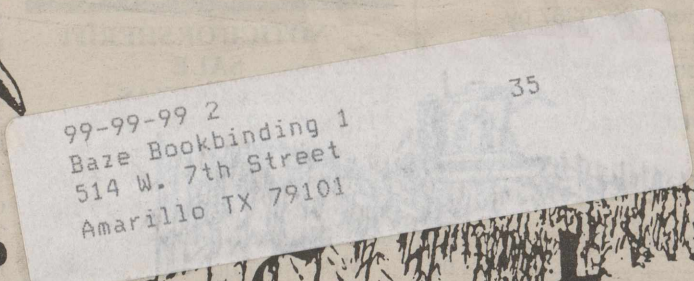

Nursery Provided

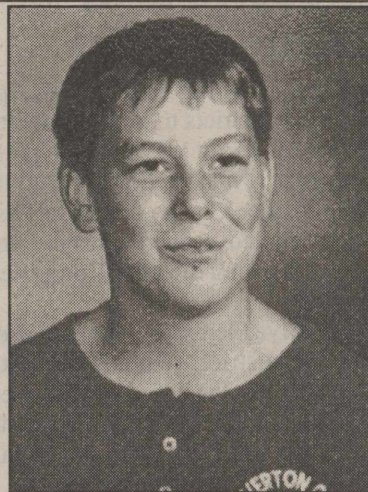

This is National EMS Week

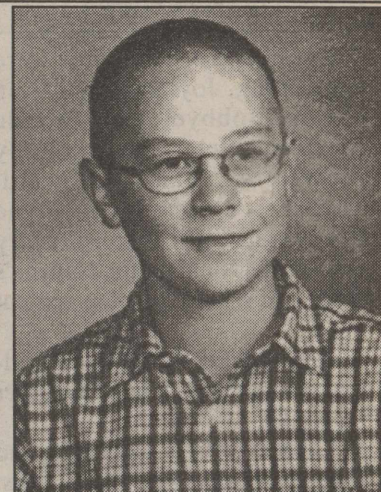

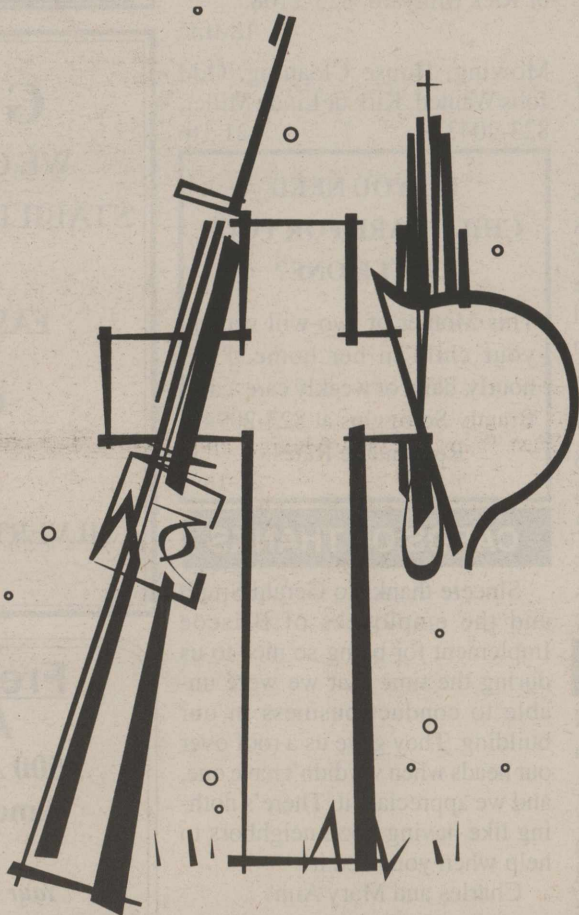

**Property Owners
Receive 2001
Value Notices**

State law requires County Appraisal Districts to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. On May 18, 2001, the Briscoe County Appraisal District mailed property owners notices showing their 2001 proposed value.

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill. "Please do not pay--this notice is not a tax bill," Mrs. Fleming said.

