

Council Will Set **Vote Date**

Gallaway resigned 10 days ago at a special meeting which lasted no more than five minutes. His resignation was effective that day, June 16.



Improved After **Scattered Rains**

Crops around Olton were looking good this week with most area farmers optimistic about the prospects.

No damaging hail had been reported recently although a storm last week brought high winds and dumped up to 1.25 inches of rain in some spots. Wheat harvest is almost com-

pleted with the yield reported as down from previous years. One grain elevator man estimated that average yield this year is about half of what it was last year. The potato crop looks good

and Thurston Tollett, two miles north of Straw Gin, said he thought his would be ready in about 10 days. He added, however, that his cotton is the 'sorriest I've ever had.'

Cucumbers were thriving on the Harley Miller farm, just west of the drive-in theatre. "I expect they'll be ready for harvest between July 15 and July 20," Miller said. He added that his cotton is also looking good.

Joe Roberts, four miles south and two east of Olton, said he finished wheat harvest in May and the yield was down. His Band Rehearsal heavy rain was reported Mon-day of last week at the Roberts farm, followed by about three-fourths of an inch this Monday
