Salutatorian is David Anderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Anderson. His grade average for the past four years is 94.41.

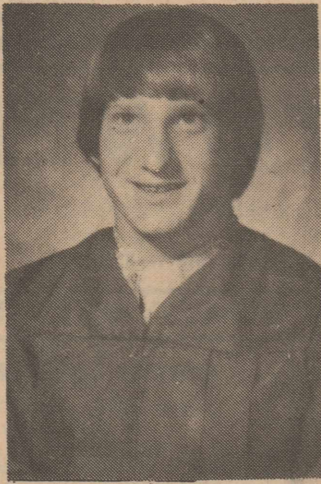

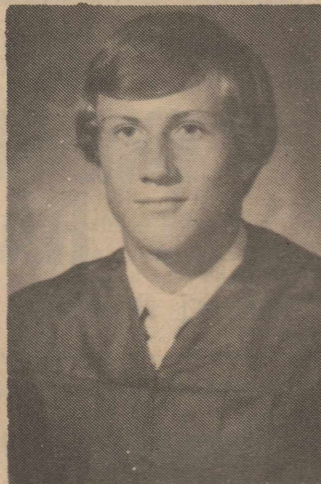

Holcomb commented that this was an exceptional group of students to attain such high grade point averages and that it was the first time in a number of years to have this many honor students.

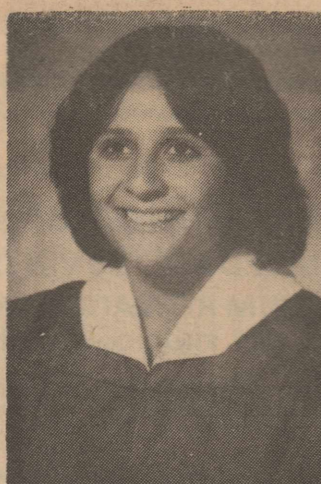

## Local Group Meets With City Council

A good representation from various organizations was on hand Monday afternoon to meet with the City Council for a public hearing concerning the 1978-1979 city budget of approximately \$200,000.00 and Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$3,688.44 in trust and \$23,766.00 which the city expects to receive in the 1978-1979 fiscal year.

The hearing was held to permit citizens to present oral or written comments on possible uses for funds.

Present were Mayor Kenneth Crowner and city secretary Faye Rallsback along with council members L.V. Worley, Celso Gonzales, Vernon Bridges, Charles Aurburg, and Cornie Covey.

A steering committee composed of David Counts, Buster Lowrey, David Albus, Bob Harrison, Charles Clarke, and Tommy Kent had met earlier and discussed the general need for a building here that could be used for a meeting place, or auditorium, as well as providing a place for the local square dance club.

The need had been presented to the council at an earlier meeting and Mayor Crowner told the group Monday afternoon that action had been taken by the council to set aside funds in the amount of \$6,000.00 for 1978, 1979, and 1980 for the building provided a suitable location, along with a clear title, could be submitted.

