Fans are invited to attend the pep rally and help cheer the team on to victory.

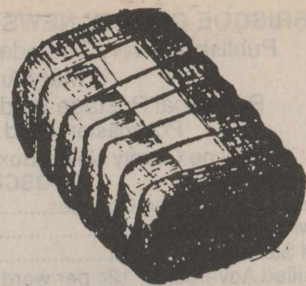

District Runner-up Team To Be Decided Here Friday Night

A very important game will be played here Friday night between Silverton's Owls and Valley's Patriots, and the winner will be the district runner-up behind Groom and will advance to the state playoffs. Both teams want a victory very badly, and both will be working for it when the kickoff takes place at 7:30. Be there yelling for your team!

For those fans who had wished for good weather at Happy Friday night, their wish didn't come true, but a few other good things did result from the game.

Happy kicked off to the Owls, and Issac Garcia rushed for a first down before the Cowboys intercepted a Silverton pass. Two plays later, Red Ivory scooped up a Happy fumble and ran 20 yards for the first touchdown of the game. Garcia kicked the PAT, and the Owls moved into an 8-0 lead.

After Happy controlled the next onside kick, the Cowboys fumbled and Chase Comer picked it up and ran 37 yards to the endzone. There was no PAT and the Owls led 14-0 with 7:01 remaining in the quarter. When the Cowboys went back on offense they were stopped behind the line by Garcia before completing a pass for a first down. The Cowboys made another first down with 2:52 still to be played in the first quarter, then passed complete for a touchdown with 2:13 still on the clock. There was no PAT, and the score became 14 for the Owls, and 6 for the Cowboys.

Happy kicked off, and the Owls

returned the kick to midfield. Francis rushed the ball a couple of times, but it went over on downs.

Happy picked up a first down, but had their pass intercepted by Francis on the next play.

As the second quarter began, Francis ran for a first down, then completed a pass to Clint Ivory for another touchdown. Garcia kicked the PAT, and with 9:35 remaining on the clock, the Owls moved into a 22-6 lead.

Once again, the Owls performed the onside kick, and Happy controlled it at the 34. The teams traded penalties, and a Cowboy pass was broken up and almost intercepted by Red Ivory. The ball went over to the Owls on the Happy 36, but on first down the Cowboys intercepted an Owl pass.

Happy made a first down, and completed a fourth-down pass, brought down immediately by the Owls, and the ball went over on downs.

Francis rushed for eight yards, and on fourth down Red Ivory punted, the ball traveling 63 yards and stopping on the Happy four-yard-line.

Happy made a first down on their 20, but on fourth down Matt Strange recovered another Happy fumble.

The Owls executed a reverse play which missed a first down by inches with 36 seconds remaining before halftime.

