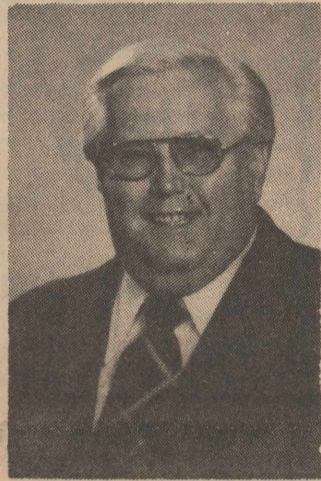
## Dr. Kyker To Address CofC Banquet Guests

Plans have been made for the upcoming Chamber of Commerce banquet set for Thursday, April 5, in the school cafeteria. Banquet speaker will be Dr. Rex Paxton Kyker, who is professor and head of the Department of Communications at Abilene Christian University.

Kyker was born in Texico, New Mexico, and graduated from a Farwell, Texas, high school. He received his bachelor of arts degree from ACU, his master of arts degree from the State University of Iowa, and his Ph.D. from the University of Florida.

He is married to the former Christine White and they are the parents of five children, three daughters and two sons.

Kyker is a ten year chairman of the Speakers Bureau, a member of the March of Dimes, past president of the Abilene Parents' Club, and current president of the

Taylor County Heart Association. He is also a past president of the Texas Colt League and is active in Boy Scouts. A past president of the Key City Kiwanis Club, Kyker was lieutenant governor in 1961 of Division 12 of the Texas-Oklahoma District of Kiwanis International. He was also governor of the Texas-Oklahoma District, Kiwanis International in 1967,

and was twice a member of the International Committee on Support of Churches in their Spiritual Aims.

The professor was named Kiwanian of the Year in 1972 and was cited as Teacher of the Year in 1975 at ACU, completing 34 years of service at ACU and senior member of the faculty with most years of service.

### Absentee Voting Is Underway

Absentee voting for the upcoming April 7 joint elections began Monday of last week and will continue through Tuesday, April 3.

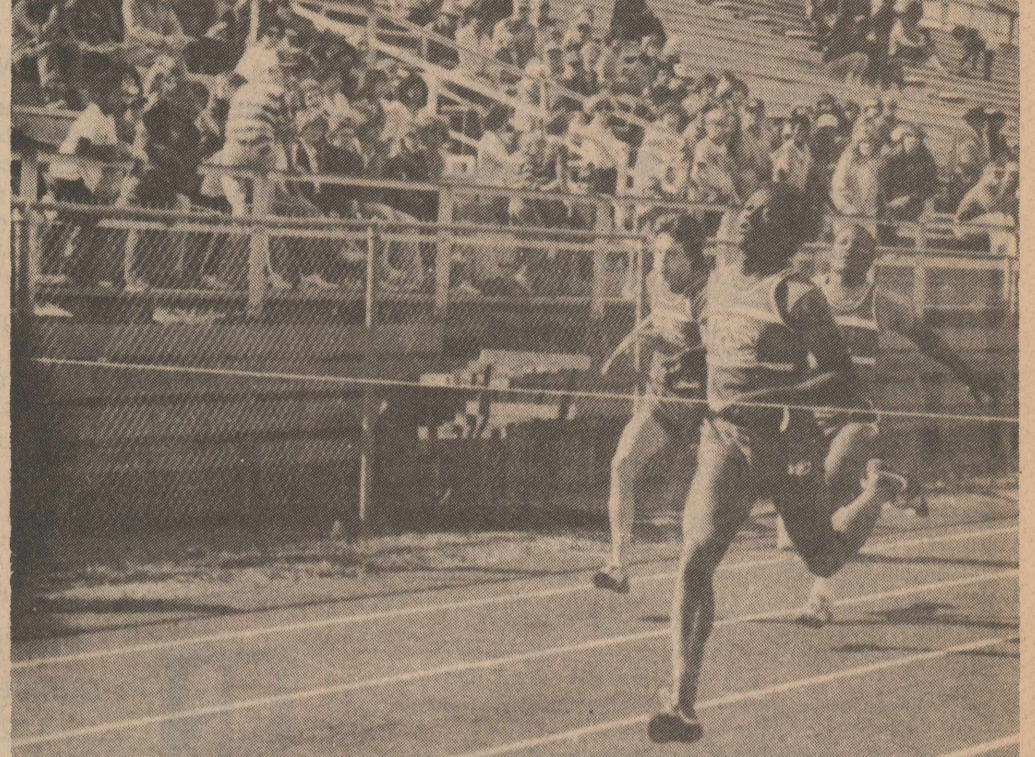
The City of Knox City, the Knox City-O'Brien Independent School District, and the Knox County Hospital District again will hold joint elections, and those persons who will be unable to go to the polls on April 7 are reminded and urged to vote before the April 3 deadline.

