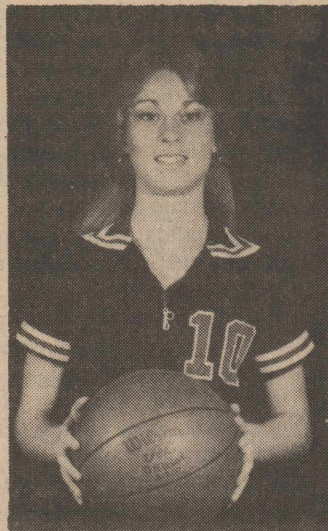
Theme for this year's convention was "FHA - What A Difference You've Made In My Life."

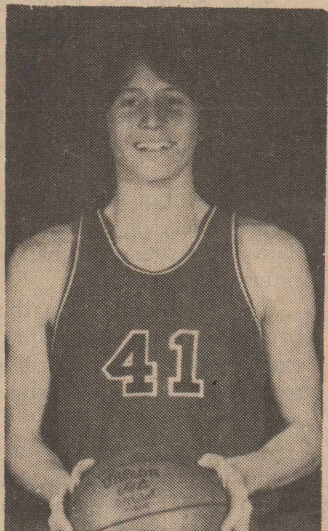
Gerri Watson was elected as Area IV vice president of programs during the Friday night House of Delegates meeting.

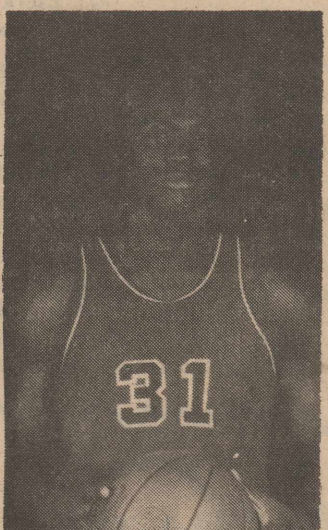

## Knox County Hospital Is 'Out From Under'

Monday, March 12, the Knox County Hospital board members and staff breathed a big sigh of relief, because for the first time since the hospital's closing in the summer of 1976, the institution is out of debt. The last remaining note at a local bank was "paid in full."

The hospital had borrowed approximately \$100,000.00 in late 1976 and early 1977 to help get back on its feet after being without income for almost four months in 1976. Hospital administrator Glen Rumley noted that without the cooperation and understanding of the Citizens State Bank in Knox City and the First National Bank in Munday that "we would never have made it."

Rumley stated that the entire indebtedness was repaid in just a little over 27 months and that Monday was a "super" day for everyone.

In January, the board members were presented the audit and cost report on government programs by

Russell Altmiller, CPA, the hospital auditor. Board members were pleased to learn that the hospital was able to hold cost increases down to only 5.1 percent over the previous year. This increase was one of the lowest in the state. Rumley commented, "The boys in Washington should be happy with us."

KC took both games on Saturday for consolation honors, 18-16, 15-13.