She emphasized the importance of the notice and the key information that it contains. "A property owner has the right to appeal to the Briscoe County Appraisal Review Board or any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership, and other areas," she said.

The Appraisal Review Board, more commonly called the "ARB" is an independent panel of citizens responsible for hearing and settling protests from property owners who disagree with some action by the Appraisal District. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

What should a property owner look for on the notice? "Look at the proposed value for 2001," Mrs. Fleming said. "The notice shows the land's value and any improvement(s) value for the property for the current year." An improvement is a building, structure, fence, or any other type of fixture to the land.

The appraisal notice also includes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value, too.

Homeowners that qualify for property tax homestead exemptions have a limitation on their home's appraised value. The Appraisal District may not increase their home value by more than 10 percent for each year since the last reappraisal year. A homeowner's reappraisal notice shows both the market value for the home and the limited home value.

Notices to property owners whose values increased more than \$500 also will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new taxable value using last year's tax rates. Generally, taxing units set final 2001 tax

rates in August and September. Final tax amounts may vary from the "estimated" amounts.

Mrs. Fleming asks property owners to look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure that there are no mistakes. "If the notice contains an old address, please let the Appraisal District know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time only, and tax bills do not go out until October," Mrs. Fleming added.

A property owner is responsible for informing the Appraisal District of the correct mailing address. A property owner is liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time.

Mrs. Fleming added, "If you did not get a notice and want 2001 information about your property, please call the Appraisal District at 806-823-2161. The general deadline for protesting the ARB is June 29.

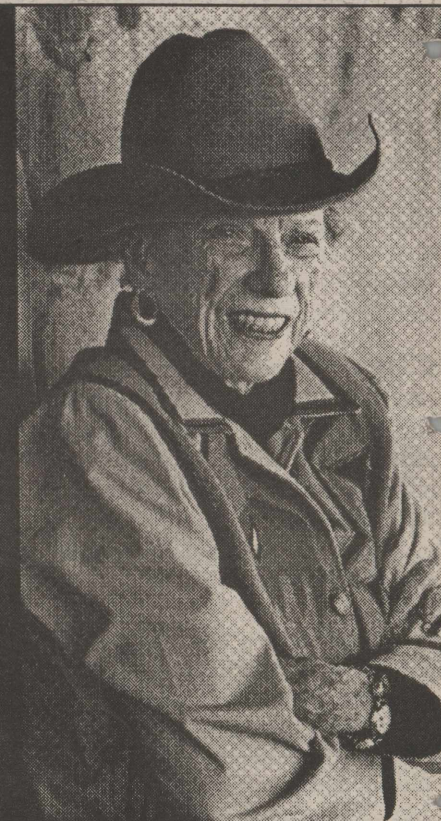

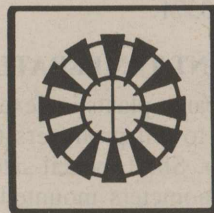

TDH Issues Plague Warning After Die-Off

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has issued a number of precautions after concluding that plague was the cause of a prairie dog die-off at Lake Meredith National Recreation Area.

According to Dr. James Alexander, a zoonosis control veterinarian with TDH, evidence of the prairie dog die-off was investigated at lake Meredith, raising suspicions that plague could be responsible.

Preliminary test results at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Plague Laboratory in Fort Collins, Colorado, identified the bacteria (*Yersinia pestis*) responsible for plague in fleas from the Lake Meredith prairie dog town.

Plague is a bacterial disease of rodents that can be spread to humans and other animals by infected fleas. It has three forms: bubonic (infection of lymph nodes), septi-

cemic (infection of the blood) and pneumonic plague (infection of the lungs). Pneumonic plague is the only form that can be spread from person to person.

Humans can become infected with plague by the bites of infected fleas, by direct contact with the tissues or body fluids of a plague-infected animal, by inhaling infectious airborne droplets from persons or animals with pneumonia plague or by laboratory exposure to plague bacteria.

Plague is common in animals in West Texas and New Mexico, and the disease is occasionally seen in rodent and rabbit populations in the area.

