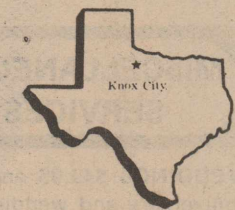

Residents Urged

Use Water Sparingly!

City officials have asked all residents to use absolutely no water except for household purposes.

According to city secretary Faye Railsback, the water situation is desperate, due to the lowered water table.

The city's last well has been put into use to help meet the demand.

One reservoir is being held full for fire usage only, according to Dean Homstad, water superintendent.

All service stations have discontinued car washing, and private well users in the city are being asked to discontinue usage as their supply comes from the same water table, Mrs. Railsback said.

Some surprising statistics about water usage include:

- Dripping faucets waste about one percent of total consumption.
- Water dripping through an opening the size of a pin hole at 40 pounds of pressure (normal tap pressure) results in the loss of 170 gallons in 24 hours. (That's a half pint per minute). Leakage through an opening the size of a pencil point at the same pressure results in a loss of 970 gallons every 24 hours.
- Your washing machine uses about 10-15 gallons per load.
- Your dishwasher uses between 5-8 gallons per load.
- Each flush of the toilet uses between 4-5 gallons.
- Evaporative cooler uses about 20-25 gallons every 24 hours.
- You personally use about 125 gallons of water a day, and the average household uses about 500 gallons a day, or 15,000 gallons a month!

City's July Tax Rebate Increases

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday announced that his office has mailed checks totaling \$19.8 million to 900 Texas cities as their July share of the local-option one percent city sales tax.

The July allocation raises to \$216.3 million the total received by the cities this year to date. This is a 13.4 percent increase over the same period last year.

Knox City's net payment this period was \$1,109.17 as compared to \$1,110.79 for the same period last year. 1978 payments to date total \$20,109.97, reflecting a 15 percent increase over the 1977 payments to date of \$17,363.35.

Area towns and the amounts of their July share include Aspermont, \$935.35; Haskell, \$2,703.17; Munday, \$869.32; Seymour, \$2,604.83; and Stamford, \$3,452.01.

Tackitt Is Named To Who's Who

Neal Tackitt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Merle Tackitt, has received word that he has been nominated for honorary award recognition and will have his biography published in the 1977-78 edition of "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

As recipient of this honor, he is also eligible to apply for \$40,000 in scholarship grants.

Recognition in "Who's Who" is a national honor reserved exclusively for junior and senior class high school students who have demonstrated leadership or achievement in either academics, athletics, extra-curricular activities or community service. Recommendations are received from thousands of high schools and youth program sponsors at the national and local levels. On a national basis, less than five per cent of the junior and senior class students are featured in "Who's Who" each year.

Neal, who will be a senior at Knox City-O'Brien High School this fall, received the defensive secondary award in varsity football last year, was named the "Most Improved Athlete" at the annual awards banquet in May, and was a member of the varsity track team which won district last spring. Water Is Lifeblood

Water is the lifeblood of any area. Therefore, it becomes the responsibility of each person to use the water the best possible way. At this time ground water is short, many wells are low or dry. Irrigation water running off our cropland is not only wasteful, it also carries sediment, chemicals and plant foods with it. These can become a pollution problem farther down stream.

Irrigation water can be collected, stored, and transported for re-use with a tail-water (irrigation water runoff) recovery system. A tail-water recovery system not only reduces pollution by collecting the water that runs off while irrigating, but also conserves irrigation water supplies and carries plant foods back onto the cropland.

The following items are needed to have a successful tail water recovery system:

Cotton Is Checked For Infestations

Emory Boring, Extension entomologist and Tommy Antilley, County Extension Agent, recently have been checking several cotton fields around the county for insect infestations. Most fields are beyond the stage where thrips can cause damage. Light to moderate bollworm activity is present although many of the eggs present are not hatching due to the hot, dry conditions. Relatively high numbers of beneficials are present in many fields.

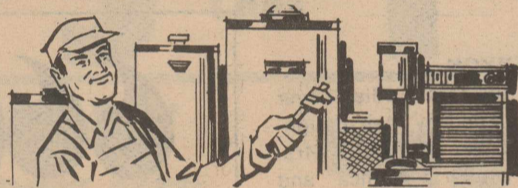
The peak bollworm egg lay has been predicted for Knox County for July 26. Producers are reminded that they need to continually be checking their fields for worm damage. Fields should be checked at least twice weekly and infestation levels determined by damage to green squares and numbers of small worms. All factors indicate this to be another heavy bollworm year but there is one practice that irrigated producers may use that will help in number of worms to reduce number of times required to spray. It has been shown that lush green cotton during peak egg lay will have heavy worm damage, usually more than fields that were stressed during this time.

Producers should try to finish watering by July 23 and start back after August 6. This will stress cotton somewhat during the peak egg lay and make it less attractive to worms. A slight reduction in yields due to less watering could be more economical than having lush green growth and taking more worm damage plus the expense of spraying more times.

