Baum Campaigning District Door-To-Door

Jim Baum is not one to let the grass grow under his feet. Since announcing his candidacy for Congress, 17th District, the Big Spring radio station manager has visited in all parts of the 33-county District.

Baum has vowed to take his campaign to the people by going door-to-door in at least 73 towns and cities and currently is fulfilling his pledge.

Baum says, "I want farmers and middle income families to know I want their votes. That's why I'm going door-to-door...to give this campaign a personal contact."

Baum averages 200-300 homes per day and is frequently asked into homes to talk politics. "This is what I really like," he adds, "hearing what others expect or don't expect from government."

On the subject of his candidacy, Baum stresses the fact he's a working man, a man raising a family just as so many others in this Congressional District are doing. "I know the problems they face," he says, "because my family has them, too."

Baum and his wife, the former Margaret Stewart of Beaumont, reside with their four children, ages 10-15, in one of Big Spring's older homes located on an acre and built in 1910 by one of Big Spring's first physicians. Baum manages Radio Station KBYG and his wife is the Coordinator of Volunteer Services at Big Spring State Hospital. The Baums are members of the First United Methodist Church.

Baum, 41, was a resident of Abilene from 1946 until 1958 and is a graduate of Abilene High School. He attended Sul Ross State University on a baseball scholarship before becoming a professional baseball player with the Pittsburgh Pirate Farm System. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.L. Baum, still make their home in Abilene.

Baum, a broadcaster for 21 years, and his family have resided in Big Spring for 13 years.

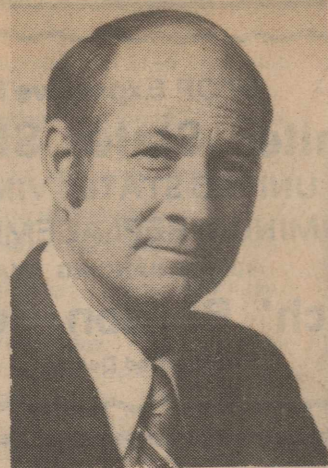
BVRA Sets '78 Rodeo

Weatherford Man Seeks Congress Post

WEATHERFORD - Democrat, Crews McCulloch, a 46-year-old Weatherford businessman of Parker County, has announced that he will seek the post of U.S. Congressman for the 17th Congressional District.

He believes that a Congressman should be qualified for the post and stresses that his varied background has given him the experiences and qualifications for the position. His background includes that of combat veteran, foreign area specialist, farmer, rancher, manufacturer, and businessman.

McCulloch views agriculture, energy, and inflation as the most crucial issues facing the district and the nation and sees them as being closely related.

He has first hand knowledge of the problems faced by the farmer and rancher, and says he will work to secure 100 percent of parity.

He grew up on a farm and from 1965 to 1971 owned and operated more than 6,500 acres in cotton, grain and cattle. Other interests included a farm implement dealership, fish farm, cotton gin, and farm supply. He liquidated his farming interests because of decreasing prices and increasing government regulations. He states, "Liquidation can be financially devastating. Tax credits

taken for depreciation and investment credit must often be repaid. I'm still paying for my decision."

In the field of energy, McCulloch said that he would fight for total de-regulation of all oil and gas production. "I saw first hand the real impact of no energy policy. During 1971-1973, I owned two manufacturing companies producing recreation vehicles. In early 1973, the energy crisis struck without warning. My sales were off more than 90 percent and by the end of that year I was bankrupt. Other areas of our economy were also thrown into depression. Five years and three congresses later, we are

Three Persons File For School Election

Two members of the Knox City-O'Brien CISD Board of Education have filed for re-election with one newcomer entering the race. Allen McGaughey and J.M. Emerson are asking re-election in the April 1 contest with Barbara Barnard signing up for the first time.

March 1 is the last day a candidate can file for a place on the ballot which is 30 days prior to election day.

John Crownover, school board president, whose term

is expiring this year has announced he will not be a candidate.

After the consolidation of the Knox City ISD and Carney ISD in August of 1976, a new seven member board was elected and the regular trustee election held in April 1977. The seven elected members then drew for one, two, and three year terms. John Crownover, J.M. Emerson and Allen McGaughey drew one year terms; Alex Godsey and Doug Meinzer drew two year terms and John Grindstaff Jr. and Henry J. Jones drew three year terms.

