An early Sunday morning Labor Day weekend accident 1.3 miles north of Rotan claimed the life of a former Knox City resident. John Arthur Arnett, 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Arnett, and injured young Arnett's wife, Teresa, who suffered a broken leg and minor lacerations.

Also killed in the 1:50 a.m. two-car accident was Rotan resident Mike Fowler, 19. Injured was Terry Porter, also 19 and from Rotan.

Allen Arnwine, DPS investigating officer, said Fowler was driving over a hill when his car was in collision with an automobile driven by Arnett. The officer said Arnett was pulling onto the highway when he was struck by Fowler's vehicle throwing all the

Hounds To Meet Rule In Opener

Tradition has been broken this year as the Hounds travel to Rule for the season opener Friday night rather than meeting with Rochester for the annual opening clash. Kickoff time is set for 8:00 o'clock at Bobcat Stadium.

With two preseason scrimmages under their belt, the Hounds meet the Bobcats who are tied for fifth place with Newcastle in the District 5-B form chart published in the Sunday edition of the Abilene Reporter-News.

Coach Jimmy Rogers' Hounds have been selected to finish third behind Haskell and Crowell, selected as first and second respectively, according to the Reporter-News.

Dubbed as the "Cinderella" team the first half of last year's season with a 5-0 mark, the Hounds were leading Crowell before injuries plagued totally bombing the Hounds for the remainder of the season.

As a result, KC lost its next five games as sophomores and freshmen played a lot; however, those players gained valuable experience which should help things considerably this year.

Of the nine returning Greyhound starters, four including Jimmy Rushing, David Walling, David Counts, and Neal Tackitt, played the end position. Rogers has moved Rushing and Tackitt to the backfield where there is less

Returning at guard are Johnny Carrasco and Skipper Jackson while Doug Ray is back at tackle. David Benson is playing flanker while Domingo Garcia returns at deep

No. 3 quarterback at the start of the 1977 season was Dwayne Johnson, who played 'quite a bit' as the QB slot was 'hard hit' last season with injuries. According to officials, if he stays healthy, the position should be in good

Linebacker Kenny Cornwell and back Joe Gutierrez played enough to earn a letter last year and newcomers are tackles Greg Covey and Kyle White, guard Joe Alsides and backs Ricky Gonales, a 10.1 sprinter, and Tim Robinson.

According to Rule coach Jasper Wilson, the Bobcat club will have about 16 hands; however, eight started last year and another lettered.

Q. Every summer I pass dozens of cars spewing water and steam from their radiators. What can I do if my car ever overheats in traffic? — J. B., Brownsville

A. Pull over to the side of the road. Try putting the car in neutral and accelerating the engine slightly. This speeds up the water pump, and the fan should pull more air through the radiator. Turn off the air conditioner, but turn on the heater for additional circulation. Open the hood to help cool the engine and wait. What if the temperature doesn't drop? Shut the engine off and keep the hood up. Don't check anything immediately; a hose could burst and scald you. After the engine has cooled, add more water or coolant, or proceed to the nearest service station for

Q. While travelling through an unfamiliar town last week, I found myself turning into a one-way street the wrong way. There were no signs at the intersection to indicate that the street was one-way. How else could I have known? — V. S. W., Helotes

A. By paying attention to the pavement markings. They direct traffic just like signs. A yellow line down the center of a road divides it for two-way traffic. Drive to the right of a broken yellow line except when passing or when the right half of the road is closed to traffic. Never cross a solid yellow line, which marks a No Passing Zone. On one-way streets, the lanes are marked by broken white lines, and you may drive in any lane.

You asked about the places we had been and some things we've seen, and I apologize for not getting this to you sooner. I don't think everything could be put in one article so I just want to outline some highlights.

Burton received a fellowship to study at the Rheinische Freidrich-Wilhelms Universitaet in Spring 1977 from Rotary Clubs International, and we left for Germany in August 1977.

After a week in Munich, we took the train to Schwaebisch Hall for two months of intensive language training at the Institut there. Goethe Through this school we took field trips to Rothenburg, Speyer, and Bad Wimpfin. Rothenburg is probably the most famous of the three since it is one of the few middle age cities with the fortifications around the city still intact.

In October, we moved to Bonn. During our first weeks here, we took a beautiful drive up the Rhein River, passing through Koblenz, stopping at the Lorelei where the mythological goddess would sing to sailors causing them to forget their ships and crash into the mountain, and ending in Ruedesheim for the yearly new wine festival.

It was about this time school started at the Bonn university, and we were unable to travel very much. One weekend we did drive to Frankfurt and stopped at a reconstruction of a Roman settlement dated around the first century A.D.

We started the new year by going to Paris. Among the

Stamp Tax Collections Increasing

AUSTIN - Figures released by the State Treasury Department indicate a sizeable increase in stamp tax collec-

According to State Treasurer Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp tax collections for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1978 amounted to \$289,601,633.42, an increase of \$12,105,664.37 over collections in the previous fiscal

Collections hit an all-time monthly high in May, 1978 when \$27,071,882.90 was collected. The increase reflected during fiscal year 1978 averaged in excess of \$1 million per month.

Collections from the sale of stamps on liquor, beer, and wine amounted to \$1,836,-206.29, an increase of \$70,959.63. This tax is imposed on tourists who bring alcoholic beverages across the bridges from Mexico into Texas.





That law also automatically repeals the one percent city tax on residential utilities October 1, 1979, unless the city government votes to continue the tax.

Cities that wish, however, can by majority vote of the council repeal the city tax effective October 1, 1978 - the same day the state tax exemption becomes effective.

Bullock said that 39 cities have informed his office that they intend to repeal the city tax, while another 45 have said they will retain it.

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
