

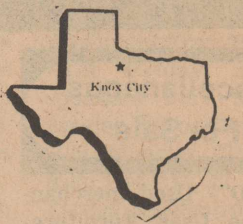

'People Helping People'

## Therapy 'Works Wonders' For Knox City Woman

"People Helping People" is a slogan heard by so many people concerning the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene. This statement is really an "understatement" as patients and persons who visit the WTRC facilities can plainly see that there is so much more. It is more than just helping people with their physical handicaps, it is a place where people are concerned about one another and where tremendous advancements are being made every day toward a person's ability to be able to talk, walk, or hear once again.

"It is such a wonderful place - there is no other place like it." These statements came from Knox City resident LaVerne Thompson who went to the WTRC on September 18, 1978, just 13 days after suffering a stroke.

Mrs. Thompson's physician, Dr. R.G. Howell, sent her to the Rehab Center during this short lapse of time stressing that the main key to recovery is "getting started early."

September 5 began as any other normal day for LaVerne, who was employed as secretary by the City of Knox City, when she suffered her stroke, sustaining damage to her left arm and leg. There was very little movement in her left arm and leg and she was confined to a wheelchair. Luckily, LaVerne was right-handed.

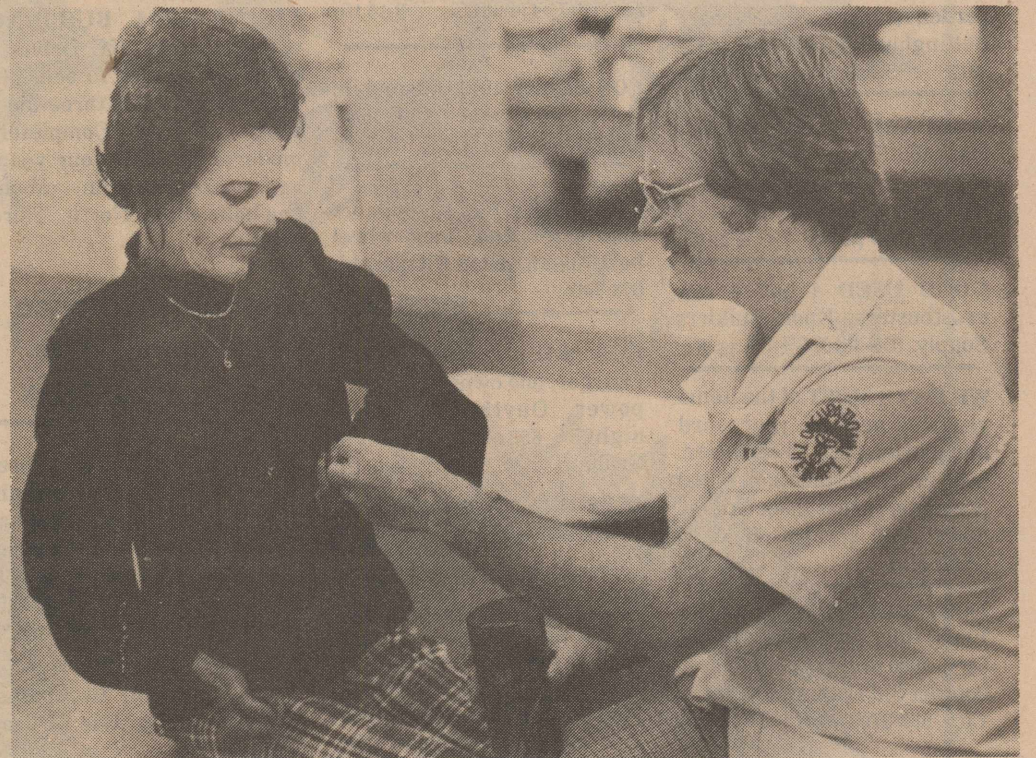
She was admitted to physical therapy at the Rehab where she would be taught to walk and increase the overall muscle strength. LaVerne was also admitted to occupational therapy to work on gaining total independence in dressing, feeding, cooking and achieving other daily self care activities.

Now, LaVerne is walking with a left brace and cane and is using her left arm as an assist to the right arm. She is also independent in all of her daily activities.

LaVerne has made so much progress that she will soon be discharged from the Rehab Center. She has worked very hard to gain her independence and her therapists, Lu Ann Fender of Weatherford, Oklahoma, a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, and Bubba Klosterman of Brownsville, a graduate of the University of Texas, state that they are very proud of

The new Miss VRJC, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Carter of Knox City, is a green-eyed 5'4" beauty who is following in the footsteps of Stacy Angle, a Knox City girl who has become a professional entertainer after winning the collegiate beauty and talent crown here in 1975.

Sonia sang her way through the "American Trilogy" which is a medley of patriotic songs including "Battle Hymn of the Republic" and "Dixie".

