

Council Deadlock Stymies Move On Parking, Employee Changes

Mayor Joins Vote On Parking Issue

Parking on 8th Street between Main and Ave. G will remain angle for the time being.

The controversial issue brought out a crowd in protest of parallel parking and resulted in a 3-3 stalemate among members of Olton's city council Tuesday night.

A petition signed by 185 people of the city and immediate area was presented at the meeting. It asked delay of the ordinance on parallel parking and further study of the matter before it was acted upon.

Basil Sherman, a groceryman whose store fronts on 8th, acted as spokesman for the group. He said it "fell my lot" to present the petition, adding that it was drawn up by a Chamber of Commerce committee.

"We are not trying to tell you what to do or what not to do," Sherman said. "We're all interested in safety where there are traffic problems and we're not asking you not to pass this ordinance."

However, Sherman said, "we would like the thing to be studied. No survey has been made and we'd like to see a little work done on it."

After almost two hours of discussion of pros and cons on the issue, Councilman G.H. Buchenau said: "I think we've spent enough time on it and I'd like to make a motion that we pass the ordinance."

Mayor M.T. James quickly stipulated that he would vote on the question. He said that under the rules of procedure he could vote on issues other than elections by announcing beforehand that he would vote.

City Attorney Andy Stroebel then told the group that it was his understanding that the mayor was not allowed a vote except in the event of a tie.

James said he was certain it was legal procedure for him to vote in this case, then asked if there were any objections. "No objection if it's legal," said Gullett. Gullett and Buchenau agreed.

The mayor said he would be glad "to withdraw my vote if the city attorney finds it is not legal."

Stroebel then found a paragraph in a law book and read it aloud.

"This seems to show that he can vote," Stroebel said. The city attorney later said he would check into the situation further.

Buchenau stated his motion to approve the ordinance to take effect after 30 days. Gullett seconded.

Count of the votes showed James, Bob Duncan and Fred Thompson against the motion, with Gullett, Gullett and Buchenau voting "for."

"I'm not trying to be hard-headed about this," said Mayor James. "But we want everyone to vote as they wish. I do believe this warrants more study."

Retorted Gullett: "It's sort of an underhanded way to go at it, I think."

"What part is underhanded?" James asked.

"Why didn't you bring this up on the resolution?" Gullett questioned.

Later James said: "My vote should not be construed to mean I'm absolutely against your proposal. Later, I might be for it, but right now, I feel like it should have more consideration."

The long discussion of the pros and cons of the parallel parking situation prior to the vote brought opinions from almost everyone in the room.

"Parallel parking is not the answer," Sherman told the group. "These blocks are in the school zone and we all want to adhere to the zone for the safety of the children."

"The fire truck comes down this street and it sometimes might have to slow up, but I don't believe it is hampered to the extent that it couldn't go 10 to 15 miles per hour. The fire boys must drive within the limit of the law."

"In little towns," Sherman said, "when we cut down on parking, we add the incentive for people to go out of town."

"We'll admit we're a little selfish. . . . It would hurt not only those on the street but all the downtown area. We made a check the other day and it showed on the average that a person in a car parked on this block went to four stores."

"We ask only that it be studied before it is passed. . . . if it is passed, we will abide by it," he said.

Jack Silcott told the council he came to the meeting only as an interested citizen and that he had no selfish motive.

"But I do think it would hurt business. I had heard of this petition, but I hadn't seen it."

Mrs. Bill Thomas, who operates a beauty shop on 8th, said her views had been expressed well by Sherman.

"We want to get together and build Olton, not slow it up," she said.

Bill Kelley, a main street merchant, said: "I've seen many times where women have ample room to park parallel, but in many cases they will not attempt to park whether there's room or not. . . . if it's parallel."

Some people at the meeting felt that parallel parking on 8th would cut down as much as 50 or 60 per cent on parking space.

Gullett said one main street merchant had told him his business had not been affected by parallel parking.

Buchenau said he had offered the proposal "strictly as a safety measure. . . . we had been approached on it by a lot of people."

In answer to a question about the number of accidents on the street, Gullett said he thought that a number of minor accidents were never turned in. He said that would be the reason that few accidents would be in the records on the street.

"We did have the merchants in mind when we were discussing the ordinance," Gullett said. "We plan to create additional parking."

Buchenau said some additional parking behind the city hall had been planned and that this "would create as much parking as will be eliminated."

Sherman said he knew that the state had recommended parallel parking on the street, but he added that a recommendation to cut out the stop light at the school also had been made.