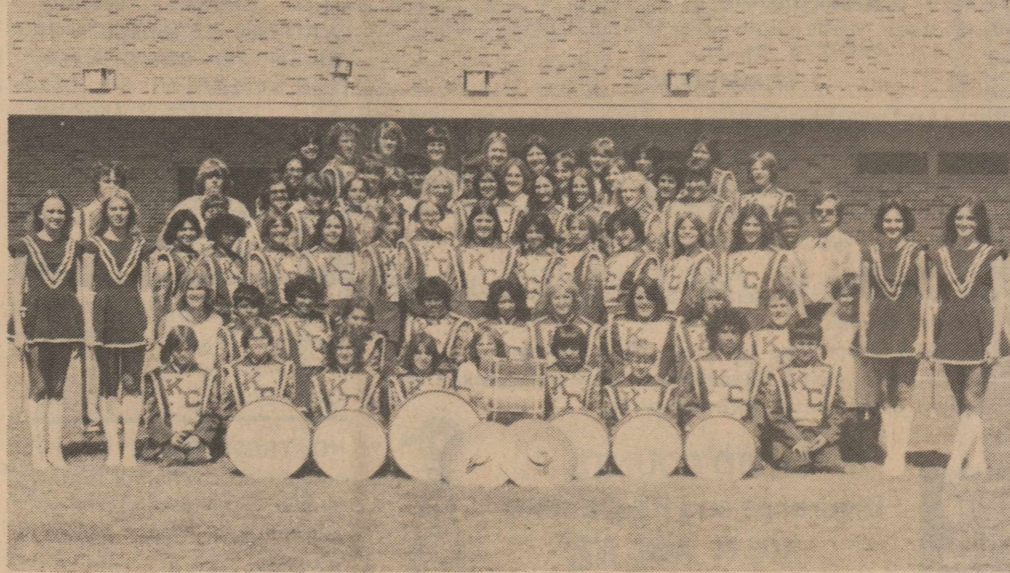

## Delegates Elected By AAM Office

In a called meeting of the local American Agriculture Movement last Friday morning, a good representation was on hand at the Knox City Strike Office to elect Herbert Bellinghausen as delegate with David Albus alternate to represent the local office at future district and state meetings.

Bellinghausen, along with Ross Mac Oliver, attended a meeting in Fort Worth Wednesday of last week where the state was organized into five districts for the AAM.

The men reported that projected plans call for one person to be employed the year round to stay in Washington, D.C. as 'watch dog' and report to the state and local offices matters of legislative importance.

A fund has begun in a Lubbock bank for the Washington employee and several local members contributed individually to this fund. A total of \$100,000 must be reached before the individual is hired, Bellinghausen said, and if the total is not reached, all monies will be refunded.

Local, district, and state delegates receive no salary but members did vote to reimburse travelling expenses.

Other matters of business included, a discussion of maintaining a budget for the local office. AAM does not assess dues, but it was agreed that members would be asked to voluntarily contribute \$5.00 per month or \$60.00 annually for necessary expenses. All members were asked to take their contributions by the local strike office or mail them in to Box 807, Knox City, Texas 79529. Members agreed that the AAM has been successful in calling national attention to the plight of farmers and ranchers throughout the area and it is vitally important that interest continues.

For this reason, another meeting of the area farmers and ranchers is being set by AAM on Tuesday night, May 23, in the school cafeteria at 8:00 o'clock.

## Voters Okay Hill, Stenholm

Approximately 40 percent of voters in Knox County went to the polls Saturday to cast their ballots.

With 3,000 registered voters, more than 1,200 votes were cast within the county to elect a new governor without a runoff, choose the two top candidates for the June 3 runoff in the 17th congressional race, re-elect a county commissioner, and nix the propositions to increase interest rates on loans of \$5,000 and under and to allow parimutuel betting in Texas.

The two Knox City boxes accounted for the largest turnout within the county.

## Kelly Beaver On Championship Team

Kelly Beaver of Lubbock, granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Carvee, kicked the winning score recently to win her team the championship in Freshman II Girls' Division of the Lubbock Soccer Association.

Kelly, daughter of Mrs. Barbara Beaver, is a member of the Pumas, which defeated 'Charlie's Angels' 2-1 in the final game of the season. Both teams were untied and undefeated going into the last game, and it was the first time the Pumas were scored on all season.

The team will be playing in tournament competition in Dallas June 10-11.

A win in Dallas makes the Pumas eligible for further competition in Florida.

In the county's only contested race, Bobby Roberson was re-elected to his third term as County Commissioner, Precinct Two, with 262 votes. His opponent Boyd Meers had 207.

## Farm and Ranch News

It is almost time for Rolling Plains ranchers to be thinking about mesquite brush control with aerially-sprayed herbicides.

To determine if the right conditions exist to provide a good kill, it is necessary to take a look at weather conditions beginning last fall. Herbicides used to control mesquite are growth-regulating chemicals that must be translocated from the leaves to the stems and the roots to be most effective. Translocation is strongly influenced by growing conditions at the time of the herbicide application.

Research has found that the highest percent of kill occurs when monthly rainfall exceeded the long term averages on each of the six months prior to spraying. On test at six ranch locations using 2,4,5-T when these six months had above aver-

age rainfall the percent of kill was 77 percent. When only four months had above average rainfall this dropped to 42 percent.

Based on 18 test where rainfall prior to spraying was above average in only two months prior to application, root kill was only five percent.

With the amounts of rainfall received in Knox County this past few months, producers should expect a low rate of kill on mesquite. Mesquites with little foliage are in poor condition for spraying.

