Scattered Rains Fall, Crop Outlook Favorable

Most area farmers described their crop prospects as "favorable" Wednesday despite scattered hail on farms west of here.

Heavy rain and "some hail" was reported after a storm late Tuesday which took the life of a 40-year-old Latin

American farm laborer. Ricardo S. Robles was struck and killed by a bolt of lightning while he was working on the Roland Clevenger farm, two and a half miles north of Springlake. Robles, with three members of his family, was hoeing feed in a field.

His wife, Francisco, 41, was knocked to the ground by the same bolt that killed Robles. Two teenage daughters, Maria Elena and Norma Jean, were working a short distance away. The Springlake-Earth area received rains of up to one inch from Tuesday's storm.

Another heavy rain was reported in the area last Thursday. At the J.D. Stamps farm, five miles south and two and a half east, Mrs. Stamps reported two inches of rain last Thursday.

One and a half inches was reported last Thursday at the J.F. Cole farm, five miles south and a half east.

Mrs. Cole said their cucumbers were "looking good" and they plan to start picking Monday or Tuesday. No rain was reported in this area Tuesday.

The Tuesday rain also missed the Frank Farrar farm, three and a half miles east of town, although 1.40 inches was reported there last Thursday.

"Our crops are looking real pretty and the cotton has blooms on it," Mrs. Farrar said.

Last Thursday's rain was measured at 1.50 inches at the H.A. Hysinger farm, north-east of Olton.

Mrs. V.J. Carlisle said their crops were looking "fair." The Carlisle farm is two and a half miles southwest. She reported 1.45 inches of rain last Thursday.

At the Billy Smith farm, eight and a half miles west of Olton, Mrs. Smith said they had already picked cucumbers one time and planned to pick again Monday.

She reported some rain last Thursday, with another .60 of an inch Tuesday and some hail.

Secret Weapon In Lions-Legion Tilt

The Legion team pulled a secret weapon on the Lions Club here last Friday night and claimed a disputed victory in their uproarious baseball clash.

With the Legion team ahead by about 13-11 (that's as good a guess as anybody's), the Legionnaires sent a female batter out in the top of the ninth to protect their lead.

With Mrs. Charles McClain on the mound and Mrs. Charles Polk behind the plate, the Legion team sewed up the "victory." A couple of the Lions batters went down on strikes, so tantalizing were Mrs. McClain's "blooper" pitches.

Shortly after that, they called it quits, with the fans more tired from laughing than the players were from playing. Although Basil Sherman claimed he got a hit every time he stepped up to the plate, there really were only three clean hits all night.

Joe Turner and Bill Kelley got one piece for the Lions and George Jones got one for the Legion team.

T.J. Roberson shackled the Legion team without a hit for six innings, using a roundhouse curve. George Jones kept the Lions' bats quiet. But both hurlers stayed in hot water from walks and errors.

After the starting pitchers left the mound, both clubs sent a steady stream of pitchers in, none of them able to halt the walks and errors.

One, Slowballer Robert Duncan claimed a no-hitter for his efforts. The Lion hurler pitched to two batters, walking one and hitting the other.

Both teams gave umpires Raymond Hernandez and Bub Holt a hard time. There were a few "sour" calls, presumably because some of the players were slipping the ump's nickles and dimes so they would call them "right."

A crowd of about 100 saw more fun than they did baseball. About \$70 was taken at the gate, with all proceeds going to the local baseball association, which sponsors youth baseball here.

Election Of Councilman Is Scheduled For Aug. 21

AGAINST CITY, FORMER MAYOR

\$100,000 Suit Dropped

A little over three years ago, Lupe Martinez, sometime convicted bootlegger, shocked this community with a \$100,000 suit against the City of Olton and then Mayor D.Y. Ray. Today the suit is dead. It was dismissed last week at Littlefield by District Judge E.A. Bills.

When the legal battle first arose, it stirred up all sorts of anger here, with people taking sides on an issue which

split the town wide open. Last week, when Judge Bills dismissed the suit, attorneys for both sides were ready to call it quits. Both sides asked for dismissal, the judge said. As a result, Judge Bills dropped the case for "lack of prosecution."

Martinez, in the suit, claimed false arrest by Mayor Ray and asked \$100,000 in damages in three categories:

1. \$25,000, alleging he lost

his job as a result of being jailed for a day.
2. \$25,000, alleging he was "humiliated" in that amount.
3. \$50,000, alleging he was deprived of his constitutional rights. He asked this amount in exemplary damages.

Martinez petitioned that the arrest was perpetrated by Mayor Ray with malicious intent to deprive him of his liberty without any legal authority. "I would have dismissed the

city from the suit earlier," Judge Bills said Saturday, "because the city did not authorize the arrest."

As for the case against ex-Mayor Ray, the judge said, "it would have been hard to prove damages for Martinez because of his record."

