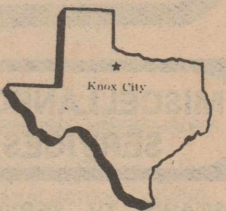

## Gliders To Be Part Of Air Show

Former Knox City resident Eddie Williams, pilot for Braniff International, along with Sam Fly, pilot for Delta Airlines, will bring their gliders to Knox City on Sunday, September 24, for the tenth anniversary celebration of the Knox City Municipal Airport. The men will trailer their gliders to Knox City, assemble them at the airport, and take off with Chris Christensen towing them with his Cessna 180.

Following their demonstration, they will land at the airport and disassemble their aircraft.

Both men have been flying gliders for ten years as a hobby. They take weekend practice flights and usually fly some two to three hundred miles per day. Williams and Fly compete in regional and national contests during the year in various parts of the country. Regional contests have been held in Cordele,

Georgia; Hutchinson, Kansas; Hobbs, New Mexico; Georgetown and Caddo Mills, Texas; Euphrata, Washington; and various other places.

All contests are sanctioned by the Soaring Society of America, which sponsors a United States team to enter international competition which is held every two years. This year's contest was held in France and two years prior was held in Australia. The 1980 contest site has not been selected but it is hoped to be in the United States.

Most glider pilots enter several regional contests annually. Held for five days, the pilots fly each day over an assigned course for speed, usually between 120 and 350 miles. This differs in the national contest as it lasts for ten days.

Winning speeds have been as high as 92 miles per hour over a 350 mile course with this speed being reached at Hobbs. The average speeds attained on cross country practice flights are 60 to 65 miles per hour.

Eddie's ground crew consists of his wife, Carol Ann, sometimes assisted by their daughters, Laci and Dede. Williams is the son of Betty and Cidy Williams and the grandson of Judge and Mrs. L.M. Williams and Mrs. Una Pray, all of Knox City.

Eddie and his family live in Lewisville.

## Late Score Wins Opener For Hounds

The Knox City Greyhounds came home victorious Friday night after winning their opening game of the season against the Rule Bobcats by a margin of 12-6; however, the winning score came with only 2:15 left in the final period of action before time elapsed giving the Hounds their first win of the season.

Quarterback Dwayne Johnson split end Ricky Gonzales on a 75-yard scoring play for the winning touchdown.

The Hounds opened the scoring in the second quarter when Johnson went over from the one, climaxing a 35-yard drive.

Home team Rule came back in the fourth quarter to "even things up" as tailback Rodney Threet raced 39 yards

for the touchdown, after passes had kept the drive alive. This set the stage for the winning touchdown although Rule had a touchdown called back in the fourth period because of a holding penalty.

Statistics for Knox City and Rule respectively were first downs, 13, 12; rushing yardage, 98, 59; passing yardage, 132, 150; passes completed 5 of 14, 13 of 26; intercepted by, 0, 2; punts, average, 3 for 20, 2 for 34; penalties, yards, 8 for 85, 8 for 73; and fumbles lost, 2, 5.

Other area contest results were Seymour 7, Munday 2; Woodson 12, Benjamin 6; Haskell 58, Anson 6; Rotan 41, Spur 14; Roby 12, Aspermont 6; Hawley 34, Rochester 0; and Throckmorton 32, Perin 0.

### School Enrollment Released

School enrollment totals for the 1978 and 79 Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District were released to the News office Monday of this week by Superintendent W.R. Baker's office. Overall total for this school year is 395 which is down from last year's beginning enrollment of 454. Grades kindergarten through fourth have the largest enrollment with 139 pupils. The O'Brien Mid-School housing grades five through eight tallied 128 students with the same number of students in high school for a total of 395.

The early childhood program enrolled 19 students this year compared to 16 last year.

As the 19th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children approaches the September 25 sale date, the West Texas Rehabilitation Center's holding pens are ready...but empty.

The more than 160 area chairmen scattered throughout Texas have all been contacted and are presently contacting their friends and neighbors asking for their donation of livestock or cash to this unique fund-raising event. Pledges are already coming into the Center via the area chairmen, and prospects look good for another record Round-Up sale.

Area chairmen are Lee Smith, Knox City, and Togo Moorhouse, Benjamin.

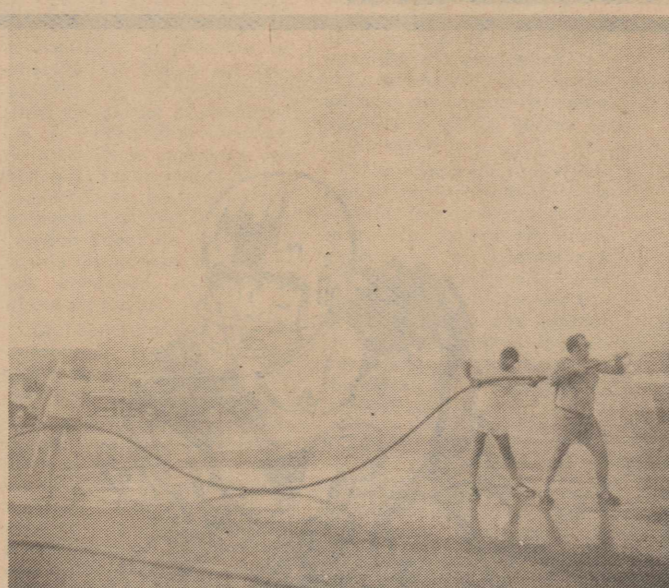
Shelley V. Smith, executive director of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center said, "This year's Round-Up just has to be the best ever, as the Center is currently faced with a deficit of \$225,000 in operational monies. Smith added: "The success of the sale, as always, is in the hands of the people at this point, and I can think of no other hands that I would rather entrust the future of the Center to than the people of the southwest. In the 19-year history of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, our friends have never let us down, in good times or bad."