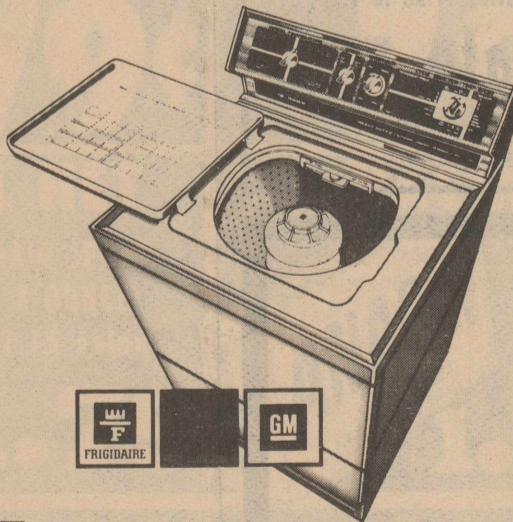

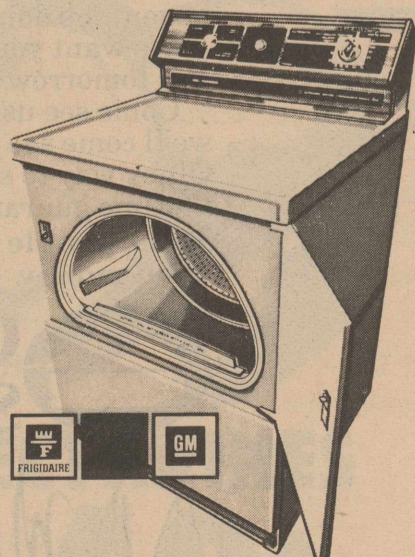

On Tuesday morning, the group went to the State Capitol to attend the special session of the Texas Legislature called by Governor Dolph Briscoe.

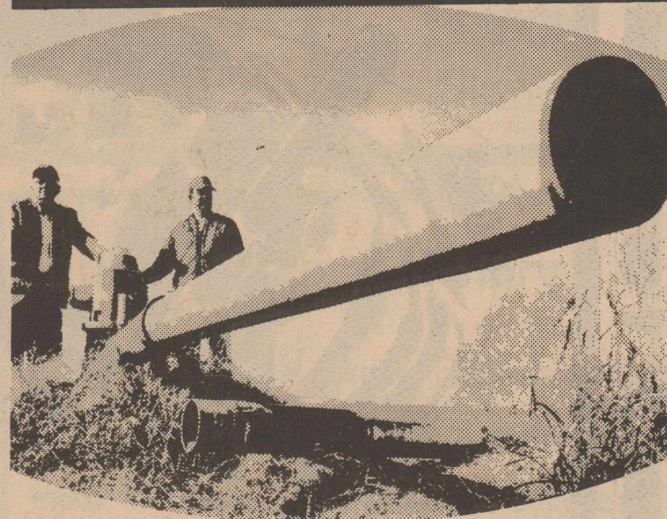

Controlling Animal Damage

Gophers are small brown furry animals that people hardly ever see. You can tell they are there because of the horseshoe dirt mounds they create on the ground while trying to push extra dirt out of tunnels that they are constructing. A single gopher can cover as much as one acre of ground, dig a tunnel as far as eighteen inches under the ground, and as wide as five inches in diameter. Their food consists mostly of fleshy roots of various plants including trees.

When damage occurs, control is needed. Gophers are most active in the fall which is an advantage to man since control measures will have little interference with growing crops. On small areas such as lawns where only a few animals are involved,

trapping is recommended. With large heavily infested areas poisoned bait is the most efficient.

When planning to trap, use specifically designed gopher traps. Look for the freshest two mounds in the yard and dig between them to find the burrow. Clear the dirt out from the runways and insert one trap in each hole so the gopher will be caught no matter from which direction he is coming. Try to place the traps back into the tunnel as far as possible. Leave the hole you dug open and leave the area for a while. Ground vibration from your walking will attract the gopher and after you leave, it will investigate. In the process of trying to cover the hole, the gopher will be caught. Be sure to secure each trap with a piece of wire or string to a stake so the gopher will not carry the trap away.

For larger areas, a milo-maize grain coated with strychnine alkaloid is used for bait. Again, between the freshest mounds, take a probe such as a pointed broom handle and lightly probe between the mounds feeling for a tunnel. If you have found a tunnel, the ground will give way easier than on regular solid ground. When probing, start about eighteen inches away from the open end of the horseshoe mound. Once a mound is found, try not to touch the floor of the tunnel because you could cause a depression and the grain deposited may be covered by the gopher.

Remove the probe and insert one tablespoon of strychnine coated grain. Cover the surface opening with leaves or grass. Place bait in several areas along the tunnel. FOLLOW LABEL DIRECTIONS on the bait you purchase. Always be sure that all poisoned grain goes underground so that birds or other non-target animals will not be injured or killed.

Under some circumstances, gophers invade a whole pasture. A gopher burrow builder machine is then used. For more information, contact Deena Pattillo, Wildlife Damage Control Specialist, Texas Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service, located at Rm. 304 Federal Bldg., Wichita Falls.
