#### Classing Office Closes Feb. 7

The Munday Marketing Services Office closed on February 7, according to Sidney Ferrell in charge.

Cotton prices dropped to the lowest level of the season as buyers offered from 650 to 700 points above CCC loan values for mixed quality lots of cotton. Some movement into the loan has begun in anticipation of prices going up in the near future.

Grades 51 and 42 each accounted for 24 percent of the cotton classed this week. Grade 52 was 21 percent and grade 41 was 13 percent. About half of the cotton classed was reduced in grade because of bark or grass. Staple 32 continued as the predominant fiber length at 66 percent. Staple 33 accounted for 23 percent and staple 31 was 11 percent. Micronaire readings, in the base range of 35 to 49, accounted for 89 percent of the cotton tested, and 10 percent miked lower than 35.

About 1400 samples were classed during the week ending February 2, bringing the season total to 56,900.

## GED Tests Scheduled In Haskell

The General Educational Development Tests will be given in the official testing center, the Haskell Junior High School Library, on Saturday, February 10, beginning at 9:00 a.m. The fee for the battery of five tests is \$20.00. An applicant is advised to bring his Social Security Number and driver's license as proper identification.

The test has five parts:
Correctness and effectiveness of expression; Interpretation of reading materials in the natural sciences; Interpretation of literary materials; and General mathematics ability. The test questions are multiple choice. There is no time limitation but most examinees take approximately eight hours to complete the test battery.

Persons eligible for testing

Be a resident of Texas or a member of the Armed Forces stationed in Texas; be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year. Applicants who have attained their 17th birthday and will enter the Armed Forces may test immediately after withdrawing from school.

To receive a certificate of high school equivalency, the examinee must: Complete the examination with a minimum standard score of 40 on each of the five tests OR an average standard score of 45 on all five tests; have attained at least their 17th birthday prior to date of testing and be out of school for one calendar year.

The GED program provides a means for determining the educational level of adults who have not completed a formal high school education. A certificate of high school equivalency may be issued to adults who successfully complete the GED examination, verifying that the holder has demonstrated a level of competence on the examination which is equivalent to that of a high school senior.

## **Texas Crude Oil Value Increases**

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said the value of crude oil produced in Texas increased last year to an average of \$8.93 per barrel, a 7.2 percent increase over the previous year.

Bullock said a study of oil production, prices and tax revenue was featured in the January issue of "Fiscal Notes," a monthly financial report published by the Comptroller's Office.

# The Comptroller reported that production of crude oil during fiscal 1978 totaled 1,059.8 million barrels, compared to 1,112.2 million barrels in 1977.

This represents a decline of 4.7 percent, the largest decrease in the last five years.

An examination of quarterly price increases show that the price per barrel for crude oil jumped from \$3.48 during the second quarter of fiscal 1973 to \$6.77 for the same period of the following

Average Texas crude oil prices per barrel have steadily increased over the past five years to the current record levels.

Even though production of crude oil in Texas is on the decline, oil production tax revenues are expected to grow at a slightly faster rate during the next three fiscal years.

Based on the Comptroller's December 1978 revenue estimate, receipts from oil production taxes will increase by 3.7, 4.0 and 3.1 percent respectively during fiscal years 1979, 1980 and 1981.

## **H-SU Students To Perform At Festival**

Aramco, the Houstonbased Arabia America Oil Company, has invited Hardin-Simmons University to participate in the second annual Saudi Arabia Music Festival in Dhahran March

In Saudi Arabia

Not only is H-SU the only foreign group to be included, but in the event of a successful trip, "it would be up to you and your people to make it an annual visit," Norman Murrell, entertainment supervisor for Aramco in Dhahran, said in extending the invitation.

The unlikely connection between a leading oil producing nation and a private Baptist university in West Texas began when Murrell was in Abilene in the fall of 1977 to visit his son, Mitch, a sophomore at H-SU, and attend that year's All-School Sing.

"Mr. Murrell was apparently very impressed with the music department here for he hopes that, with our help, the Saudi Arabian Music Festival can become an annual program of great importance to the Aramco communities," stated Dr. Jack Dean, dean of H-SU's school of music.

So in little over a month seven faculty members and three students from Hardin-Simmons will be recovering from jet lag, and eating schwarmas (an Arabian version of the burrito filled with lamb) in between teaching and performing music ranging from Handel to "Star Wars" to Chicago in one of the world's leading oil producing nations.

The H-SU musicians will perform at each of the four Aramco compound schools in Dhahran, Jeddah, Riyadh and Najmah and prepare each junior high school band for the massed performance March 8. And they will work with the Dhahran Community Chorus in conjunction with its performance of Haydn's "Te Deum" and Vivaldi's "Gloria" on March 12 and 13.

Dr. Loyd Hawthorne, choral director at H-SU, will serve as guest conductor and clinician for the choir performances and Lawson Hager, director of university bands, will direct the massed bands.

Other faculty members attending include Larry Wolz, instructor in voice, Dan McAlexander, instructor in piano and music theory, and Celeste Myall, instructor in strings.

And Abilene students Dan Gideon, John Orr and Phillip Burnaman, besides getting to miss ten days of school

and arrive home in time for

spring break, will get a chance to practice the teaching skills they've been learning by individually instructing the Saudi music

The group plans to leave for Saudi Arabia March 1 with Aramco Services Co. in Houston arranging and footing the bill for all passports, visas, vaccinations and plane reservations and living accomodations for them.