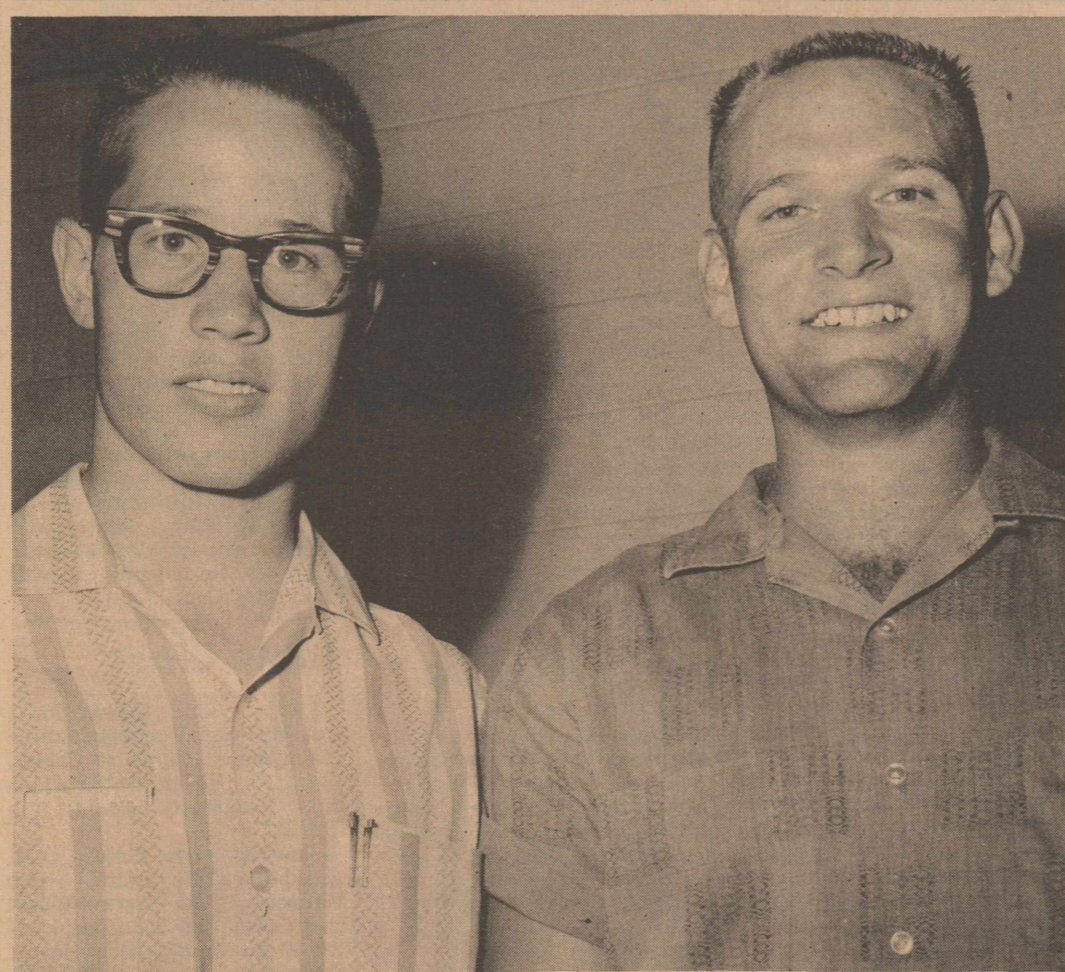
"We would have made a mistake to follow the state recommendation on that," he said.

"Parallel parking is designed to speed up traffic," Sherman added.

Said Gullett: "That wouldn't make any difference, we'd still have a 15-mph zone."

Councilman Fred Thompson said he thought parallel parking is designed to speed up traffic. "I've yet to see a parking lot with such parking," he said.

Later, Thompson asked: "I wonder what an expert would

Clayton, Nelson Face Run-Off, Sides Edged

Lamb County gave its West Texas and home-county candidates a big boost and Olton followed suit in primaries last Saturday.

Olton's own Truitt Sides went down to defeat despite a big boost from his hometown. Sides led J.W. Davis, the Demo nominee, by 453-134 here, but Davis rolled up a big margin at Littlefield's big box to get a 332-vote victory.

Springlake farmer Billy Clayton led the ticket for state representative, but he was forced into a run-off with B.M. Nelson, Dimmitt publisher. A third man in the race immediately threw his support to Clayton.

Olton and Lamb County generally stuck together on the major races, favoring Marshall Formby, Preston Smith, and Waggoner Carr, the West Texas candidates.

GOP voters in both Olton and the county favored Jack Cox for governor and Bill Hayes for lieutenant governor.

And voters in both primaries went against horse race betting and against abolishing the poll tax.