Absentee voting for the city election is being conducted at City Hall. Three candidates are seeking the mayorship including A.T. (Drew) Holcomb, incumbent Kenneth Crowover and L.E. Groves. Three are seeking the two seats on the council including incumbent Vernon Bridges, incumbent Cornie Covey, and Craig Williams.

Absentee ballots may be cast at City Hall Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. with Faye Railsback as clerk.

Absentee voting for the school election will continue from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. at Knox City High School where Mary Beth Smith is absentee clerk and deputy absentee clerks are Melanie Whitley and W.R. Baker. Those seeking the two seats on the school board are Jimmy Tankersley, incumbent Alex Godsey, incumbent Doug Meinzer, David Albus, and Charlie Bateman.

Those who need to vote absentee in the hospital election may do so on Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. and on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. until 10:00 a.m. in the hospital business office. Incumbent Gene Brown of Munday will be facing Greg Clonts of Knox City for the one elective seat on the board.

During the Knox City tracksters jaunt to Snyder's Canyon Reef Relays Saturday, the team pulled some 83 points together for a third place win. Top team at the meet was Crosbyton with 123 points followed by Hamlin with 96.

Fourth place went to Aspermont with 53 points while the Brownwood junior varsity placed fifth with 50 points. Other placings were Munday, sixth, 37; Roscoe, seventh, 34; and Spur, eighth, 14.

Taking first place wins for the Hounds were David Walling, who leaped to a 6'4" in the high jump, and teammate Tim Roberson, who ran a 23.4 in the 200 meter dash.

Dwayne Johnson placed second in the 110 meter high hurdles while Tim Whitten took fifth in the same contest.

Roberson took second place in the 100 meter dash, and

Scott Lynn took fourth in this event.

In the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, Johnson took third, while David Benson and Russell Hacker, placed fifth and sixth, respectively.

Lynn also took third place honors in the 200 meter dash and Walling also placed third in the long jump contest.

The 400 meter relay team raced to a 46.3 to come out third while the 1600 meter relay squad ran to a sixth place finish with a time of 3:48.8.

Kelley Boone placed fourth in the pole vault while Danny Martinez placed fifth in the 800 meter run.

### Deadline Nears For Loan Applications

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) reminds farmers in Knox County that Tuesday, April 3, is the deadline to apply for disaster emergency loans covering production losses caused by drought between July 1, 1977, and February 27, 1978.

FmHA County Supervisor Joe T. Boone said a twelve-month period for receiving applications will expire on that date.

Boone reported that FmHA has made seven farm emergency loans in the county totaling \$123,320 for recovery from that period of damaging weather. Loans totaling about \$161,960 have been closed for drought from February 28 through August 2, 1978. Applications for this period will be received through August 23, 1979.

FmHA, a Department of Agriculture agency, makes disaster emergency loans to farmers who cannot find other sources of credit needed to restore operations to normal. Loans must be based on substantial loss from the designated disaster. Eligibility extends to recognized farmers who work

at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living and are U.S. citizens, or to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

## Cotton Insect Meeting Set

A cotton insect production meeting will be held Monday, April 2, beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the assembly room of the Knox County Courthouse. The purpose of the meeting is to familiarize cotton producers with cotton insects and economic levels at which to control them.

Emory Boring, extension entomologist, will be on hand to discuss damaging cotton insects and to train producers on what insects to look for and at what level of economic damage they should be controlled. Primarily, the training will deal with the boll weevil and the cotton bollworm.

This training should be very beneficial to cotton producers in becoming qualified to determine levels of insect damage in their fields.

# WTU Officials Make Various Changes

Durwood Chalker, president of West Texas Utilities Co., Tuesday was elected chairman and chief executive officer of Central Power and Light Co. in Corpus Christi, and has submitted his resignation at WTU, effective July 1.

Chalker will be succeeded at WTU by Glen D. Churchill, former WTU vice president who since July 1976 has been executive vice president of Central Power and Light Co.

The changes were announced after being approved by the boards of directors of both companies in meetings Tuesday morning.

