

Hartt said electric usage probably would have been higher if heavy winds had accompanied the cold fronts during the month and if many customers were not practicing conservation.

Fuel costs for February were slightly lower than in January, which also helped take some sting out of the

The degree day figures, which are an accepted mea-

sure of energy requirements, indicated that West Texans needed 85 percent more energy this February than last February just to keep their homes warm

The "heating degree day" is the net difference between the average outside temperature over a 24-hour period and a base temperature of 65 degrees. This past February there were 729 degrees in Abilene, compared to 393 in February, 1977.

Hartt said this is about average for WTU's entire service area, which stretches from Shamrock on the north to Persidio on the south with Abilene about in the center.
