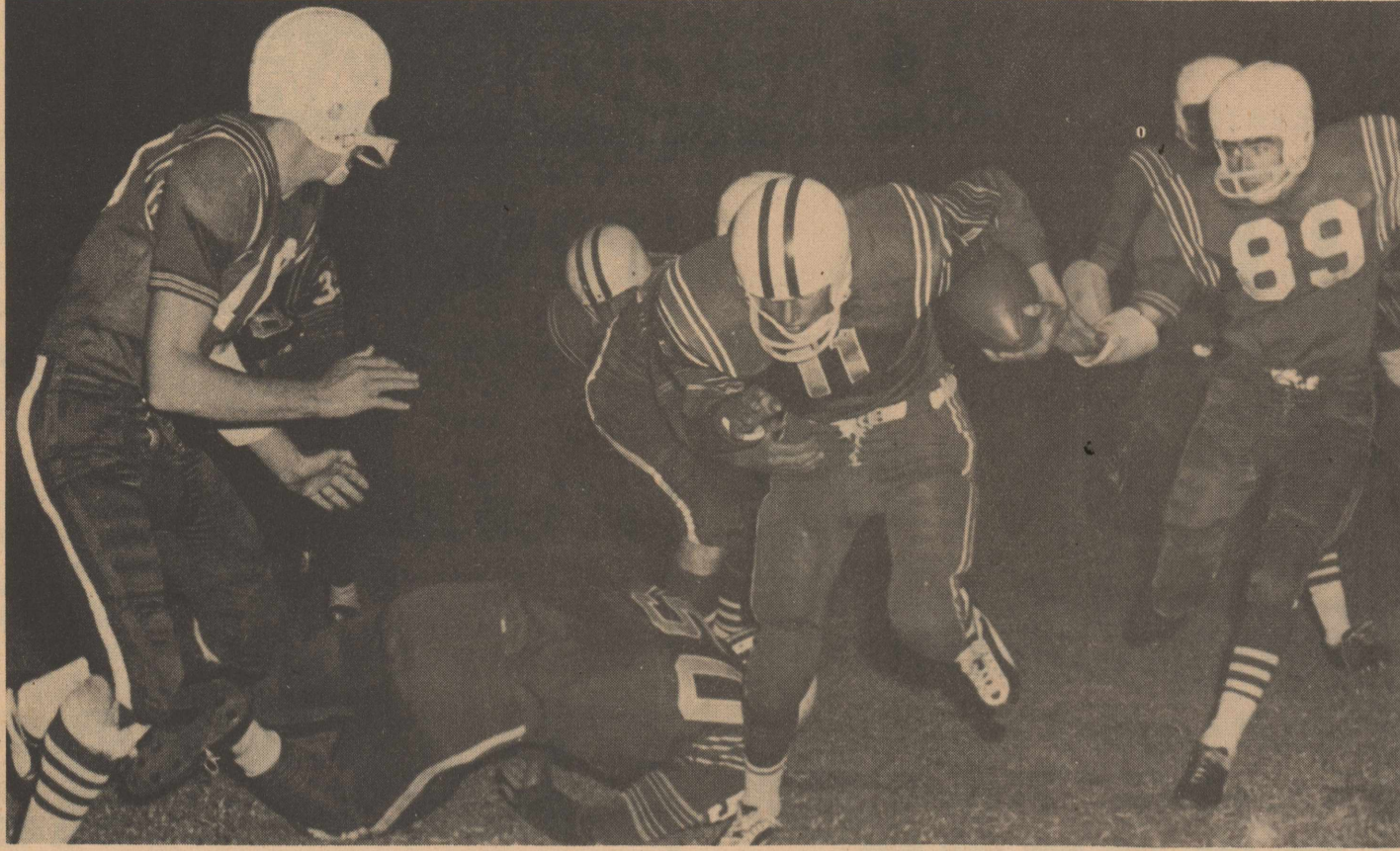
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Mustangs Overcome Fumbles, Friona

OLTON CO-OP GIN

Olton's Mustangs almost began the basketball season too soon here last Friday night, bouncing the ball around a great part of the evening before getting enough control to beat a scrapping Friona team, 25-8.

Fumbles plagued the Ponies throughout the game, halting Olton drives on five different occasions.

The Mustangs built up a 25-0 lead before the Chiefs scored with less than five minutes left in the contest.

Olton's victory was Friona's 26th straight defeat and left the Mustangs at 5-5 for the season and 2-2 in District 3-AA good for third place.

Four Ponies shared the Olton scoring honor, with Richard Hall getting one touchdown on a one-yard sneak, George Jones and Joe Priest adding one apiece on a pair of 11-yard runs, and Jones getting the last one on a one-yard shot. Captain Charlie T. Burrus kicked the lone Olton extra point.

Friona's single TD came on a 17-yard run by Doug Dodd. Gary Rennee and the Chiefs' two extra points.

In the first period, Olton advanced once to the Chief 38, then fumbled. A little later, the Ponies rolled to the Friona 41, but a third down bobble lost yardage and forced a punt.

