"When an American is in his office he talks about baseball, football or fishing—when he is out at the games or on the creek bank, he talks about business.

"He is the only fellow in the world who will pay 50 cents to park his car while he eats a 25-cent sandwich.

"An American likes to cuss his government but gets fighting mad if a foreigner does it.

"We're the country that has more food to eat than any other country in the world and more diets to keep us from eating it. We're the most ambitious people on earth, and we run from morning until night trying to keep our earning power up with our yearning power.

"We're supposed to be the most civilized, Christian nation on earth, but still can't deliver payrolls without an armored car.

"In America we have more experts on marriage than any other country in the world—and more divorces.

"But we're still pretty nice folks. Calling a person "a real American" is the best compliment we can pay him. Most of the world is itching for what we have—but they'll never have it until they start scratching for it the way we did."

Joanna has received these honors: Who's Who in choir, DAR award, and English III award.

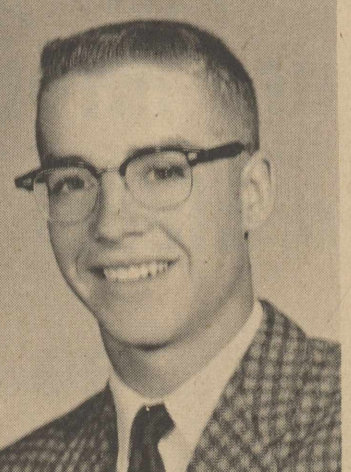

Johnny is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Schenck. He was born May 11, 1944 and has attended Olton Schools for eight years.

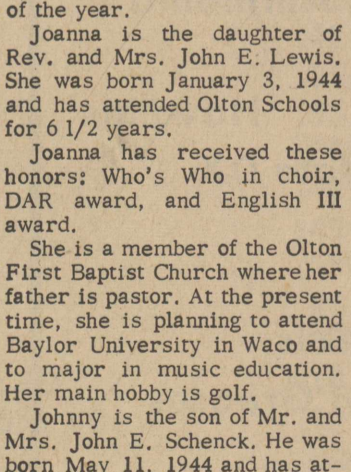

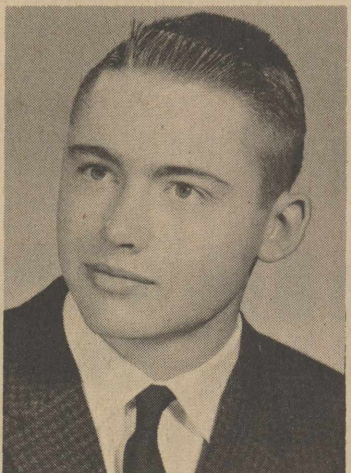

Political 'Scramble' Due In Lamb County

Cagers Try Lockney, Morton Next

Olton basketballers lost three of four games for the second straight week, as only the Fillies could cop a victory in meetings with Floydada and Muleshoe.

Olton boys lost to Floydada, 88-43, then fell to Muleshoe, 64-58. The Fillies bounded Floydada's girls, 54-49, then dropped one to Muleshoe, 54-37.

The Olton teams travel to Morton Friday night, then play Lockney teams here next Tuesday night. Girls' games start at 7 p.m. on each occasion.

The Fillies racked up the only victory of the week with their win over Floydada.

To do it, the Olton girls had to come from a five-point deficit at the end of the third quarter. Behind 37-32, the Fillies outscored Floydada 22-12 in the fourth period.

Gayle Nicholas hit for 28 points to lead the attack, while Cheryl Poteet had 14 and Tommy Witten 12. Gladys Thomas led rebounders with 9, while Deanna Farrar and Renee Givens each had 5.

In the Olton boys' loss to Floydada, 88-43, Gary Johnson led the Mustang attack with 16, while George Jones scored 9, Johnny Schenck 7, Ronnie Parsons 6, and Rusty Sherman 4. Teague led Floydada with 23.

Against Muleshoe there Tuesday night, the Fillies fell behind early, and trailed 31-11 at the half. A rally in the third quarter by the Fillies tightened up the game, but Muleshoe played on even terms in the fourth to take the victory.