Crownover will bring to a close more than 19 years of service to our local board. Appointed to complete the unexpired term of Guy Robinson January 14, 1957, he was elected for his first full term in 1958. Crownover was elected president of the board in April 1959 and did not run in 1964. He was off the board until elected again in 1966, when he was again elected president, a position he has held to the present. This totals 19 years and three months of service to our school district as a board member and 17 years as board president.

White Files For O'Brien Council

Johnnie White, who was appointed last year to fill out an unexpired term on the city council at O'Brien has filed for re-election in the city election scheduled April 1, according to city secretary Cathy Cameron.

One more place on the council, that of Jerry Johnston's, also will be up for election this year. According to Mrs. Cameron, Johnston has not indicated whether or not he will run again.

Holdover officials are Mayor C.H. Underwood and council members Charlene Brothers, Buster Hodges, and Butch Stephens.

Filing deadline is March 1.

Plans are for Crane to enter a nursing home in Abilene where he will be taken to the Rehab Center for his treatments.

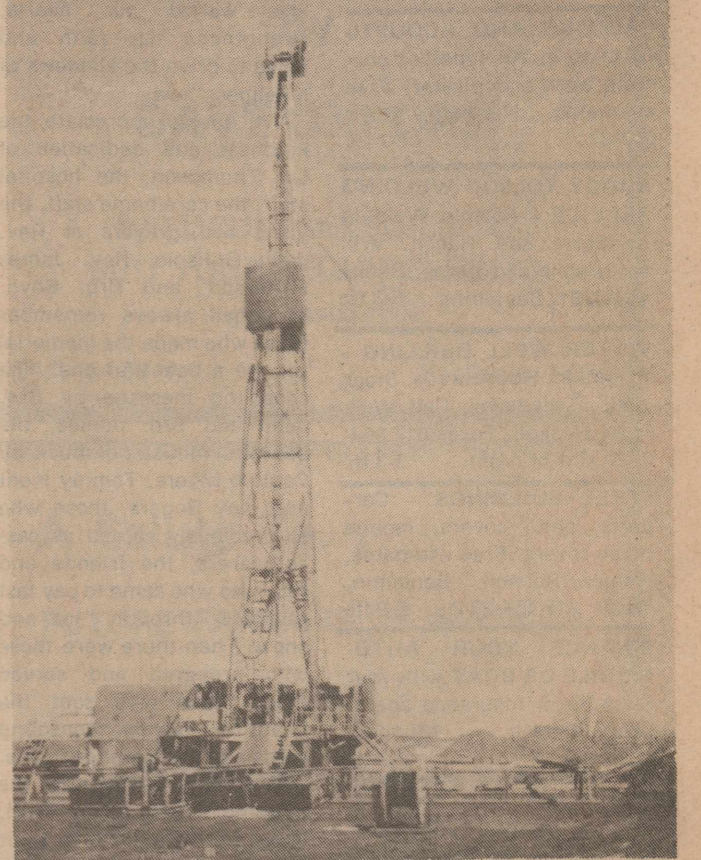
Dr. W.F. Thompson felt that therapy could be of much benefit to Crane and made the necessary arrangements.

The welcome was extended by Mrs. Edward Smith of Munday and Sandy King, also of Munday, gave the invocation.

Mrs. Smith introduced Mrs. Albus, who stated that she accepted the challenge of speaking for one reason only and that was to speak out for AAM.

She urged women to go to the meetings with their spouses, go to the strike offices where they call the state office in Hereford as well as the national office in Colorado for daily reports, and above all--be active. Mrs. Albus further noted that there is not much to look forward to in years to come if the AAM is not successful. Many of the speakers go at their own personal expense and sacrifice. PLAN AHEAD
Sort clothes according to type of fabric, color-fastness, degree of soil and garment construction.
You'll save both hot water and electricity by doing similar items together.
Accumulate a full load before running your washer.

BE SELECTIVE
Choose the cycle that is precisely appropriate for the clothes you are washing. Is a "hot" temperature setting really necessary? Except for heavily soiled items, most loads will come clean in either a cold or warm wash. Look into cold wash detergents.

Too much detergent can clog machine and drains... always measure, don't guess!

Follow the manufacturer's recommendations for your type equipment.
Mixing brands of detergents can cause graying of clothes.

FOR SAFETY SAKE
Be sure control is "off" before reaching into your washer.
If one is necessary, use only a heavy duty extension cord.
Be sure your washer is grounded.
Keep dry cleaning agents, color remover and Fibreglas out of your washer. It's a good idea not to wash clothes containing cleaning fluids in your washer.




