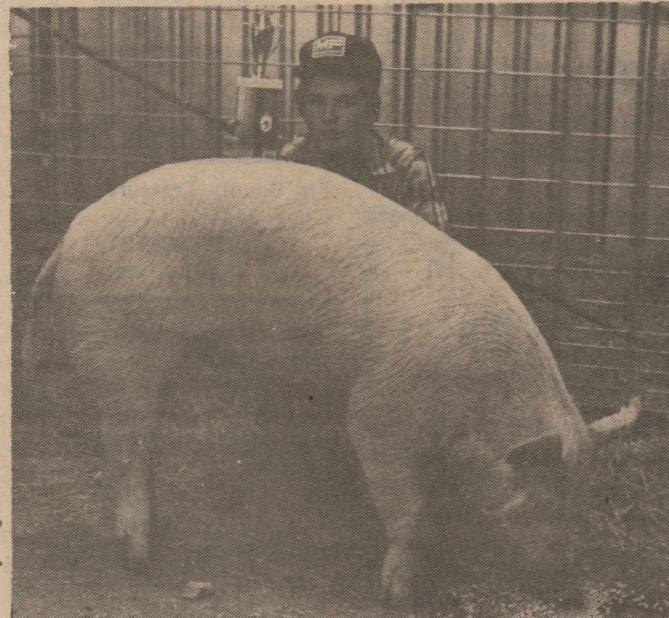

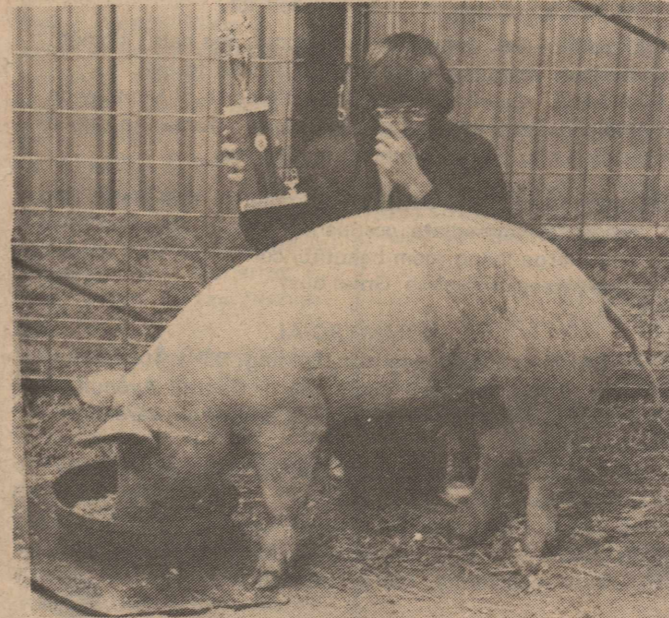
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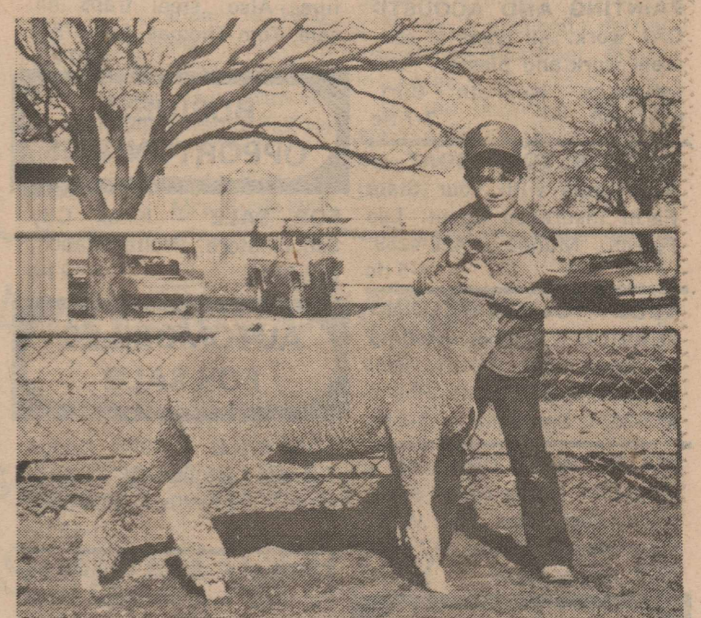

Area Students Take Top Honors In County Livestock Show

The two-day Knox County Junior Livestock Show drew to a close Saturday afternoon with a numerous amount of hometown and area students proudly bringing home trophies and ribbons from their efforts.

