Eldon Franks Named Citizen Of The Year

A man that, in his own words, just "takes day by day as it comes" and, apparently, fills most of those days working for the community was named Olton's Citizen of the Year here Thursday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet.

Presentation of the plaque to Eldon Franks came as a highlight of the fifth annual C-CA banquet in the school lunchroom. In making the presentation, George Redinger, vice-president of the Chamber said: "Anything that needs doing, you don't have to ask him. He volunteers."

A crowd of approximately 150 looked on as Franks accepted the plaque and said: "You must not have to do much to get these in Olton, because I sure haven't done anything."

Asked this week if he was surprised, Franks said: "Surprised? I could have gone through the floor. I don't know what I did to deserve it. There were several there that I feel were a lot more deserving."

Most of Olton is familiar with Franks' work as past president of the ORC. Of this he modestly says: "I just happened to be there at the right time. Of course, it really wasn't work. I had an awful lot of people to help me and I enjoyed it. It was a pleasure to me to get to work with all those nice people."

Franks, who moved to Olton in 1922 from Memphis, Texas, is active in the Lions Club, of which he is past president and past program chairman. He is also past president of the Quarterback Club.

He is a member of the volunteer fire department, a deacon of the First Baptist Church, has served two years on the city council, was campaign manager for the Red Cross and was vice-president of the Lamb County polio drive. He and his wife, Ruth, who teaches in elementary school here, have three children, Jim, Don and Mrs. Stan Elliott. All three graduated from Olton High School. Both boys graduated from Texas Tech and Mrs. Elliott, from West Texas at Canyon, where she now lives. Don farms outside Olton and Jim lives at Kermit.

Local Control Needed On Housing, City Says

Petition Raps Choice Of Site

Unless Olton can have local control of its proposed government-financed low-rent housing project, the town's housing board probably ought to "forget the whole thing."

That was the consensus of opinion among city councilmen Tuesday night at a regular meeting. Their remarks came after they heard a report on latest developments in the controversial project, the latest of which was a petition filed late Tuesday in opposition to a proposed site for eight Latin American units.

Report of the petition came from Dick Whiteley, who attended the session as a spokesman for the local housing board. None of the board—Basil Sherman, Basil Johns, Ed Hestand, Charles Folk and Charles Sullivan—was on hand for the council meeting.

However, the housing board had scheduled a meeting of its own to discuss the project at length Thursday afternoon.

Whiteley said the board sought the city council's opinion on the project following the two-pronged announcement that the 12 units would be for Latin Americans and Negroes only and that the proposed site for the Latin units would be the second block east of the square.

The petition against the site for the Latin units read as follows:

"We, the undersigned, are not in favor of the proposed location for a low-rent housing project for Latin Americans in Olton, Texas, and subscribe our names hereto in protest of same."

The document was signed by 39 families who live in the vicinity of the proposed site. Councilman Carrol Cox summed up his feelings on the project this way:

"If the local board can't determine for itself where they think the sites should be—whether they're for Latins, whites or Negroes—then I'd say forget it."

Said another councilman, Fred Thompson: "You can add my 'Amen' to that."

That thought pretty well was the feeling of the rest of the council, too.

Earlier, Whiteley had explained that "we (the housing board) think it (the site for eight Latin American units).

Council OK's Raises For 5

In addition to discussing the community's low-rent housing project, the city council okayed raises for five employees at a regular meeting Tuesday night.

The group also approved plans to put up six new street lights on Highway 70 and okayed a permit for a domino parlor here.

The pay raises, which total \$1,440 over a year's time, went to Harold Cartwright, water and sewer superintendent; Bernice Smith, city secretary; Billie Hall, city clerk, and two men who work in the water-sewer department, Domingo Garcia and James Huggins.

Cartwright's raise was for \$35 per month, and Mrs. Hall's was for \$10. The others were for \$25 per month each.

