Senate Of Texas Passes Resolution In Memory Of Bruce Campbell Sr.

Senator Ray Farabee notified Bruce B. Campbell Jr. last week that in memory of his father, the Senate of the State of Texas passed a Senate Resolution on August 7. 1978.

Senator Farabee said that Mr. Campbell played a vital part in the community of Knox City and many will remember the vitality and joy he carried with him. "Full of good wit and humor, your father lessened the burdens of many, endearing him to them. He was a great civic leader and will not be forgotten.'

The Senate Resolution reads as follows: SENATE RESOLUTION **In Memory**

of **Bruce Burnett Campbell**

S.R. NO.133 By: FARABEE WHEREAS, An era on which one man's life left an indelible mark was closed with the death, on January 26, 1978, of one of Northwest Texas' most illustrious and colorful citizens, Mr. Bruce Burnett Campbell, of Knox City; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Campbell, who died at the age of 91, was as fascinating and colorful as the Old West itself: as a child he played with the children of that last chief of the Comanches, Quanah Parker; he survived attempts on his life, train wrecks, cattle drives in the searing Texas sun, and even the great depression's onslaughts on the banking business, and for he was a banker as well as a rancher;

> Interest rates on direct home repair and replacement loans are one percent on the first \$10,000, three percent on the next \$30,000 and 6-5/8 percent above that. Vacation homes have a three percent interest rate for the full amount of the loan. The maximum loan amount on personal property is \$10,000; the maximum on real property is \$50,000. A combined limit for one borrower may not exceed \$55,000.

Business owners may receive direct SBA disaster loans of up to \$500,000 to restore real property, machinery, equipment, fixtures and inventory to pre-disaster condition. The interest rate is three percent on the first

You will never believe what we did over the weekend went back to Tucson, Arizona! Just went through there three weeks ago. The second time was no. better than the first. J.O.'s mother wanted to go visit her daughter, Olga Teague, and we took her Saturday and came back Sunday. One thing about trips like this, you do not have time to wonder about what to do. you just go and come. I can probably tell you how many fence posts there are between Las Cruces and Tucson, or something like that.

· If you heard someone yelling last Friday, it was me. I had just received word that the two appraisals I had worked so hard and long on had been accepted by the Institute of Certified Texas Assessors admissions committee and I was clear to take the CTA exam in October, I had worried over this for about two or three months, so was very happy when I received the letter. They do not give you a grade, just that your appraisals are accepted or not. Now if I can just pass the exam, they tell us it is not an easy exam to take, so I may be down there for most of the day on October 7 taking the exam. One thing about this, you find out that day if you passed or not, then you get your certificate that night. This year they are doing things a little different. The TAE Board will have two people there helping grade the exams and if you pass, you will receive your state CTA designation and also be certified by the board as Registered Professional Assessor of Texas. The TA board is the Texas State Board of Tax Assessor Examiners set up by the legislation at the last session last year. All taxing agencies, such as City, Water Districts, etc., are not going to be required to practice what the schools have been required for sometime now, True in Taxation. This will mean more city tax assessors-collectors going to the CTA schools and learning more about the tax work. Some of them are not liking it, but now they see what schools have been going through for

Local Schools Part **Of National Program**

City-O'Brien Knox C.I.S.D. is again part of the National School lunch and Child Nutrition Program, offering nutritious breakfasts and lunches each school day.

Breakfast is served at 7:45 -8:15 at the Knox City cafeteria. Breakfast is 40 cents for students and 50 cents for teachers. Lunches are 60 cents for students K-4 and 65 cents 5th - 12th grades; \$1.00 for adults.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free milk. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents and breakfast is ten cents. If a person's income is greater than those shown on the chart, but he or she has unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of his income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, his children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment. provided that the loss of income causes the family







Highway Use Tax Return Required Soon

Most owners of large truck, truck-tractors, or buses are required to file a Federal Highway Use Tax Return, Form 2290, by August 31.

The tax generally applies to single unit trucks weighing 13,000 pounds or more, to 2-axled truck-tractors weighing 5,500 pounds or more, to three or more axled trucktractors regardless of weight, to trucks of 9,000 pounds or more equipped for use in combinations, and to buses with a gross weight of more than 26,000 pounds, the Internal Revenue Service said.





The Benjamin School serves nutritious meals every school day. Lunches may be bought for the following price: Grades K through 6th, 80 cents, grades 7 through 12, \$1.00, teachers and school employees, \$1.50 and other adults \$2.00. Breakfast for all will cost 50 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents. If the parents' income is greater than those shown, but they have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of their income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child. or disaster or casualty losses, those children may still be eligible. Reduced price breakfast is 10 cents.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income durnig the period of unemployment to be at or

below the levels shown on the scale To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced priced meals for their children, per-

sons should complete an application and return it to the school. Within ten days of receiving the application, the school will let the applicant know whether or not their children are eligible. caught in the trap. Skunks rarely release their scent in darkened places. Sometimes, if the entrances are hard to get to, the live trap can be baited with semi-cooked bacon or sardines as attractants. The skunk can then be released in another area. In rural areas, the skunks can be trapped with No.1 or No.11/2 steel traps set at den entrances. Again, the traps can be baited or unbaited. Outside city limits, shooting is most effective but the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department should be contacted concerning laws on this fur bearer.

Skunk odors can be neutralized by the liberal use of a commercial deodorant, vinegar, tomato juice, or a week solution of household ammonia

WACO - Instructions from the special tax session that the members of the 66th Legislature meeting in 1979 shall write a formula for taxing farmland on productive values and a substantial increase in the inheritance tax exemption look good. So says the Texas Farmers Union. But there are other questions unresolved according to the statewide organization.

"It appears the real trick to the whole package is distinquishing between instructions to the regular session on what SHALL be done and what MAY be done," says TFU President Jay Naman of Waco. "If voters approve the measure in November, lawmakers must write provisions for a productivity tax on farmland, give homeowners some small relief and further help the aged.'

"After you've whittled away a little from the tax rolls." Naman continued. "you must make up the difference somehow. And without any real reform of the system, you still have the same basic people providing the same revenue by only a slightly altered process. It's critically important that the legislature has set aside \$450 millino for reimbursement to districts due to exemptions. But no formula was written as to HOW the state's money will be distributed. Rural school districts must place confidence in legislators to do the right thing in January. It's up to individuals and

organizations like Farmers Union to watch over the next session and see to it they do the proper thing.

Texas Farmers Union has been one of the organizations seeking an increase in inheritance tax exemptions, and the increase to \$200,000 up to \$300,000 by 1985 is praised 'for the ability it will provide farm families to hold onto hard earned equity through generations." TFU spokesmen say they also applaud the exemption on utility sales taxes and the increased relief

for homeowners and a freeze on taxes paid by the elderly. "The most disappointing thing," said Naman, "is that large corporate interests, already paying far less than their fair share, hovered over the capitol to assure they,

too, had their big bite of the tax relief pie. TFU has opposed the inclusion of large corporations, speculators and huge timber interests in the productivity tax designed for farmers. The farm organization has also



With a clause in the tax package that says the legislature "may" exclude intangible property and erase existing laws that are intended to tax all property, the Farmers Union says it fears that the issue in the lawsuits may be ruled unsupportable.

"There's nothing black or white about this package," concludes Naman. "We need to underline the good in it. We also must see to it that rural school districts benefit on equal terms with urban districts if and when the bits of relief get passed around. But the final measurement against real reform must leave us with the ultimate conclusion that those who hoped that Texas Lawmakers would provide worthwhile tax relief are doomed to disappointment.