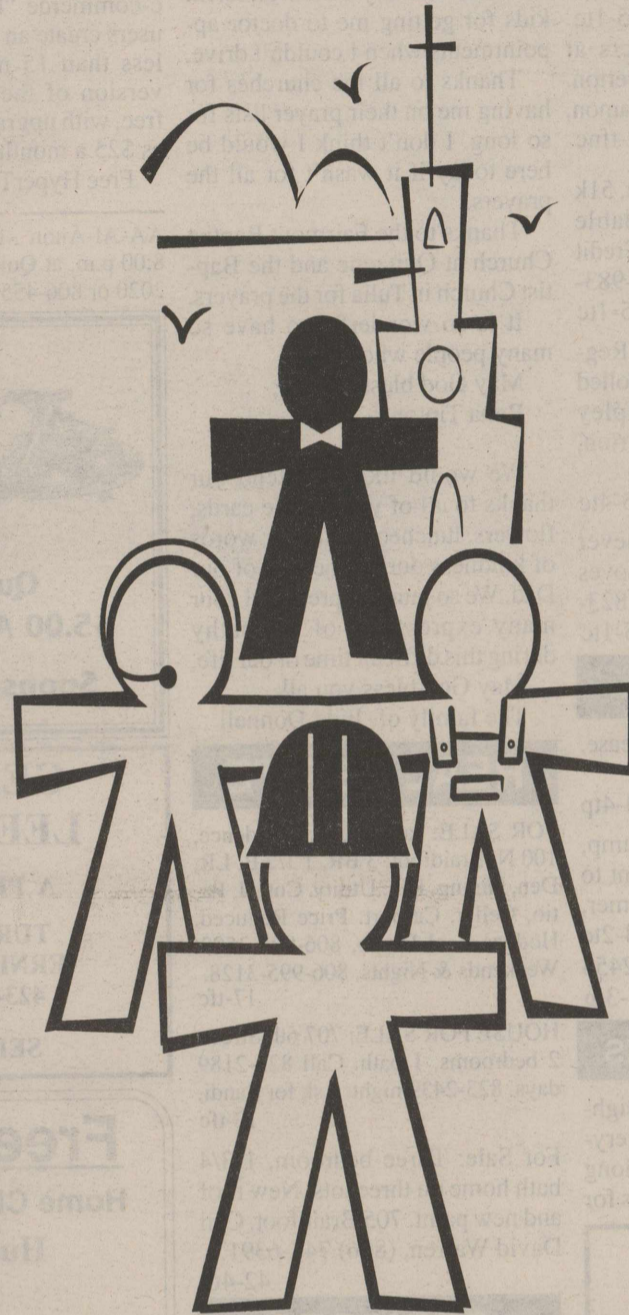

Rushes by Isaiah Ivory, Clint Ivory and Garcia picked up a first down for the Owls, after which Francis made another first down with 5:19 remaining before halftime. Isaiah Ivory carried the touchdown, there was no PAT, and the Owls moved into a 28-6 lead.

After the Owls kicked off, Happy came back with runs and passes that didn't give them a first down and the ball went back to the Owls.

Isaiah picked up four yards, after which Francis hit Adrian Ramirez with a pass that gave the Owls another touchdown. Clint Ivory kicked the PAT, and gave the Owls a 38-6 lead.

The Cowboys controlled the inside kick and picked up a first down on a penalty against the Owls. The Owls intercepted a Happy pass out of bounds before giving the Cowboys another first down on a penalty.

As the fourth quarter began, Happy threw three incomplete passes and the ball went back to

the Owls. Clint Ivory made a first down on the 20, after which Duncan Vernon carried the ball into the endzone for a touchdown. There was no PAT, and with 8:28 remaining in the game, the Owls moved into a 42-6 lead.

Happy came back really trying hard to score, but once again the ball went over on downs. The Cowboys intercepted a Silverton pass, but were penalized and the Owls continued their offensive series. Francis ran for a first down on the nine, but the ball went over on downs.

Happy came back with a first down, then lost the handle on the ball. Chase Comer scooped up the loose ball and ran for a touchdown with 41 ticks left on the clock. There was no PAT, and the final 48-6 score was made.

The Owls kicked off and Happy controlled the onside, but three plays later Francis intercepted a Cowboy aerial, and the Owls killed the clock.

Friday night's game is the only one of importance in the district this week. Since Groom is undefeated, they don't leave any questions to be answered. It is the game between the two teams that are tied for second place that holds the importance, because one of them will be the runner-up and go into the playoffs. Be there!

