## Parking Proposal To Be Aired

A proposal to change parking from angle to parallel on 8th Street from Main to Ave. G. heads the agenda for a regular city council meeting scheduled Tuesday night at 8.

The proposal, made by Councilman Howard Buchenau last month, drew criticism from some and a petition was circulated asking delay of the action.

Buchenau told the Enterprise he would have the "facts and figures" to back up his proposal at the meeting.

Another councilman, Cecil Gallaway, said he had measured the street and found it to be 54 feet, 2 inches wide. He also said the state had recommended several years ago that parallel parking be installed there. "The proposal was made purely to improve safety conditions on the street," Gallaway said.

The petition is expected to be presented to the council Tuesday night. It maintains that parallel parking would tend to speed up traffic on the street, which is near the school, and increase hazards.

It also asks that the council not act on the proposal until a thorough study is made.

# New Deputy On Job Here

After 18 years of keeping an eye on things here, V.L. Smith has taken a post at Littlefield and the town has a new deputy sheriff.

The new man is W.O. Word, 47, who has been a Hockley County deputy the past year. He was in police work at Brownfield and Littlefield prior to going to Anton.

"Smitty," as he's been known in Olton ever since he came here in 1944, will become chief deputy to Sheriff Dick Dyer at Littlefield.

Word, who went on duty Tuesday, says he's "glad to be here, and I'm looking forward to meeting everybody."

"Anytime I'm needed, I hope people will feel free to call on me. My phone number's the same as Smitty's, you know."

Smith, who was in police work at Wichita Falls before he moved here, has helped investigate on some big cases.

The most famous, or perhaps infamous, was the Dr. Hunt murder case at Littlefield. That case, never solved, still gets into conversation occasionally when lawmen in this part of the country get together.

Only a few months ago, he was able to run down the culprits in Olton's biggest burglary in history, a \$1,500 job at Olton Bowling Center.

"I've had wonderful co-operation here," Smith said, "and I hope folks here will give Mr. Word the same help they gave me."

And he added, with a smile, "I hope they'll call me, day or night, if something comes up and they want me come over from Littlefield."

Smith and his wife, Alice,

moved to Littlefield Wednesday. They have three sons, Billy of Lamesa, Joe Oliver of Littlefield and V.L. Jr. of Earth, also a deputy sheriff. They attend the Church of Christ.

Word was with the police department at Brownfield a year and a half before going to Anton as a deputy sheriff. He was with the Littlefield police department two years before that.

His family will move here after school is out. He and his wife Vivian, have one daughter at home, Rita Jo, 13, a seventh grader. They also have three married daughters. The Words are Baptists.

# Demo-GOP Primaries In Spotlight Saturday

## Legislator, Judge Races Featured

Democrats and Republicans will go their separate ways Saturday as Olton area voters take part in two-party primaries for the first time.

Both parties have races on the state level which will attract voters, but only the Democrats have local races in Lamb County.

Some observers are hailing this year's primaries as Texas' first test in the establishment of a two-party system.

However, most see the general election in November as the one which will tell just how much ground the GOP has gained on the Democrat stronghold.

Democrats will vote at the school cafeteria, while the Republicans will ballot at the American Legion Hall. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

At Hart Camp, Democrats will vote at the Baptist Church while Republicans will ballot at the Hart Camp Co-Op Gin.

At Springlake, the Demo primary polls will be at the Co-Op Gin office. GOP voters will ballot at the Springlake Community Building.

On the local level, two races have captured a lot of interest. Both are in the Democratic Primary.

Truitt Sides, an Olton man, will vie with J.B. Davis, Rocky Ford farmer, for the Democratic nomination for county judge.

In November, the winner will face Ray Keeling, Littlefield auto dealer who is unopposed in the GOP primary.

The other top race has three men in the running for the Democratic nomination for state representative, 91st district.

They're Bill Millen, Muleshoe farmer; Bill Clayton, Springlake farmer; and E.M. Nelson, Dimmitt publisher. Millen and Clayton describe themselves as conservative Democrats.

Most observers predict a run-off in that race, with the eventual nominee facing the GOP's Frank Ford of Hereford, who is unopposed in his primary.

In a race of purely local interest, Howard Hall will contest Glen Exter for Precinct 1 chairman.

On the state level, the governor's race is in the limelight with six Democrats seeking the nomination and a pair of Republicans competing for the GOP favor.

West Texas candidates are expected to run strongly here, with Marshall Formby of Plainview a good bet to lead the ticket in this precinct. Gov. Price Daniel and former Navy Secretary John Connally will have their supporters, as will former Gen. Edwin Walker, At-

torney General Will Wilson, and Don Yarborough of Houston. Jack Cox of Breckenridge and Roy Whittenburg of Amarillo are seeking the GOP nomination.

Probable leader in this area for the Demo nomination at lieutenant governor is Preston Smith of Lubbock. He is opposed by Jimmy Turman of Fannin County, Crawford Martin of Hill County, Robert Baker of Houston and Jarrard Srest of Temple.

The lieutenant governor's race in the GOP primary pits Bill Hayes of Temple, only major candidate to visit Olton during the campaign, against Kellis Dibrill, San Antonio.

Another West Texan, Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, is expected to poll heavily here in the attorney general's race. He's opposed by W.T. McDonald of Bryan, Bob Looney of Austin, Tom Reavley of Austin, Tom James of Dallas County, Les Proctor of Austin.

# Trustees OK Library Plan

Olton Schools' library will be open on a part-time basis for students and adults this summer.