At Corpus Christi, Chalker will succeed Roff W. Hardy, also a former Abilenian, who will retire on July 1. Hardy has been chairman and chief executive officer of Central Power and Light since resigning as WTU president on January 1, 1975.

WTU and CPL are sister companies within the Central and South West Corporation, an electric utility holding company with central offices in Dallas. Other CSW operating companies are Southwestern Electric Power Co., Shreveport; and Public Service Co. of Oklahoma, Tulsa.

Central Power and Light currently is the largest operating company in the Central and South West System in terms of annual revenue, number of customers and number of employees. It serves more than 200 towns in a 44-county

area in South Texas extending from Bay City to the lower Rio Grande Valley, and including the cities of Laredo, Del Rio, Uvalde and Victoria.

Also announced following the WTU Board meeting was the resignation of Glenn Rosilier, corporate treasurer and director of accounting and finance. Rosilier has been elected controller for the Central and South West Corporation effective July 1. At Dallas, he will succeed Robert L. Range, who is moving to Corpus Christi to become executive vice president of Central Power and Light.

Promoted by WTU as a result of Rosilier's resignation were Don Shahan, to secretary-treasurer, and Larry Connors, to controller. Shahan has been corporate secretary and assistant treasurer and manager of federal taxes and financial analyses. Connors has been assistant controller and manager of accounting.

Chalker, a native of Stephens County, joined WTU as a junior engineer in the Transmission Department in June, 1950, after earning a degree in electrical engineering at Texas A&M University. He has spent his entire professional career at WTU, all of his service in Abilene except from 1954-60 when he was district distribution superintendent at San Angelo.

Chalker was elected vice president in 1968 and to the WTU Board of Directors in

1969. He was elected president and chief administrative officer in 1975 and was named president and chief executive officer in 1976.

He is a member of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank of Abilene, a director and member of the Executive Committee of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, currently serving as chairman of the Chamber's Industrial Manufacturing Committee. He also is on boards of the Abilene YMCA, Hendrick Medical Center Foundation, Boy Scouts of America Council, West Texas Rehabilitation Center and the United Way of Abilene. He is past president of local chapters of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers and the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers, and a recipient of the TSPE Engineer of the Year award.

Chalker and his wife, Vada, have three sons, Daniel, a student at Texas A&M; David, a junior at Cooper High School; and Jason, in Austin Elementary School. They live at 777 Elmwood and attend the First Baptist Church.

Churchill will return to Abilene to head the Company he joined as an assistant to the controller in August, 1964. He is a graduate of Texas A&M with a degree in accounting and is a Certified Public Accountant.

He was promoted to assistant controller at WTU in 1965 and to controller in

1966. He was elected vice president and treasurer and to the Board of Directors in 1972. In March, 1976, he was designated vice president with overall responsibility for employee affairs, accounting and financial functions of WTU, and served in this capacity until he joined CPL.

During his 12 years in Abilene, Churchill was active in United Fund, the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and served as a director and secretary of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. He also was a member of the Abilene Exchange Club and the Abilene A&M Club. At Corpus Christi, he has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and a member of the Executive Committee.

He is a past president of the Abilene Chapter of Certified Public Accountants, and is a member of the Corpus Christi Chapter of CPA's and the Texas Society of CPA's, in which he has served as a director and member of the executive committee. # Three To Receive Special Tech Honors

**LUBBOCK** U.S. Representative Charles W. Stenholm of Stamford, rancher Bob Brown of Throckmorton and general manager E.C. Dick Weekley of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will receive special recognition March 30 from the Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Sciences.

Each will be presented the Gerald W. Thomas Outstanding Agriculturalist Award, Stenholm for agri-business, Brown for production and Weekley for public service. The award is named for a former dean of the college, now president of New Mexico State University.

Awards will be made at the sixth annual Honors Banquet-Pig Roast of the College of Agricultural Sciences. The event will begin at 7:00 p.m. in the Coronado Room of the Texas Tech University Center.

Stenholm has been a teacher, farmer and farm manager, a banker and active in farm cooperatives - for nine years the general manager of the Stamford Electric Cooperatives. Elected to the 96th U.S. Congress last November, from the 17th Congressional District, he serves on the House Agriculture Committee with appointments to subcommittees on cotton, dairy and poultry, livestock and grains, and oilseeds and rice.

Brown, nationally recognized as a leading rancher and cattle breeder, operates the Crooked River Ranch and the R.A. Brown Ranch near Throckmorton and Brown Simmental Breeders, Matheson, Colorado.