The only other salaried workers for the city, Police Chief Emmett Burrow and Night Officer Harvey Castleberry, were not considered. Burrows received an increase and Castleberry was employed only two weeks ago.

Councilmen said all but one of the five employees who received raises are paid out of the water-sewer fund. Half of the city secretary's salary is paid from the general fund.

The city's budget for the year forecasts a \$6,300 excess in the water-sewer fund and should be able to handle the raises without problem, according to the council.

In the general fund, an excess of only \$700 is foreseen. The six street lights approved for Highway 70 came as a result of a request from the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. The C-CA asked for some 30 to 45 new lights.

To Clean It Up

All Square Needs Is A Little TNT

Wanted.

Someone to blow up the square.

If that sounds just a little radical to you, it shouldn't. It's just what the square needs, according to Dr. Lynn Fite, one of the owners.

Dr. Fite said he's heard several people say they wish the square were cleaned up. "I'm all for it," said the doctor. "But before we can do any cleaning up, we've got to get that hunk of concrete out of the ground."

That "hunk of concrete" Dr. Fite referred to is the remains of the bottom of the old Lamb County Courthouse, which later became Olton Memorial Hospital.

Seven months ago, workmen began razing the old building. Everything went well until they came to the bottom. At that point, it was found that plain old equipment would not get the job done. The old basement area, part of it a vault, wouldn't budge.

Workmen damaged one piece of machinery trying to get the concrete broken up. And so, for the past few months, the old square has just sat there—doing nothing. It still needs cleaning up.

The problem now, as Dr. Fite said, is to get that concrete out. "It'll take dynamite," says Dr. Fite. "That's what I was told by the people we hired to demolish the building."

The people hired to do the job—Mercury Demolition and Salvage of Amarillo—aren't experts in high explosive work. "They told me they're ready to sign a check and turn it over to anyone who is qualified to work with explosives," said Dr. Fite.

"So far, we haven't found anyone."

But, as Dr. Fite says, "There ought to be somebody in this area who knows how to handle TNT."

Merchants along the square would be sure to take a dim view of anyone setting off a blast if they didn't know exactly what they were doing. There's only one thing sure right now. Dr. Fite and the other owners would like to get to the bottom of it.

Science Fair Opens At School Friday

Judges for the annual Science Fair scheduled here Friday in the all-purpose room of H.P. Webb Elementary were announced this week by James Caley, fair director.

They are Dr. Earl H. Collier, chief agronomist at Halfway experiment station; L.S. Patterson, high school science teacher at Lockney; M.T. James, mayor of Olton.

Blue, red and white ribbons will be given for first, second and third place winners. Top exhibits in each division will be marked by a gold star and will be entered in the Regional Science Fair April 14-15 at Texas Tech.

Each exhibit entered will receive an award.

The exhibits will be open to the public from 4 to 10 p.m.

Students will visit during the day.

The fair will be divided into four groups, senior, junior, intermediate and elementary. Senior will consist of grades 10-12; junior, 7-9; intermediate, 4-6; elementary, 1-3. Individual exhibits will be shown in the senior group, individual and group exhibits in the junior and intermediate groups and group exhibits in the elementary group.

Projects will be judged Thursday night on this basis: Scientific thought, 30 points; creative ability, 30 points; thoroughness, 15 points; clarity and dramatic value, 15 points; technical skill, 10 points.

Arrangements for the fair are made by the Olton chapter of Future Scientists of America.

