Funeral services for Knox City native Kenneth Earl White of 5007 38th Street, Lubbock, were held Wednesday morning, July 12, at ten o'clock in the First Baptist Church in Knox City. The Rev. John Gillispie, church pastor, and the Rev. Donald White of Fort Worth officiated. Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. White, 56, was dead on arrival at Highland Hospital in Lubbock Sunday, July 9, at 9:30 a.m., after becoming ill at his residence. Death was ruled due to natural causes.

Born December 19, 1921, in Knox City, he served in the U.S. Army during World War II. On February 1, 1947, he married Laura Mae Buchanan in Knox City and the couple moved to Lubbock in 1960. Mr. White was the Parks Superintendent Foreman for the City of Lubbock and was a member of the Gillespie Baptist Church.

Yard of the Month honors for July have been awarded to Mr. and Mrs. T.B. Bingham who live at 710 South Central Avenue.

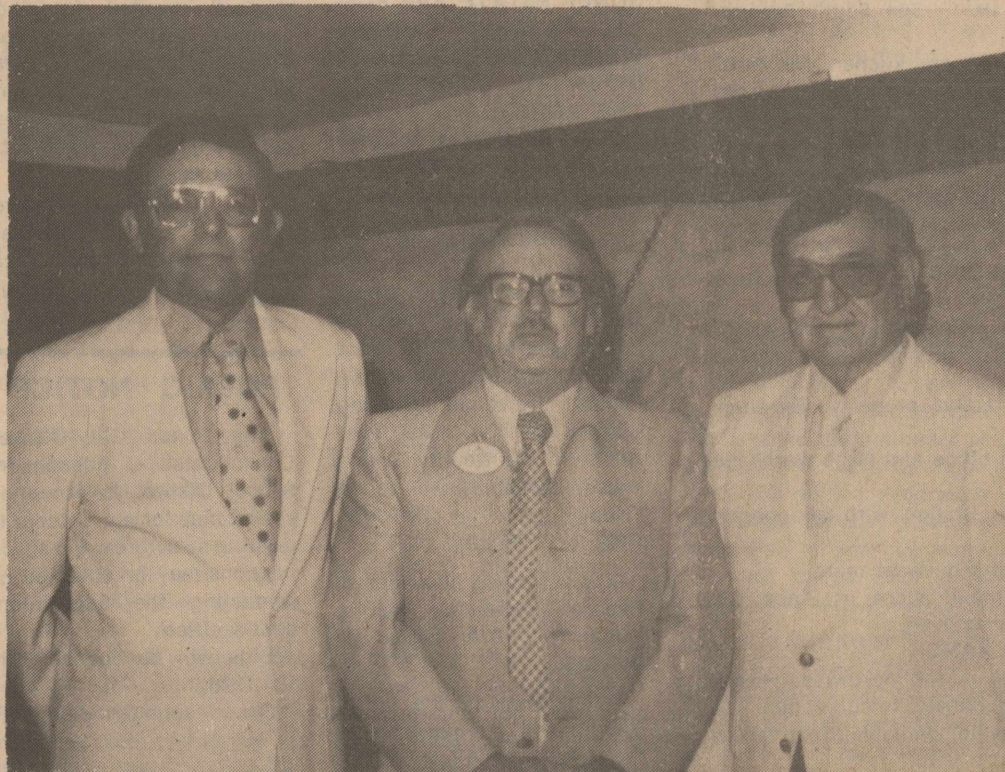

## WEATHER SUMMARY FOR JUNE FURNISHED BY PLANT MATERIALS CENTER

June 1978, was generally warm and windy. Temperatures for the month averaged 83 degrees Fahrenheit, 4 degrees above the 12 year average of 79 degrees. The warmest temperature recorded was 106 degrees on the 25th. The coolest temperature recorded was 60 degrees on the 9th. June had 13 days when temperatures were 100 degrees or higher.

Moisture for the month totalled 1.94 inches which is .54 inches above the 12 year average of 1.40 inches. No moisture has been received since the 13th. Precipitation received since January 1st totals 6.84 inches which is 3.90 inches below the 12 year average of 10.74 inches.

