





# **Dailies** Endorse Stenholm

#### Dear Billye Bess,

I believe your readers will be interested in some figures I put together, which I believe display one of our nation's more serious problems -- "inflation."

Last week I was advised by the people who furnish bread for our cafeteria that a 11/2 pound loaf of bread would cost 49 cents--this was the second increase this school year. When school opened bread was costing 421/2 cents, later it went to 46 cents and now 49 cents. That represents a 15 percent increase in ten months. Bread, by the way, isn't the only item going up.

Below is a chart that demonstrates the increases since 1971 and their relations to the price Knox City area farmers receive for wheat.

In twenty-three years as superintendent, I have never had to subsidize a food service program, but this inflation problem is making realistic management impossible.

In our school, we serve about 75,000 meals a year and our expenses this year will be about \$64,000 and our income (I hope) about \$64,000.

# Your Social Security

### SOLVENCY OF TRUST FUND

During the past few years the American public has received more information about the Social Security Trust Fund than about any other part of the social security system. Unfornately, most of the news concerned negative aspects of the fund and problems that had arisen concerning its future solvency. The Social Security Administration never denied any financial problems, and the reserves in the Trust Fund were used to offset the deficits. Although no social security beneficiaries were in any immediate danger of losing their benefits, these "sensationalized" stories frightened many beneficiaries and contributors to the trust fund. With the passage of the 1977 amendments, the

Security Office, said today. 'New legislation signed into law on December 20 included the following provisions:

1. Beneficiaries OVER 65 can earn as much as \$4,000 without any cutback in their social security checks. Once a person's earnings exceed \$4,000 for 1978, \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 in earnings

2. People UNDER 65 can receive all benefits if their annual earnings are \$3,240 or less. The \$1 for \$2 reduction applies to earnings above \$3.240.


3. The retirement test monthly provision in the law in effect through 1977 has been eliminated except for the first year a beneficiary receive benefits. In 1977, for example, a person could receive his social security check for any month he didn't earn

# **Stenholm Holds News Conference**

Charles Stenholm made public Wednesday, May 24, a private decision he made the weekend before. Stenholm answered his opponent's challenges and accusations in a news conference at his Abilene campaign headquarters.

Stenholm leader in the May 6 Democratic primary for the 17th Congressional District, explained his decision on a public debate and defended his position concerning other attacks made by his opponent.

On Sunday, May 21, Stenholm mailed a letter to both Abilene television stations stating his reasons for declining a proposed debate between the two candidates.

"I had not planned to make this personal letter public when I mailed it last Sunday. said Stenholm today. "But developments this week have caused me to change my mind.'

"In recent days my opponent has made repeated calls for a public debate. I have no intention of engaging in such a spectacle. The people of the 17th District are entitled to know my reasons," stated Stenholm

"The things you have been hearing from the opposition camp since the primary are simply not the way I think a campaign should be conducted," stressed Stenholm.

"I repeat my position that we do not want more federal aid to education," said Stenholm. "Recent figures released by the Texas Education Agency indicate that eight percent of the money required to operate the local school districts in Texas for the 1976-77 school year came from the federal government.'

Continuing to answer his opponent's attacks Stenholm said. "A call for one third or 331/3 percent funding from Washington is, to me, inviting absolute dictation from bureaucrats if what we are getting now is any indication.

"I do believe in federal grants and aids directly to students, primarily when

they are to be repaid at low interest rates," continued Stenholm. "I do believe in impacted aid when the government is responsible for imposing burdens on a local school system. I do insist that we must retain local control. and it seems obvious to me that this is hardly possible if we accept more and more