Smith and Carr both gained run-off spots, but Formby trailed.

Democrats named 31 delegates to the county convention at their precinct meeting Saturday and adopted the unit rule. No resolutions were passed, but some are expected to be made at the caucus Friday night.

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"NOTHING TO WORRY ABOUT"

At one point in Tuesday night's city council meeting, Councilman Robert Duncan asked City Attorney Andy Stroebel:

"On that \$100,000 suit against the city (in which Stroebel acted as plaintiff's attorney) . . . now that you're city attorney, how's that gonna work? You can't represent both of us."

Stroebel grinned and said, "you won't have to worry about that."

The new city attorney said he would see about getting the case dismissed soon.

The suit against the city was filed in May, 1959 by Lupe Martine, claiming false arrest.

Sherman Drops Job On Housing

Olton groceryman Basil Sherman dropped one hot spot while speaking on the heated parking issue at the city council meeting Tuesday night.

Sherman resigned his post as head of the local low-rent housing board, which heads the federally financed project which caused some stir here not many weeks ago.

He said he was resigning the post due to the "press of business and a lack of time." He requested to be relieved immediately.

The council accepted his resignation, with Duncan, Thompson and Gullett voting for and Buchenau and Gullett abstaining.

Asked by Mayor M.T. James if he thought the project is worth continuing, Sherman said:

"It's a good thing if the people will accept it. But the locations for the units picked by the federal agency do not seem to be okay with the people."

The government had suggested a location two blocks east of the square for the location of eight units for Latin Americans. A petition protesting the location later was lodged with the local board.

Charles Polk, a member of the housing board, said another survey on the project was needed, to determine whether there should be units for whites here.

A new member will be named to the board by the city council and the board will elect its own new president.

New Councilmen Split With Old

An unexpected move Tuesday night by Mayor M.T. James Jr. threw Olton's city council into a deadlock on a parallel parking question and stalled efforts of three recently elected councilmen to "clean house" at city hall.

Plans to discuss the discharge of several city employees came to light as rumors flew after a behind-closed-doors session Tuesday afternoon.

James pulled his surprise Tuesday night on a motion by G.H. Buchenau to approve an ordinance calling for parallel parking on 8th between Main and G.

The mayor announced he would vote on the question and referred to state law which he said made it legal for him to vote on motions other than elections if he announced his intention to vote before the ballot was taken.

The result was a three-three split on the parallel parking motion. Councilmen Buchenau, Bob Gullett and Cecil Galloway voted to adopt the ordinance.

James and Councilmen Fred Thompson and Bob Duncan balloted against the proposal.

As a result, angle parking will be kept on the street, at least for the time being.

The plans to make some changes in the present list of city personnel were not brought out at the council meeting Tuesday night.

However they were confirmed Wednesday by Gullett and Galloway.

"We had intended to bring it up last night," Gullett said Wednesday, "but after the way things turned out, we just decided to let it go for the time being."

A reporter asked Gullett specifically if the new council members wanted to "clean house" at the city hall.

"Something like that," Gullett said. "We've had some complaints and we want to check into it."

Gullett said the behind-the-door session of Tuesday afternoon was designed to "talk over" the standing of the employees in question.

Councilman Galloway, also contacted Wednesday, said the get-together Tuesday afternoon was not an "official meeting."

"We just had some things to talk over and felt everybody would feel easier about it just talking among ourselves, not in front of the crowd which we knew would be there Tuesday night for the parking thing," he said.

Galloway added that not all the council was present at the afternoon session and that the city secretary was not called in to record any minutes. Specifically, Galloway said the only councilman not in attendance Tuesday afternoon was Buchenau.

"There was nothing official about it," he said. "We also discussed the parking proposal some."

Mayor James said Wednesday that he had mentioned during the afternoon get-together that if Gullett and Galloway had anything to act on, he would call in the newspaper and the secretary.

James said he was told that no action was being planned at that time.

Galloway said, in answer to a question about the rumors to "clean house," said "you're liable to hear anything."

"It's not so," he said. "There were a lot of employees not mentioned."

But he added that he thought "there are some things going on which could cause us (the city) a lot of trouble."

He pointed out that he had mentioned at last month's council meeting the question of qualifications of the city attorney and city secretary.

Galloway said it was his understanding that either officeholder must be a qualified elector and reside in the city of Olton.

At last month's council meeting, the group named a new city attorney, Andrew Stroebel of Olton. He succeeded Day and Owens of Plainview.

In other activity at this week's regular meeting, the council:

1. Accepted the resignation of Basil Sherman as chairman of the local low rent housing project.

2. Elected Buchenau as mayor pro-tem to succeed Thompson. Buchenau and Gullett were nominated, with Buchenau winning by a 3-2 vote.