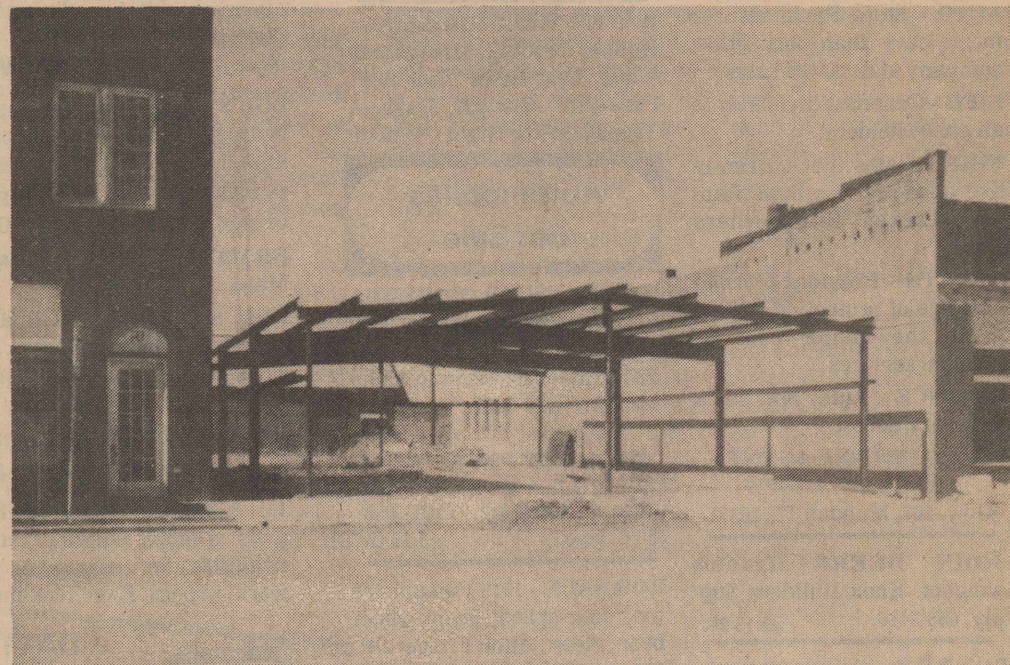

## Controlling Ground Squirrels

Do you know what a ground squirrel is? Well, when it comes to comparing it to other squirrels, the ground squirrel lives under the ground and leaves the hole open to his tunnel. Its hole is similar to a prairie dog hole but not as large. The ground squirrel is larger than the pocket gopher and smaller than the prairie dog. It averages 12 inches in length. The main characteristic that helps to identify the ground squirrel is its color. He's usually a tannish-yellow to a dusky gray and has black stripes down his back. If you get close enough to count the stripes, you will find there are 13 of them. Thus, the 13-Lined Ground Squirrel.

Ground squirrels have a feeding and burrowing habit that conflicts with man's agricultural interests. Their diet consists of seeds, grain, green vegetation, and insects. Their burrows may also be a nuisance in irrigated areas. Therefore, control measures are needed.

Poisoned bait and poison gas are the two general types of control. Strychnine grain can be purchased at any feed store if you are a certified

applicator and may be used according to label directions. A teaspoon of poisoned grain scattered in front of the hole of the animal is usually the method of treatment. If there is a threat to other animals, place the bait inside the entrance. ALWAYS be sure to READ THE DIRECTIONS on the container. Sometimes the ground squirrel will not accept the bait, so before putting out the poison grain, prebait the area with untreated milo maize. Prebaiting is a process of placing out untreated maize for two or three days so the animal is used to seeing it and eating it. Then place out treated maize to kill them on the fourth day.

Calcium cyanide gas is used to kill ground squirrels but the registration requires that you be a certified applicator. A professional pest control operator may be employed to treat for you. If a person only has a few ground squirrels, he may wish to kill them using the exhaust from his automobile.

## Science Fair To Be Held At VRJC

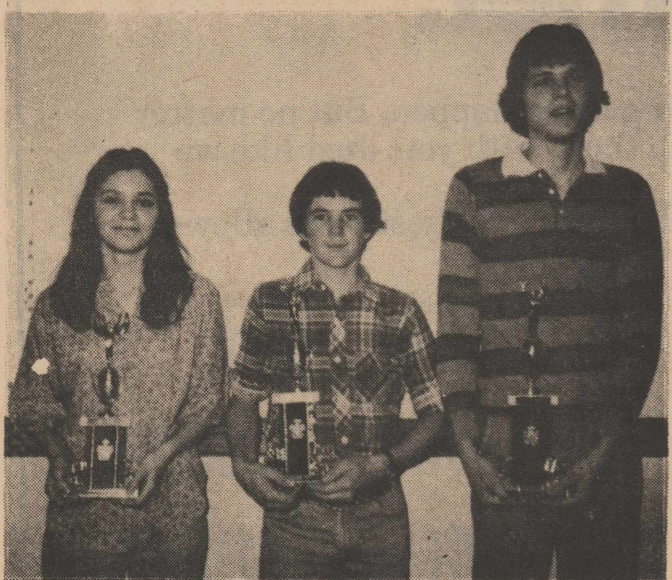

## Les Cowan Dies In Weatherford

Former Knox City High School football coach Les Cowan was dead on arrival Friday morning, March 9, at Weatherford Hospital after collapsing from an apparent heart attack in a classroom at Weatherford High School where he was an assistant football coach.

Services for Mr. Cowan, 53, were held Sunday afternoon, March 11, in the First United Methodist Church in Weatherford. Graveside services were held Monday afternoon, March 12, at one o'clock in the Hamlin Memorial Cemetery.

Cowan, a former Hamlin and McMurry College star football player, was known as a fall, husky, and fast end, who lettered four years at McMurry, making the All-Texas Conference team his last three years.

A Navy veteran of World War II, the 25-year-old athlete decided to skip his first chance at pro football in 1950 after his final year at McMurry to go into the coaching field. He had been drafted by the Los Angeles Rams. Cowan played one season of professional ball for the Chicago Bears in 1951. His first coaching job was at Robert E. Lee Junior High School in San Angelo.

