Dear Billye Bess,

I believe your readers will be interested in some figures I put together, which I believe display one of our nation's more serious problems--inflation.

Last week I was advised by the people who furnish bread for our cafeteria that a 1 1/2 pound loaf of bread would cost 49 cents--this was the second increase this school year. When school opened bread was costing 42 1/2 cents, later it went to 46 cents and now 49 cents. That represents a 15 percent increase in ten months. Bread, by the way, isn't the only item going up.

Below is a chart that demonstrates the increases since 1971 and their relations to the price Knox City area farmers receive for wheat.

We can see what our farmer's problems are by looking at this chart. Now how would you like to manage a school cafeteria that is only supposed to break even with these kind of wild price increases on basic commodities?

In twenty-three years as superintendent, I have never had to subsidize a food service program, but this inflation problem is making realistic management impossible.

In our school, we serve about 75,000 meals a year and our expenses this year will be about \$64,000 and our income (I hope) about \$64,000.

I hope the voters will consider this when they go to the polls on June 3.

This does not leave many hours left in the 24 hours in a day. I do not even like to think of that, we would never get farmers pleased about the trailers.

Rhodes Answers TV Audience; Sets Rally

Democratic congressional candidate A.L. (Dusty) Rhodes answered more than two dozen questions Friday evening on a thirty minute television call-in show.

Rhodes was asked by the moderator of the program why he decided to run for Congress. "I really felt that I could extend my years of service," the candidate began. "I've just always felt that there would be a time."

Rhodes continued, "to do something that might be significant for this country that I love. I just want to try to express to everyone listening tonight that I may be of service. I've practiced law for 20 years. I've tried to help people that needed me. Therefore, having a background in law I think is an asset because I can better serve those who really need me.

In the Congress you're really dealing with law...you're really dealing with how to represent people. More than 80% of the job of a congressman is to represent the individual needs of the people, to cut through red tape in Washington, and to serve those who elected you

in their needs and wants. Yes, being a lawyer is an asset, and I think that it's one of the better assets that I am able to offer the people of the 17th District.

It was also brought out during the show that the Dusty Rhodes to Congress campaign will hold a rally at the Abilene Civic Center on Thursday evening, June 1, beginning at 7:30. Country western singer Tammy Wynette and "Hee Haw" stars Jana Jae and Tweed will perform. The public is invited to attend the free performance.

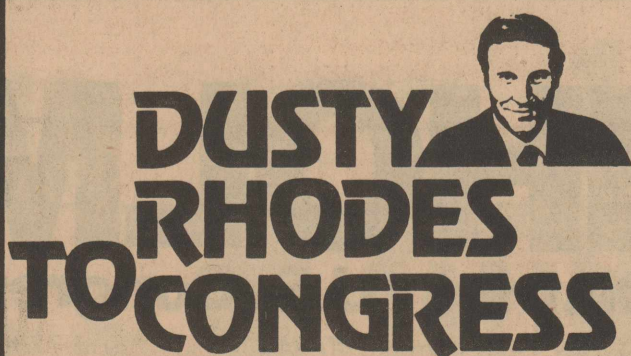

Comparison table between The Record and Dusty Rhodes regarding various qualifications.

