

TDA Has Sent Ballots for Oct. 2 Regional Boll Weevil Election

that will determine whether to establish a boll weevil eradication program and set a maximum assessment in the six-county Northern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone.

Based on Farm Service Agency records, the Texas Department of Agriculture has mailed 3,410 ballots. Eligible voters in the Northern High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone should receive an official ballot by mail on or after September 11. A postage-paid return envelope is included. Completed ballots must be postmarked on or before October 2 to be counted. Producers who planted cotton in 2000, but do not receive a ballot should immediately contact TDA at (512) 463-7593.







Mayfield ran for four yards and Ramon Martinez grabbed a pass for seven yards, before the ball went back to Hedley.


Jacob Francis made a good tackle and Thor Patton recovered a fumble.