No cases of plague in humans have been reported at this time. Human plague is rare, averaging 12 cases per year in the United States. The last case of human plague in Texas was reported in 1993, and the last human plague death in Texas occurred in 1982.

Medical personnel throughout the area have been advised to watch for plague symptoms, which are similar to those of the flu, including fever, sore throat, muscle pain, headache and swollen lymph nodes. Persons who have visited the park recently and have developed symptoms should consult a doctor.

Untreated plague can have a mortality rate ranging from 30 percent to almost 100 percent, depending on the type, but if treated early, a full recovery is likely.

"Plague is a highly treatable disease," said Alexander. "Early diagnosis and treatment are the keys to a full recovery."

Alexander adds that the best way to prevent plague in humans and pets is to observe the following measures:

- Practice flea control in and around your home and on your pets.
- Practice rodent control around your home.
- Avoid all contact with rodents, squirrels and other wild animals
- Wear insect repellent if you are

in an area where plague is present.

- Do not camp, rest or sleep near animal burrows.
- If you are hunting and must handle wildlife, wear gloves.
- If traveling to an area where plague is present, protect your pets with flea powder or flea collars, or leave your pets at home.
- Do not touch sick or dead ani-

mals.

People who live near prairie dog towns should be sure their pets are kept free of fleas. Swelling of lymph nodes in the area under the lower jaw and pneumonia are the primary symptoms of plague in cats. Suspected cases should be evaluated and treated by a veterinarian.