Mrs. Curry Rites Held

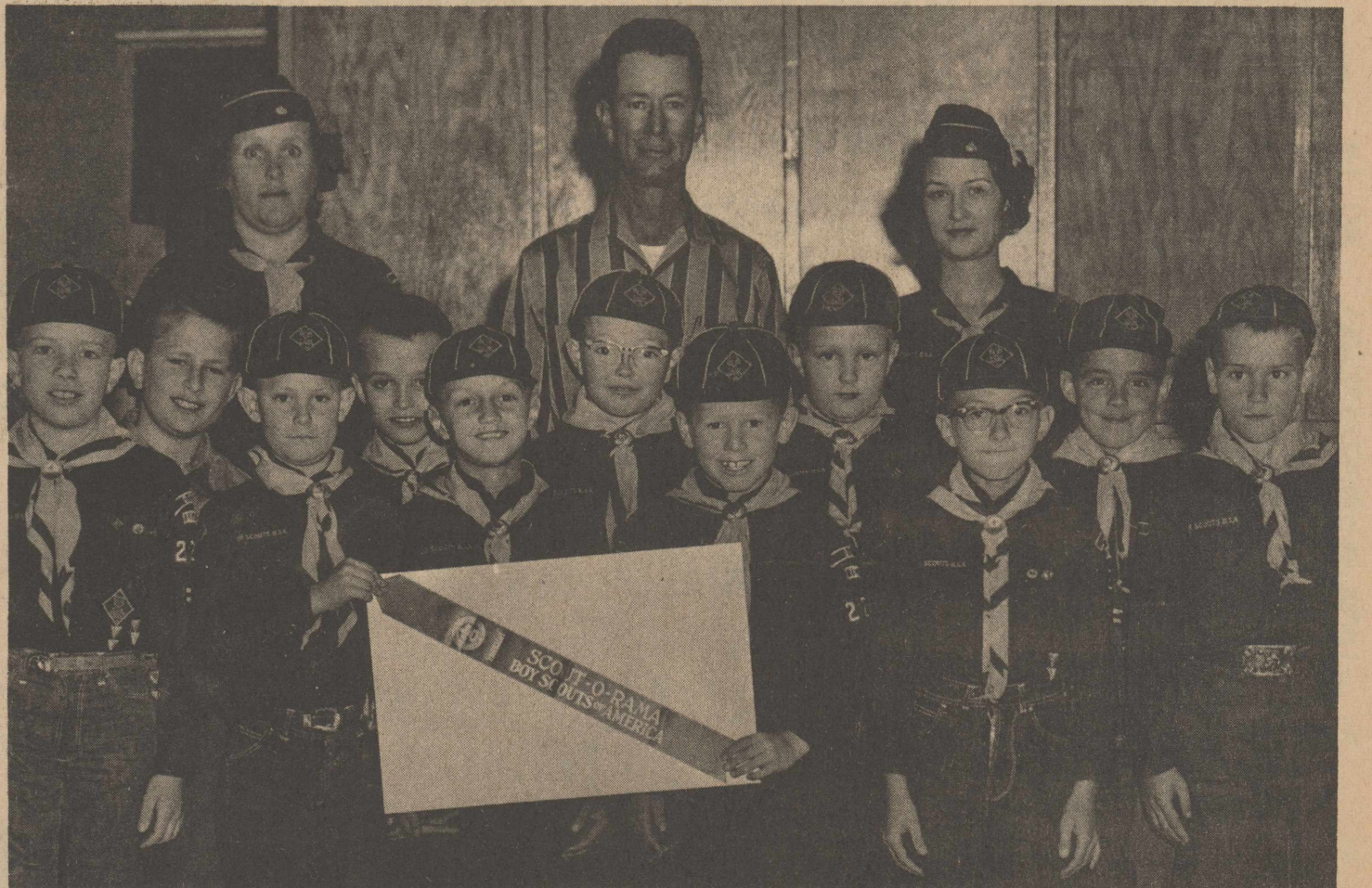

C-CA Speaker Hits Apathy

What direction are we going to go?

We are going to have to find positive answers to this question, John McKee, Ford Motor Company, Dallas told a group of 150 attending the fifth annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet here Thursday night.

Using a three-year-old child as an example, he said our youngsters are asking two questions.

"Will I at age 21 have the right to worship God as my conscience dictates? This is a basic question in a free society."

