



#### **Older Adults Should Not Negect Exercise**

More than a third of Texans older than 65 doe not engage in any physical activity, but getting that type of exercise is not as hard as it seems.

The benefits of physical acticity for older adults, according to Dr. Sharon Robinson, assistant professor and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, include reducing the risk of a heart atta ck, controlling weight, reducing blood pressure and helping to prevent osteoporosis.

"It's easy to let physical inactivity take over," Robinson said. "The key is to keep moving and to plan sme type of physical actiity into your every day routine."

Exercises can be as simple as coming to a stand duirng television commercial breaks or using plastic milk jugs filled with water as weights to do arm reaches. A onehalf gallon container of water weighs about four pounds.

"Walk," Robinson suggested. "Don't park in the sace nearest the building to which you are going."

As with people of any age, use the buddy system. "You'll help motivate each other

and it's safer," she said.

In the week ended December 28, online sales of Texas/Oklahoma/Kansas cotton dropped to 7,268 bales, versus the previous week's sales of 24,438 bales. Average daily prices received by producers utilizing the Internet trading system ranged from 47.40 to 50.01 cents per pound compared to a range of 51.13 to 52.06 cents the previous