3. Approved moving of a warehouse back of the city hall to the city yard.

4. Approved use of city men and equipment to clean up the square, noting that permission had been granted by the owners prior to the clean-up.

5. Tabled a request by General Telephone Company to make changes in key set and extension phone rates here.

6. Approved expenses of \$200 for each of three firemen to attend fire school at College Station this summer.

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EDITORIALS The Council Deadlock

The Galloway-Gullett-Buchenau vote was blocked here Tuesday night at a city council meeting when Mayor M.T. James unexpectedly announced he would vote, bringing the council to a three-three deadlock.

In exercising his vote, Mayor James was at one point accused of using an "underhanded" method.

The move was, perhaps, unusual in the absence of a tie, but whether or not it was "underhanded" is another matter.

When he announced he would vote, the mayor stated that he was not against the parking proposition in question. Rather, he said he felt it had not been investigated thoroughly.

We feel that James was sincere in the matter and, perhaps, felt that he was forced into the move to prevent an injustice.

We are in agreement with Mayor James that the parking question has not been investigated fully and we feel that a move to rapidly railroad the ordinance through without proper investigation and discussion would be a mistake.

However, regardless of the issue involved,

it is our opinion that a pre-arranged consistent voting pattern among the new councilmen is not only a mistake, but dangerous.

It has appeared, since the three new councilmen were elected, that the votes of the other two councilmen, Fred Thompson and Bob Duncan, were of little value in view of the fact that Galloway, Gullett and Buchenau have voted together on all questions.

We would hope that the five members of the council would learn to work together, considering the views of all members, so that city business can be accomplished fairly and efficiently.

If they do not, it is highly possible that the city council could stand permanently at a draw for the next year. It is obvious that, under these circumstances, very little could be accomplished.

If nothing else comes out of the situation, it should point out to the voters of Olton the importance of voting in a city election. A shamefully small number voted in the last one.

Just How Binding Is That Contract?

You cannot get out of a contract just because you made a bad deal or because you changed your mind. Tough luck will not get you off the hook, unless you cover it with the contract.

A builder agreed to build a home for a certain price. Then his costs skyrocketed due to unexpected increases in labor and material costs. Could he get out of his contract? No. Unless the contract says what is to be done if there are unexpected costs, the contract is binding and the law will hold the builder to it. From the builder's standpoint, a good contract would provide that, in case of increased costs, the buyer would pay them.

Suppose you agree to sell 100 steers which you own for a certain price, and hoof and mouth disease kills off most of them. Scarcity may boost the cattle price. Since you can buy steers, even at sky-high prices, you will either have to do so and perform the contract, or pay the buyer damages for your failure to perform.

Things which the law says the parties should have thought about, such as increased costs or strikes, are no excuse for not going ahead with the contract unless the contract says that it is an excuse. An exception to this rule is where performance is prevented by an irresistible, superhuman cause—as where the citrus crop which was sold failed because of a severe freeze.

The law itself—without anything being said about it in the contract—excuses you from carrying out your contract if the law forbids the thing called for in the contract—for example, a building in violation of a zoning law.

Where the very thing contracted for is destroyed, as when the house to be sold burns down, the law excuses performance.

Contrary to popular opinion, death will not excuse performance, unless the contract calls for the personal services of the decedent, such as those of an author, actor, or lawyer. And so the law will enforce most agreements against the estate of the decedent. This is true even if the contract calls for the payment of money over a long period of time, as in the case of a lease. The result may well be to impoverish the decedent's family. A good