In the Friday competition, Daniel Godsey won the grand champion gilt honors with a Yorkshire entry. The fourteen-year-old is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex Godsey of O'Brien.

Brother Johnathan bred the champion pig and also had a litter mate that was named reserve champion gilt and still another litter mate

that was named grand champion boar of the county show. Leon Burkham, vocational agriculture teacher, explained that there were 16 pigs in this particular litter of Yorkshires from the Godsey herd and eight were driven in shows this year.

Reserve champion boar was a spotted poland China

entry shown by Kristi White of Knox City, daughter of the Jimmy Whites.

Shane Johnston, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Johnston of Knox City had the grand champion pen of broilers.

Reserve champion lamb was shown by Bob Burkham, nine-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Burkham of

Knox City.

David Counts took top honors with his grand champion and barrow during the final day of competition. Reports were that the swine show competition was extra tough but Counts eked out the barrow win and Michael Albus, also of Knox City, made it a clean sweep for KC in the

market swine judging with the reserve barrow.

KC lass, Kristi White, won the showmanship trophy in the swine division with Shannon Ryder of Benjamin earning the honor in the steer competition. Sheep showmanship award was presented to Larry Welch of Munday. Benjamin's Stasy Carver had the grand champion market lamb as well as a mediumwool crossbred entry. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Carver are Stasy's parents.

Doug Brown of Benjamin, son of the Stanton Browns, took the reserve grand champion steer award for this heavyweight cross. Presenting ribbons on Friday was Knox City-O'Brien FFA Sweetheart, Sonia Carter, with Kathy Kuehler, Munday Sweetheart, assuming the duty on Saturday.

City Sales Tax Check Is \$1,723.77

Knox City's sales tax check of \$1,723.77 is a part of \$18.5 million mailed to 894 Texas cities last Friday as their January share of the one percent city sales tax, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Other area towns and their amounts include Munday, \$799.55; Haskell, \$2,546.08; Seymour, \$2,486.02; Stamford, \$4,422.49; and Hamlin, \$1,754.95.

Bullock also reminded the 250,000 Texas retail merchants who remit their sales tax collections on a quarterly basis that January 31 is the deadline for their next reports.

"If they haven't done so already, I'd suggest they put a big red circle around that date on their calendars because late reports can mean costly and time consuming problems for our merchants," he said.

Bullock stated that the latest batch of rebate checks include two in excess of \$2 million for the cities of Dallas and Houston.

Houston, the state's most populous city, will get a check for \$4 million and Dallas will receive \$2.2 million.

San Antonio will receive \$984,163, Fort Worth, \$761,375, Austin, \$600,346 and El Paso, \$507,051.

The local-option, one-percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders and remitted monthly to the cities by the Comptroller's Office. Bullock urged merchants who have questions or problems with preparing their sales tax reports to contact the nearest Comptroller's Field Office or call toll-free 1 800 252-5555 for assistance.

Smith Thanks Rehab Donors

Lee Smith, area chairman for the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene, asked the News office this week to convey his thanks to the people in this area for their generous donations to the Rehab Center, during the Saturday night telethon.

He added a special note of thanks to Gaylynn and Bob Burkham, children of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Burkham, who for the third consecutive year have auctioned off one of their animals with the proceeds going to the Rehab Center. This year the two exhibitors auctioned off a lamb which brought \$247.00. Rehab '78, the eight annual telecast to benefit the center, received nearly \$375,000 in donations and pledges, according to reports Sunday by Shelley V. Smith, executive director of the center.

Included in that amount was a \$72,000 grant from the Texas Rehabilitation Commission for the establishment of a brace supply shop at the center, Smith said.

The telethon raised approximately a fifth of the Rehab Center's projected \$1,600,000 budget for 1978. However, Smith explained, "Even with the good start the center will need a lot more money. Right now we will depend a great deal on small shows and benefits."

