Superintendent Gets Vote Of Confidence

3-Year Pact

Olton school trustees gave Supt. Johnny Clark Jr. a vote of confidence in the form of a renewal of his three-year contract at a regular board

meeting Tuesday night. The board renewed Clark's contract at his current salary, \$11,500 per year, and lauded the superintendent's work since he came here in July of 1961. That action topped the night's discussions, which also in-

1. Approval of reports on the lunchroom, athletic fund, enrollment, transportation, and tax collections.

2. Appointment of a school census trustee, Mrs. Rex Chitwood, who served in that capacity last year.

3. Employment of a bus driver, Carl McClure, for a new route authorized last month by the Texas Education Agency. The school purchased a new bus for the route recently, at a cost of \$3,675.

The lunchroom continued to show a deficit, although its financial situation is improved over last year. Reports showed a deficit of \$3,500 as of Dec.3, compared with \$2,900 in the red at the start of the fiscal year, Sept. 31.

The school system's longtime athletic fund debt was pared considerably last month, as payments of \$2,621 reduced the debt to \$7,100. At the start of the new year, athletic fund totaled \$9,625.50.

Average daily attendance for the second six weeks showed a slight gain, with a total of 1,156 compared with 1,135 during the first six weeks period.

All of the gain was in the average attendance was 650 compared with 620 during the first six weeks.

Enrollment for the second six weeks in white schools was 1,229, compared with 1,227 during the first six weeks.

Tax collections at the end of November were \$64,891.28, compared with \$69,398.57 at the same time a year ago.





AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE INSPECTION OF REGULATION OF MEATS. SLAUGHTER HOUSES, REGU-LATION OF HANDLING OF MEATS, PROHIBITING SALE OF UNINSPECTED OR UN-WHOLESOME MEAT OR FOOD PRODUCTS, PROVIDING FOR THE AP-POINTMENT OF AN ASSIST-ANT TO THE CITY HEALTH OFFICER, PRESCRIBING PEN-ALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS. AND DELCARING EMERGEN-REPEALING ORDIN-ANCES IN CONFLICT HERE-WITH, CONTAINING ASAV-INGS CLAUSE, AND ESTAB-LISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, expose, or offer for sale in the City of Olton, Texas, as well as to bring into the City of Olton, for human consumption, any meat, or meat food products of any cattle, calves, sheep, ironing or baby sitting. SECTION 2. INSPECTION. The City Health Officer, with the approval of the City Council, shall act as the Chief meat inspector for the City of Olton who shall be required to inspect all meat and meat food products of any cattle, calves, sheep, goats or swine that are offered or exposed for sale in the City of Olton or that may be brought into the City of Olton for sale for human consumption. However, no inspection shall be required for meats that have been previously inspected and approved by Federal authorities, State shall have the right to appoint an assistant to assist him in the

SECTION 4. SANITATION OF SLAUGHTERHOUSES.(a) There shall be abundant light, both natural and artificial, of good quality and well distributed, and sufficient ventilation for all rooms and compartments to insure sanitary conditions.

(b) There shall be an efficient drainage and plumbing system for the establishment and premises, and all drains and gutters shall be properly installed with approved traps

(c) Hot water for cleaning rooms and equipment shall be delivered under pressure to sufficient conveneint outlets and shall be of such temperature as to accomplish a thorough

cleanup The floors, walls, ceil-(d) ings, partitions, posts, doors, and other parts of all structures shall be of such materials, construction and finish as will make them susceptible of being readily and thoroughly cleaned. The floors shall be kept watertight. The rooms and compartments used for edible products shall be separate and distinct from those used for inedible products.

(e) The rooms and compartments in which any product is prepared or handled shall be free from dust and from odors from dressing and toilet rooms, catchbasins, hide cellars, casing rooms, inedible tank and fertilizer rooms, and livestock

(f) Every practicable precaution shall be taken to exclude flies, rats, mice, and other vermin from slaughterhouses. The use of poisons for any purpose in rooms or compartments where any unpacked product is stored or handled is forbidden.

(g) Water closets, toilet rooms and dressing rooms shall be required for employees and such rooms shall be entirely separated from compartments in which carcasses are dressed, or meat or meat food products are stored, placed, handled or prepared. Such facilities shall be properly supplied, lighted, ventilated, and kept in a sani-

tary condition. (h). Rooms, compartments, places, equipment and utensils used for preparing, storing, or otherwise handling any product, and all other parts of the establishment, shall be kept clean and in sanitary condition. There shall be no handling or storing of materials which create an objectionable condition in rooms, compartments, or places where products are pre-

pared, stored, or otherwise handled. (j) No employee or other person shall be permitted to expectorate on the floor but cuspidors shall be provided which shall be kept sanitary. (k) Conveyances in which meat or meat food products are

delivered shall be so constructed, closed or covered that the contents shall be kept clean. (i) Butchers and others who dress or handle meat products

shall thoroughly cleanse their hands. Implements used therefor shall be thoroughly cleansed. The employees of the establishment who handle any meat product shall keep their hands clean, and in all cases after visiting the toilet rooms or urinals shall wash their hands before handling any product or implements used in the preparation of product. Aprons, frocks and other outer clothing worn by persons who handle any product shall be kept clean and made of material that is readily cleansed.

SECTION 5. SLAUGHTERING

From and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, association or butcher to erect, establish, refrom, maintain and/or operate any abattoir or slaughter house where animals are slaughtered, to be used as food or offered for sale or sold for food within the limits of the City of Olton, where such abattoir or slaughter house is not constructed, maintained and operated in accordance with all the provisions in this ordinance and any violation of same in any any violation of this provision shall be deemed a misdemeanor and on conviction of same in any court of competent jurisdiction, such person, firm, agent or employee of any corporation or association or any butcher shall be punished by fine of not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each day's violation shall be deemed a separate offense and punish-

SECTION 6. VALIDITY AND CONSTITUTIONALITY. If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared to be void, ineffective or unconstitutional for any cause whatsoever, such declaration or holding shall not affect the validity of the ramaining Sections and provisions of this Ordinance.



in Texas' two per cent sales tax law are recommended by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy.

Some changes would result in decreased revenue and some would mean an increase But the total outcome of a legislative put-and-take would produce an additional \$10,500,000 a year from a tax that is expected to bring \$170,000,000

into state coffers this year. Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas is chairman of the commission. Other members are Hugo H. Loewenstern of Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin, Senators Louis Crump of San Saba and Jep S. Fuller of Port Arthur; Representatives Charles Sandahl of Austin and Charles Wilson of Trinity.

Parkhouse predicted that if spending in the next biennium is in line with the present level, no additional taxes would have to be leived.

A large addition to income-if recommendations are adopted--would come from applying the state sales tax to motor vehicles sales in place of the selective excise tax now levied on vehicles.

Commission recommended repeal of the exemption of farm machinery and equipment, but suggested that feed for farm work animals; herbicides, defoliants and desiccants, and all fertiliezer sales be exempt.

Some other recommendations 1. Apply sales tax to all clothing sales, which would up revenue \$10,000,000 a year. 2. Exempt vending machine sales of less than 25 cents, and all sales of less than 25 cents for retailers who derive 50

banks, since sales to national

banks are exempt Exempt all sales of alcoholic beverages.

5. Permit grocery stores to pay sales tax in proportion to purchases of taxable and non-taxable items. Grocers with annual receipts of less than \$100,000 would pay sales tax on the assumption that 85 per cent of receipts are from ex-
