KC Senior David Walling's hopes "dwindled" during the Saturday division of the State track and field meet held in Austin on the campus of the University of Texas. Walling, who was the defending state class A high jump champion, had returned to Austin with hopes of defending his title and State record. Walling ran into a little bad luck and was defeated for the first place title by Richard Woolford of Hawkins.

David took runner-up honors jumping to a 6-8 for the second place finish.

Woolford also broke Walling's last year's State record by 1/4 of an inch with his winning leap.

Walling, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Walling, had cleared 6-10 this season and cleared 6-8 at the State contest but couldn't get over 6-9 1/4. He cleared the height on his first try, but tipped the bar with his leg.

Still, Woolford had more misses than Walling and had not been close to clearing the height.

Then, on his final jump, Woolford easily cleared the bar defeating KC's State champion.

David won first in both the district and regional contests before advancing to the State competition.

UIL Banquet Set Saturday

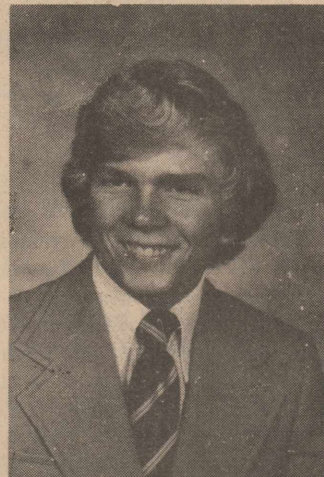
The eleventh annual University Interscholastic League and Activity Banquet will be held Saturday, May 19, at 8:00 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

High school students who have participated in any high school organization or activity will be guests at the banquet. Additional guests will include faculty and school board members.

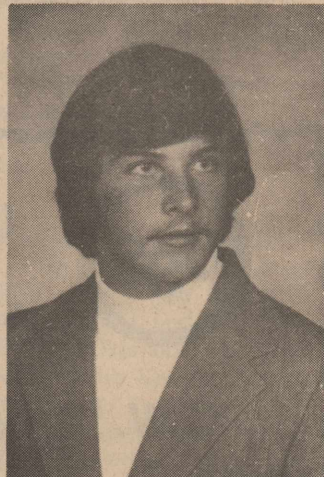

Tornado Victim In KC Hospital

Student Recalls 'Terrible Tuesday'

Tuesday, April 10, 1979, began about like any other day, but events that occurred that afternoon changed the pattern and residents in the North Central Texas area as well as Southern Oklahoma now describe it as "Terrible Tuesday."

The tornadoes that struck Vernon and Wichita Falls affected many former residents and a recent article in *The Knox County News* dealt with these persons and their families.

Shortly after the story appeared, a victim of the Vernon tornado was transferred from Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls to the Knox County Hospital and because we felt that his story would be of interest to our readers, we paid a visit to him one day last week.

Lyndle Reeves, who is a business major at Vernon Regional Junior College, was busy that Tuesday afternoon preparing for a sales presentation to be made in class when he made a trip out on the eastern edge of Vernon about 2:30 o'clock to Cardinal Equipment Company to check with the manager on the possibility of using some of their equipment. The manager was not in and Lyndle was advised to come back later, and he said he did return about 3:30. He said he remembered that it was get-

ting 'awfully dark' and was literally pouring rain. When asked if the clouds looked 'stormy,' he said he supposed they did, but as he had never been frightened of clouds he really had not paid much attention to them.

As he went inside, he said an employee of the firm ran up front from the back of the building and exclaimed, "A tornado is headed for the building. Everyone get out of here and into the median between the divided highway just off the slope and on the flat ground."

Moments after lying down, Lyndle said he heard the loudest roaring noise he had ever heard. "It was indescribable - a sound I'll never forget!" He could hear the winds demolishing the Cardinal Equipment building they had just left. Tumbleweeds came storming over them from the east.

Lyndle then felt the winds picking him up. He tried to grab the person next to him, the grass, the ground, anything, but he couldn't. The man next to him grabbed another person's legs and managed to stay down. Lyndle said he saw his roommate, Wayne Pennartz' yellow sweater as he flew over him. "I was up in the air

whirling around. Rocks and debris were hitting me all over, so I covered my face with my hands," he said. Two of his fingers received deep cuts, in fact one was cut to the bone, and he described the feeling as having about ten persons throwing rocks at him from a short distance. Then something heavy hit him and he felt excruciating pain in his back and pelvis and he said he thought he was going to die. Then the winds began to let him down but kept whirling him around after he hit the ground. At last the winds, which he said were clocked from 300 to 800 miles an hour, passed on, but Lyndle couldn't get up. He moved his head and saw a wrecked combine and tandem plow

just a few feet away. He estimated that he came down approximately 60 yards from where he was picked up. He yelled to Wayne for help. The rain turned to hail and Lyndle said he thought he was going to be beaten to death. Wayne and Larry, the manager at Cardinal Equipment, went to Lyndle and leaned over him to protect him from further injury from the hail. Finally it stopped and Wayne and Larry went for help. Lyndle was completely covered with mud and grassburrs.