That decision was reached by school trustees at a regular meeting here Tuesday night.

"Interest seems to be high among the students in such a plan," Supt. Johnny Clark Jr. told the board.

Clark said 14 classes were polled and interest was noted in 12 of them.

The board voted to allow the

opening of the library for two half-days a week for 10 to 12 weeks during the summer.

After the proposal was approved by the trustees, Clark said he thought the action would serve a "dual purpose."

"It should benefit both our school program and the community as a whole," he said.

Before suggesting changes, I think we should give this program a chance to work. I should be that there are inequities in this tax bill which will need to be corrected. ## Think, Then Vote!

Voting time is something that we all usually take too lightly.

Many of us go to the polls unprepared, then vote strictly on impulse.

Too often we scratch out a candidate's name just because it doesn't sound just right.

The Enterprise is publishing in this issue background information on as many candidates as possible. We hope you will read through the issue carefully. We also suggest that you look over the political advertising in these pages, because through it you can learn still more about the candidates.

For the first time, Texas will have two primaries. In Olton, the Democrats will make their choices at the school cafeteria. Republicans will select their nominees at the American Legion Hut.

The Enterprise is aligned with neither party. Because of this, we may be called fence-straddlers. Those who have followed us closely, however, know better.

We have repeatedly taken a stand for conservatism in government. Our efforts will continue to be directed on that course.

Our Republican friends tell us that the only way to have conservatism is for conservatives to line up with the GOP.

Conservative Democrats argue that if their conservatives move away from the party, it will kill their chances of stemming the liberal tide in their ranks.

We still believe a third party is the answer and we are sticking to our guns. We still remember the Demo-GOP national platforms of 1960, and they were much too similar.

Those who believe in getting with a party and staying with it won't agree with us, but we are going to vote for the man, and not the party.

We will vote in the primary of our choice, where the most for our poll tax money is offered, and then we'll split the ticket on November. We won't care one whit about the little phrase at the top of the primary ballot.

Republican—Jack Cox of Breckenridge. Cox would make Texas a dynamic governor, and he's a known conservative.

**FOR LT. GOVERNOR—**  
 Democrat—Preston Smith of Lubbock. Sen. Smith is another with a fine record who would work for economical government without waste.

Republican—Bill Hayes of Temple. Hayes, the only candidate for a major office to visit Olton during the campaign, is an outspoken conservative.

**FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL—**  
 Democrat—Waggoner Carr is a West Texas who proved he is worth his salt while House Speaker and in other public service.

the Texas Constitution. What is your solution to this problem? Revision of Constitution to eliminate outdated provisions, strengthen State and local government and remove necessity of continuous amendments to handle problems that should be solved by statute. I recommended creation of Study Commission on revision in 1957 and will work for action promptly.

2. Give your opinion of the poll tax as a PREREQUISITE for voting. Favor substitution of workable registration law. As Attorney General I supported proposed constitutional amendment abolishing poll tax in 1949.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. Texas has had selective taxes for many years, and all States must employ them. I have opposed a general sales tax and regret the Legislature could agree only on this type of tax last year, even though it is more limited than the taxes of many States. Inequities and administrative handicaps in the tax must be corrected after we have had sufficient experience on the tax to do this.

### Why Dual Primary Elections ?

Both major political parties, each having cast 200,000 or more votes for Governor in the 1960 general election, are required by law to hold a primary election for the purpose of nominating candidates for Governor and all other State offices to be chosen by the vote of the entire state, candidates for Congress, and candidates for offices to be nominated by the vote of a county.

The places of holding primary elections or conventions in the various precincts are not to be within 100 yards of the places in which such elections or conventions are being held by a different political party. The exception is in those counties having a population of 500,000 or more, where the places of holding such primary elections and conventions may be within 100 yards of one another provided completely separated facilities are used. The counties falling within this exception are Bexar, Dallas, Harris and Tarrant. This exception also applies to counties having a city of more than 100,000 inhabitants which is partially located in two counties. This exception fits Amarillo which is located on the line dividing Potter and Randall counties.

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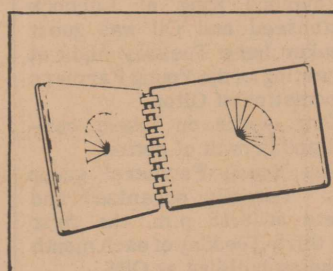
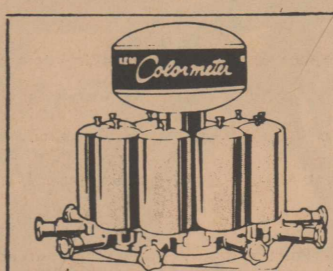

1. Many Texas voters feel that too many constitutional amendments too often (14 in 1962) is an ineffective method of rewriting the Texas Constitution. What is your solution to this problem? Texas needs a revision of its Constitution, so it will function as the foundation upon which our laws are based, rather than as an accumulation of laws. Many present amendments to our Constitution should actually be legislative matters rather than Constitutional questions. I favor a Constitutional revision.

2. Give your opinion of the poll tax as a PREREQUISITE for voting. I do not believe in a poll tax as a prerequisite for voting. However, we obviously must have some system of voter registration to ensure honest elections. A system of voter registration necessarily must be set up by the

legislature before the poll tax requirement can be abolished. The revenue produced by the poll tax also would have to be replaced from some other source.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. Texas had a choice between a sales or an income tax, and it chose a sales tax. Now we must make it work. The sales tax is a growth tax, and once the loopholes and inequities are eliminated, we should not increase the tax -- but confine the growth of state government to the tax revenue. I favor revision of our tax structure to eliminate inequities in all our present sales taxes. I oppose any tax increase.

