Polk, Amarillo, Texas, in order to receive testimony concerning Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. This hearing was previously scheduled for March 1, 1978. This document is the first of two volumes which, upon completion of Volume II, will form the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. Volume I, Basic Data Report, includes information on existing wastewater treatment facilities; existing water quality; existing land use patterns; existing population; and projections of economic growth, population, and probable land use patterns. Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will present the recommended plans for water quality management and the legal, financial, and institutional requirements of each plan. Also included in Volume II will be descriptions of feasible alternatives, an environmental assessment, and a summary of the public participation activities conducted during the development of the plan. The Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin is being developed to statisfy the requirements of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, and pursuant to Title 40 Code of Federal Regulation Parts 130 and 131 and the State of Texas Continuing Planning Process The public hearing shall be conducted in compliance with Section 26.037 (formerly Section 21. 089), Texas Water Code. The study area for this plan includes most of the Red River Basin. This plan will not address the planning required in the Texarkana Designated Areawide Planning Area; detailed planning within that area will be provided through the development of the Texarkana Areawide Waste Treatment Management Plan and will not be considered at this

Copies of the Basic Data Report will be made available for public inspection at the following locations: Texas Department of Water Resources Offices, Stephen F. > **GET EQUIPMENT READY** FOR HOME CANNING

It's "inventory time" for proper home canning equipment--an absolute "must" for safe, high quality homecanned foods.

Below are some recom mended guides for proper home canning equipment:

A two-piece self-seal lid is the most commonly used and reliable lid. Other new lids are appearing on the market-so follow manufacturer's instructions to make sure lids seal properly and hold the seal during handling and

-- Water bath canner

Use any large kettle with straight sides, a tight-fitting lid and a rack to keep jars off the bottom of the kettle. Kettles should be deep enough to hold jars upright and permit the water to boil gently one to two inches over the jar tops.

The boiling water bath is recommended for canning fruits, Fruit juices, tomatoes, rhubarb, and pickled veget-

-- Pressure canner

Pressure canners are necessary for processing all meats and non-acid vegetables in order to prevent spoilage due to botulin toxin. A pressure canner in safe

working order is the key to 'get-ready'' plans for home canning all vegetables (except tomatoes)

A "make sure" checklist for safe working pressure canners appears below

-- Take off removable petcock and safety valves, wash and dry thoroughly. Soak in vinegar to remove any corro-

-- Use a toothpick or pipe cleaner to clean openings in lid of canner

-- Use fine steel wool and soap to wash bottom part of pressure canner.

-- To remove any odors and stains, combine juice of one lemon--or two tablespoons vinegar--with two quarts of water. Process at five pounds pressure for five minutes.

-- Grease (using vegetable oil) the closing surfaces of metal - to - metal - sealing pressure canners if lid is difficult to remove or steam -- Replace gasket if rubber

has hardened.

--Check dial gauge on pressure canner. Clean weighted gauge thoroughly.

LAWN GREEN UP TIME Green months are ap-

proaching and Spring lawn preparations should begin soon. An important step to a healthy green lawn is correct restoration practices following winter.

The first step in bringing a lawn back to life after dormancy is the removal of unwanted thatch. The accumulation of leaves, grass clippings and various organic materials known as thatch has an undesirable effect. Moisture and nutrient penetration are deceased and root development is of a shallow nature in lawns with thatch layers. Removal of this layer can be accomplished by de-

thatching machines built for this purpose and available at many rental businesses. Also a common garden rake will remove much of the thatch as will a lawnmower lowered to a scalping height and operat-

ed over the lawn. Another step, that of aeration, is not required but may help in areas of soil compaction. Aeration increases the exchange of carbon dioxide and other toxic gases between the soil and atmosphere. Coring or grooving type aeration machine's will usually aid compacted soil. If your lawn doubled as a football field this winter, you might consider aeration in your lawn restora-

A third and very important part of this procedure is fertilization. A complete fertilizer should be applied in Spring to encourage good growth of roots and foliage. Be careful of fertilizers containing weed killers as these can damage or kill flowers, shrubs and trees.

In order to encourage a quick start after cold weather, remember to dethatch, aerate if needed and fertilize. These lawn restoration practices will eliminate many problems throughout the summer.

'Make certain that you are deputies who can legally register a person on the spot.

For the May 6 primary, new voters may register through April 6. It is important that voters be registered in the precinct in which they vote. If a person has moved within the county, he must notify the tax office of the address change.

Current voters who haven't moved should have previously received new registration cards. Anyone who did not receive a card should contact his tax office. Stenholm advised. Stenholm recommended that each person check to make sure his voter registration ID card is yellow. Anyone not having a yellow card should check with the County Tax Assessor-Collector.

This new card became ef-

fective March 1, 1978. However, previously registered voters who do not have their new cards may still vote by giving the precinct judge necessary information at the poll. The entire process is much simpler if the person has his current voter registration card, Stenholm noted.

Stenholm is seeking the post presently held by veteran legislator Congressman Omar Burleson who is retiring at the end of the present

Stenholm's campaign is based upon five major issues. He is concerned about inflation, energy, agriculture, senior citizens and government regulations.

"We must eliminate waste and balance the budget. We must deregulate oil and gas and increase domestic production. Farmers must have more stable markets and a fair return on their investments or every citizen suffers. We must make our social security system secure and keep down hospital costs. We must eliminate government intervention in our daily lives," Stenholm stated.

"It is not only every eligible citizens right to vote but his duty, as an American, to exercise that right," Stenholm concluded.

