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## Hounds Win First In Quanah Relays

The Knox City Greyhound track team brought home their second first place trophy when they competed in the second meet of the season Saturday at Quanah. The Hounds totaled 117 points for their day's work. Seymour finished with 95 points and Childress took third place.

Two Greyhounds placed first in their respective divisions with Phillip Rhodes taking top honors in the 100 yard dash and David Walling placing first in the high jump contest.

Other wins for the Hound varsity team included the 440 relay team of Mike Howell, Ricky Gonzales, Tim Robinson and Phillip Rhodes, second; David Anderson, 880 run, fifth; Tommy Mangis, second, Dwayne Johnson, third and David Benson, sixth, 120 high hurdles; Ricky Gonzales, third, 100 dash; Brett Boone, third, 440 dash; Tommy Mangis, second, and Dwayne Johnson, fourth, 330 intermediates.

Also, Phillip Rhodes, third, 220 dash; Eddie Martinez, third, mile run; mile relay team, Brett Boone, Jimmy Rushing, Mark Clonts, and Tommy Mangis, third; Domingo Garcia, third, pole vault; David Anderson, third, high jump; and David Anderson, third, and David Walling, fifth, long jump.

Other teams competing in Saturday's meet were Quanah, Chillicothe, Vernon-Northside, Harrold, Munday, Crowell, Paducah, and Archer City.

This week, the Hounds will compete in the Olney Relays.

## 'Pa' Waldrip Honored On 99th Birthday

Thursday, March 16, marked another milestone in the life of W.F. (Pa) Waldrip, who celebrated his 99th birthday in the home of his son and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ford Waldrip at O'Brien.

Also on hand to help honor Pa on his birthday were his other children, Lloyd and his wife Allene of Knox City, and Lynn and his wife Margie of Odessa, and Ruie and her husband James Dutton of Earth, Texas.

The birthday honoree looks at least 30 years younger than his age and according to him, he has nerves steady as a 'rock'.

When asked what he attributes his long life, Mr. Waldrip, with a wry smile, said, "Tending to my own business and not letting anything upset me."

For the most part, Mr. Waldrip's only problems are the fact that he is confined to a wheelchair because of crippling arthritis, and he experiences some difficulty in hearing. However, one could never suspect that either is a problem because he always has a smile on his face.

Born two miles south of Iredell on March 16, 1879, his parents were the late James Frank Waldrip and the former Martha Anne Waldrop. He married Minnie Morgan July 24, 1902 at Iredell. They moved to Stamford in 1905 from Bosque County and made a crop 15 miles east of Stamford in 1906. That fall, they moved west of Knox City in the Needmore area where they stayed nine years and then lived two miles west of Rochester for 11 months before buying their home place two miles north of Knox City in 1916.

Soon after Mrs. Waldrip's death on November 1, 1968, Mr. Waldrip moved to the Brazos Valley Care Home January 1, 1969, to make his home.

His eldest son, Ansel, died May 21, 1969.

A remarkably well-read, well-educated man, Mr. Waldrip told his daughter that he awoke during the night recently, and wondering if he were in his right mind, he tested himself. She