1. Many Texas voters feel that too many constitutional amendments too often (14 in 1962) is an ineffective method of rewriting the Texas Constitution. What is your solution to this problem? The basic strength of our country historically has been its great federal constitution, laying down broad guidelines for legislative, judicial and executive action. Students of Texas government agree that our state constitution, written under the stress of the reconstruction years of 1876, does the opposite, imposing a constitutional strait-jacket. Modern, growing Texas urgently needs a modern constitution. I pledge to devote all my energies toward working

for complete revision and modernization of our 86-year-old constitution.

2. Give your opinion of the poll tax as a PREREQUISITE for voting. A price tag should not be put on the exercise of one of the fundamental rights of democratic citizens. Only five of our 50 states still have the poll tax requirement. Modern Texas requires no such financial limitation on the scope of our democracy. As governor, I pledge to submit legislation calling for a voter referendum to abolish the poll tax and to employ all the prestige of the office to secure its adoption.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. As is widely known, I traveled the length and breadth of Texas in the 1960 campaign, fighting the sales tax lobby which I regarded then -- and still regard -- as little more than a front organization for Eastern-owned interstate gas pipelines that were seeking to avoid taxes on themselves. The general sales tax that emerged from the last session and became law when the Governor failed at the moment of truth to veto it, is a cumbersome, unfair, regressive tax.

## Power Lawn Mowers May Be Dangerous

The job of keeping lawns neatly trimmed and mowed will become more time consuming with the advent of warm weather. Power tools for doing the job are readily available and power mowers are regular equipment around most homes. These mowers, improperly used, can run up the cost of lawn mowing, cautions the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, by being accident hazards.

The rotary type mower can become a lethal machine, warns the Council, if it is used to mow lawns or weeds where rocks, bones, pieces of wire, nails or other debris can be found. The cutting blade can be broken by striking a hard object and hurled through the air. Wire can be cut into short pieces and hurled at bullet speed. Be sure, advises the Council, that the area being mowed is free of such objects and that the mower is constructed so as to prevent objects being hurled toward the operator.

Furthermore, the Council suggests a few additional rules of safety which, if followed, could prevent many accidents involving lawn mowers or other power tools. "Never," they warn, "try to make adjustments to a mower with the engine running. It's just good business to remove the wire from the sparkplug before attempting to repair or adjust the cutting blade or remove accumulations of grass or weeds from under the mower."

Children should not be allowed to operate a mower nor should a person who is barefooted or wearing open toed shoes. The engine should be cool when refueling is done and if an electric mower is used be sure the extension cord is in perfect shape or you may be in for a shock, warns the Council.

It's a good idea, say the Councilmen, to once again read the operator's manual which came with the mower or their tools before taking them out for another season. The folks who made the equipment are concerned about the user's safety and have made recommendations to insure a long and useful life for the machine and operator, concludes the Safety group.

Judge Otis T. Dunagan of Tyler will bid in Saturday's Democratic primary for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Judge Dunagan, who has had 20 years of judicial experience, based his campaign during visits to all parts of Texas on a pledge to bring to the court "common sense interpretation of our criminal laws." 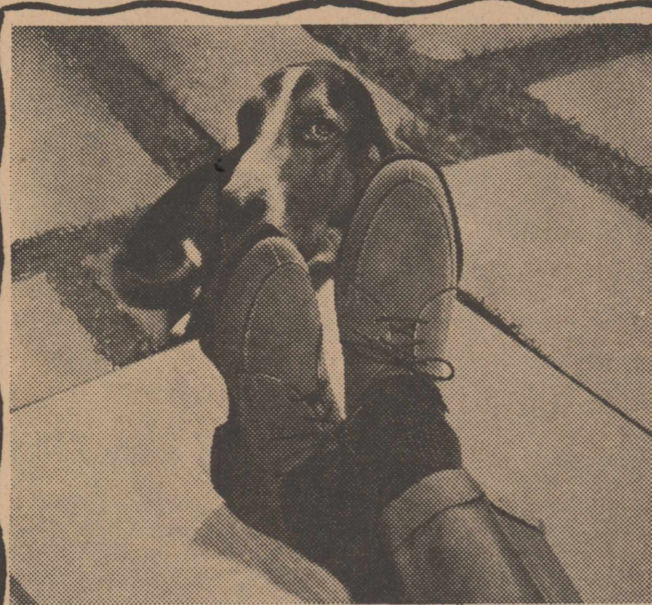


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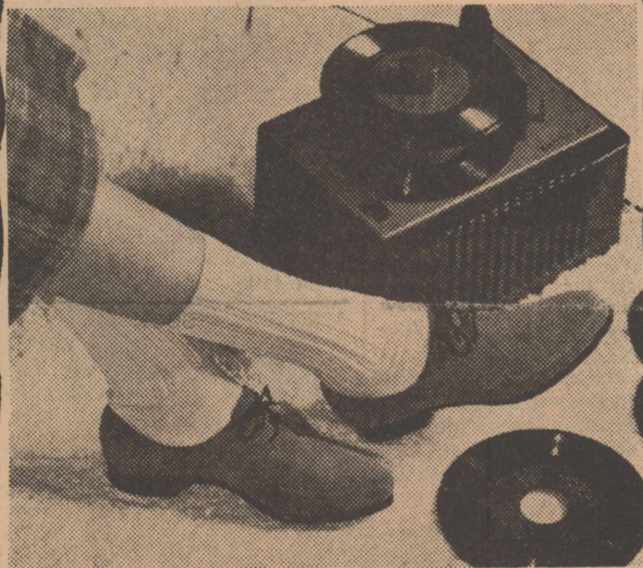