In these cattle operations, requiring the management of more than 56,000 acres, he runs some 2,000 cows. The Crooked River Ranch is a commercial operation, the other two Simmental herds. R.A. Brown Ranch is a recognized breeder also of quarter horses.

Weekley, formerly executive secretary of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, became general manager of the

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in 1962. He is credited with contributing greatly to that organization's continuous and outstanding service to youth. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, operated annually by 3,000 volunteers, is committed to funding scholarships amounting to \$1.24 million for 248 college and university students. Last year it established an endowment of \$100,000 to support new scholarships in the Texas Tech College of Agricultural Sciences, in addition to 22 previously granted scholarships and some research funding.

Stenholm was graduated from Tarleton State Junior College and holds the bachelor's and master's degrees from Texas Tech. He taught vocational agriculture for two years, 1962-64, and became a partner in L.W. Stenholm and Son Farms, was owner-manager of Stenholm Farms, 1969-76, and for the past two years was manager of Watson Farms and president of Double S Farms, Inc. He was a director of First National Bank, Stamford, from 1975 to 1978.

In addition to community service, he has headed the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Texas Electric Cooperatives, the Quarter Horse Division of the Texas Cowboy Reunion and the Tri-Area Livestock Association. He has been vice president of the Texas Federation of Cooperatives and is a charter trustee of Cotton Incorporated.

Brown was active in a wide variety of student affairs when he attended Texas Tech where he earned the bachelor's degree in 1958. He is Purebred Council chairman on the executive committee of the National Cattlemen's Association, a charter member and past president of the American Simmental Association, founding member of the World Simmental Federation, co-chairman of the Texas Experimental Ranch Committee, director of the Texas and Southwestern Cattlemen's Association, the American Quarter Horse Association and Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show. He has been a director also of the Texas Society of Range Management.

Weekley has headed the Texas Association of Fairs and Expositions, the American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers' Association, the Agri-Business Committee of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. He has been a trustee

of the Livestock Merchandising Institute, member of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and has represented the 13 southern states on the national FFA Alumni Council. He holds the bachelor's and master's degrees from Texas A&I University. He taught vocational agriculture for seven years in Lytle and then joined the Texas Educational Agency as an area supervisor. When he left to become Texas FFA executive secretary, he continued as a consultant to TEA.

## FIRST AID FOR POISONING

**EYE CONTACT OR SKIN CONTACT:**  
Flush thoroughly with water for at least 15 minutes.

**POISONOUS GASES**—Remove victim from fume exposure. In so doing be sure to minimize your exposure to the fumes. If patient is not breathing, start artificial respiration immediately. Do not stop until victim is breathing or help arrives.

**CALL YOUR POISON CENTER OR PHYSICIAN PROMPTLY.**

**SWALLOWED POISONS:**  
If patient is unconscious or having symptoms of poisoning:  
—Transport to nearest medical facility. (If you drive, have someone else attend the patient.)  
—Bring with you container(s) of the substance(s) involved.  
—If vomiting occurred, bring the vomitus.

If patient is conscious:  
—Get medical advice promptly.  
—Dilute the poison by giving patient at least one 8 oz. glass of water.  
—Induce vomiting (only on medical advice) BUT NOT IF patient is unconscious or in a coma  
—having seizures  
—the swallowed poison is a corrosive such as drain cleaner, lye, acid. In this case give liquids.

To induce vomiting (only on medical advice):  
—Give one (1) tablespoonful (one-half ounce) of Syrup of Ipecac (for patient one year or older) followed by one 8 oz. glass water. If vomiting does not occur in 15 minutes the dose may be repeated only once. Place patient in spanning position when vomiting begins.

If patient has swallowed kerosene, gasoline or other petroleum distillate, the physician or poison center may advise vomiting. Do so only if directed.