Miss Nicholas scored 28 and Miss Poteet 9. Linda Price had 6 rebounds and Miss Thomas 5.

Olton's boys made it tough all the way for Muleshoe's Mules. The Mustangs trailed 34-28 at the half, then played on even terms in the last half.

Schenck hit 17 points and Johnson 16 to lead Olton scorers. Parsons hit 11, Jones 9, and George Phillips 5. Bill Malone led Muleshoe with 17.

And now there are only nine days left for candidates to file in the Democratic and Republican primaries.

And only five days left for you to pay your poll tax.

And no races... yet.

But, if past performance counts for anything, the last few days should be busy ones on the political front.

So far, each post up for election this year has one candidate.

The biggest news, and about the only news, politically last week was the announcement of Billy Wayne Clayton, Springlake, for state representative.

Clayton, a delegate to the National Democratic Convention in 1960, hopes to succeed Rep. Jess Osborn of Muleshoe, who announced last week he would not seek reelection.

Right now, he has the field to himself, although rumors have it that a Hereford woman will file on the Republican ticket.

Only other candidate to file last week in Lamb County was Cong. George Mahon, and that was anticipated.

There are prospects that Republicans will file candidates for county posts, but so far the party hasn't been heard from.

The next 10 days may see new candidates filing on both sides, turning both party primaries into real horse races.

Besides Clayton, the Democratic Primary ballot for May 5 will show the following candidates:

Pat Boone Jr., Littlefield, for district judge; J.B. Davis, Rocky Ford, for county judge; Ernest Owens, Littlefield, for district clerk; Charles Jones, Littlefield, for county clerk; C. Roy Stevens, Littlefield, for county school superintendent; and Mrs. Lucy Moreland, Littlefield, for county treasurer.

Three of the candidates—Jones, Owens and Mrs. Moreland—are incumbents.

Boone will be trying to step up to district judge from the county judge post he now holds. Davis and Stevens are seeking their first elective terms.

The present district judge E.A. Bills, is retiring, and the county school superintendent, Jerry Lumsden, has resigned.

Prior to the party primaries, Olton voters will decide on two school board members and three city councilmen in April elections.

The school board election comes up the first Saturday in April. Terms of members Fred Hicks and Roy Roberts will expire.

The city election will be the first Tuesday in April. Terms of councilmen Carroll Cox, Clovis Poteet and Dr. Lynn Fite expire.

1962 Feed Grain Program Unveiled

Producers who wish to comply with the 1962 feed grain program will sign up between Feb. 5 and March 30. The program, however, is completely voluntary, L.D. Aten, ASC office at Littlefield, stressed.

Provisions of the 1962 program are very similar to those for 1961. One change is that idle and fallow land for the

years 1959 and 1960 will be considered in the soil conserving base for farms. This will give less flexibility in the use of land diverted from feed grains, explained Aten.

"Even though farmers appealed last year, they will have to appeal again" Aten pointed out. "There is a new restriction that if they had had or had been feeding grain to stock and had no record of it, this cannot be counted. Only documented proof will be accepted."

Payments rates for diverted acres will be in line with those for 1961 because support prices for feed grains have been set at identical levels. The rates are again based on the normal production of the farm times the county support rate. The minimum acreage reduction (from the 1959-60 base) is 20 percent, which will earn a payment based on 50 percent of the local support price. For diversion of between 20 and 40 percent the payment will be figured at 60 percent of the local support price.

Barley, which was not included in last year's program because of late passage of legislation, is included in the 1962 program. A producer having barley plus grain sorghum or corn can participate in barley reduction independent of the other crops. If he wished to

comply on barley alone, however, he must stay within his 1959-60 base on corn and grain sorghum if he wants to receive price supports. On the other hand, if he wished to comply on the corn and grain sorghum he must not exceed his base acreage for barley.

