**FURNISHED BY PLANT** MATERIALS CENTER June 1978, was generally warm and windy. Temperatures for the month averaged 83 degrees Fahrenheit, 4 degrees above the 12 year

aveage of 79 degrees. The warmest temperature recorded was 106 degrees on the 25th. The coolest temperature recorded was 60 degrees on the 9th. June had 13 days when temperatures were 100 degrees or higher.

Moisture for the month totalled 1.94 inches which is .54 inches above the 12 year average of 1.40 inches. No moisture has been received since the 13th. Precipitation received since January 1st totals 6.84 inches which is 3.90 inches below the 12 year average of 10.74 inches.

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of Bermuda and St. Augustine grass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn

name, address, age, signature, or photograph. To establish identity, they must submit a second record such as a school record, vaccination record, or driver's license. Parents applying for a Social Security number for their pre-school children may supply only a birth record if no other record of identity has been established for the child.

The changes in regulations affect adults as well. They must appear in person to apply for a number or replacement of a lost card. Youths can mail in their documents (not photocopies), and they will be returned by mail after certification by an authorized Social Security employee.

Before May 15 young people did not have to submit proof of identity to get a Social Security number, and adults could get a number or replacement card by mail. Over 150 million Americans have Social Security Numbers and seven million new numbers are issued each year.

Congress in 1972 ordered the Social Security Administration to tighten up its card-issuing procedures because of concerns about the fraudulent use of Social Security numbers by illegal aliens and others. In 1973, the agency began requiring adults, resident aliens and welfare recipients to furnish proof of identity when they applied for a number. For several years foreignborn applicants of any age have had to submit evidence of their United States citizenship or their alien status to show they are lawfully admitted to the United States. Procedures for this group are not changed by the new procedures. The Social Security Administration keeps computer records of a worker's earnings and uses the information to determine eligibility for monthly payments and Medicare, Harner said that the new rules are designed to assure that a person's record is "accurate and complete". He also stated that these procedures "will help prevent another person from misusing a Social Security number, either knowingly or unknowingly."
