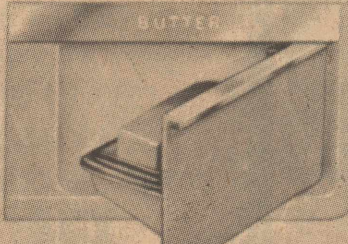

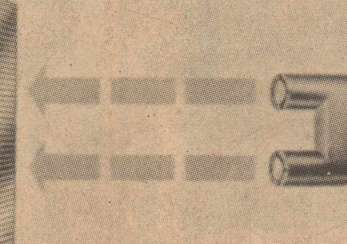

Street Paving Is Completed

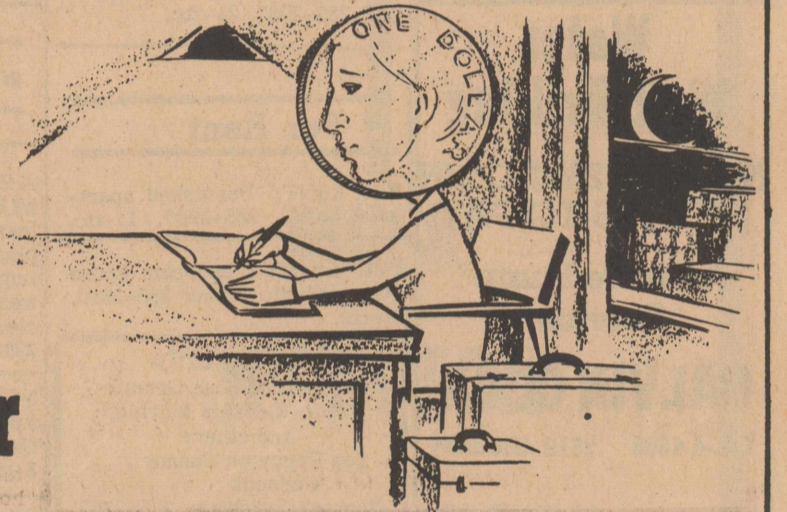
The paving of Avenue A from Broadway West to the Dimmitt Highway has just been completed.

The Diary of a Dollar

It has been a busy day. Early this morning I was swapped for some medicine for his baby by a young fellow who got me in exchange for farm produce.

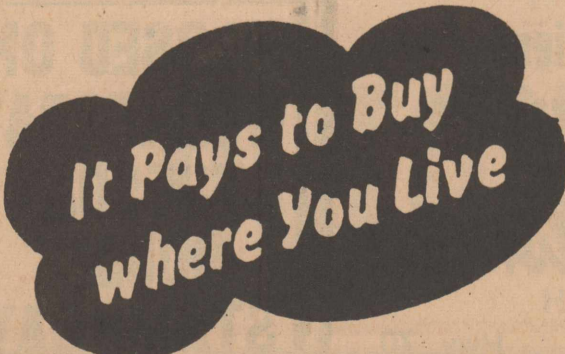
a bad day's work for one little old dollar.

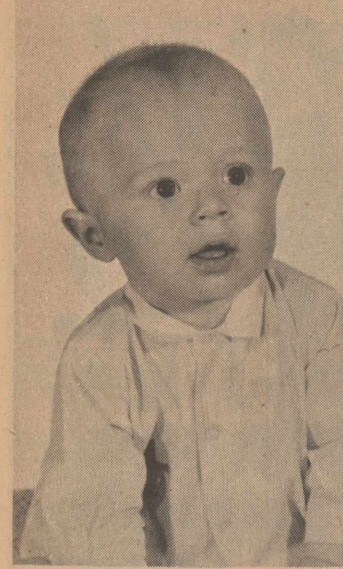
