

Cowboy Camp Meeting Set May 5 **Near Matador**

A Cowboy Camp Meeting will kick off with a chuckwagon noon meal on May 5 at Mott Creek Ranch, in the caprock breaks 12 miles west of Matador. Fiddle players, guitar pickers, gospel singers and cowboy witnesses will share their testimonies under the cottonwood motte near Mott Line Camp, once part of the Scottish-owned Matador Land & Cattle Co., Limited. Music will be provided by The Three M Company, the Roaring Springs Full Gospel Band, Marianne Brunson, Will Boedecker and others. Guests will chow-down on stew, beans, sourdough bread and cobbler. Everyone, not just cowboys, is invited.

The line camp, which was awarded a Texas State Historical Marker in 1986, was the scene of two cowboy gunfights in its early history. The first involved two cowboys, Jim Harkey and Jim Barbee, who drew their pistols over the singing of Yankee Doodle in 1877. The second involved Harkey's younger brother, Mose, and Mr. and mrs. Frank Drace in a tragic love triqangle that left the cowhand dead and the family haunted in future wanderings.

Comanches, Apaches and Kiowas likely danced a war dance or two and made medicine while encamped at the springs during their raiding and buffalo hunting days. The hunters became the hunted when the U.S. fourth Cavalry marched by the seep springs in pursuit during the Red River Indian Wars of 1872-1874. It was taps, not gospel, that echoed off the canyon walls when the soldiers camped nearby.