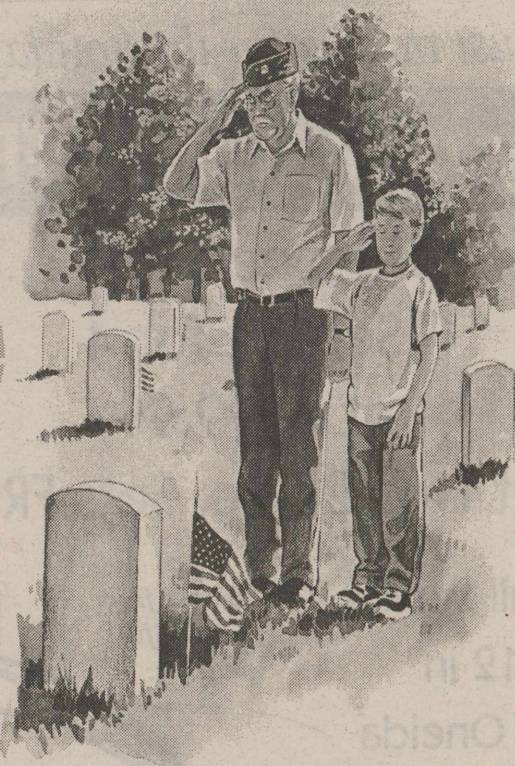

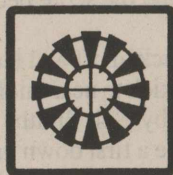

Home, sweet home, may not be so sweet. In fact, many homes are infested with indoor pollutants that make breathing dangerous. Carbon monoxide is the most dangerous form of indoor pollution because it can kill quickly. It causes dizziness, nausea, headaches, and flu-like symptoms. Unlike the gas used to cook food or heat homes, carbon monoxide has no odor. The two main sources of carbon mon-

oxide inside the home are the gas furnace heat exchanger and gas hot water heater. It is important to have a home heating system checked by a professional once a year. Other forms of indoor pollution can cause serious or chronic illnesses. Secondhand tobacco smoke can cause allergies, asthma, and ear infections in young children. Mold, which can cause allergies or asthma, is also a concern in Texas. It is important to

keep the humidity level in houses below 60 percent to prevent mold from growing. *

Vegetables in Southwest Texas' Winter Garden are making excellent progress, despite a slow start caused by dry weather. Hot and dry weather in August and September delayed the planting of winter vegetables by two weeks in Southwest Texas, but October rains gave vegetables a strong start. Leafy vegetables like cool weather and those that have been planted are making excellent progress. Harvest of carrots, cabbage, spinach, pickling cucumbers, broccoli, beets and beans is expected to gain momentum this week.