Friona threatened once itself in the first quarter, after Danny Murphree returned a punt 39

yards to the Olton 49.

Three plays later, the Chiefs kicked and Olton's Priest was hit as he gathered in the ball. He fumbled and Friona had new life at the Olton 25.

Priest later broke up a fourth down pass at the Olton goal, and the Mustangs took over.

Three plays later, Olton fumbled again and Friona recovered at the Mustang's 45.

The Chiefs advanced to the Pony 29, but Halfback Ronnie Parsons got the Mustangs out of that hole with an interception which he returned to the Olton's 25.

From there, Olton drove for its first touchdown. The march took 14 plays, with Priest's 28-yard pass to George Phillips setting the Mustangs in business at Friona's 35.

Priest then hit Jones with a 23-yarder to the 12, but a clipping penalty rubbed out most of the gain.

Jones then ripped for seven yards, then added six more. Fullback Johnny Moses then took over, ramming three for a first down at the 13, then seven more to the 6. Jones made it first and goal with a five-yard scamper and Hall carried it in for the TD.

Moses and Priest carried down the 11, where Jones carried it the rest of the way for the score. After the extra point try failed it was 12-0, Olton, with 10:57 left in the third period.

Shortly after the kick-off, Priest hauled in a Friona pass and returned to the Chief's 29.

Moses and Joe Costello carried it to the 21, where Friona drew a penalty to the 11. Priest cracked across for the score.

Burrus' kick was good and Olton led by 19-0 with 7:30 left in the third.

The Mustangs got the ball once more in the third, and advanced to the Friona 21, with Parsons' 24-yard run and Jones' 14-yard dash the big gainers. However, Jones fumbled at the end of his run, and Friona took over.

George came right back a few

minutes later and intercepted and Friona aerial, setting up Olton's fourth touchdown.

Jones ran twice for a total of 12 yards to give the Ponies a first down at the Friona 37.

Then Priest hit Clyde Galloway with a 24-yard aerial that set the Ponies in business at the 13. Jones got eight in two carries and Moses added two for a first down at the three.

After two more tries, Jones went in for the score, to make it 25-0 with 8:30 left in the game.

Friona came roaring back after the kick-off, with Renner leading the way. The Chief quarterback got a first down at the Olton's 46, then directed the attack to the 17, where Dodd rolled in for the touchdown. Renner carried the extras, and it was 25-8 with 4:57 left in the game.

Olton came marching back, with Priest passing to Jones for seven to get the ball to the Olton 42. Richard Hall got a first down on a fourth and one situation, and then Jones raced 15 yards to the Friona 41.

Priest, Costello and Jones teamed to gain the yardage for a first down at the 27, and then Priest hit Darrell Glover with a 10-yard pass to the Chief 17.

A moment later, Priest fumbled at the Friona 13 and the Chiefs took over with time left for only two plays.

Standouts defensively for the Mustangs were Billy Carson, who was all over the field with his tackling, Jones, Robert Struve, Larry Fancher, and Jimmy Bennett.