As we all know the price of everything is up, up, up and as I was rumagging through some boxes of old stuff you save and save then throw away, I ran across this interesting statement.

This statement was from Beetham & Son Funeral Directors and Embalmers, Corner Hubbard and LaSalle, Mineral Wells. Texas and was dated October 12, 1918. Itemized items on the statemet were as follows: Casket & Box--\$37.50: Burial Robe--\$3.50; Washing and Dressing--\$2.50; Wagon--\$2.50; Opening Grave--\$5.00; Total \$51.00.

Then another one was dat-June 13, 1966 from McCauley Funeral Home. Munday, Texas it was itemized as follows: Casket and Service--\$495.00; 12 gauge Perfection Box--\$200.00: Open and Close Grave--\$40.00; Underwear and Hose -\$2.95; 1 Certified Death Certificate--\$1.00: Total \$738.00

I can't imagine why they were kept unless they were just some of the things you save that you don't know what else to do with. Guess you can see just how much more it cost to die in 1966 than in 1918, only \$687.00. but then that is about right for 48 years.

In checking with Smith Funeral Home in Knox City about how much the cost would be in 1978 I was informed that the minimum would be \$800.00 for casket and service and from there you could spend as much as you desired. Of course the more you paid the more elaborate the funeral, which is as it should be.

SCS Will **Tighten** Controls

WASHINGTON--The Soil Conservation Service (SCS) will require that 50 percent of the area upstream from a proposed watershed project impoundment be adequately protected from soil erosion before construction on the dam can begin, M. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of agriculture for conservation. research and education, recently announced.

"The new policy will help SCS and local project sponbut also emphasize water conservation, water quality, and fish and wildlife habitat." Dr. Cutler said. Previously, SCS had re-

quired only that 50 percent of the needed conservation practices be planned--but not actually in place--prior to construction of dams. Requiring that 50 percent of the affected area be adequately protected will help conserve soil, reduce water quality problems, and help keep reservoirs from filling with sediment.



MARRIAGE WON'T CAUSE BENEFITS TO BE CUT

Benefits to widows and widowers who remarry after age 60 will not be reduced under new social security amendments, according to James Harper, Social Security Branch Manager in Vernon The provision becomes effective in January 1979.

Under present law, benefits to widows and widowers who remarry at 60 or later may be reduced.

Other important benefit changes were made by the new law, the representative said. They include: Public pension offset--So-

cial security dependents benefits to the husband or wife of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker will be reduced by the amount of any pension or annuity he or she receives based on his or her work in non-covered public employment. The change is effective for benefits paid for December 1977, based on applications filed in Decemher 1977 and later. The offset provision does not apply to those who would be eligible for pension by December 1982, and who could have qualified for social security dependents benefits under the law in effect on January 1.

Blind people--The measure of substantial work was changed for people who receive social security disability benefits generally payable only if a person is unable to perform substantial work. Before the change, the measure of substantial work was earnings of \$200 a month. Under the new law, the monthly measure for substantial work will be the same as the retirement test--\$334 a month for 1978, \$375 for 1979, \$416 for 1980, \$458 for 1981, and \$500 for 1982. Length of marriage before

divorce--The length of marriage required before a divorced woman can be eligible for benefits on the record of her former husband is reduced from 20 to 10 years. The change is effective January

Retroactive benefits--When a person applies for reduced benefits, generally no benefits will be paid for months before the month of application unless the benefits are for disability or unreduced dependents benefits are involved. The change is effective for applications filed in January 1978 and after. Previously, up to 12 months benefits could be paid for months before the month of application in all cases.

PAINLESS IN OFFICE SURGERY REMOVES BUNION; PATIENT IS AMBULATORY

A painless in-office surgical procedure to remove unsightly and painful bunions, which eliminates a cast and permits the patient to walk out of the podiatrist's office following surgery, has been developed by a Chicago podiatrist.

The procedure was developed by Dr. Seymour Kessler, of Chicago, President of the Academy of Ambulatory Foot Surgery, a national society of podiatrists with the skills and equipment to perform foot surgery in their offices. The society's headquarters are in Philadelphia.

The simplified surgery eliminates lengthy and costly hospitalization, and permits a patient to remain ambulatory and resume normal duties immediately following surgery, according to Dr. Kessler.

In a report to the 1600 members of the Academy, which also has members in Canada, Mexico, England and Israel, Dr. Kessler explained that his new procedure has been successful in over 150 patients of all ages.

He said he adapted a procedure first introduced by an English orthopedic surgeon in 1964, but simplified it and shortened the time a patient is in surgery. Dr. Kessler makes a minimal incision less than one-half inch in length.

The bone in the area of the bunion is fractured by specially designed instruments inserted into the toe through the tiny opening. By pressure, the podiatrist then forces the bunion into the interspace between the first and second toe.




Instead of a cast, the Chicago podiatrist applies a compression dressing and the foot is put into a rigid bottom surgical shoe. The patient walks out of the office. A day later the compression bandage is removed, the bone repositioned and the foot is wrapped in a sturdy tape dressing. The latter is maintained for three weeks.

Following this, Dr. Kessler reported, the doctor wraps the first toe joint with a non allergic dermacel tape and teaches the patient how to re-wrap the toe after a shower or bath.

Under traditional surgical procedures, he explained, the foot is opened approximately three inches for removal of the painful bunion. The patient remains in a hospital for five days to two weeks, and then is severely handicapped by a heavy cast and crutches for about six weeks. Dr. Kessler rarely administers more than a very mild analgesic for post-operative medication.