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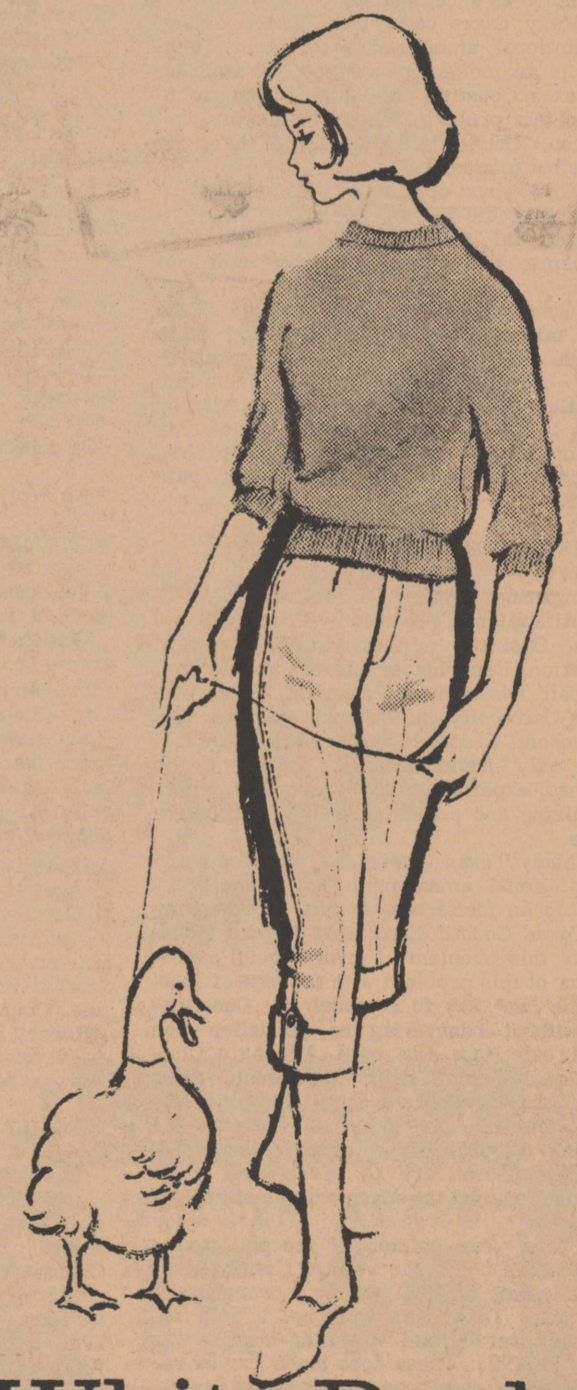

quence until the remaining articles have been revised. I do not feel that any revision is necessary in Articles I and II. I am opposed to a Constitutional Convention.

2. Give your opinion of the poll tax as a PREREQUISITE for voting. On several occasions, I have voted to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting. However, the problem has another facet. There must be a sound system of voter registration, and so far this problem has not been resolved entirely to my satisfaction. The voter-registration bill passed by the Legislature in 1946 (contingent upon approval of a Constitutional Amendment abolishing the poll tax) offers the best registration system evolved thus far. The Constitutional Amendment failed; hence the registration bill is without effect. I am still in favor of abolishing the poll tax.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. I opposed the sales tax consistently until the legislative session of 1961, as I felt there were other, more equitable methods to obtain revenue. However, I supported the sales tax bill which was enacted because I felt that it was the only tax bill which offered a solution acceptable to that Legislature or probably to any future Legislature. The law as enacted contains several good exemptions, but it needs some major adjustments as to collect procedures.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. If the revenue is needed to efficiently operate our State and provide the essential public services, the sales tax or broad based tax is the best solution. My position is that if needed, we should have the broadest base with the lowest rate possible.

1. Many Texas voters feel that too many constitutional amendments too often (14 in 1962) is an ineffective method of rewriting the Texas Constitution. What is your solution to this problem? I favor careful examination of this problem with the idea of finding the best way to remodel our Constitution without endangering the foundation upon which our State was built. I favor a Constitutional Commission which would make use of the excellent research already available. However, care must be exercised regarding the manner in which members of the Commission are to be selected so as to guard against the machinations of special interests.

2. Give your opinion of the poll tax as a PREREQUISITE for voting. I am in favor of abolishing the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting. Texas has long had a poll tax, but the prerequisite to voting feature was added in 1903. These lost funds can be replaced from other sources. I suggest a semi-permanent registration system as is found

in other states, but one designed to suit Texas, particularly in the light of the voting needs of our rapidly increasing and shifting population.

3. Give your opinion of the use of the sales tax as a method of obtaining state revenue. I have not been a supporter of a general sales tax. The present limited sales tax was an emergency solution to the State's serious fiscal difficulties. No other way appeared by which necessary revenue could be obtained to care for the deficit and at the same time provide essential State services demanded by our people. If a good alternative solution can be found, I would recommend a careful restudy of our tax problem.

## Physical Assets \$7,710 Per Family

How large an investment of money is represented by the car, refrigerator, washing machine, furniture and other consumer durables owned by the average Lamb County family? How much would this equipment bring today, if offered for sale?

