Northeast **Area Rapped** Hard By Hail

Olton area farmers, many of them faced with hail-battered crops, awaited clear skies and a warm sun Wednesday, after persistent rains left their fields water-logged.

More than four and a half inches of rainfall has washed across already soaked fields here since Saturday, when a blistering hailstorm stripped crops northeast of town.

This brought the total rainfall to about nine inches in this area in the past two weeks. Wednesday afternoon hazy skies still gave threats of more rain.

More than two and a half inches of rain were reported to have fallen here Saturday in 30 minutes.

Some badly battered cucumber vines showed new signs of life by Wednesday, but gave little indication of much production, "Some of the vines may come back out, but the hail may have ruined enough that it won't be profitable to pick them' said a local cucumber shed operator.

Hail battered crops all directions from town, but played hop scotch through the area, hitting a field, then skipping

About 5,000 acres of crops were damaged by hail. Approximately 1500 acres of cotton was a complete loss, estimated a local ginner.

Little was left of any crops in a strip northeast of town, where hail struck. Most of these cotton fields looked like match sticks, while grain crops were left with broken, twisted stalks. Cucumbers in the hard-hit area looked as if a paralyzing frost had hit them.

Most farmers agreed this was one of the worst hailstorms to ever hit this area so late

Lightening was reported to have struck at the Raymon Carson and J.B. Kemp homes. A washer and dryer was ruined at the Carson home, and a pressure pump motor damaged

at the Kemps. A tornado was sighted near the Hopewell community west of here Saturday, but didn't

touch the ground. Many downtown businesses had water blown into them Saturday afternoon as violent winds

> Various alternatives were debated this week, as farmers with heavily damaged crops considered planting black-eyed peas or fall potatoes, plowing under crops, or just leaving

them to see what happens. At the J.A. Boverie farm four miles northeast of town, "the hail shelled my black-eyed peas," said Mrs. Boverie, "and left our cotton like tooth-picks." "That was the worst hail we ever had. Why, when we opened our back door, hail was piled up about a foot deep,' she added. She said her husband is considering replanting his fields with black-eyed peas.

Hail damage to crops was reported at the Tom Ross farm three and a half miles northwest of town, and five miles southwest at the W.M. Smith farm. "It hurt about 130 acres of our cotton," said Mrs. Smith. "It was so odd. It hailed on one farm, then right across the road it didn't touch the crops," she noted.

Four miles southeast of Olton crops were destroyed by hail at the R.J. Caviness farm, according to Mrs. Caviness, "The wind blew real hard and the lightening hit our telephone; some of the roads looked like rivers," she said. "We found five little birds that had drowned in the rain," she stated.

Emmett Harper who farms three miles east of town said "I think the hail just slowed up the production of my cucumber vines, and hope by next week they'll really start producing again.'

"Some of our cotton was so pretty and now it just looks like match stems; Jim said he didn't: expect it to make anything," said Mrs. Jim Kemp, whose husband farms four and a half miles northeast of town.

Desmond Barry Speaks To Olton Audience Tuesday



Olton Man Picked To Attend Exclusive NJ Music School

An Olton piano instructor is among the exclusive 16 professional musicians in the United States selected for admission to The New School for Music Study in Princeton, N.J.

The outstanding young teacher, Harold Dean Carson, will study at the piano pedagogy and music research center from September through June, 1963. Carson will study new piano teaching methods and instruct students at the school. "I'll be doing research for new teaching techniques while I'm there," said Carson.

He returned Sunday from a five-day summer study course for piano teachers in Dallas. The course was an extension program of the Princeton music

He will be a student in the professional department, one of the school's two divisions, as he and his fellow students instruct the 300 piano students in the school's junior department.

A scholarship also will be given Carson at the school, where he will study teaching methods 6 1/2 hours and teach piano 5 1/2 hours daily, six days a week.

to Carson after he inquired about the school last year and officials noted his outstanding music record. He auditioned before a panel of three judges at the school last summer for further consideration of his asmission to the school.

His past musical training, teaching record and personal ability were the main areas considered for Carson's admission to the selective school,

Between 450 and 500 students have taken piano lessons from Carson since he began his teaching career 14 years ago. He has taught piano in Olton schools 12 years, following a two-year teaching period at

Sunray. More than 65 percent of the young musician's piano students have received "superior" rating at the National Piano Playing Auditions.

These top ratings were given by a judge from the National Guild of Piano Teachers, who grades a piano student on 37 different aspects of perform-

Some of Carson's students have continued to study music at Baylor, West Texas State,

Wayland. But not limited to any musical area, Carson also has taught organ lessons and directed several high school girls' singing groups here. The Princeton school is the "only piano pedagogy school in the U.S." noted Carson. The field of outstanding teachers at the school will have time to give their 16 music students plenty of individual instruction, with a ratio of two students to each teacher. "Pedagogy is actually just learning to teach

Carson. A semester of study at the St. Louis Institute of Music, St. Louis, Mo., has been made by Carson. He was music director at the First Baptist Church in 1959-60, and the church pianist several years. He now is organist for the

Carson is chairman of the National Piano Playing Auditions, sponsored by the National Guild of Piano Teachers. He also is former secretarytreasurer of the Plainview Music Teachers' Assn.

Witnesses Are Vital

By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say.

Our courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his client's story.

Chances are you worry about stepping up, taking an oath, and telling your story in court. On some rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting your own standing in the community.

As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.

Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules: 1. Go to the place (say, the scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.

other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand. 3. Wear clean, conservative

2. Visit a court. Hear how

clothes. 4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But

think of what you saw and heard. 5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.

6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be rushed.

7. If you err--and people often do--correct yourself at once. If you can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff. 8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with

either side. 9. Stop when the judge breaks in, and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say cound end in a "mistrial."

10. Keep cool and don't sass back.

11. If they ask you: Certianly, you have talked to other people--the lawyer, for example; and yes, you may be reimbursed for certian of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.

12. Remember, without witnesses our law would fail to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.





Proposed Constitutional Amendments Are Explained

In this issue of the Enterprise there appears the full text of seven of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 6). So that you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows: NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 25)--Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9)--Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47, 000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22)--Permits

creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 46)-- Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage fa-

cilities in reservoirs.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51)--Creates hospital districts and limits their power

pital districts and limits their power.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

(12) years or more.

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOTT (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 70)--Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOTT (SJR 12)--Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof. NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 25)--Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for re-

sale to veterans.

NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19) -- Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Culf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof

Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)--Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 32)--Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative of executive agencies of government.