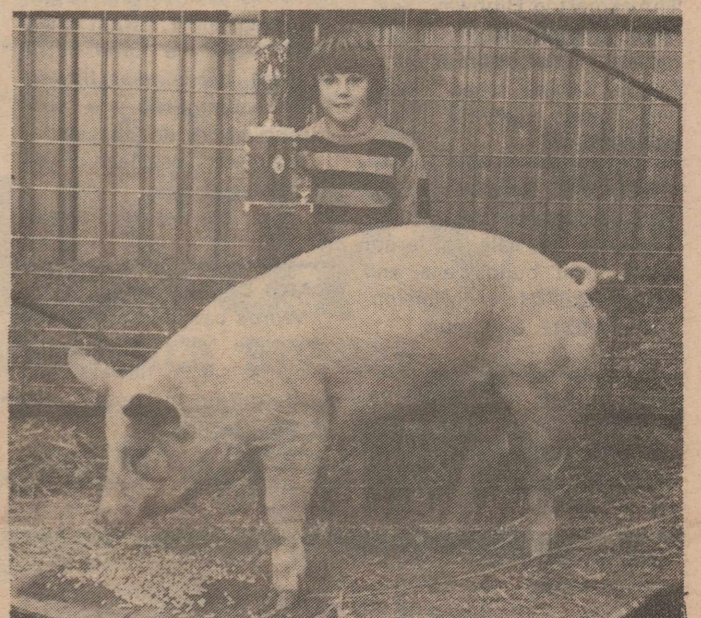

radar and other demonstrations of equipment used by him and his fellow cohorts.

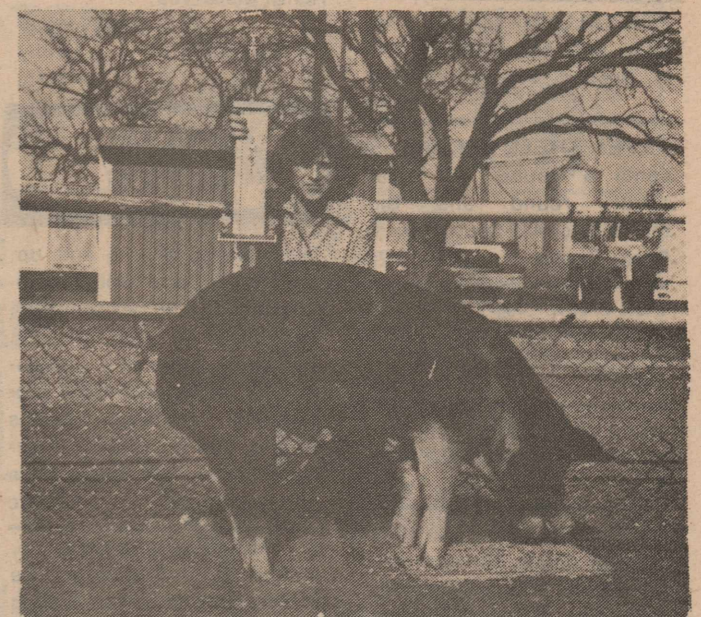

Avid chess player, Ben Smith, will provide lessons for the beginning class player. Also providing beginning lessons for students, however, in the backgammon will be Bill Penman.

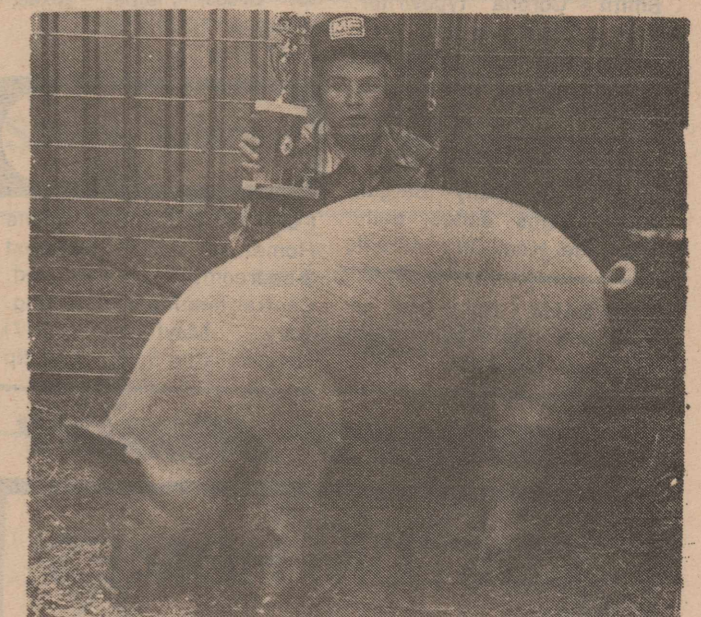
Claudia Tidwell will show an actual demonstration of an easy way to decorate cakes and Glen Rumley will provide instruction in the use of life saving equipment.