Most people have never figured out the amount they have put into such possessions. As to their equity in their houses and in their insurance and other

investments, they are well aware of these. But as to assets of this sort—no idea.

An estimate of the dollar value of these tangibles is now possible through studies made on a national scale by the National Bureau of Economic Research and through a report published by the University of Michigan.

The finding is that there is a direct relationship between the amount of money that families have invested in cars, washing machines and the like, and the size of their incomes. In general, it is several percent over their annual income level.

In Lamb County, where earnings per household are above the United States average, the number of such possessions and their value are proportionately greater.

The average local family, on this basis, has an estimated \$7,710 invested in consumer durable goods.

It exceeds the \$7,000 invested per household in the United States as a whole and the \$6,530 in the State of Texas.

The reports point out that the acquisition of possessions of this type was at a "phenomenal" rate in the nine years to 1956, after which it began leveling off. For the last five years, such investments have been increasing only one percent annually.

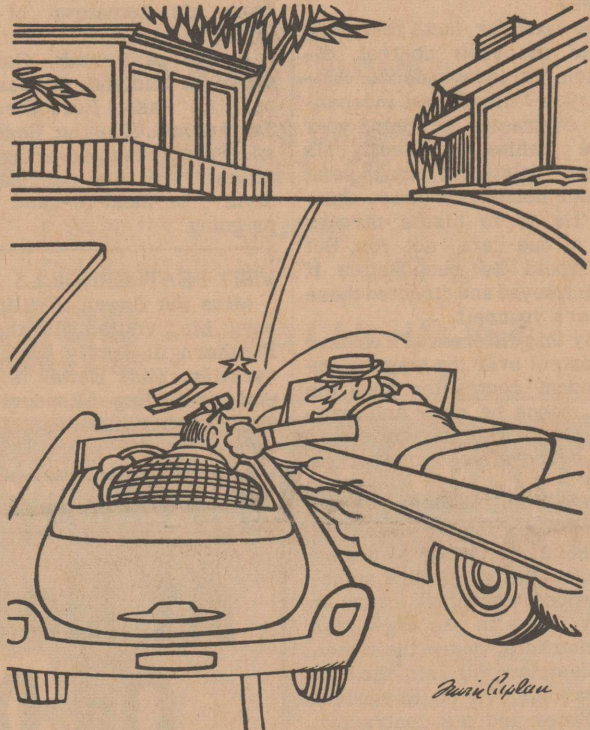
The automobile industry and other durable goods producers would face a glowing future, it is noted, if people should decide to step up this investment rate to two or three percent a year.

Nationally, the gross value of consumer durable goods is placed at \$365 billion, with autos making up 40 percent of the total.

The gross investment by the 6,530 Lamb County families in their cars and other physical equipment is estimated at \$50,329,000.

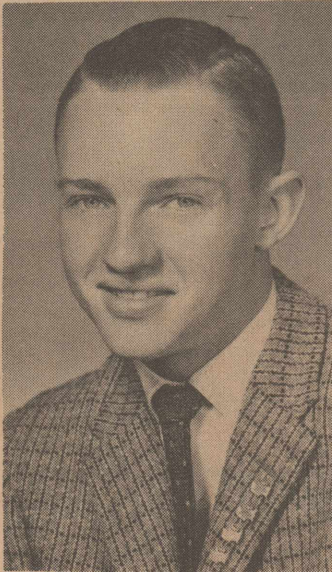
If offered for sale today, however, they would bring much less than that, allowing for normal wear and tear. The return would be about 47 percent of original cost.

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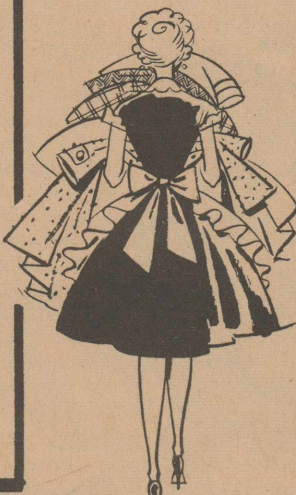
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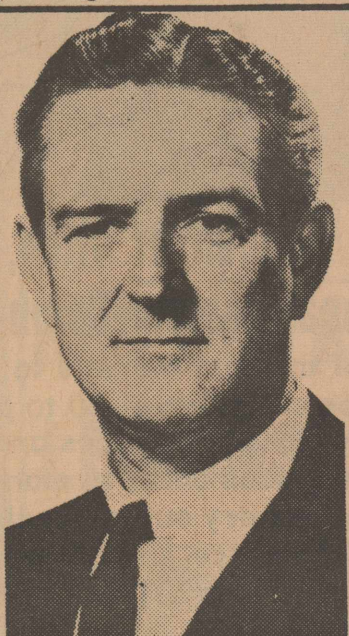