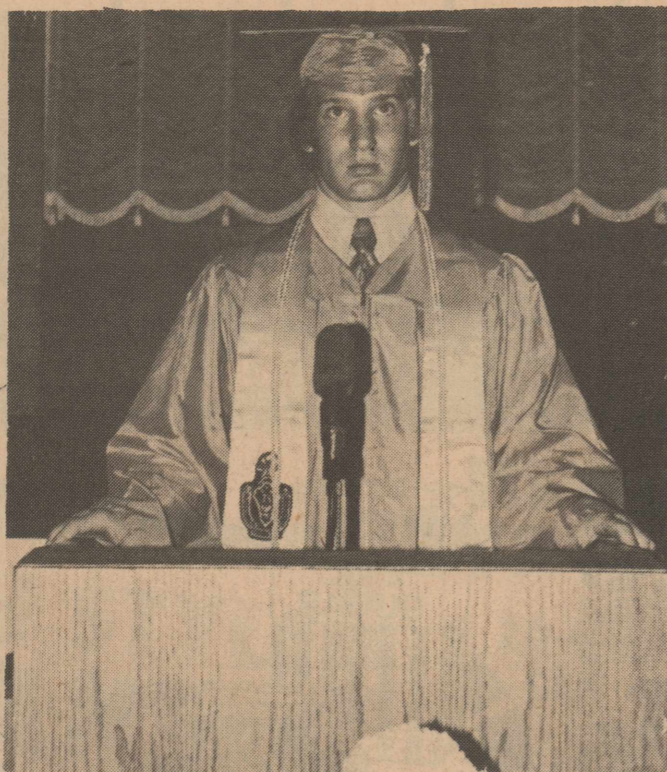

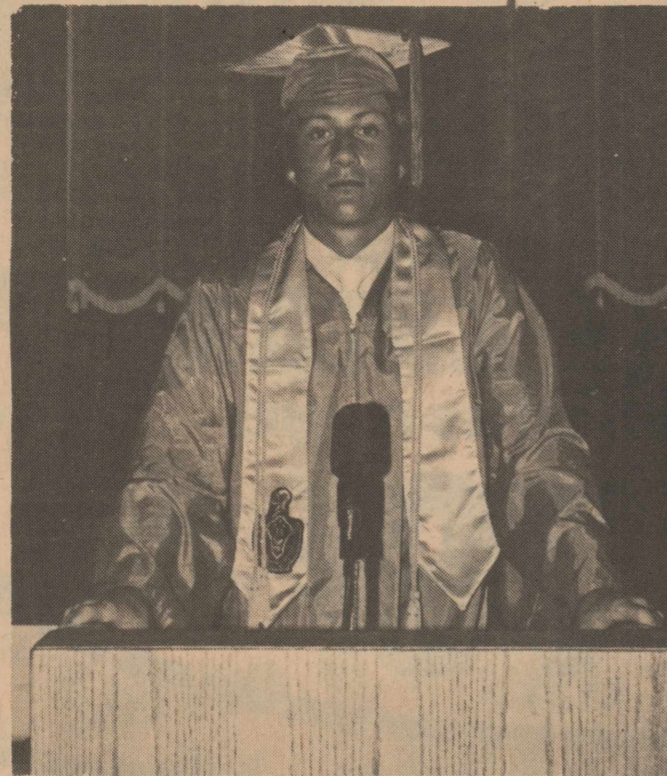

## Your Social Security

### SOLVENCY OF TRUST FUND

During the past few years the American public has received more information about the Social Security Trust Fund than about any other part of the social security system. Unfortunately, most of the news concerned negative aspects of the fund and problems that had arisen concerning its future solvency. The Social Security Administration never denied any financial problems, and the reserves in the Trust Fund were used to offset the deficits. Although no social security beneficiaries were in any immediate danger of losing their benefits, these "sensationalized" stories frightened many beneficiaries and contributors to the trust fund. With the passage of the 1977 amendments, the entire program has been assured financial stability well into the next century. Therefore, we will have sufficient time to work out any foreseeable problems that may arise in future years well before they become a threat to the trust fund.

Although the measures taken to insure financial stability will result in higher social security taxes, no one should have to worry about "social security bankruptcy scare stories" that a few self-proclaimed "investigative reporters" have seen fit to write for their own personal gain.

Just remember that any statements or implications that the social security trust funds are in a state of financial insolvency or will become insolvent within the course of this century are simply not true regardless of the sources and however the statement is phrased. ### RETIREMENT TEST

"Social security beneficiaries (except those receiving disability benefits) will be allowed to earn more in 1978 and still receive their full social security benefits," James Harper, branch manager at the Vernon Social

Security Office, said today. "New legislation signed into law on December 20 included the following provisions:

1. Beneficiaries OVER 65 can earn as much as \$4,000 without any cutback in their social security checks. Once a person's earnings exceed \$4,000 for 1978, \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 in earnings.

2. People UNDER 65 can receive all benefits if their annual earnings are \$3,240 or less. The \$1 for \$2 reduction applies to earnings above \$3,240.

3. The retirement test monthly provision in the law in effect through 1977 has been eliminated except for the first year a beneficiary receives benefits. In 1977, for example, a person could receive his social security check for any month he didn't earn over \$250 or work at his business, regardless of the total earnings for the year. This will no longer be true.

4. Provisions are in the new law to increase both the \$4,000 and the \$3,240 amounts each year, starting with 1979," Harper explained.

Farmers now have a permanent representative in Washington, employed by the American Agriculture Movement, to further the aims of the AAM and also to inform all the state delegates whenever anything concerning agriculture is a topic on Capitol Hill. The delegates will then notify the farmers in their respective districts, so that farmers can keep abreast as to what is going on in Washington and contact their representative and senators, letting them know how farmers feel about the issues at hand.

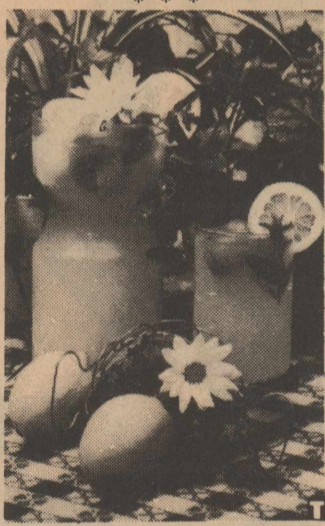