# Diesel Shortage A Major Crisis

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced today that there is a shortage of diesel fuel that is developing into a major crisis for all businesses dependent on diesel fuel. This has come to his attention in the past week as a result of calls from fuel distributors, marketers, truckers and farmers, Stenholm said. The investigation of the Congressman's staff in trying to assist in the severe shortage has shown that the northern and western parts of the nation are experiencing almost complete loss of diesel fuel. This comes at a time when farmers are attempting to prepare their land for the 1979 crop; therefore, any delay in securing supplies will be particularly critical to the economy of our nation. Congressman Stenholm's office has received numerous calls from distributors who have been unable to secure diesel to meet present needs. The office has attempted to secure additional supplies, but has had limited success. In all cases, new supplies that are incoming are going to be more costly, but even more money may not be sufficient to guarantee delivery. One dealer indicated he had not received diesel in over three weeks, and his wholesaler could not promise a future delivery to him or the other 2300 customers that he services in the farm communities. Also, inquiries have revealed that suppliers holding 50,000 gallons of diesel only three days ago have now sold these supplies to speculators. Thus, these supplies have been withdrawn from the available market.

The Congressman attributes the crisis to several factors. 1) We have the highest demand and declining supply rate in the history of our nation. One year ago we had 152 million gallons of diesel available. Today, we have only 119 million gallons (5 million less than a week ago). 2) There is more refinery down time than normal due to recent fires and other physical problems. 3) We have experienced a lengthy cold winter which has caused large amounts of diesel stocks to be shipped to the Northeast region of the country. It will take 20 to 25 days to reverse this process. 4) The Iranian shortfall hurt the independent refiners who are unable to replace the missing Iranian crude with high-priced crude from other sources found on the nervous spot market. 5) Brokers are purchasing large amounts of diesel fuel and

transporting to storage in anticipation of reselling at 60-70 cents per gallon after April 1. The Congressman attributes much of the crisis to the overregulation of the petroleum industry by the Department of Energy and other agencies as is evidenced by the stoppage of the Sohio pipeline last week. These agencies fail to take into account through lack of knowledge the special timeliness of diesel usage during peak farming periods. Stenholm further notes that proliferation of a multitude of regulations from the Department of Energy are continually being revised and changed to the point that the refiners and distributors can scarcely know what is proper procedure. It has caused the oil industry to spend millions of dollars in trying to comply with the regulations; monies that could have been used to build refineries.

In fact, there is not even a consensus of opinion within the Department of Energy regarding the interpretation of their own regulations, concluded Stenholm. Congressman Stenholm has requested that Chairman Kika de la Garza (D - Texas) convene his Investigation and Oversight Subcommittee on Agriculture. The Congressman further states that he expects the hearings to convene next Thursday to examine the problem of current diesel shortages during land preparation and planting time. The hearings will also investigate the 60-day forecast and the long-term outlook for diesel supplies and other energy matters. In the meantime, Congressman Stenholm urges all farmers, truckers, and diesel suppliers to work together to make the best of an apparently bad situation.

Ralph Howe of Seymour has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell at the 34th Annual Stockholders Meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston. The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 64 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were approximately 650 persons in attendance. Thomas H. Benson, president, in his report to the stockholders, stated that there was an increasing demand for new loans in 1978. This was the second largest year in the Bank's history with \$245.5 million in loans and it appears the demand for loans will continue.

## "The Book Report"

### CLEANING 'HOPELESS' CERAMIC TILE

Badly stained tile - especially in showers - presents a cleaning problem.

Often, there's a rough, white build-up on them, a brownish soil along the grout lines and a dark, varnish-like stain in the center of the shower base.

Actually, the blame falls to three different culprits - so, three different cleaning methods are needed.

Avoid using abrasive cleansers - they harm the ceramic glaze.

Just follow these three treatments:

**ROUGH, WHITE BUILD-UP**  
These are hard water salts left when water evaporates. The same thing happens in a tea kettle.

Use a commercial tile cleaner weekly to dissolve the scale, and then wipe it clean.

**BROWNISH SOIL  
ON GROUT LINES**

This is mildew. Scouring and scrubbing will work, but the mildew will grow back.

Spray an ordinary household spray disinfectant on the dry tile, and let it stand overnight.

In the morning, sponge the mildew off. The mildew will

not return if this treatment is repeated monthly.

**VARNISH-LIKE STAIN  
ON SHOWER BASE**

This is a build-up of body oils and soap scum which most cleaners will not remove from ceramic tile.

Remove the stain with liquid laundry detergent. Pour it on the stain full strength and let it stay for a few hours or overnight.

Then, sponge or scrub, and rinse with plenty of water.