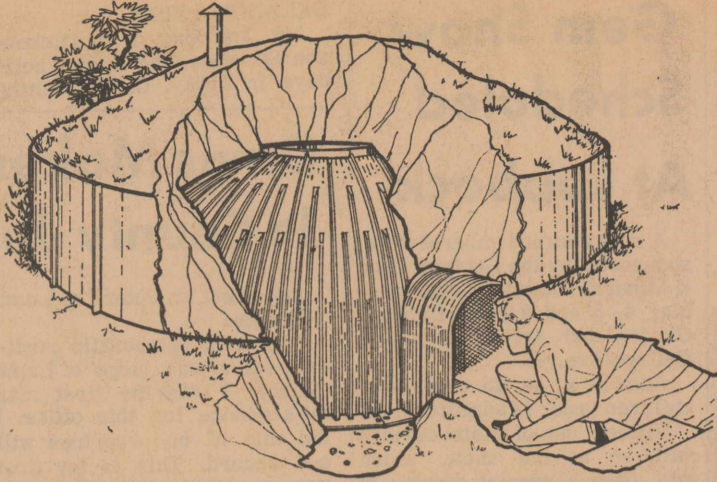

**Eye Accident Rate Said High In United States**

Helen Keller, the world's most famous blind citizen, has said, "If one tenth of the money we now spend to support unnecessary blindness were spent to prevent it, society would be the gainer in terms of cold economy, not to mention considerations of the happiness of humanity."

Any such attempt at prevention must begin with accidental eye injuries incurred in the home, in the factory, and on the farm.

Statistics indicate that the United States annually has over 300,000 accidents which involve damage to the eyes. This amounts to an accident every 30 seconds or 100 accidents per 8-hour work day throughout the year.

It has also been estimated that the average period of disability for an eye injury is 15 weeks, in comparison with an average of five weeks for all accidents affecting other parts of the body, and that more

eyes are lost from these accidents than are legs, hands and feet combined.

A national health survey has shown that occupational injuries are responsible for 20 percent of all cases of blindness in one eye and eight percent of all cases of blindness in both eyes.

The toll to national efficiency caused by industrial eye injuries is readily apparent in the annual loss of a staggering 53,760,000 man hours - the equivalent of 26,800 fulltime employees.

Accidents in the home, most of which could be prevented, account for another large percentage of eye injuries. National figures indicate that 18 percent of all cases of blindness in one eye and five percent of all cases of blindness in both eyes due to all causes were the result of accidents in the home.

Finally, accidents as the result of play and games at school add to the grim total. More than a thousand children lose the sight of one or both eyes each year.

It is estimated that 95 percent of these accidents are preventable, given adequate eye-testing, adequate illumination and if proper precaution were taken.

**Students Win Honors In National Piano Auditions**

**Responsibility For Workers Is Explained**

Now and then you may hire someone to do some special work for you. In case someone is hurt are you legally responsible? It depends on how you "hire" him. Was he an "independent contractor"? An "employee" or an "agent"?

As a rule, an independent contractor has an independent calling like that of a plumber, electrician, house painter and the like.

Your agreement with him calls for certain results. You do not tell him how to work. As a rule, you are not legally to blame for any harm he may do. He is an "independent" contractor and not an employee or agent.

But what about an employee or an agent? You, the employer or principal, controls and directs how the worker does his job. You are therefore responsible for it, and largely for any harm that may grow out of his work.

But how can you tell the difference between an independent contractor and an agent or employee?

You look for facts that show or do not show control, direction, or independence. Suppose you "hire" an independent contractor to paint your house white. Accidentally his worker splatters some paint on your neighbor's green shutter. He is to blame through lack of due care, not you. But you would be responsible if you employed and directed these painters yourself.

Why this difference? You have no control over the way the independent contractor does the work. Since he owns and manages his enterprise, he is legally responsible for what he does.

But you will may have some legal responsibility for an independent contractor's work as, for example, if you hire someone whose work may cause an injury. Thus in one such case the contractor dug in the street. A pedestrian fell into the hole and was hurt. He could sue both the owner and the contractor. One cannot always pass on all the responsibility to the contractor if in itself your project is dangerous -- like blasting in a populous place.

In such cases you have an extra duty to make sure to get skillful and responsible independent contractors to do such work.

A man got an independent trucker to haul lumber. The trucker crashed into a car on the highway. The injured party sued both him and the lumber company and won. As a rule only the independent trucking contractor would have had to pay, but here the lumber company should have known that this trucker was reckless.

When you call in a plumber, repairman, or other independent contractor you must make your place safe for him to work in. You must tell him of any traps and hidden dangers (not obvious ones.) Otherwise you may be liable to the contractor for any injuries to him or his workers.

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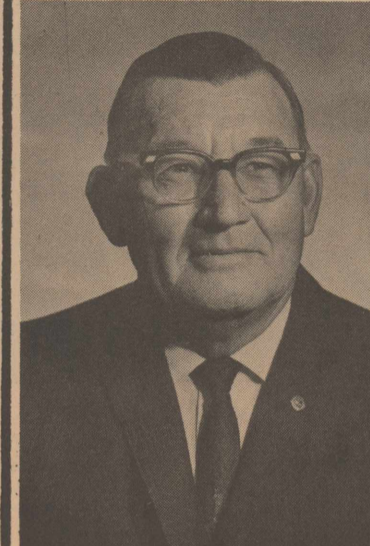