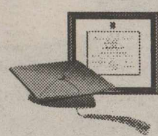

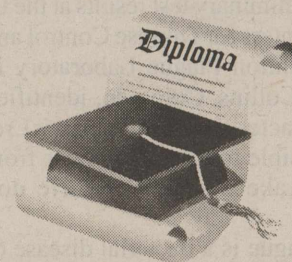

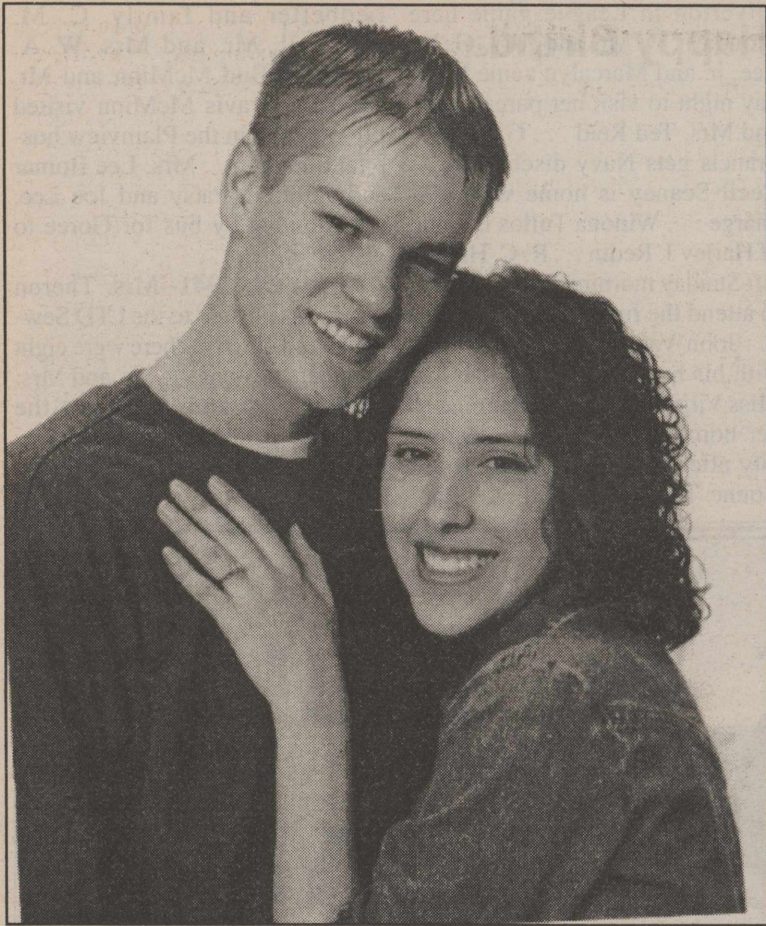

Silverton Students Take Top Honors in Stock Market Game

Students from Silverton have taken top honors in the Spring 2001 Stock Market Game sponsored by the College of Business Administration and Economics at New Mexico State University. The State Championship was captured by Silverton High School students Bryn Mayfield (captain), Jenny Young and John Arnold, under the guidance of teacher, Michelle Francis. First place in the Grades 7-9 division was taken by another team coached by Mrs. Francis, Silverton Middle School students Caleb Francis (captain), Tyler Reed and Daryl-Ann Reynolds.

An innovative method for teaching economics to students, the Stock Market Game is a computer simulated competition played this Fall by almost 3,000 high school, middle school and elementary students throughout New Mexico and West Texas. According to Dorothy Hughes, Stock Market Game Coordinator at NMSU, "We experienced a very bearish market this Spring, but we feel that makes our program especially educational, so students can learn about the risks involved in securities trading. Since our goal is to promote intelligent and cautious investment decision-making, we feel there were valuable lessons learned this semester."

Each team begins with an imaginary \$100,000 and during a ten-week period each semester

"plays" the market, making transactions based on the daily closing prices from all three stock exchanges. Players may buy, sell, short sell, and short cover, and all transactions are charged a 2% broker fee. Teams also may buy on margin says Hughes, but are charged interest at 7%. Teams also receive 5% interest on cash balances and receive dividends that are paid on stock they hold. The goal is to make as much money as possible during the ten-week period. The portfolios are updated daily, and ranking reports are generated weekly.

The program, now called SMG Worldwide (SMGWW), began an Internet version five years ago and, due to its popularity in New Mexico and West Texas schools, is now the only version of the game offered. Not only do teams conduct all their transactions on line, but they also perform most of their research on line, aided by a number of links to other educational websites, many of which are only available to registered SMGWW teachers and students. Each semester the top state, regional and essay contest winners in New Mexico and West Texas are presented with plaques and T-shirts and every participating teacher's top team members are awarded certificates. According to

Hughes, almost 800 awards were presented this Spring. Both Fall and Spring winners are invited to awards luncheons in Albuquerque and Las Cruces in May.

Before the game each semester, Hughes offers training workshops, during which game rules and general investing information is provided. Nationally, the Stock Market Game has been in operation for 26 years; over 700,000 people participated last year in all 50 states. It is sponsored by the Securities Industry Foundation for Economic Education and receives financial support and the donation of teaching materials from many corporations, brokerage firms, and the three stock exchanges.

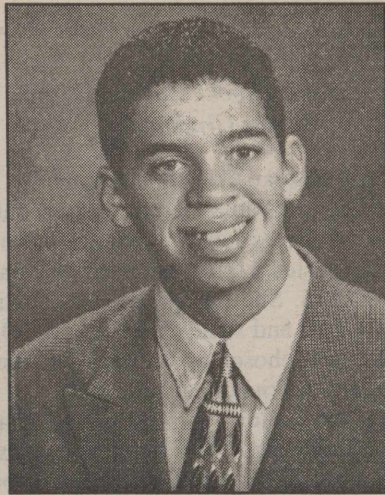

She lists her dad as having been the greatest influence in her life.

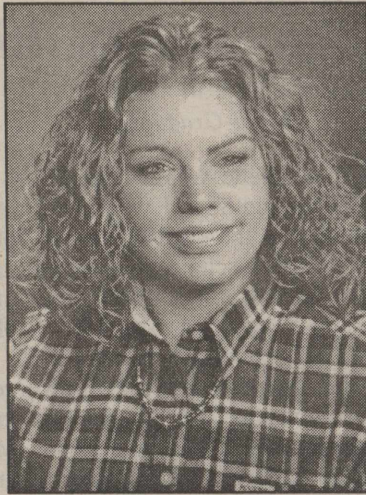