If producers do want to spray mesquites this spring, the time of application is very important to percent of kill. Mesquite should not be sprayed until the leaves have fully extended and have turned from a light green to a dark lush green color and have small pods developing. Soil temperature at eighteen inch depths should be at least 75 degrees F or above for best results.

To obtain the most benefit from mesquite control, the rancher, should follow herbicide spraying with good ranch management practices. Sprayed areas should be deferred from grazing at least three months.

Control of mesquite is a management problem. The success of controlling mesquite with herbicide depends on many factors. To make sure the maximum benefit is obtained from the money spent on mesquite control, apply herbicides at the proper time under the proper climatic conditions and follow up with sound range management practices.

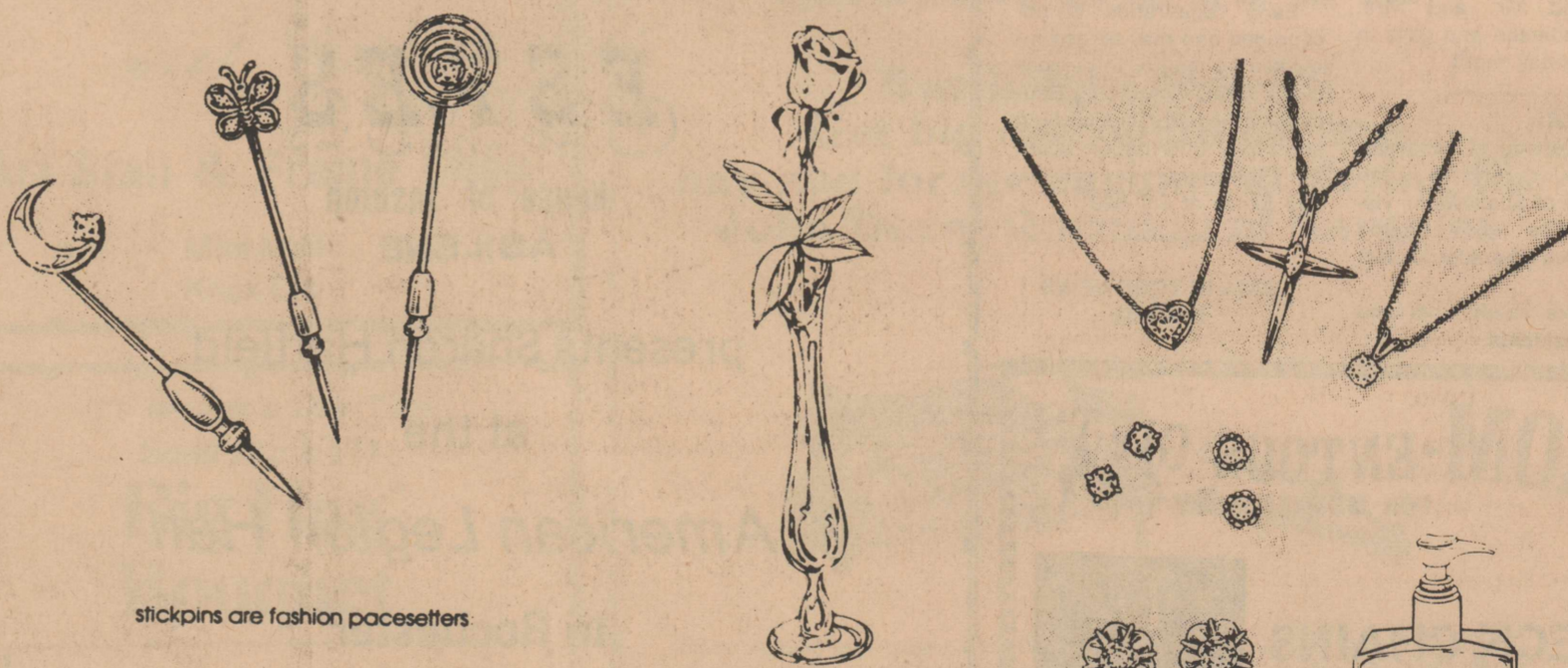

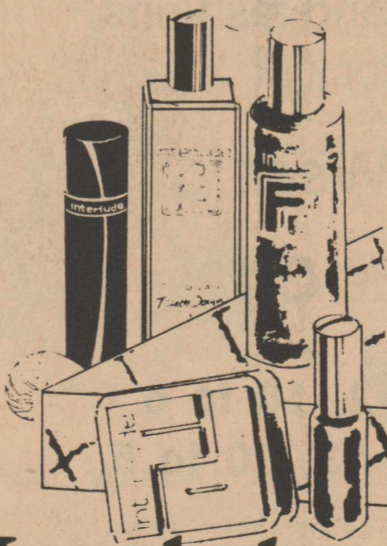

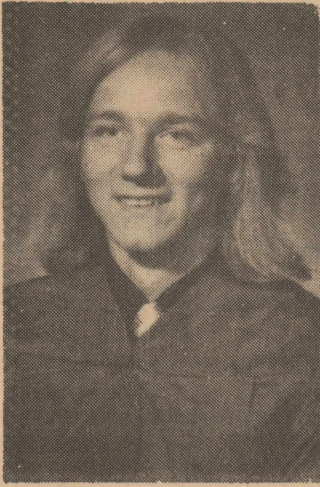

## VRJC To Offer ECA Course

Vernon Regional Junior College in cooperation with the Texas Department of Health Resources will offer an Emergency Care Attendant (ECA) course. The ECA course is scheduled from 6:30 to 9:30 on Monday and Thursday beginning June 1 and ending July 13.

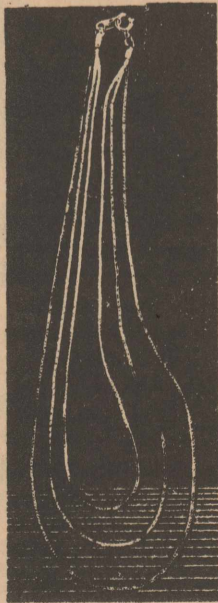

# Burleson Offers Academy Info

WASHINGTON, D. C. --Congressman Omar Burleson reminds young persons who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies, for the class entering July 1979, he uses a competitive method of selection so that all young persons who meet the necessary requirements may be considered.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland; the Military Academy at West Point, New York; the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. These institutions offer a fine education and a great opportunity for service