"I have not yet signed an order," the judge said, "but I will, and you can say that I have dismissed the suit."

Martinez has a long record of brushes with the law, here and elsewhere, and the Olton police department and former Mayor Ray kept tabs on his activities while they awaited disposition of the suit during the past three years.

Police Chief Emmett Burrow this week produced records indicating at least 40 convictions of Martinez since 1949, mostly on liquor law violations. Fines in the cases totaled more than \$3,000, with Martinez drawing jail time on some occasions.

In February, 1959, Martinez, now at Sweetwater, was convicted of assault with intent to murder in Howard County and received a three-year suspended sentence.

Records show two liquor convictions and one for DWI against Martinez in Nolan County in the 1950's and five liquor law convictions in that county in 1960 and 1961.

Almost a dozen liquor convictions were against Martinez in Lamb County in the 1950's, and he paid fines on numerous other cases, ranging from gambling to drunkenness, in city court here during that time.

In addition, Martinez' record showed convictions in Plainview, Amarillo, Dimmitt, Midland and Farwell.

The suit stemmed from the arrest of Martinez on May 20, 1959, by Ray. A complaint charging vagrancy was signed by the former mayor.

Vernie Head, then police chief of Olton, clashed with Ray on the arrest. He told reporters at the time he had advised Ray not to make the arrest, and he said that he refused to arrest Martinez because he did not have a warrant.

As the controversy developed, Head lost his job, a city court jury found Martinez guilty in the vagrancy case, and a few months later, in November, Ray resigned as mayor.

The controversy cooled and very little mention of the case were heard until recently, when Andy Stroebel, Martinez' lawyer, was appointed city attorney.

Deadline For Filing Is Aug. 9

A special election to name a new city councilman to replace resigned Cecil Galloway has been set for Tuesday, Aug. 21.

The date was decided upon by the city at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

Last day for candidates to get their names on the ballot will be Aug. 9.

Galloway resigned June 16, leaving the vacancy. His successor will serve the remainder of the two-year term, which will expire in April, 1964.

Eldon Franks will be election judge, with Tom Smith as assistant judge and Betty True-lock as election clerk.

In other activity at Tuesday night's session, the council:

1. Appointed a board of equalization to include Basil Sherman, D.Y. Ray and C.S. Silcott, with Bill Thomas and Mrs. Gerald Bizzell as alternates.

2. Approved a plat of Golf View Estates, a new development planned near Olton Recreation Center. It will include 29 lots, all 140 feet by 250 feet fronting on FM 168.

3. Agreed to settle out of court on two delinquent tax cases, one involving almost \$2,000 and another about \$400 in back taxes.

4. Approved vacation times for city employees, including Berniece Smith, July 15-29, Police Chief Emmett Burrow, July 29-Aug. 11, and Billie Hall, Aug. 15-29.

5. Approved paving of a small section of street for Mrs. R.A. Lewis near the intersection Ave. G and 6th, with Mrs. Lewis to pay for the curb and gutter and the city to pay the paving costs. Council members said this paving was intended as part of the city paving program last year but was unintentionally omitted.

P-TA Schedules Leadership Course Monday

A leadership course for PTA officers and committee chairmen is scheduled Monday night at 7:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria. Mrs. Melvin Hines will instruct the three-hour course.

Mrs. Owen Jones, newly elected PTA president, met with the group at her home Monday afternoon to stress the importance of participation of those officers who have not completed the course in recent years.

State materials and instructions were distributed to the officers and chairmen at the Monday meeting.

Budget, Buses Top Board Meet

After making a final amendment on the budget for 1961-62, Olton school trustees accepted the delinquent tax roll for 1961, heard a report on new buses and hired two teachers at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

Largest amendment in the budget came under maintenance of plant, where the budget was changed from \$11,400 to \$14,810.

In breakdown of the heading, salaries were changed from \$3,000 to \$3,060; contracted services from \$4,400 to \$5,450; replacement of equipment from \$2,000 to \$2,950; and other expenses, from \$2,600 to \$3,350.

Other amendments were made in teaching supplies, from \$13,500 to \$13,534; expense in pupil transportation, from \$13,895 to \$15,100; supplies for operation of plant, from \$3,000 to \$4,050; and food service, a \$2,000 addition.

Maintenance expenses for the summer were estimated by Supt. Johnny Clark at \$4,400. This included plumbing and interior brickwork at the elementary school, setting up of a science lab at the junior high, repairs at Bohner School, some repairs to school housing, a fire extinguisher and various expenses from contracted labor.

The new buses scheduled to arrive here by Sept. 1 include a 48-passenger Chevrolet chassis, a 54-passenger Dodge chassis and a 60-passenger Dodge bus. Total cost on new buses is \$9,038, including about \$344 for change-over work.

