Activities will start at 9:30 a.m. with a coffee, followed by a welcome by Gene Garrison, Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, Marshall Howard, Littlefield, will be master of ceremonies.

A beef cattle tour on feeding cattle, conducted by Byron J. Greiman of Lubbock, will start at 10 a.m. Greiman is an extension service specialist and a native of Iowa.

John H. Selbert, extension service specialist of Lubbock, will speak on "What Will Happen in 1962 in Regard to Cotton Prices" at 10:40 a.m.

Promotion of cotton consumption will be discussed at 11:20 a.m. by Dr. George Pfeiffenberger, Plains Cotton Growers. Pfeiffenberger attended the University of Dayton, Ohio, and Texas A&M. He was recently named by the Cotton Digest as cotton's Man of the Year.

## Woman Hurt Seriously In Mishap

Mrs. James Fajardo of Floydada was listed in critical condition at Plainview Hospital Wednesday after she was injured in an auto accident here Sunday night about 7 p.m.

The accident occurred about 30 feet east of Ave. D on Highway 70 when a 1960 Chevrolet, driven by Jose Perez of Dimmitt, and a 1961 Comet driven by James Fajardo collided head-on.

Mrs. Fajardo and two children, a six-weeks-old baby and a two and one-half year boy, were passengers in the Comet. The children were uninjured in the accident.

The family was taken to Dr. Lynn Fite by an ambulance from Parsons Funeral Home. Fajardo and his wife were taken to Plainview Hospital where Fajardo was treated for a cut on the chin and released.

Perez was taken to Littlefield jail where charges had not been filed Wednesday. Jose Ortega, a passenger in the Perez car was taken to Olton jail and fined for drunkenness.

According to Highway Patrolman Joaquin Jackson, the Perez auto was traveling west on Highway 70 in the wrong lane. The Fajardo car was going east on Highway 70.

Jackson said Fajardo had slowed his car to let a car make a turn ahead of him and was almost at a standstill when the accident occurred. The Fajardo car was knocked backward about 40 feet by the impact.

# Council Vote Set; 2 Members Quitting

## Cox, Fite Out; Poteet Undecided

Olton city councilmen Tuesday night scheduled the annual city election for April 3 and two of them promptly said they would not seek re-election.

Councilmen Carrol Cox and Lynn Fite said they definitely would not be on the ballot.

The third councilman whose term expires this time, Clovis Poteet, said he is undecided about running again.

Candidates have only a little over two weeks in which to file.

Saturday, March 3, at noon is the filing deadline.

Election judge for the city vote will be Eldon Franks.

The council's action on the election topped a regular meeting in which lighting on highway 70, the need for a night police officer, and financial matters were discussed.

Two representatives of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture---President James Hall and manager Dick Whiteley--- met with the council and proposed that the city provide street lights on Highway 70.

Hall recommended three lights per block for the 15 blocks in the city limits---a total of 45.

He pointed out that neighboring towns Earth and Springlake have lights along 70 and added that lighting of the highway would make for safety and a better appearance.

Cost of the entire proposal---45 additional lights---was figured at about \$2,500 per year.

The 15-block strip has only four street lights at present.

Mayor M.T. James said he felt the council was agreed on the need for lighting on Highway 70, but finding the money to do it would be a problem.

The city's cost for all street lights in town at present is about \$1,900 per year.

"We've talked about adding street lights before," said James, "and we fell like some should be added each year. But as you know, we now have only about a tenth as many lights as needed in the residential areas."

The council said it may be able to add some lights on the highway, but not nearly so many as 45. Mayor James appointed Councilmen Cox and Fite as a committee to investigate the matter.

The mayor also set a council meeting for Feb. 27, at which the council will review finances and determine where expenditures other than present ones could be made.

## THE GAS CONTROVERSY

### Farmers Hear Report On Legislation Effort

### Pioneer Gas President Seeks Area Solution

Area farmers heard a report last week at the Hilton Hotel in Plainview from David Burgess, president of the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, regarding the effort made by the group to secure legislation at the recent special session of the legislature.

The legislation sought would have given to farmers the same right of appeal to the Railroad Commission as incorporated cities, towns, and villages now have, when the farmers are served by gas companies who also sell to domestic consumers within the limits of incorporated cities, towns or villages.

Burgess commended the group on the conduct of their effort to secure the legislation in Austin and reported that more than 400 men from the twelve counties in the association had made the trip to Austin.

The bill was not concurred in by the Senate but was sent to conference committee.

The committee changed the bill to read:

1. Exempt a natural gas company from Railroad Commission rate jurisdiction if such company sells gas to farmers for agricultural uses but is not engaged in selling gas for domestic use within an incorporated city.
2. Place a natural gas company selling gas to domestic users within an incorporated city and also selling gas to farmers for agricultural purposes under Railroad Commission regulations.
3. Require ten percent of the farmers affected by a rate increase to petition the Railroad Commission for hearing.

The changes were made after gas companies said that the original bill was indefinite and vague.

After the Plainview meeting, the association released a report saying in part that they were "convinced by the effort made at the special session that relief would be forthcoming and that by a strong united effort, irrigation farmers could be given the right to have their gas rates reviewed so that they could buy gas at a fair price."