Besides helping prepare the junior high bands for the mass performance, the Hardin-Simmons musicians have been asked to perform themselves. According to Dean, they have been requested to present classical works since "the people are starved for classical artists here."

And H-SU voice instructors Jaynne Middleton and Kathy McNeil have been asked to perform solos with the Community Chorus' production of "Gloria."

The prospect of the allexpense paid trip to Arabia is an exciting one for the H-SU people.

"It's such a great opportunity that we almost have to accept," Dr. Dean said. "It's a rare opportunity for our faculty members and students to expand their world view, enhance their

festival March 8. Beginning at 8:30 that morning the bands and choirs will start rehearsals.

After lunch and more rehearsals the bands and choirs will come together for a dress rehearsal of the The studetns will be taken to homes for dinner then per-

form that evening in the Dhahran junior high school gym. After the concert everyone will be treated to a feast of schwarmas and taken to the airport for their flight home. The H-SU group plans to remain for the Community

Chorus performances and then return home. Since instruments and most of their music will be

provided for them, the Abilene people have only themselves and their luggage to maneuver on the trip. Said Dean, "The Aramco people have been wonderful in taking care of every detail. Jim Nieboer, festival chairman in Dhahran, wrote to let us know the music we should purchase ourselves and told me 'music is very difficult to get here so I cannot send you copies; money is not difficult to get here, so we can reimburse you when you arrive.' They take care of everything!





## Your Social Security

**UNIVERSAL COVERAGE** 

An independent study group established by Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. will hold a field hearing on February 6 in Albuquerque, New Mexico, on whether Social Security coverage should be mandated for federal employees and others not now covered.

Joseph Bartlett of Boston, chairman of the Universal Social Security Coverage Study Group, said the hearing will be held at the Hotel Plaza, 125 Second Street, N.W., from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Private citizens, representatives of interest groups, and public officials who want to testify should write the Universal Social Security Coverage Study Group, Department of HEW, Washington, D.C. 20201, or phone (202) 472-3590.

Additional field hearings are scheduled February 8 in San Francisco; March 6 in Kansas City, Missouri; March 20 in Miami; and April 13

in Washington, D.C. In announcing the hearing, Bartlett said, "This is a very complex issue and it is worrying many Americans. We want to obtain the views of everyone who is interested or potentially affected by it, as these views will be essential in preparing the study group's final report.'

Current some eight million individuals in the nation's work force do not participate in the Social Security program. This group included 2.5 million federal government workers and 3.7 million state and local government workers. While most federal civilian workers are not covered by Social Security, 70 percent of state and local employees do participate in the program.

Virtually all full-time federal employees are covered by a Federal Civil

Service Retirement Plan. In December, 1977, the Congress directed the Secretary of HEW to conduct an independent examination of the pros and cons of extending mandatory social security coverage to members of the work force who are not now covered

#### NO ALTERNATIVE TO SOCIAL SECURITY FOR MOST

who dissatisfied with one or another aspect of social security frequently wonder if they can get a better deal if they were able to use the money they put into social security to provide for their own financial security.

First of all, it's important to point out that for most people there really isn't any viable alternative to social security, and it's misleading to talk as if there is. People who feel they could get a bet-

ter buy through other sources often are not fully aware of what social security in-

volves.

Social security is more than just a retirement program or an insurance program for retired workers. It also pays benefits to dependents of retired and disabled workers and survivors of deceased workers. Social security taxes pay for hospital insurance for older people and people receiving disability payments for two or more years. And it also pays for Medicare for those with permanent kidney failure and require dialysis or a kidney transplant.

Social security's objective is to provide persons with adequate protection against certain risks. The real measure of its value is what happens when people retire, die, or become disabled.

To this extent readers should note that less criticism is coming from the 34 million persons - one out of seven in the population - who are currently receiving social security benefits totaling about a fourth of the annual Fedreal budget. These benefits range from an averae of \$254 for a worker retiring at age 65 in 1978 to an average of \$598 for

In general, social security benefits currently replace about 53 percent of the preretirement income of low earners; about 42 percent for average earners; and about 30 percent for earners paying maximum social security taxes over the years. The difference recognizes the fact that the low earner can least afford a

reduction in income. However, because each dependent is entitled to a certain percentage of the worker's check up to a family maximum, benefits to a low income family may amount to almost 100 percent of the worker's preretirement income.

The fact is, if a person attemped to duplicate his social security protection with private insurance, he may find it isn't possible at the same price. No insurance company currently offers a package of protection similar to social security, and efforts to match up social security provisions by purchasing individual life, disability, retirement, and health insurance plans to accomplish the same result

can be expensive. When one considers savings and various kinds of investments as a means of building future financial security, he would do well to remember that social security pays life-time, taxfree retirement benefits that increase automatically with the cost of living. He would need to be a very astute businessman to build all of those features into his investment program.

People who attain age 65 in 1978, with the average lifeexpectancy of 15 years at that age, can expect to get back at least 10 times as much as they contributed in taxes. The average worker who retires at the turn of the century may, in general, expect to get back at least his or her tax contributions, in spite of the relatively higher taxes payable. And people who become disabled or who die young may expect family benefits to be many times their contributions, both now

and in the future.

The proper way to view social security and other sources of financial security is as complementary sources rather than as alternatives. Social security is designed to serve as a floor of income protection upon which people may build up to any desired level to fit their personal life styles. The result for most people is more protection for themselves and their families than they could otherwise af-