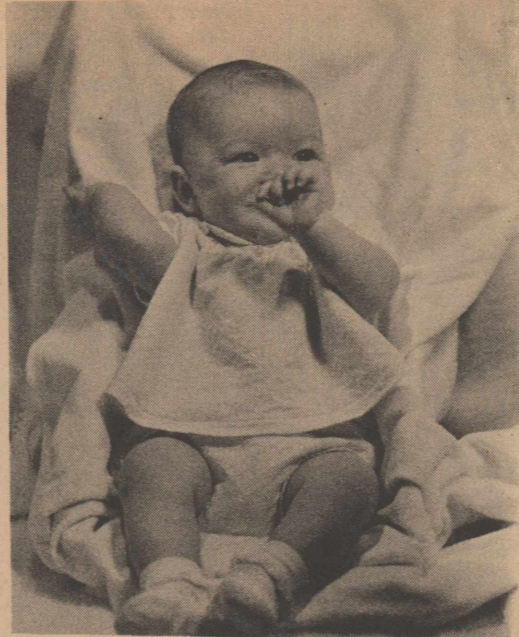

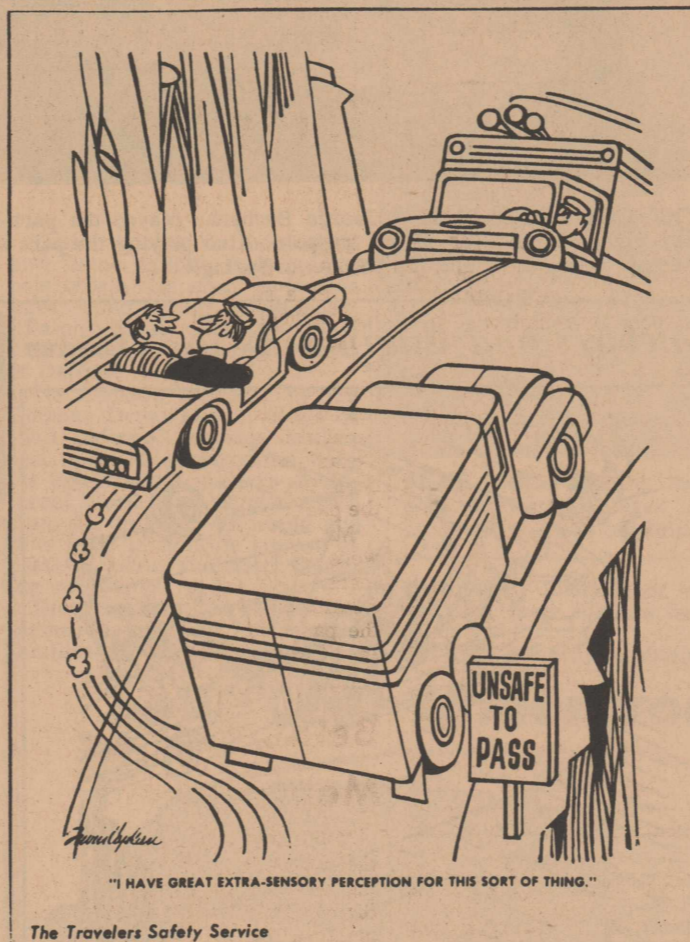

### How Many 'Bad Eggs'?

AUSTIN—The Texas housewife's chances of getting a "bad egg" at the supermarket today is only one in a hundred, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said this week.

"Five years ago, she ran the risk of feeding her family about 16 poor quality eggs in every hundred served," White added.

The 37-year-old John White, who is seeking re-election to the state's top agricultural post, cited the new Texas Egg Law as an example of new legislation he inaugurated for the protection of the consumer.

The young commissioner said he was especially proud of the fact that Texas is no longer a "dumping ground" for poor quality or unhealthy foodstuffs from other states. "We fought hard for laws which now serve as a watchdog for quality on such important food items as eggs, fruits and vegetables," said White.

It is this type of protection which I seek to continue assuring the people of Texas as their commissioner of agriculture," John White said.

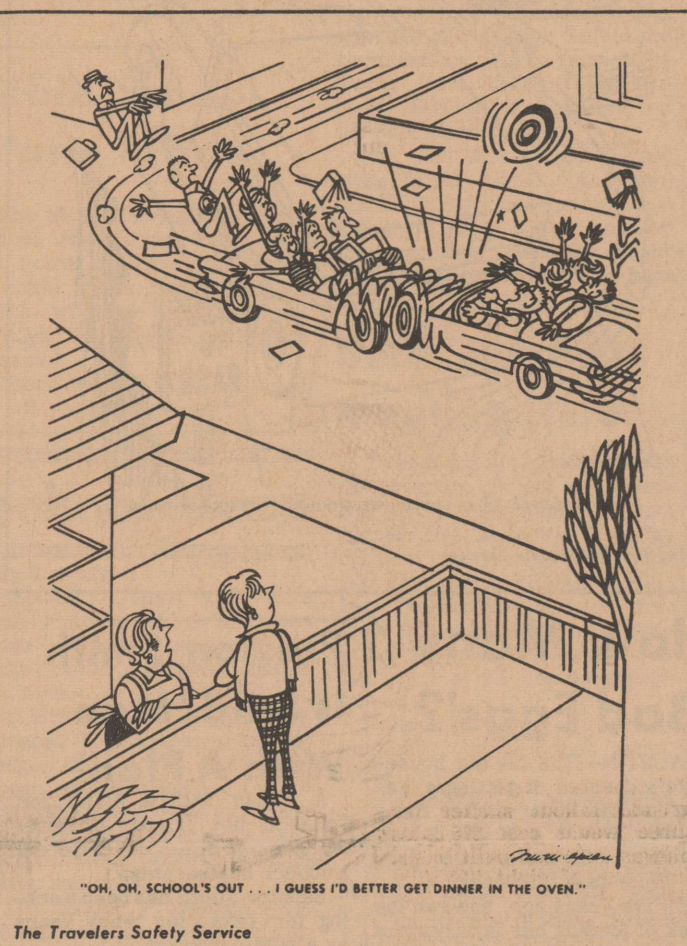

**Fertilizer, Irrigation Tests Made**  
 Four different irrigation methods and four fertilizer treatments on cotton were tested to determine the effect on the efficiency of cotton production at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1961.