First runner-up was Kathy Nixon of Burkburnett who sang a rendition of "Won't

You Come Home, Bill Bailey" while Throckmorton's Rhonda Rogers, second runner-up, sang and played the piano on a medley number including "Has Anybody Seen My Gal" and "That's My Baby".

Miss Carter will receive \$600 in scholarships to VRJC, where she is expected to reign for an entire year before competing in the 1980 Miss Texas Pageant in Fort Worth. ## Bloodmobile To Visit Wednesday, April 11

Mrs. Doris Crownover, Blood Services chairman, has announced the next visit of the Red River Regional Red Cross Bloodmobile to Knox City will be Wednesday, April 11.

The Bloodmobile will be set up at the First United Methodist Church from 2:00 until 6:30 p.m. and the goal has been carefully set at 82 units to insure that the blood and blood product needs of the county are met.

The Red River Regional Red Cross Blood Center is the processing site for 40 regional hospitals. Regular deliveries are made to these hospitals but when a special need arises at a hospital such as Knox County Hospital, the Red Cross Center sends out the necessary units of blood.

Because blood can only be stored for 21 days, donors are always needed to replace the supply. A donor may give blood every 56 days if they are between the ages of 18 and 65, in good health and weigh at least 110 pounds. Seventeen-year-olds can give with written parental con-

sent. The actual process of giving blood only takes from seven to ten minutes but with time for registration, the medical history and refreshments, the donor should expect to spend about an hour at the Bloodmobile. A brief medical examination including blood pressure, temperature, pulse and a hemoglobin blood test is given to every potential donor. These are some of the factors that determine if it is safe for the individual to be a blood donor and if the blood being donated is safe for a patient to receive.

"One hour is not a lot of time when it could save someone's life. Blood cannot be made anywhere except in the human body and must be given voluntarily. It is truly the gift of life," Mrs. Crownover said.

Persons wishing to set up an appointment to donate blood should contact Mrs. Crownover or drop by the First United Methodist Church on Wednesday, April 11, between 2:00 and 6:30 p.m.

## Hounds First In Aspermont Relays

Knox City's Greyhounds, coached by Jimmy Rogers, totalled an even 100 points in Saturday's efforts at Aspermont's Double Mountain Relays ahead of second place finishers Rule, who tallied some 87 points. KC won first place in three events to earn the necessary points for the first place finish.

Rogers noted that the first place wins of the 400 meter team composed of Scott Lynn, Tim Roberson, Ricky Gonzales and Dwayne Johnson with a time of 45.31; the 110 meter hurdles by Johnson with a 15.16 time; and the high jump by David Walling,

who leaped 6'6", all set records in the meet.

Second place wins for the Hounds were Ricky Gonzales in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.7; and Walling in the long jump, who again leaped 18'9½".

Neal Tackitt brought home a third place finish in the 800 meter run with a time of 2:12.3 while Johnson took third in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 41.61. Ricky Gonzales rounded out the third place finishers with two wins, one in the 200-meter run with a 23.14 time and in the long jump with 18'6¾".

Russell Hacker took fourth place in the 110 meter hurdles while Greg Whitten placed sixth in the same event.

In the 100 meter run, Tim Roberson placed fifth with Scott Lynn behind him placing sixth. Jimmy Rushing took fourth in the 400-meter run and the 1600 meter relay team of Tackitt, Rushing, Chuck Hutchinson, and David Counts, placed fifth.

In the field events, Terry Watson placed fifth in the shot put.

This Saturday, March 24, the Hounds will travel to Snyder instead of Iowa Park as reported earlier.

## City Sales Tax Up By Two Percent

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Thursday, March 15, that rebates to Texas cities of the local one percent sales tax for the first three months of 1979 have fallen slightly behind the first quarter of 1978; however, Knox City's is up two percent with O'Brien and Benjamin both up by six.

The dip in city allocations as well as a similar drop in the collection of the state's four percent sales tax is not likely to affect overall state revenue this fiscal year, Bullock said.

"However, I'll be watching tax trends and receipts closer than a hawk watches a sparrow and plan to give the Legislature an updated revenue estimate for the next two fiscal years in the next 15 to 20 days," Bullock said.

Bullock said more than 915 Texas cities will share \$56.6 million in sales tax rebates during March.

He said 1979 rebate payments to cities from the first of the year total \$100.3 million, compared to 1978 payments of \$101.4 million over the same period.

Bullock said late returns that have not hit the Comptroller's accounting system and not sluggish retail sales during the reporting period seem to be the chief culprit for the downturn in rebates.

Area towns and their percentage increase include Anson, 20 percent; Crowell 7 percent; Goree 7 percent; Hamlin 3 percent; Munday 3 percent; Rule 27 percent; Seymour 4 percent; and Stamford 6 percent.