Cooperating farmers will be eligible for price supports on their 1962 crops of corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats and rye, subject to the base yield limitations. Also, they are permitted to draw one-half of their total diversion payment at the time of their sign-up.

Non-cooperating producers will not be eligible for price supports on feed grains, but they will receive the market price for them. Since no acreage will be diverted they will not receive payment for any additional conservation use.

New Elementary Teacher Employed

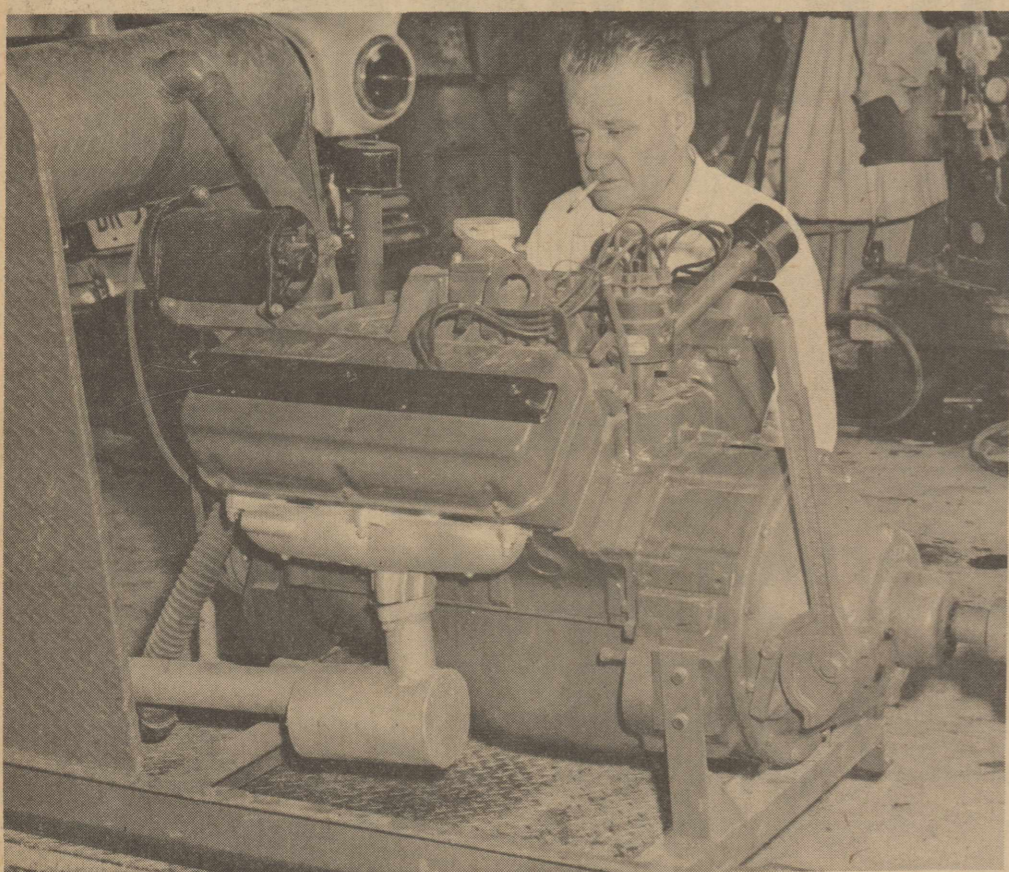

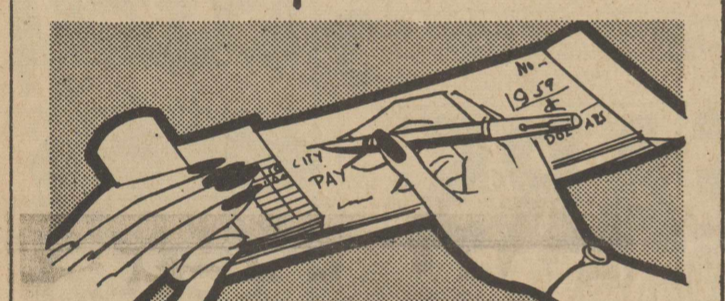