James C. Valliant, recently promoted from assistant to associate water engineer, stated that the tests were designed to determine the combination of irrigation method and fertilizer treatment which would produce the greatest net return and the highest irrigation efficiency in the production of cotton. Four irrigation methods combined with four fertilizer treatments and three varieties of cotton were used. The irrigation methods were: (1) First bloom only, (2) First bloom plus mid-bloom, (3) First bloom, mid-bloom and September 5 compared with (4) dryland cotton. Full details of the test are in the complete High Plains Research Foundation Report No. 45, issued in April, 1962.

The three varieties of cotton were Gregg, representing early maturing; Lockett 88-A, representing mid-maturing, and Paymaster 88-90, representing late maturing as well as the open-boll type cotton.

Valliant concluded from these tests that, "Results from the 1961 cotton irrigation test indicate that in early and mid-maturing cotton, response to fertilizer is directly related to the rate of irrigation water, while response to fertilizer in late maturing cotton could be due to the period of time the plant demands nutrients."

The 1961 results indicate that applying irrigation water at early stages of growth, first bloom or first bloom and mid-bloom at a low rate of fertilizer will produce the highest practical irrigation efficiency. Balancing time of irrigation and amount of fertilizer can increase lint cotton, net return per inch of irrigation water and net return per acre.

Fertilizer applications on a per acre basis were: 40 pounds of nitrogen and 60 pounds of phosphorus; 80 pounds of nitrogen and 60 pounds of phosphorus; 120 pounds of nitrogen and 60 pounds of phosphorus, compared to the nonfertilized plots.



### Cotton Classing Is Available

Growers who wish to have their cotton classed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture under provisions of the Smith-Doxey Act should apply for these services as soon as their cotton is planted, says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist.

The Smith-Doxey Act provides for one free classification for each eligible bale of cotton. Samples must be submitted by a bonded sampler or by a public warehouse which issues negotiable receipts, explains Elliott.

Each cotton improvement group, except those in southern Texas, must file an application with the cotton classing office serving its territory not later than August 1. Those in counties south of a line from Dimmitt to Karnes to Matagorda must file an application by June 1.

### Shelter Design Book Available

Those wishing to build their own home fallout shelters can now obtain the most up-to-date information through a handbook, "Family Shelter Designs," just distributed by the Department of Defense.

The booklet, prepared by the Defense Department's Office of Civil Defense, provides designs and detailed construction data for eight fallout shelters of different types. They range in cost from \$75 to \$850. All would cut to at least 1/100th the amount of outside fallout radiation reaching occupants.

These shelters, the booklet explains, are designed for "use by families who do not have access

to community shelters or who prefer that their shelters be at their homes."

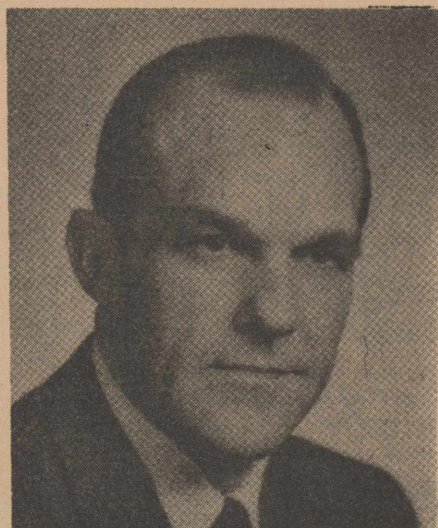
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# These Men Head GOP Ballot

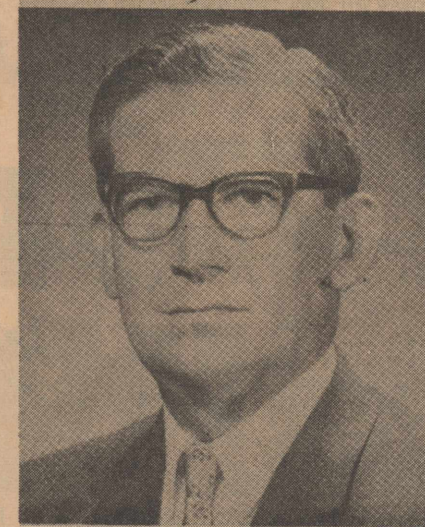

In 1955 he began a long battle with the Teamster's Union, which demanded that he sign a union contract despite the fact that his employees did not wish to belong to a union. The ICC upheld his position in 1957.

Mr. Barry believes in honorably accepting his own responsibilities and in statesmanship instead of politics in government. Instead of a vacillating, apologetic foreign policy, he wants a program of responsibility and forcefulness. He favors equality in labor and management legislation. He is opposed to government policy being dictated by starry-eyed college theorists, socialists and selfish labor leaders.

### Joe Phillips

A native of Lubbock, where he was born in 1925, Mr. Phillips is a real estate dealer and past president of the Texas Real Estate Association. He is also a director of the National Association of Real Estate Boards. A veteran of World War II, he is married and has three children.

A firm believer in the principle of state's rights and the freedom of communities to work with and solve their own problems, Mr. Phillips is opposed to any attempts of the federal government to interfere in urban affairs. He feels that only through the promotion of the private enterprise system worldwide can we have economic well-being, peace and prosperity.

He believes that we must strive for more economic and business-like approaches to national and international affairs.