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center, which celebrated its 25th anniversary this

year, is facing the inflation problem as are all members of the business community, coupled with phenomenal growth in the number of patients served. Last year the Center provided services to 6,098 handicapped individuals, and this year the patient load is running about 12.5 percent ahead of last year's - which was a record. The Center operates three campuses, one each in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder. Patients are admitted to this private, non-profit treatment and diagnostic facility without regard to race, creed, color, place of residence, or ability to pay.

The Center during 1978 must raise \$1.8 million for its operational expenses. Anyone wishing to donate either livestock or cash should contact his area chairman or the West Texas Rehabilitation Center at any of the three campuses.

The cattle sale is set for 10 p.m., Monday, September 25, at the Abilene Livestock Auction, and will be followed by a special sale at 1 p.m. Wednesday, October 4, at the Coleman Livestock Auction, and the horse sale at Abilene Livestock Auction at 1 p.m., Saturday, October 7. tors under a wide variety of conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow the seed or plants and sell them to the public.

More than 1100 strains of grasses, legumes, forbs, and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

About 9,000 pounds of seed were produced at the Center last year, mostly for trial plantings across Texas and Oklahoma. Some 5,000 woody plant seedlings were also produced as well as 250,000 rhizomes of plants that have to be propagated by planting underground shoots.

Two new plant varieties, 'Alamo' switchgrass, and 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower, were certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the Center. 'Selection 75' kleingrass is another plant released from Knox City that has gained wide acceptance throughout Texas. Over 650,000 acres of Kleingrass have been planted over the state since its release.

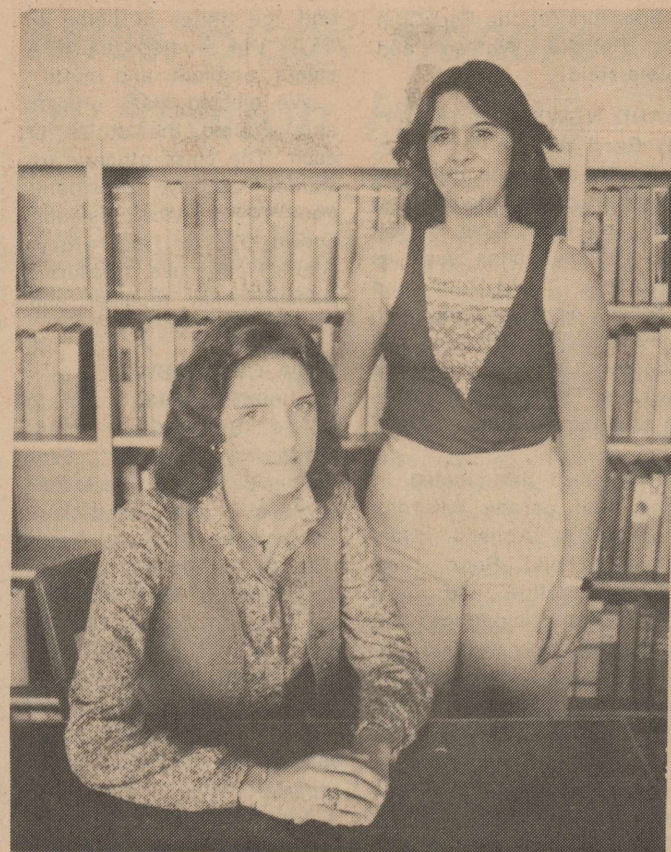

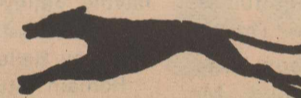

### PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1) H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation. The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity. The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons. The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased. The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased. The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies. The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing authority where the property tax is imposed. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45) S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

### NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

### NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

### NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court. The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction. The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

LA ENMIENDA PARA ALIVIO DE IMPUESTOS (H.J.R. 1) H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible; requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos articulos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo o parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposicion de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos sobre tierras agricolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva. La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exencion actual de no menos de \$3,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas. La enmienda concede una exencion de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exencion adicional de los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exencion la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas publicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse. 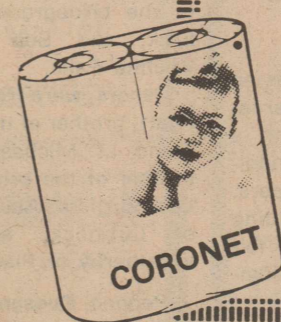