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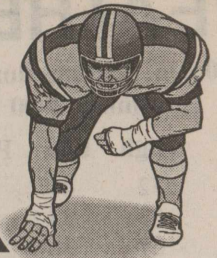
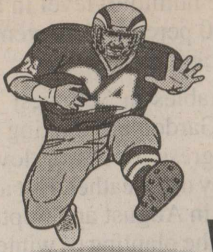
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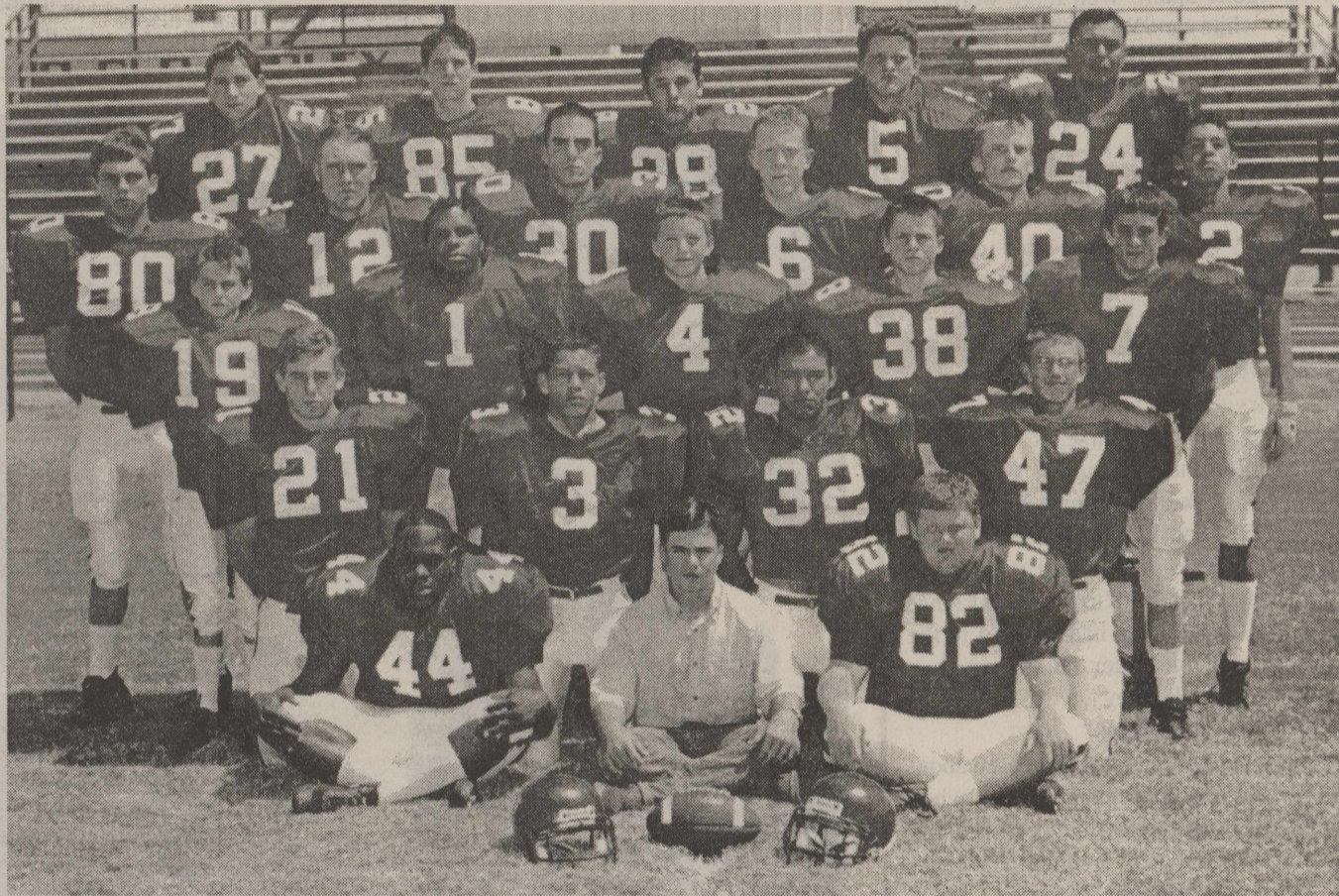

The gifts are returned to the tree in time to be distributed to the children at Christmas.

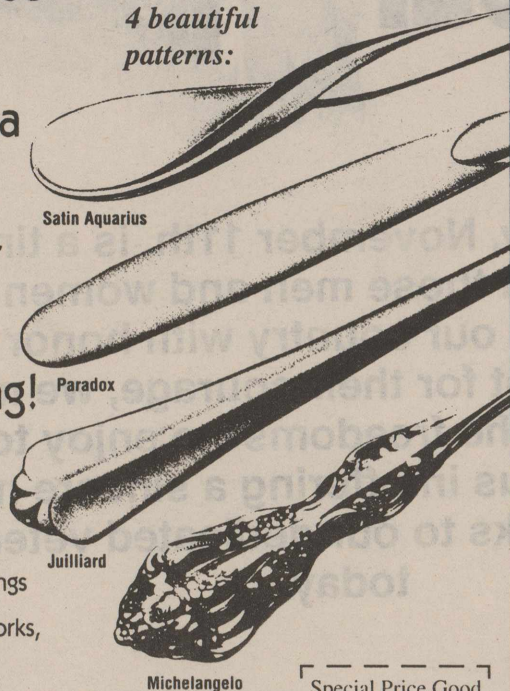
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