"Will I at age 15 have the right to attend a free public school and will what is taught in it not be influenced by the government?"

"What is our answer going to be?" McKee asked. "You are being ruled by minority groups because of the

apathy we've shown in the past 25 years," he said.

In stressing this, he called for a show of hands of those who had attended a precinct meeting in 1960.

Approximately 20 hand went up.

"Where would we be, if at town meetings in the 1600's, such a minority was present?" he asked. "We have not assumed our responsibility."

McKee pointed out that we now have to have labels to try to pinpoint people as either ultra-liberal, liberal, middle-of-the-road, conservative or ultra-conservative.

He also asked why it is now necessary to have such things as Public School Week and Brotherhood Week.

"We progressed on the theory of freedom and free enterprise until 25 years ago," he said. "The communists moved gradually in so that now you and

I are living in a crisis from day to day."

Highlight of the banquet was the naming of Eldon Franks as Olton's Citizen of the Year.

Percy Parsons was also presented a plaque for his outstanding leadership of the Chamber during the past year by George Redinger, vice-president.

Master of ceremonies was Johnny Clark and the invocation was given by Alfred White, minister of the Main Street Church of Christ. Dinner music was furnished by Harold Carson.

Any Astronauts In Olton?

Had John H. Glenn Jr. been a product of the Olton schools, would he have been the astronaut who first orbited the earth for the United States?

We don't know. What we do know is that he comes from Ohio and it can be assumed that he is above average in ability. In the public schools of Olton, he would have been expected to progress at the same rate as the average child. What happened to him in the New Concord Public Schools we don't know. In Cleveland, Ohio, however, schools have had classes for the gifted child for a number of years. Cincinnati, Ohio, is the location of the National Association for Gifted Children. Some chapters from a booklet, "Educating Tomorrow's Leaders", published by the state of Ohio are titled "An Educational Challenge," "Some Issues in the Educa-

tion of the Gifted in Ohio," "Essentials in Programming for the Academically Talented" and "Enrichment in the Regular Classroom."

Undoubtedly, some of this filters down to the individual school districts. Is Texas missing the boat? We certainly don't believe that Ohio has any more gifted children than Texas. It just appears that they are trying to meet their needs more. How long will Texas—and Olton—wait? Until enough parents and citizens become interested and voice those interests loud enough. How interested are you? Do you know who your school board members are? Do you know when and where they meet? Like Scarlett O'Hara, it's always easy to say I'll think about that tomorrow. There were just a few obstacles to Project Mercury, too, but where would it be if they had said "wait."

Ray Keeling Announces For County Judge Office

Ray Keeling has formally authorized the Olton Enterprise to announce his candidacy for the office of County Judge of Lamb County.

Ray is 46 years old, owner of the Ray Keeling Buick-Rambler and International Truck Dealership in Littlefield. He was a Business Administration major at the University of Texas and after college played professional football with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1938 and 1939.

Ray stated that he is a candidate running on principle, a man who will serve all of the County justly, rather than be subject to the wishes of minority pressure groups and "big-wig and clicks."

Ray believes that a strong two party system is essential to maintain our free-representative form of government. It would be better for the Nation, the State of Texas and for Lamb County.

"A two party system is by far the best for the people as a whole," Keeling stated. "The one party system restricts the choice of the people as to who their elected officials are to be, local, State and National."

"The only place we can effectively start this vitally needed two party system is on the local level."

"A serious question arises concerning our public Welfare Program. Certainly local assistance should be rendered to any person or family who has a real need. On the other hand, a definite inequity exists when we have a large dispersal of Welfare commodities to able-bodied men, yet a shortage of farm workers simultaneously."

Keeling said he will "abide by and enforce the National, State and Local laws as required by the Oath of Office; emphasis placed on school attendance and other preventive

measures to insure the well-being of our youth.

Ray enlisted in the Army during World War II as a private and came up through the ranks to Captain in the Ordnance Department. Latin) can be changed. The board doesn't want to make anyone unhappy about it."

