Lifestyle is often linked to the diseases which now are lives and suffering.

We may decide our own link to those diseases by how we eat, drink, smoke and exercise--and how we handle stress, anger and other emo-

tions. Some choices an individual can make to ensure health start with five "take care of yourself" guidelines, many of which focus on lifestyle.

Some recommendations are as follows: -Establish sound health

habits, such as balanced nutrition, regular exercise and careful dental hygiene.

-Recognize early warning signs and symptoms of disease and take action to prevent extreme consequences of the disease.

-When necessary, use the health-care system efficiently

mended treatment. -Use health care products effectively

-Learn and apply correct health-care procedures, such as cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, in cases of emergency and illness.

OLDER FOOD PRESERVATION METHODS MORE ENERGY EFFICIENT

For energy-efficient home food preservation, older methods, such as home canning and drying, leave freezing "out in the cold."

Food preserving by freezing is an "extravagance" energy-wise, although it is probably the quickest and easiest method.

For example, it takes more energy to keep corn frozen longer than 22 days than it would to process it in a can.

Also, keeping a one-pound package of corn frozen for a year uses 17 times more energy than it does to manufacture a can to put it in.

For consumers interested in more energy-efficient methods of preserving foods, it is recommended to return to older methods, such as canning and drying.