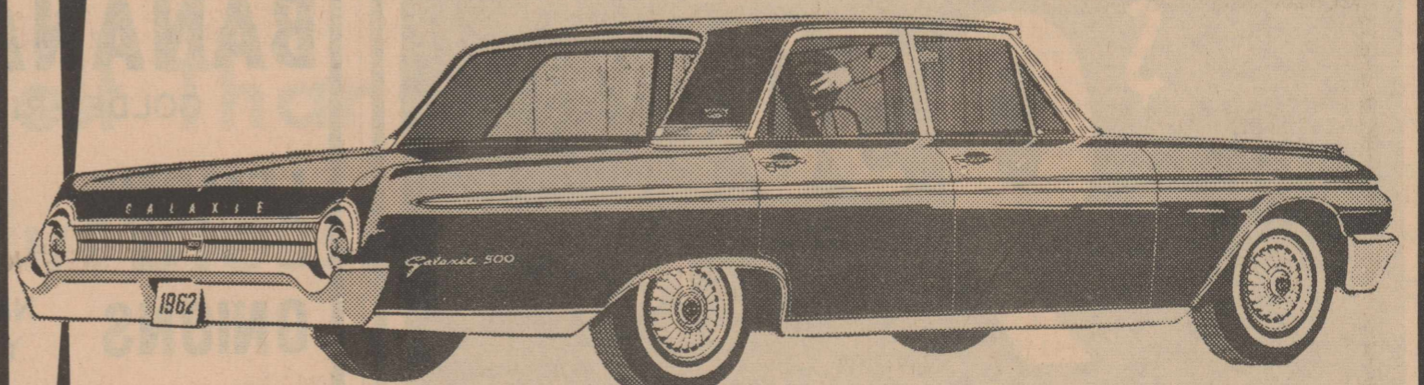
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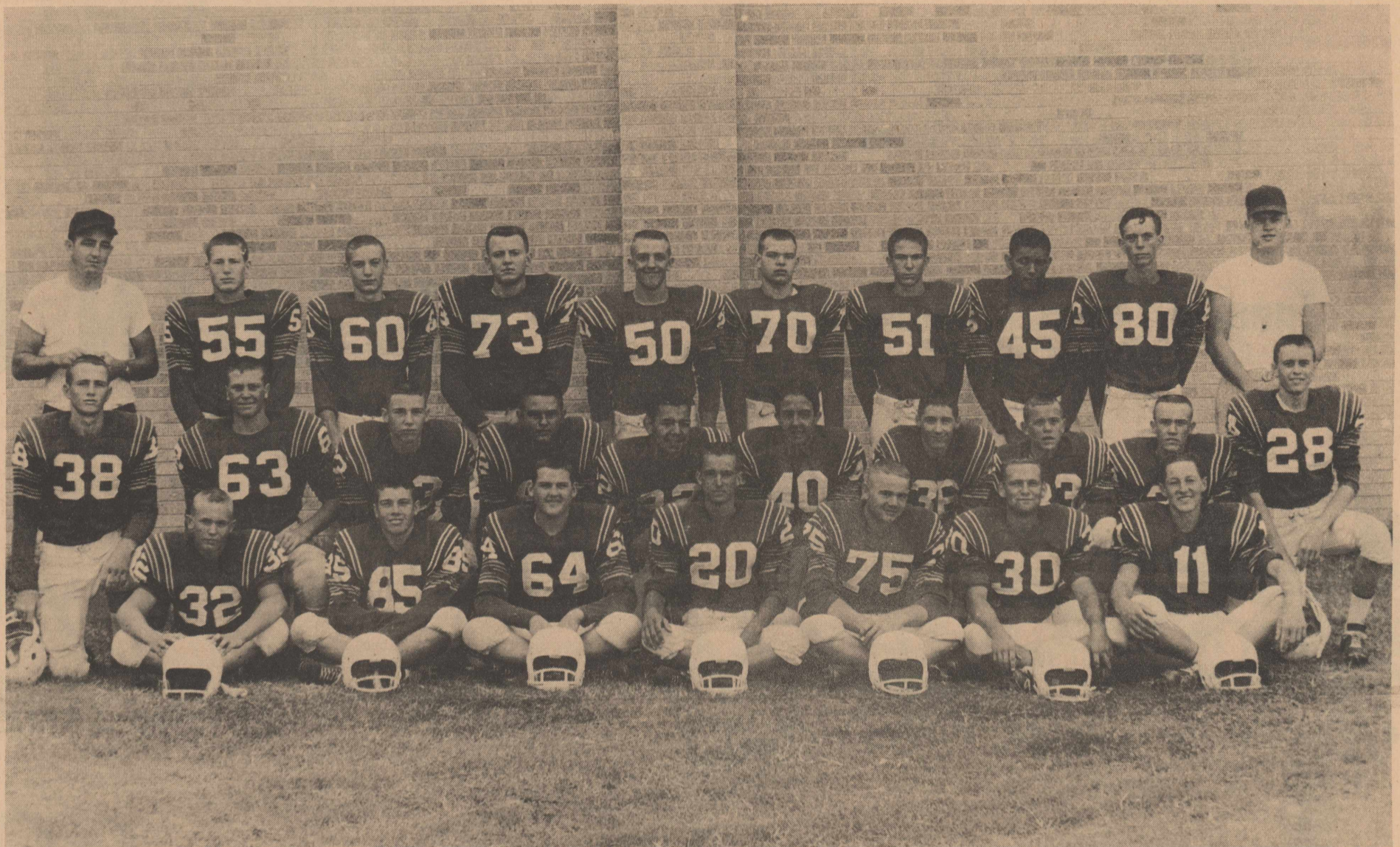

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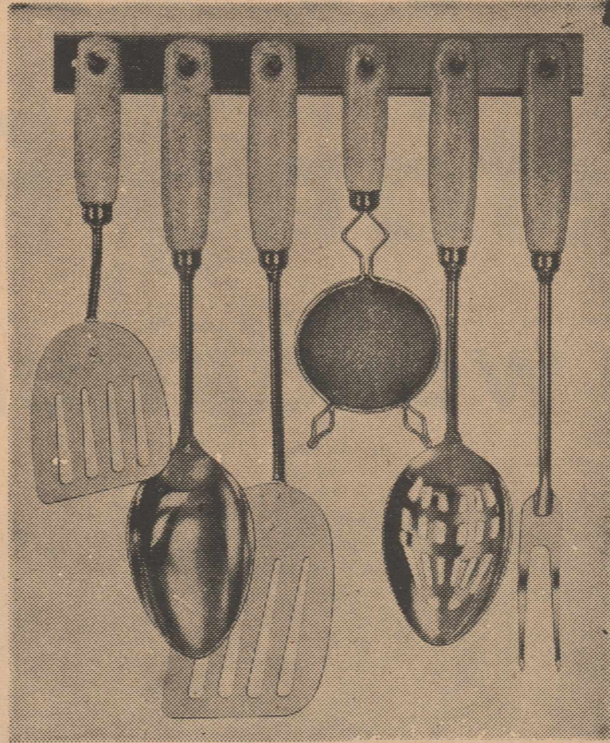
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