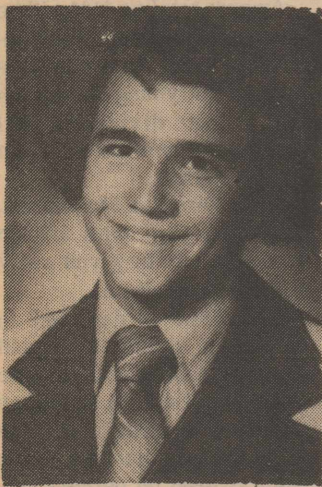

## All Babysitters Must Either Be Registered Or Licensed

Are you a mother with small children or a grandmother with time on her hands who wants to make a little extra money by caring for children in your home? "Great," says the Department of Human Resources. Most day care homes offer a perfect solution for both the day care mother and working mother who wants a home atmosphere for her child during the day.

However, those who wish to care for unrelated children in their homes are required to invest a small amount of time and effort in becoming either registered or licensed by the Department. The Child Care Licensing Act of 1975, Senate Bill 965, requires licensing or registration of anyone providing care for even one unrelated child outside the child's home.

Mrs. Fran Key, Day Care Licensing Representative for a ten-county area, including Knox County, comes in contact daily with people who do not understand why people who are "just babysitting," are required to be licensed or registered. The protection of the health, safety, and well-being of the children in out-of-home care is the primary purpose of the Child Care Licensing Act. Licensed and registered facilities are required to meet minimum standards designed to provide for the needs of the child. They give children at least some assurance of minimum protection against such things as nutritionally inadequate food, inadequate

equipment, lack of imagination in either planning of the center or interaction with the children, fire and sanitation hazards, and harsh physical discipline.

"Many women providing day care who are not licensed or registered have adequate facilities and give proper care," Mrs. Key says, "but are unaware of the law." This is why she must contact them and explain what the law requires. Injunctions and fines processed through the County or District Attorney are enforced against all who fail to cooperate by refusing to apply for registration or licensing.

## STREAMS IN DESERT PLACES

"But whatever is good comes to us from God, the Creator of all light, and He shines forever without change or shadow. And it was a happy day for Him when He gave us our new life, through the truth of His word, and we became, as it were, the first children in his new family." (Jas. 1:17-18)

Here we find James speaking to his brothers and sisters about the word of God. He is warning them if they hear the Word and do not obey, what sorrow will come to them; and if they obey, what blessings.

We hear him say, "Dear brothers, don't ever forget that it is best to listen much, speak little, and not become angry, for anger doesn't make us good, as God demands that we must be. So get rid of all that is wrong in your life, both inside and outside, and humbly be glad for the wonderful message we have received, for it is able to save our souls as it takes hold in our hearts."

Remember it is a message to obey, and not just to listen to. So don't fool yourselves. The Word says again, "He that being often reproved hardeneth his neck, shall suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy." (Prov. 29:1 and Isa. 42:25.)

Requirements for registration and licensing vary according to type of facility. There is no charge for either registration or licensing. All that is required is that the care-giver meet minimum standards for the type of facility they wish to operate and pass annual fire and sanitation inspections made by local officials. One advantage to being licensed or registered is that these facilities are put on a list which is sent to parents who call for information on day care for their children.

Those who provide care for six children or less are registered with the Department. Registration is usually handled by mail and does not require a visit from the licensing representative unless a complaint is involved. The responsibility of regulation of these homes is left with the parents, who should notify the licensing representative if standards are violated. The caregivers must give a copy of Minimum Standards for Registered Family Homes to the parents of each child enrolled.

Those providing care for more than six children are licensed as Group Day Care Homes, Day Care Centers, or Kindergarten/Nursery Schools. Private schools may also be licensed by the Department of Human Resources.

A list of registered and licensed facilities is available free of charge by calling or writing Mrs. Fran Key, Licensing Representative, Wilbarger County Courthouse, Vernon, Texas 76384 (817/552-6238). Mrs. Key explains that she is always happy to answer questions concerning registration or licensing or help day care mothers with any problems they might have.

## Wrong SS Numbers Can Delay Refunds

Tax refunds can be delayed by incorrect social security numbers and inaccurate addresses, the Internal Revenue Service warned.

To guard against unnecessary refund delays, the IRS encourages taxpayers to use the peel-off identification label provided with the tax package. The label is pre-printed with the taxpayer's

name, address, and social security number, and needs only to be affixed to the tax return before it is mailed, according to the IRS.

The IRS reminded taxpayers to check the information on the label before using it, however, to be sure all information is correct. Any changes should be made in ink on the label itself.

The IRS also reminded those persons who changed their names last year to report the new name to their local Social Security Administration office. This ensures that the new name will be assigned to the proper social security number.