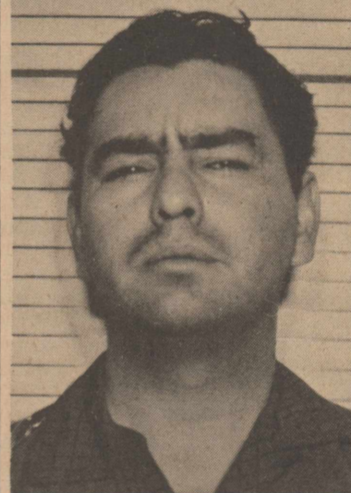
Two new elementary teachers elected are Mrs. Brenda Eleese Boone and Miss Doris Thurman.

EDITORIALS

Halter Broken

Here is something to think about. It didn't happen in Russia, it happened right here in the U.S.A. Commenting editorially, the Portland, Oregonian says:

"One doesn't, realize how regimented American farmers have become until a Stanley Yankus or a James Weir pops up in the news.

"Mr. Yankus . . . was the Michigan farmer who sold out and moved to Australia after the federal government had fined him more than \$5,000 for growing too much wheat. Mr. Yankus did not grow the wheat for sale but to feed his several thousand chickens, but that made no difference. He had planted more than his allotment of wheat acreage and Uncle Sam put the screws on him.

"Down at Lake Village, Ark. . . James Weir's 944-acre farm was sold at government auction for \$60,000. Mr. Weir grows rice and is in hock to the government for more than \$27,000 in penalties. He paid

\$8,900 for overplanting his 1958 acreage allotment, owes \$10,244 for overplanting in 1960 and \$16,872 for exceeding the 1959 allotment. The government took his farm to get its penalty money.

"The Arkansas farmer contends that acreage allotments are unconstitutional, that a man can grow what he wants to on his own land and how much he wishes of any particular crop. Not very many years ago virtually every American would have agreed with him. . . .

"Our farmers evidently have been pretty well broken to the halter. Only when a Yankus or a Weir rears up in defiance does one realize how complacently the majority responds to Washington's 'whoas' and 'giddups'."

More and more industries, and individuals other than farmers, are finding themselves with Washington rings in their noses for regulatory lead ropes.

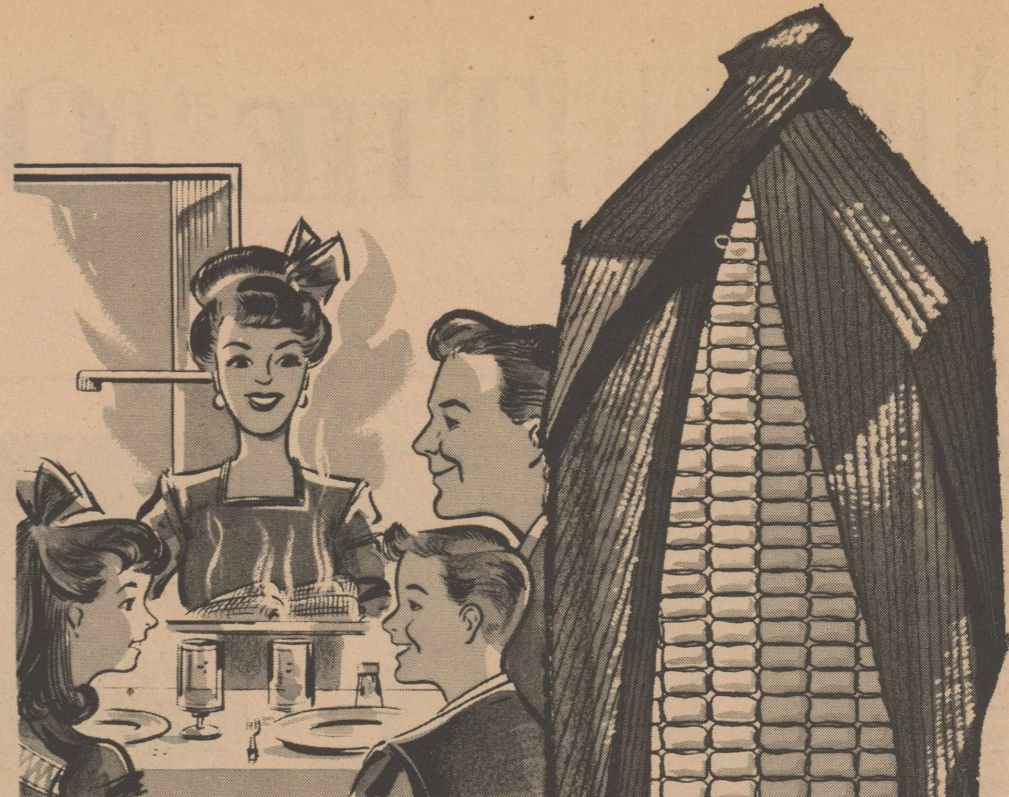
San Angelo Church Meeting Is Set July 27