After recent controversies concerning irrigation gas service, C.I. Wall, president of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, said this week:

"We feel that the recent activities in Austin during the special session of the Legislature were not characteristic of the Plains area, Pioneer, or farmers of the irrigation area we serve. We believe that the long-range interest of the Plains farmers and Pioneer are more the same than they are divergent and that differences should be worked out within the area rather than fought in the Legislature or courts with the possibility of considerable expense to everyone involved."

Representatives from the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association traveled to Austin during the recent special session to secure legislation that would place natural gas utility companies, who sell gas to domestic users within an incorporated city and also sell gas to farmers for agricultural use, under Railroad Commission authority.

The legislation sought was sent to conference committee.

"We believe and have stated a number of times that an organization of irrigation gas users which could be recognized as speaking for our irrigation customers as a whole would be of considerable assistance in obtaining the best of service to you," Wall continued.

Wall said that it had been their impression that the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association has been directed toward an attack on Pioneer rather than a cooperative effort.

"We believe that, by talking and working with a representative group of farmers, solutions can be reached," he added.

He said that the company was studying more closely applications for additional wells except where contractual or verbal commitments have been made.

"We expect that we will be able to serve those additional wells except in areas where additional wells have not been possible for over a year due to serious capacity and supply problems, the solution of which would require considerable expenditure," Wall concluded.

## EDITORIALS

### Teachers Need Time To Teach

With Public School Week coming up next month and tickets for the Teacher Appreciation Banquet now on sale, the public's thoughts are turned once again to "what goes on up there at school."

We feel that some thought should be given to the demands of the teaching profession.

Few teachers would deny that their profession is a rewarding one. Some of the rewards are real, more are intangible, and on the material side, they are often paper thin. Still, teachers teach because their greatest regard is the satisfaction that comes when their efforts to develop a child's mind succeeds.

Teachers today work under a constantly growing handicap, which hampers and threatens their essential educational function. A justifiable complaint is that teachers go stale on the job because they have to spend far too much time at work other than teaching.

What kind of work? Preparation of lessons outside of the classroom; mounting clerical duties, monitoring children outside the classroom; parent-teacher conferences; faculty meetings; extra-curricular activities, etc. etc.

Some of these details must, of course, be attended to. Lessons have to be pre-

pared if they are to be properly taught. The discipline of the monitor must be imposed on children. Parents must be met, although many of these meetings are unnecessary. Clerical duties. Well, some probably cannot be avoided, but one wonders whether some of the paper work involved couldn't be done away with. Attendance records, for instance. They can be maddeningly time-consuming. Anyone thought of automation as an answer to some of these chores?

What, then is the effect of all these chores piled onto the fundamental job of teaching? Sometimes teachers can get so bogged down doing "stuff" that they are too tired to be really stimulating in subject matter.

Part of the trouble may be that too many extra matters are added to the school programs in an effort to sugar-coat the educational pill. Too elaborate schemes are often involved in school activities, with the brunt of the labor involved falling on the teacher.

Teachers love to teach, and they often develop a genuine, if transitory, affection for their pupils. But any job can wear thin if it becomes loaded with added work which creates a deadening constriction of its essential function.

Teachers need to be free to teach.

### Watershed Project Gets Favorable Survey Report

The Running Water Draw small watershed project received a favorable report as to feasibility in Dimmitt last Thursday night after the area had been examined by a preliminary survey team sent by the state Soil Conservation Board.

Lamb, Hale, Castro, Palmer and Swisher Counties are co-sponsoring the project, which would include a series of 12 structures. One of the structures would be in Lamb County, north and east of Olton.

The project would be jointly sponsored by Texas and New Mexico since New Mexico has an estimated 110,000 acres of drainage and Texas has 240,000 acres as far as Plainview.

"Anything over 250,000 acres is too large for soil conservation," H.A. Hysinger, county Soil Conservation District supervisor said this week. "Therefore, it will be a two state project."

Running Water Draw watershed, the upper watershed of the White River, starts in New Mexico and comes to Plainview in one branch.

In Lamb County there is approximately 11,300 acres of drainage and 1,120 acres of flood plain, of which 528 acres is cropland.

Under Public Law 566, the Federal Government will pay for all construction costs and establishment of the structure.

"They will even plant the grass," Hysinger added.

"It is up to the local people to decide if they really want the project, however," he added. "They must provide easements and assurance of maintenance of the structures."

Maintenance is estimated at approximately \$250 per year for each structure.

Easements can be secured in two ways, either through individuals or through groups, such as a city.

However, Hysinger pointed out that if an individual provided the easement, he would have exclusive rights.

"This would mean that the individual would have the right to charge for anyone coming on the property. For example, anyone wishing to fish or go boating could be charged a fee."

If a city provided the easement, it would be open to the public.

Plans call for keeping from 40 to 80 acres under water at each project.

Other than the structure in Lamb County, three are planned for Parmer County, two for Castro County, three for Hale County and three in New Mexico. The project would cost an estimated \$2.5 million.