Decreases were Haskell -4 percent and Rochester with a -1 percent.

The State Department of Education will distribute the funds to the school districts based on the best available data which reflect the current distribution of children in low-income families.

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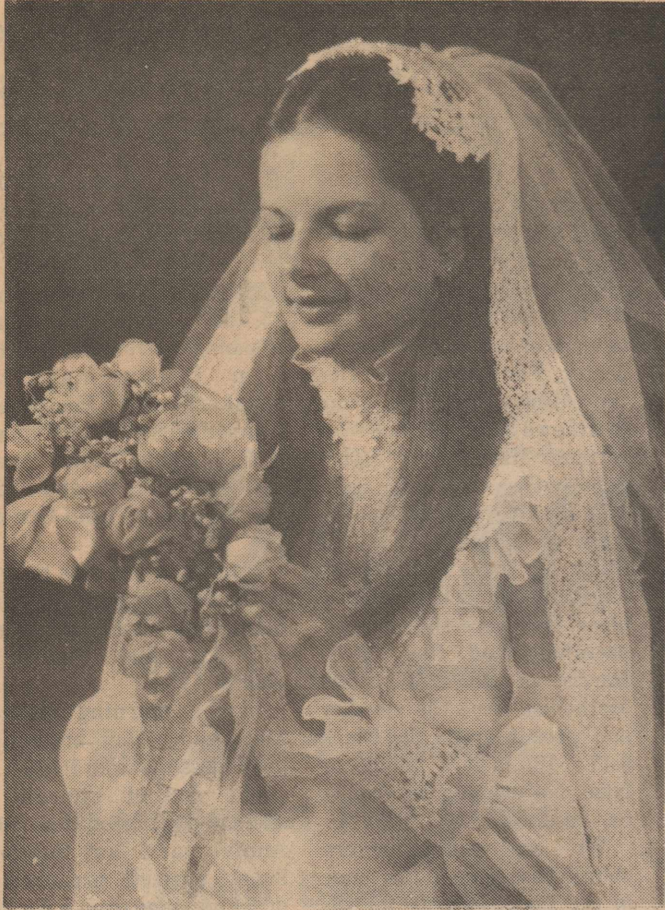

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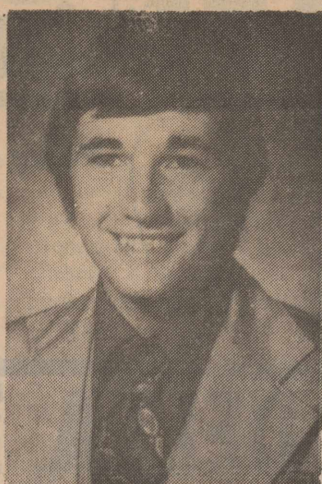

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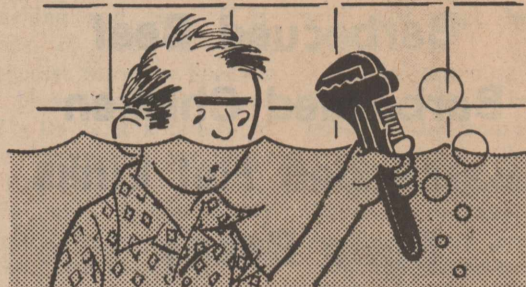

### To "Poison-Proof" Your Home:

1. Keep household products and medicines out of reach and out of sight of children, preferably in a locked cabinet or closet. Even if you must leave the room for only an instant, remove the container to a safe spot.

### POWER SHORTAGE? Keep Frozen Foods Safe

What do you do with frozen foods during a power shortage? Let's hope that is a question which you will never have to be directly concerned with. If a power shortage does catch you though, here are some tips for your frozen food storage.

If you lose power, keep the freezer closed as much as possible. Avoid opening the door. Use a freezer thermometer to keep track of how high the temperature gets inside the freezer. If the temperatures climb above 44 degrees for more than four hours, food may be unsafe to eat.

After a power failure, when is it safe to refreeze foods that are stored in the freezer? That depends on the temperature at which the foods are held, how long they were held, and the type of food.

You may safely refreeze any foods except fish and

combination dishes if they still contain ice crystals and have been held no longer than one or two days at refrigerator temperatures after thawing.

Never refreeze completely defrosted food. All thawed vegetables must be discarded. Thawed meat or poultry

with any off-color or off-odor should be discarded. As long as cold foods are held at temperatures 40 degrees or below, you can refrigerate them or use immediately. Meat and other foods taste better when kept at a constant temperature. Fluctuating levels of coldness tend to dry out foods.

During cold weather, freezers may be able to maintain optimum temperatures of ten degrees or below for a short time. Make sure that food is safe to eat by keeping track of the temperature.