to their country by young persons who wish to follow a military career.

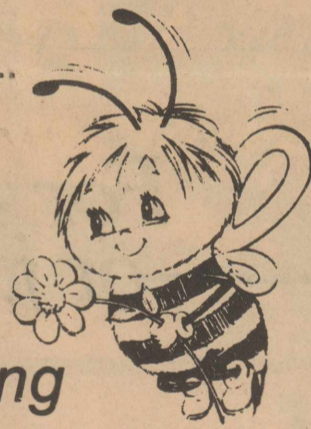
In order for Congressman Burleson to consider applicants, a candidate must meet these requirements: (1) must be a U.S. citizen; (2) must be over 17 and a legal resident of the 17th Congressional District; (3) must be under 22 years of age on July 1, 1979; (4) must never have been married; (5) must be physically fit, including excellent eyesight; (6) must have a good high school record.

Burleson stress that political influence is not a factor in

his nominations to the Academies. The important thing is not who you know but what you are.

Interested young person who meet the above requirements should write Congressman Omar Burleson, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515, no later than July 16. Examinations will then be scheduled as a rating device to set up slates for nomination. The competition is keen but Congressman Burleson wants to assure that all young persons who are interested in a military career may have an opportunity to compete for nomination.

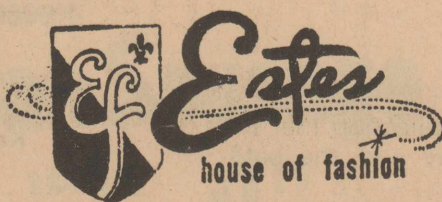
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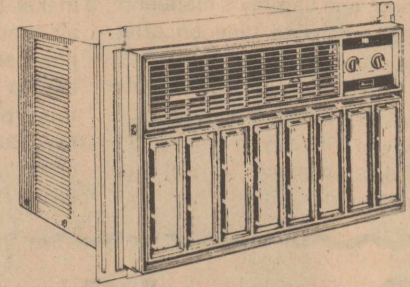

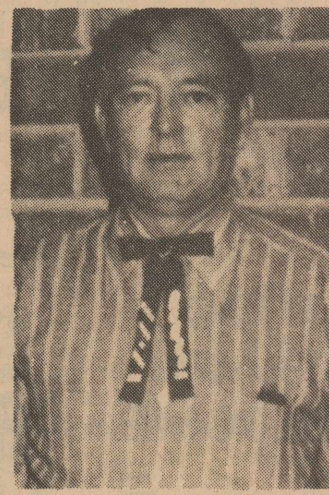

Citizens National Bank, the first new bank to be established in downtown Colorado Springs since 1907, recently opened its doors for business with a former O'Brien-Knox City man Joe Swearingen, as its vice president.