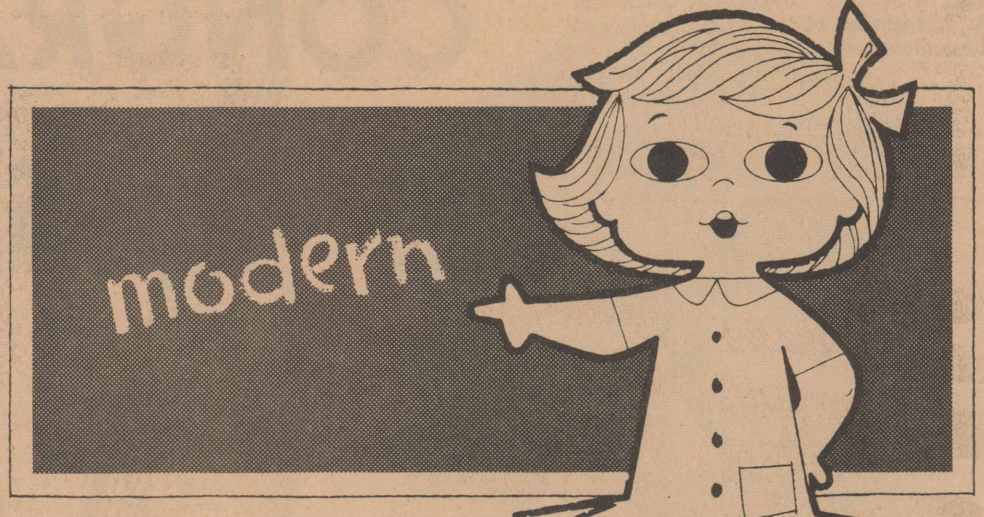

Ten Rules For The Club Treasurer

Ten rules for the club treasurer—helpless victim of spring elections—are featured in the current issue of Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine.

An article in the magazine notes that the advice comes from a certified public accountant who has had "a good bit of experience (more than he wanted) in straightening out the tangled accounts of amateurs."

The rules include:

- Record each transaction when it happens, giving a complete description. Never delay writing up a ledger, check book or receipt stub.
- Deposit all money received in a checking account at regular intervals.
- Write checks for all disbursements. Prenumbered checks aid in reconciling the bank statement.
- Insist on bills and/or vouchers before making disbursements.
- Always have on hand a small book of detachable pre-numbered receipts with stubs

- or carbon copies; immediately write out a receipt for cash received.
- Retain and file by year bills and duplicate receipts or receipt stubs.
- Write down the explanation for every transaction, no matter how trivial or obvious it appears; and write it down in all appropriate places.
- Reconcile the bank statement each month to catch errors within 30 days.
- When in doubt, or when a question arises about the books or records, seek help at once from an accountant or bookkeeper.
- Don't be satisfied if the books "almost balance." Keep records so that every penny can be accounted for.

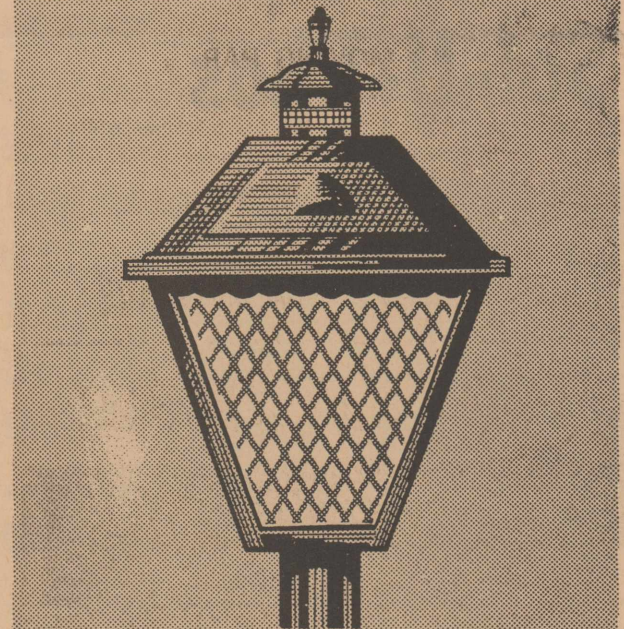

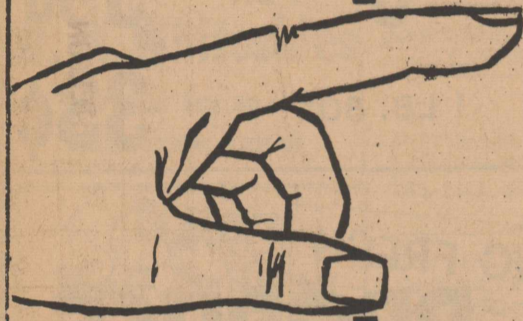

tell us?" Gullett said he thought the experts would be used to larger towns and would not understand the problem here.

"Some of the complaints I've had show that people have to stop and wait on traffic on the street," he added.

Asked how many complaints he'd had, Gullett said he could get up a petition with just the opposite point of view of the one presented by Sherman.

Asked specifically how many complaints he'd had, Gullett estimated "about 25."

"I can't see that the merchants would be hurt. We are for building up Olton and getting more trade. Our thought on parallel parking is strictly on safety," Gullett said. Councilman Thompson said: "We have brought up this parallel parking thing before, mulled it over and decided it was six of one, half a dozen of the other."

At one point, Attorney Stroebel was asked by the council if the street could have parallel parking on the south side only. Stroebel said he thought it could be set up that way.

Gullett said he had suggested that himself to some people, but there were objections to it.