## Youth Place In Open Horse Show

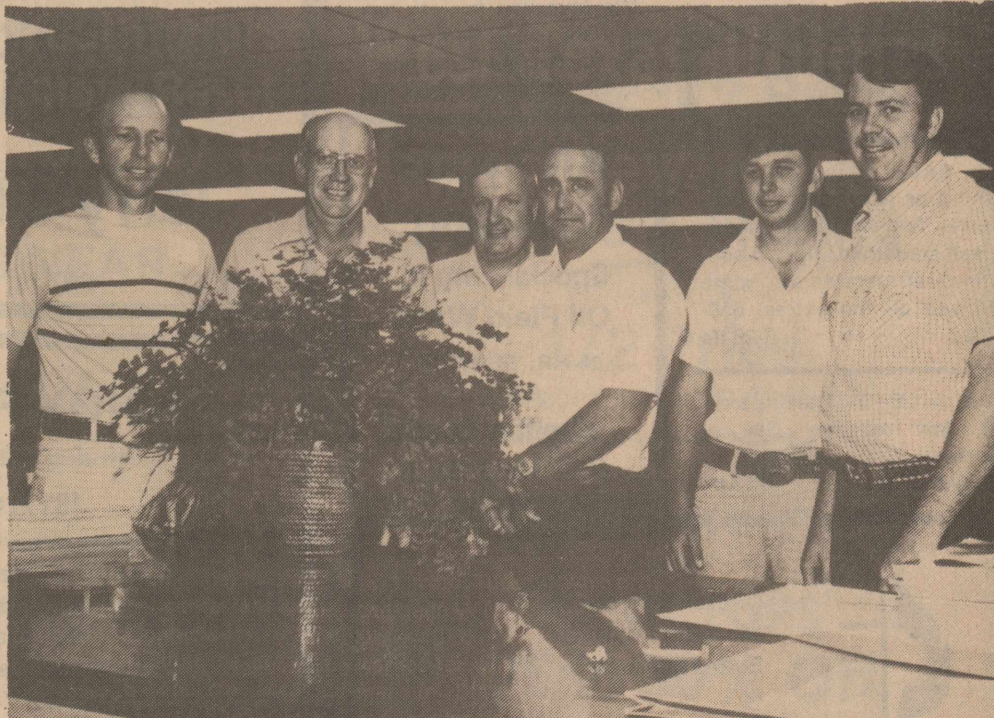
Two Benjamin youths and one from Knox City placed in the recent Baylor County Open Youth All-Trophy Horse Show at Seymour.

## Texas 46th Lowest In Tax Comparison

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Monday that Texas ranks 46th lowest among the state when comparing state taxes as a percent of personal income.

The all-important measure of tax burden for fiscal year 1977 showed Texas state tax collections were 5.82 percent of personal income, compared to a national average of seven percent.

California's state taxes were 7.75 percent of personal income and New York's 8.04 percent, Bullock noted.

He added that Texas' neighbor states stacked up as follows: Oklahoma, 6.91 percent; Louisiana, 7.89; Arkan-

sas, 7.16; and New Mexico, 9.34.

The analysis was part of "fiscal notes", the monthly financial statement published by the Comptroller's Office.

The current issue also contains reports on federal grants to Texas state and local governments and portions of President Carter's tax program that are of special interest to state and local governments.

Bullock noted that revenues of \$732.5 million in February and \$580.1 in March brought fiscal 1978 receipts to \$4.3 billion, a 12 percent increase over the previous year.

Meanwhile, he added, February expenditures of \$641.7 million and March outlays of \$660.9 million brought fiscal 1978 spending to a total \$4.64 billion, an 18 percent hike over fiscal 1977.

The state closed its fiscal books at the end of March with a cash balance of \$1.4 billion, he said.

## TET Announces Tax Relief Priorities

Texans for Equitable Taxation, the statewide association of property taxpayers, announced their priorities for tax relief in the forthcoming Special Session at a recent news conference in Austin.

According to TET's Executive Director Michael Moeller, the group will push for constitutional amendments to tax agricultural land on its productivity and abolish the State ad valorem tax. He said TET would also support a bill increasing the State inheritance tax exemption from \$25,000 to \$200,000 with provisions for future increases due to inflation.

He said that proposals to limit State taxes could easily lead to higher local property taxes and should be studied carefully before the Legislature tries to act on them. He pointed out that TET has consistently stood for shifting the tax burden from home and landowners to more broad-based State revenue sources and that property owners should be suspicious of any State tax limitation proposal which might lead to higher local property taxes.

Moeller emphasized that TET will need the active support of every concerned property taxpayer in Texas in order to have any chance of success in the Special Session.

Taxpayers in this area who wish to help TET in its efforts to reduce taxes paid by property owners should contact local TET representative W.R. Baker in Knox City.

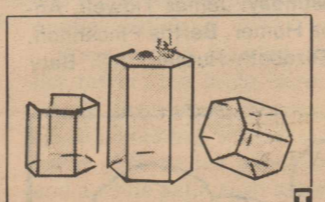