# Your Social Security

## APPLYING FOR A SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

Everyone, regardless of age or place of birth, must now submit evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful admission status when applying for a social security number, James Harper, Social Security Branch Manager in Vernon, said today.

These procedures are intended to help protect the applicant's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number Harper continued.

In addition, a person 18 or over who is applying for a number for the first time, must apply in person.

The best evidence of a person's age and U.S. citizenship is a birth certificate.

Harper stated. This should be submitted if possible. But, if it is not available, other documentary evidence can be used.

Evidence of identity should include documentation which shows the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information.

Applicants not born in the U.S. should submit evidence of their U.S. citizenship or their immigration documents showing they are lawfully admitted to the U.S.

All documents submitted as evidence are subject to verification with the agency which issued them, Harper said.

A person should allow plenty of time to get the number. It takes three to four weeks to issue the number and deliver the card after all required evidence has been submitted.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a social number," can be obtained at the Vernon Social Security Office. The leaflet tells what kinds of evidence can be used. The office is located at 1701 Cumberland and the telephone number is 817-552-9346.

NEED EVIDENCE TO GET DUPLICATE SOCIAL SECURITY CARD

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must now present evidence of identity before the new card can be issued, James Harper, Social Security Branch Manager is Vernon, said.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done, Harper stated.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity, the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

Harper said the new rules are intended to help protect the person's social security record, assure that it is complete and accurate, and to prevent anyone else from misusing or abusing the person's social security number.

Evidence of identity should include documentation which shows the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information.

Applicants not born in the U.S. should submit evidence of their U.S. citizenship or their immigration documents showing they are lawfully admitted to the U.S.

All documents submitted as evidence are subject to verification with the agency which issued them, Harper said.

A person should allow plenty of time to get the number. It takes three to four weeks to issue the number and deliver the card after all required evidence has been submitted.

A free leaflet, "Applying for a social number," can be obtained at the Vernon Social Security Office. The leaflet tells what kinds of evidence can be used. The office is located at 1701 Cumberland and the telephone number is 817-552-9346.

NEED EVIDENCE TO GET DUPLICATE SOCIAL SECURITY CARD

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must now present evidence of identity before the new card can be issued, James Harper, Social Security Branch Manager is Vernon, said.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. This can no longer be done, Harper stated.

In addition to submitting evidence of identity, the person's application will be checked against the records at social security headquarters. If all the information checks out, a new card will be issued.

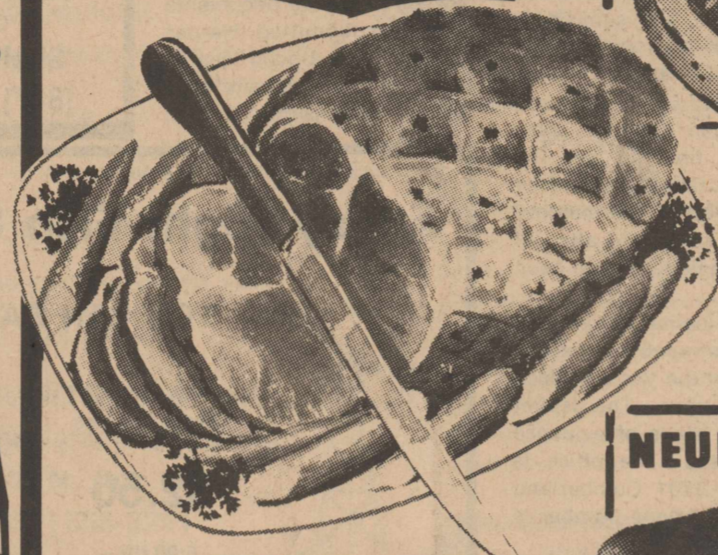

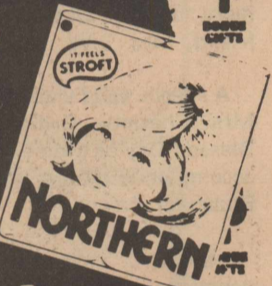
