



Both announcements drew criticism. Basil Sherman, chairman of the local Housing Authority for the project, said the local board has asked for another survey of needs for low rent housing.

The first survey, taken last year, apparently failed to show a need for low-rent housing among the white populace.

"I believe there is a need for some units designated for whites, and I think the rest of the board believes there is a need, too," Sherman said.

Announcement of the choice for the site of the Latin American units drew criticism at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture board Tuesday morning. Eight of the 12 units have been proposed for Latin American families. The other four will be for Negro families.

The C-CA board was told that the site for the Latin American project was selected because it is on paving. The site for the Negro units is designated in the Negro

"A government official told me that, if

we are allocated units for whites later, the Housing Authority can ask that the site now set up for Latin American units be switched to a site for whites," he said.

"Our housing board is going to sit tight until we get the results of another survey, he added.

Members of the local Housing board are scheduled to meet with the city council Tuesday night to discuss the entire project and its latest developments,

The low-rent project is set up on a 40year government-financed program. The units will be duplexes of brick veneer with cooking facilities. Rent will be from about \$24 per month to \$37.50 per month. Only families on low incomes could qualify as tenants.



EDITORIALS **Stash That Trash**

"Every litter bit hurts."

This is one of the many slogans being used by local clubs and organizations in the Litterbug campaign now underway here. The campaign was started by the Olton Garden Club and now has the support of many local groups.

Objectives listed in the program are: 1. To create a public awareness of litter. To stimulate public participation in cleaning up existing litter.

3. To prevent future litter by education, public opinion pressure and law enforcement.

We feel that this is a project which every individual can, and should, support. It takes very little extra effort to see that trash is disposed of properly, but this little effort on the part of most of us would produce a big result.

Perhaps the first step is to set a good example by keeping our own property clean and covering trash barrels so that trash won't blow over on the neighbor's property.

Much of "litterbugging" is due to thoughtlessness, which a tactful hint or two can take care of. Obstinate violaters should, of course, be reported to the proper authority

Farmers can help in the program by in-forming employees living on their farms of the proper place to put their trash and informing them of the law against dump-

ing litter along the roadsides. Many of us toss trash out the windows of our cars not realizing how these things mount up and the costly effort that is required to remove it.

One candy paper or gum wrapper on the highway doesn't look like much, but multiply that by every car that passes along that highway and you have a mess that somebody has to clean up.

A simple, efficient way to handle this problem is to have a litterbag in the car. Most of us empty the trash baskets in our homes and our offices every day and it only takes a few minutes. Try letting it pile up for a week or so and it would become a job.

In the same way, small pieces of trash thrown on our streets and highways by so many individuals has become quite a job, If each one had only to empty a litterbag in the car, it would be a simple matter. Let's stash that trash in the proper place

and put our tax dollars to better use.

Tax Attorney Discusses Deductions For Depletion Of Underground Water

Several aspects of the Marvin Shurbet case, filed in behalf of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District to obtain a tax deduction for water depletion, are generating considerable interest among local landowners and farmers.

One area of interest concerns the question of who owns the groundwater rights if the court determines that water is a mineral and the land has a mineral lease.

According to Clarence P Brazill, tax attorney for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, there is little doubt in Texas that the landowner, and not the lessee, has the right to the water.

In the recent cases of Fleming Foundation vs. Texaco and the Estate of Genevra O'Brien vs. United States, both the Texas and Federal courts held that in Texas, even though water is technically a mineral, a mineral lease does not include water.

Brazill said this is because, under the ordinary oil, gas and mineral lease, the parties do not intend for water rights to be transferred.

If the tax deduction for ground-water depletion eventually becomes a reality, it would become the tool through which a considerable amount of money that presently leaves as federal taxes would remain in this area.

Brazill said, however, that there is another reason that directors of the Water District feel that depletion program

'It should be noted," he added, "that regulation of the oil and gas industry in Texas did not arise because the federal government allowed a tax deduction for depletion but rather

because the state legislature invested the Railroad Commission with authority to regulate oil and gas production by law,' He said that the state legislature, in order to avoid control by a state-wide agency, had

The remedies that have been suggested for hiccups are unlimited. Everyone has hiccups now and then, and everyone has had "helpful suggestions" from friends and acquaintances

on how to stop them. Hiccups are spasmodic contractions of the diaphragm. They occur in helathy people

spontaneously or from trivial causes. In rare cases hiccups will continue for long periods and control becomes difficult. In these instances, medical attention is required.

Babies often hiccup after rapid feeding, or swallowing of air. Somethimes hiccups are noted along with neurosis and with certain diseases, such as flu.

Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. offers several suggestions for curing the hiccups --In the case of babies, admin-

Cigarette Consumption Is Up In Lamb County

As a whole, Lamb County | ars reached 7.2 billion units, residents do not frighten easily. Especially when it comes to smoking.

The latest tabulation shows that local people are puffing away at a record rate, notwithstanding the mass of reports from medical and health organizations to the effect that there is a relationship between cigarette smoking and ailments of the heart and lungs.

During the past year, some 2,466,000 packs of cagarettes were smoked locally, well over the 1960 total.

The count is based upon national data released by the Department of Agriculture and upon regional sales figures issued by the tobacco industry. In terms of the local popu-

lation of age 14 and up, it was equivalent to 163 packs smoked a year per person. Throughout the rest of the

United States, the average was 194 packs per person among the 14-plus group. It was 158 packs per capita in the West South Central States.

In some parts of the country, the figures show, people smoke much more heavily than in others. Residents of Utah, for example, consume only a third the quantity that District of Columbia residents do. The D. C. rate is nearly 220 packs per person.

The Agriculture Department report shows that more than 490 billion cigarettes were consumed domestically in 1961. The increase over 1960 was 4.2 percent.







Co-sponsors of the project would be Lamb, Hale, Castro, Parmer and Swisher counties. One of the structures would be northeast of Olton.

Running Water Draw watershed, the upper watershed of the White River, starts in New Mexico and comes to Plainview in one branch. Under Public Law 566, the

federal government would pay all construction costs and establishment of the structure. Night Watchman Easements and maintenance of the structures must be provided locally. Maintenance of

the structures must be provided locally. Maintenance is estimated at approximately \$250 per year per structure. Plans call for keeping from 40 to 80 acres under water at each dam. Other than the structure in Lamb County, three are planned for Parmer County, two for Castro County, three for Hale County and three in New Mexico.

The project would cost an estimated \$2.5 million.