He told the council that the controversial site was shown to government officials "back when the board understood that it would probably be able to get some units for whites."

He explained that the racial breakdown for the units was not known until recently.

Whiteley said approximately \$360 in federal funds has been received here so far, and some of that money is left.

Another \$2,040—making the total \$2,400—was set up for the preliminary loan, but none of that has been received, he added.

A total of \$9,000 was programmed for purchase of property. Whiteley told the council. None of that money has been received, he said, and an attempt to buy the property has not been made.

Council members explained to Whiteley that the city council's only part in the project was to make the original official request for it.

The original request for the project declared that there was a need for the program here and was made in 1960.

Later, the council appointed an official housing board and

the project became the responsibility of that group.

Announcement of the preliminary site choice first drew criticism last week at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board. Members of the board said they felt the project would be better located in the Latin American section of town.

Housing board chairman Basil Sherman said he believes a new survey should be taken to determine whether there is a need for units for whites.

The first survey, taken last year, apparently failed to show this need.

A government official told Sherman that, if Olton is allocated units for whites later, the housing board can ask that the site now set up for Latin American units be switched to a site for whites.

Man Indicted In Connection With Olton Burglary

A Hereford man, L.D. Locke, was indicted Friday at Littlefield by a Lamb County Grand Jury in connection with the Dec. 3, 1961 burglary of the Olton Bowling Center.

The burglary, which netted \$1,456 from the Bowling Center, was Olton's biggest burglary case in at least 17 years. Locke told officers at the time of his arrest that he and a 16-year-old Hereford boy entered the bowling alley the night of Dec. 3, 1961, went to the office and hauled off a cash drawer, several hundred dol-

lars in bills and change and a large amount of checks.

After he told officers details of the break-in, authorities went to a spot three miles west and one north of Olton and recovered the cash drawer plus \$323.75 in checks which had been taken from the center.

The drawer and checks were found Dec. 20, 1961. Locke was also indicted in connection with the Dec. 7, 1961 burglary of the Amherst Schools, the Dec. 16, 1961 burglary of the Spade Schools and on the same date, the burglary of the Sudan Schools.

