Burn Victim Is Flown To Parkland

Another tragedy occurred in Knox City last Saturday morning when Mary Anna Haley, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Washington, was burned over 70 percent of her body with third degree burns over approximately 45 percent of her body.

The child was burned when her dress caught fire at her home about 9:00 a.m. She was taken to the hospital an uncle, Henry by Washington, who is employed by Bob's Super Save. Dr. W.F. Thompson had an army helicopter from Fort Sill. Oklahoma, come for the child to transport her to Parkland Hospital in Dallas. According to Dr. Thompson, the helicopter had the burns victim in Dallas in less than two hours after taking off from the Knox County Hospital.

A M.A.S.T. group including the pilot, co-pilot, crew chief, and corpsman, arrived in the large chopper that can accomodate as many as three stretcher patients and two ambulatory patients besides the crew. The group, available to anyone without a direct fee, serves a large area with life-

Water Rates To Increase On March 1

Residents are reminded that water rates will increase, effective March 1. Sewer and garbage rates will remain unchanged, according to Faye Railsback, city secretary-manager. The minimum of 5,000

gallons of water will cost the consumer \$10.00 and all amounts above the minimum will cost \$1.00 per thousand. Thus, a total minimum residential bill for water, sewer, and garbage collection will be \$15.25 per month

City officials explained that the rate increase is necessary due to the increased cost of water which the city purchases from the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. The city began purchasing lake water October 3, 1978.

The North Central Texas **Municipal Water Authority** is non-profit and is owned by the towns of Munday, Haskell, Goree, and Knox City. The sale of water and taxes collected by the NC-TMWA must pay operational costs and bond requirement. The authority's tax rate

remains .40 on the \$100 of assessed value. Property is





At the time, Mr. Craig was president of the West Texas Press Association and was a member of the editorial board of the Texas Press Association. In 1954 the West **Texas Press Association** honored Mr. Craig's newspaper as the best allaround weekly paper in cities with more than 2,000 population.

Before that, in 1948, the newspaper had received the community service award from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Craig's lengthy journalism career began when he was in elementary school

Horticulture Course Slated March 5 - 8

A horticulture short course for adults will be held March 5 through 8, under the sponsorship of the Knox City High School Horticulture Department, according to Jim Dillon, horticulture teacher.

John Williamson, horticulture specialist with the **Vocational Agriculture** Division of the Texas Education Agency and the **Department of Horticulture** at Texas A&M University, will be instructing the course. Williamson is headquartered at Texas A&M University

Williamson holds bachelor of science and master of science degree in agriculture education. He is qualified as a certified teacher of horticulture in the vocational agriculture program in Texas. The short course is

scheduled to begin March 5, at 7:00 p.m., in the vocational agriculture building.

The basic plan of study will include plant growth and development, propagating media, plant propagation, vegetable gardening, landscape and design, lawns. and ground covers, house plants, and fruit and nut production. Also any specific problems or interests of participants will be discussed.

The Knox City Horticulture Department and Williamson encourage all those who participated last year to enroll again. Besides all the valuable information, all participants will be eligible for a nice door prize, refreshments, and much fellowship each night.

Persons interested in attending the short course should call Knox City High School office (658-3521) or Jim Dillon (658-3605) and leave their name. There will be a \$5.00 entry fee, and Horticulture Short Course certificates will be presented to enrollees who attend all of the training sessions.


Young Kent died Wednesday morning, February 7, after an apparent heart attack. ACU Head Football Coach Ted Sitton commented that Kelly had "a good workout'' Wednesday in ACU's offseason program. and that night, played in an intramural basketball game. After the game, he complained of a rapidly-beating heart.

Kelly's wife, Kerri, gave the athlete a rubdown and he soon relaxed. She was later awakened by his labored breathing and the standout football player died shortly thereafter. He was rushed to Hendrick Memorial Center where hour-long efforts to revive him were unsuccessful



Kent made second-team academic All-America last season with a 3.42 average (4.0 scale) in accounting. He was twice academic All-Lone Star Conference. On the field, he was three times named to the Reporter-News all-area team and his sophomore year, he made second-team all-state. At ACU, he helped the Wildcats to the 1977 NAIA national





and last season earned second-team All-Lone Star Conference honors.

A 1976 graduate of Cisco High School, he married the former Kerri Whitehead on May 6, 1978, in Abilene.

Survivors include his wife, Kerri; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hershel Kent of Cisco; and two brothers, Danny and Craig, both of Cisco.

do it, he had to stick his sore shoulder directly into an approaching linebacker. This, of course, he did without hesitation When the two trainers

pulled him to his feet, he looked as if both his arms were broken. He was led from the field, apparently finished for an indefinite period of time. That period, as it turned out, was exactly one play.





All Kelly did that year was rush for 1,184 yards, win the Most Valuable Player award in both the NAIA semifinal and championship game, and gain 643 yards while scoring six touchdowns in a memorable stretch drive to the NAIA national championship.