This is going to be hard for some of the taxing jurisdictions, as so many do have assessors that are even working toward their CTA exam, and you are going to have to have this to be certified. The new Senate Bill calls for everyone that set values of property to be certified within a five year period. This was one of the things we were told this time, that the committee had accepted the TAO schools as the certification part of the law. I'm hoping to take my CTA exam this October. I have two more schools to attend and pass. These are not as easy as it was in school to take a math test, but these are a little different. We will have a year from the time they mail us our registration forms to be-

gin working toward the CTA certification and if you do not comply with this you could be out of a job or your school could be in for some bad times. They are thinking that two or more schools may join together and just pay one CTA to be the main tax assessor - collector, which could be something to think about. Any school, city, water district or county will have to have a CTA as their main tax person, so you can see where some districts or counties may have a hard time finding that many CTAs. As far as I can find out there are only four people in Haskell and Knox counties that are working on this. So you can see where most of the counties are going to be short of certified people.

Farabee Supports Higher Market Prices

State Senator Ray Farabee expressed support for higher market prices for farmers and ranchers in a letter written to the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture this week.

"Recent protests have brought public attention to what many of us have known for more than a decade. American farmers have been feeding this country and the world, and it is time for people in agriculture to get a fair share of the dollars spent for food and fiber," Farabee stated to Secretary Robert Bergland.

Knox County has an average annual income of \$21 million dollars from agriculture. He continued, "When costs of production exceed that income, it not only hurts the people of Knox County, but it hurts Texas and America, and destroys the family farm which has been responsible for making this country the most productive in the world."

Although parity and high target prices must come from an improved farm bill by our federal Congress, Farabee outlined three things which the Texas Legislature can and

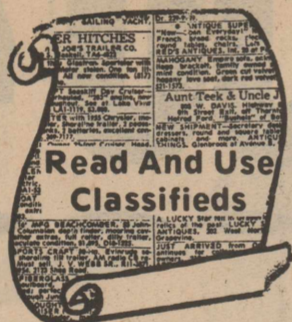

Offutt Reports On Conservation Progress

L.D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, provided the following report on conservation progress in the district during 1977. Offutt stated all schools in the district participated in the conservation education programs sponsored by the district. Participation was very good with about 350 students participating in the essay contest, 500 in the poster contest and 75 in the land and grass contest. These programs are sponsored annually and all local schools are eligible. The district nature trail was visited by about 150 students during the year.

Offutt said participation was also good in the Great Plains Conservation Program with four new contracts certified, and farmers made good use of the Agricultural Conservation Program with 57 referrals serviced during the year.

Arche Lieb, District Conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, assisted.

ing the district reported that over 1300 services were provided to land users during the year. These services included design and lay-out of pollution abatement practices under funding programs, assistance in preparing conservation plans and revisions, GPCP contracts, cropland and rangeland management practices, brush control, range seeding, irrigation practices, and wildlife improvement practices. The assistance also included services to 51 non-agricultural land users and 23 units of government in which resource data was provided to help solve conservation problems.

Lieb said that 302 district cooperators applied one or more conservation practices during the year. Some of the practices applied were 40 miles of parallel terraces, 7 farm ponds, 61 acres of grassed waterways, 17 irrigation systems on 1149 acres, 27000 ft. of irrigation pipelines, and 5963 acres of minimum tillage. Twenty-eight new conservation plans and 41 plan revisions were made with cooperators. Over 30,000 acres were reported as having adequate conservation treatment making a total of 276,000 acres in Knox County having adequate conservation treatment applied on the land Lieb concluded.

Heatly Re-Appointed To Legislative Board

AUSTIN--(Veteran State Rep. W.S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah has been re-appointed to the important Legislative Budget Board (LBB) by House Speaker Bill Clayton.

The appointment of Heatly to the post gives him 21 years on the board, more than any person in history. The West Texas Democrat has served in the House 24 years.

The 10-member board, which includes the Lt. Governor and Speaker of the House, has responsibility for the preparation of the general appropriations bill for the Legislature.

The board makes its recommendations based on estimates and reports of needed funds from all state agencies and from its own inspections.

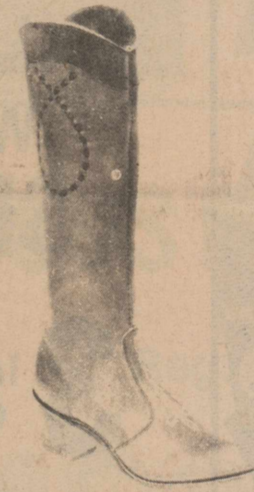
Heatly is a member of the Appropriations Committee of the House. In addition to his interim duties with that