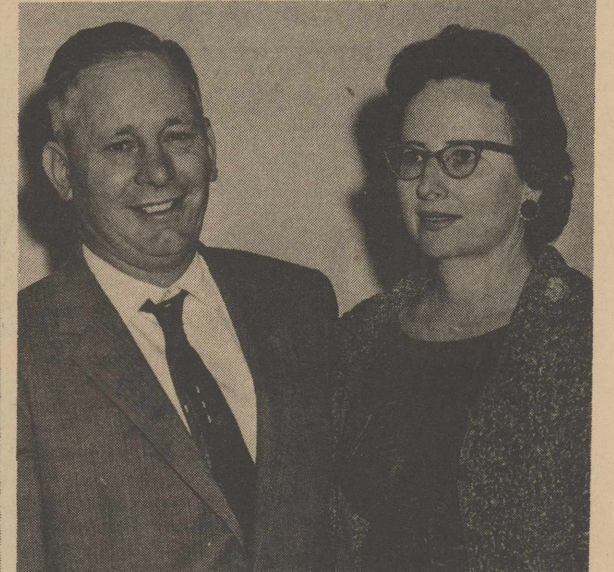

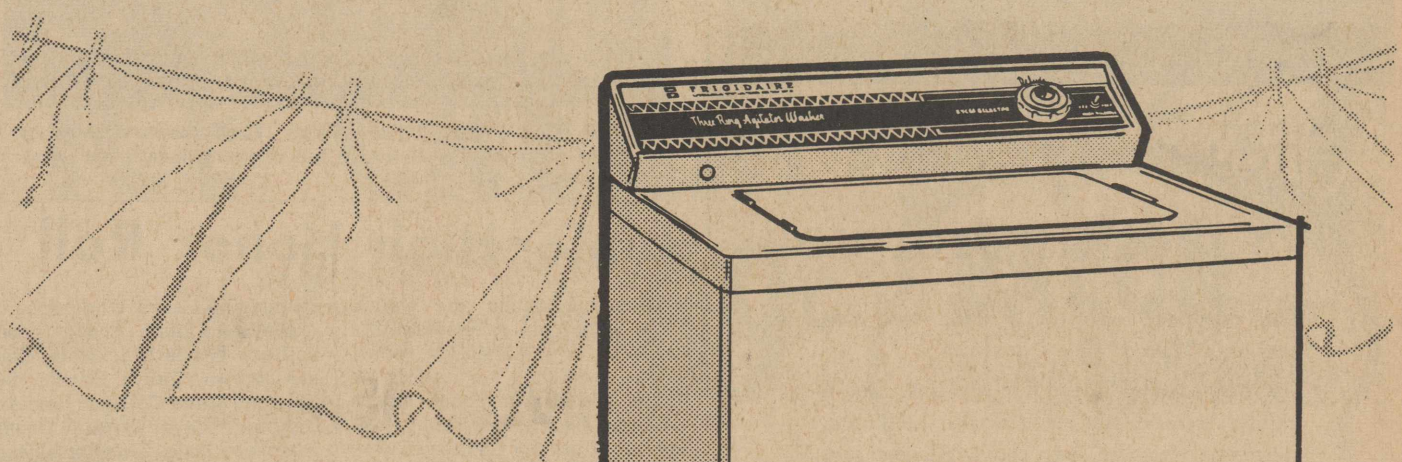

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Pecans Planted In HPRF Test

Seven varieties of pecans were planted in a new research project at the High Plains Research Foundation Feb. 17. One-hundred pecan trees were supplied by John Speck and Robert Meinecke from their nursery near Olton.

The varieties included were Western Syle, Improved San Saba, Burkett, Wichita, Barton and Peroque. Two year tops, grafted on five year root systems were used in the planting. The trees were planted 40 feet apart, 27 trees to the acre in this experimental orchard. They were planted south of the new headquarters building and greenhouse, west to the Farm to Market Highway 1070.

There are several commercial pecan orchards in the area, most of them in the experimental stage, just beginning to bear.

Dr. Thomas C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation said, "The pecan testing will be observed through the years to see if pecan raising can become a cash crop in this area."

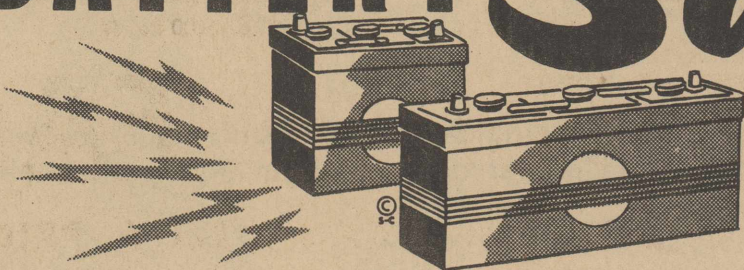

15 Accidents In County For February

The Highway Patrol investigated 15 rural accidents in Lamb County during the month of February according to Sergeant D.S. Lawson, patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for 13 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$13,190.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for Lamb County from January through February of 1962 shows a total of 27 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were no persons killed and 24 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$20,320.00.

The patrol supervisor reported that as of Thursday, March 1, a total of 227 traffic deaths had been reported to the department, as compared with 264 during the same period of 1961. "This represents a decrease of 37 deaths of 14 percent," he said, "and presents all of us with a stern challenge to help in further reducing deaths for the remainder of 1962."

"Defensive driving is one of the keys to traffic safety," the sergeant added. "If all motorists were alert when driving and knew the defensive procedures used by a professional driver, the number of monthly traffic accidents would stop sharply."