After playing professional football, he coached at Rising Star before moving to Knox City in 1954. In 1955, he was named the Reporter-News Coach of the Year after coaching the Greyhounds to an 8-2 record. He resigned following his fourth year at Knox City and then signed on as coach of the Wylie Buffaloes for the 1958 season.

At Cross Plains, Cowan again gained coaching honors as the Reporter-News Class A area coach of the year in 1969. The 1969 Cross Plains team swept through District 9-A without a defeat and won bidistrict before losing in regional play. He also coached at Justin Northwest, Nazareth and Luling before joining the Weatherford staff.

Cowan was a Methodist and a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothy; three sons, Leslie of Cross Plains, Bob of Englewood, Colorado, and Bill of Weatherford; his mother, Mrs. Florence Cowan of Hamlin; and three grandchildren.

### IT'S GARDENING TIME AGAIN!

Home gardening continues to grow in popularity. One of every three families does some type of home gardening. Texas gardeners can produce tasty, nutritious vegetables the year around.

To be a successful gardener requires following a few basic rules and making practical decisions. A successful vegetable garden is highly dependent upon many decisions made at planting time. Careful attention should be given to proper variety selection, planting date, seeding depth, plant spacing, and potential yield.

When planning a home garden, one should consider these three important points:

1. Grow crops which return good quantities of food for the amount of garden space they require. Avoid overplanting.
2. Arrange crops according to maturity rates and plant

# Olney Savings To Host Exhibition

The informal exhibition will feature four extraordinary "people" artists including Gerald Farm, John Falter, Truman Bolinger and Ron Stewart, according to Don McClatchy, president of Olney Savings.

Gerald Farm, as reported in *Southwest Art* magazine, the critics say will one day inherit the crown of Norman Rockwell. He paints Indians, but is not an Indian artist; he paints Westerners, but is not a cowboy artist; he paints portraits, but is not a portrait painter. In his own words he says, "I am a painter of the moods of people - and the story that is in them."

He also says he knows of no place you can find so many interesting character studies as in the Southwest. "I hardly ever go out without seeing someone I would like to have

model for me, and it happens at the darndest times and at the darndest places."

Farm spends weeks, even months, on a painting. Every detail is authentic - so it becomes necessary to track down the many items needed - in the homes of friends, in antique shops and museums, even very old issues of *National Geographic*.

The attitude and general appearance is usually what strikes Gerald first when looking for a model for a specific story type painting. But the eyes are the number one characteristic for a final selection.

"I have to see something there," he says. "This is vitally important. What I am trying to say in my paintings is said, to a large extent, with those eyes."

Next in importance to the eyes and face, according to Gerald, are the hands. "What you have said with those hands, the type of hands they are, tells a great deal about the character of the painting."

John Falter is another one of the great "People" artists

of our time. He has produced over 200 covers for the *Saturday Evening Post*, (do not miss some of these at the Exhibition), illustrated 40 books published by *Reader's Digest*, numerous illustrations for McMillan Books and done portraits of such famous stars as Olivia de Havilland, James Cagney, and Louis Armstrong.

Truman Bolinger is a sculptor of the West. The land, the animals and the people, past and present, have captured his heart.

The spiritual feeling, the design and the abstraction of his pieces require a great deal of research. And he prefers to portray action. His more vigorous works are a study in dynamic movement, while his sensitive pieces have an impelling emotional point of view.

Truman's deep feeling for his work can be traced to his cowboy days on his parents' ranch in his native state of Wyoming.

Ron Stewart works primarily in watercolors and oils. And only through his own

determination, perseverance, hard work, natural ability, emotion and the influence of Western artists Austin Duet and Ralph Love, has Ron advanced to the top of the ranks of Western art.

His love of horses continually brought him back to ranch life throughout his young life.

He has received top awards at the Death Valley Show, Pikes Peak National Art Show and the George Phippen Memorial Invitational Show. Stewart is also listed in *Who's Who in American Art*.

Don McClatchy concluded, "We are very honored to bring the Alterman Art Gallery Exhibition of People Art to Olney. And we hope everyone will come by and see this very special collection."

The exhibition will travel to the Bridgeport branch of Olney Savings and be open to the public March 23, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

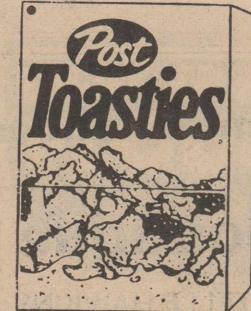