The ambulance came for Lyndle and took him to Wilbarger Hospital. Lyndle's roommate, Wayne, who is employed by Cardinal Equipment, had a bad cut on his hand and was sent to the hospital at Chillicothe. When the extent of Lyndle's injuries had been determined, he was transferred to Bethania where he arrived about 6:00 p.m., only minutes ahead of the horrible tornadoes which struck Wichita Falls. In all of the mass confusion, Lyndle wound up in his room with his admitting papers, so the hospital had no record of his being there.

It was this situation that created one of the longest nights his parents, LaRue and Arnold Reeves of Munday, have ever endured. The Reeves were first aware of their son's injuries when Debbie Little of Mun-

day, who attends VRJC, drove home to tell the Reeves that Lyndle was in the Vernon Hospital in 'guarded' condition.

His parents drove to Vernon Hospital and were told there that Lyndle had been taken to Wichita Falls - probably to Wichita General Hospital. H.L. Ayres, a friend, used his short wave to call several places including Altus, Oklahoma, Crowell, and the County Judge. A Rev. Loeschman from St. Paul's Lutheran Church also used his short wave radio all through the night attempting to locate Lyndle.

When the Reeves arrived in Wichita Falls, they were told he was not at Bethania. They went to Wichita General - he was not there. They went to the Medic Center - no Reeves. The power was off all over Wichita Falls. Persons were

For the second consecutive year, Knox City High School senior student Sonia Carter took top honors in the Area IV FFA talent contest held in conjunction with the area meeting of the Future Farmers of America on the campus of Tarleton State University in Stephenville, Friday night, May 12.

Sonia, the 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Carter, and the newly crowned Miss Vernon Regional Junior College, made a hit with the crowd on her rendition of "Texas (When I Die)" and "American Trilogy," the number she performed at the Miss VRJC pageant.

This win qualifies Sonia for State competition to be held in Lubbock July 11 through 13.

Representing the Oilbelt District, Sonia had to win over three other talent entries, all of them male bands, including a Wichita FFA District band from Henrietta, a Cross Timbers FFA District band; and the "Night Riders", a Jim Ned High School band from Tuscola representing the Big Country FFA District.

Lions Club News

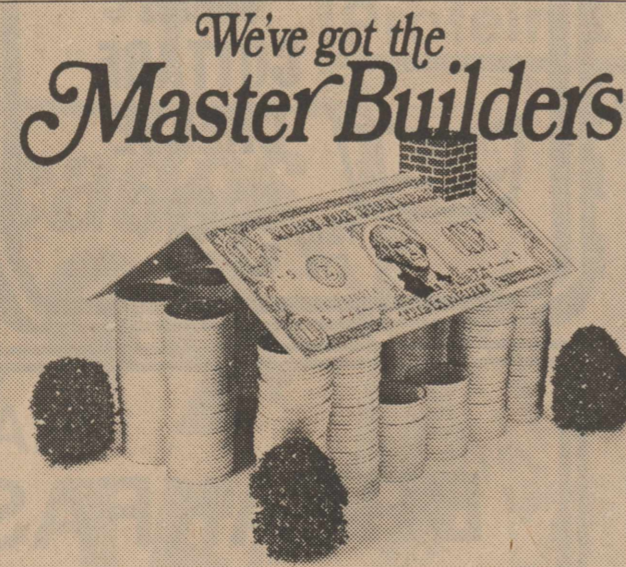

Soil Stewardship Week Is May 20 - 27

Soil Stewardship Week, which had its origin more than 1500 years ago, will be celebrated in Knox County and throughout the United States and its territories on May 20 - 27, according to an announcement by L.D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District.

The theme for the 1979 celebration is "Interdependence," a concept endorsed by President Carter in his forward to the descriptive Soil Stewardship Week booklet. The booklet and accompanying Soil Stewardship material is distributed by Conservation Districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations, and individuals interested in participating in the unique celebration.

"Americans have always understood the value of

working together in achieving common goals," President Carter said. "We have learned that unity of purpose and mutual dependence are essential to our growth as a society of self-governing people.

"It is especially fitting, therefore, that interdependence ... of city and country, of Americans and their resources, and of man and nature ... is the theme of Soil Stewardship Week in 1979," the President observed. "Our nation can be thankful for our progress in repairing the damage we have done to our environment. But that is only a start. To achieve greater harmony with nature, we must continue to seek harmony with one another."

The concept of Soil Stewardship had its origin in the special Rogation Days set aside by the Bishop of Vienne

France, following bad weather and earthquakes that brought crop failures and widespread hunger to much of France some 1500 years ago. The Bishop called upon the people to offer prayers and penance, and to offer humble thanks to their creator "for the priceless gift of soil, water, air, and sunshine which make all living things possible."

While we are not faced with the immediate prospect of famine or hunger in the United States today, the reasons for Soil Stewardship commemorative activities hasn't changed very much, the sponsors believe. We still need to pause each year to express our thanks for the natural resources of soil, water and air which nurture our people and provide us with daily food and fiber necessary to carry on our daily existence.

Soil Stewardship Week has been sponsored in the United States since 1955 by the National Association of Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 Conservation Districts. Information on Soil Stewardship Week and descriptive materials may be obtained at local Conservation Districts.

using flashlights and candles. There were auxiliary lights in the operating rooms. Every few minutes volunteers who were inside the hospital would come to one door and read a list of names of patients. Johnny Andrade and Mrs. Reeves stayed at the door at Wichita General, while Arnold went back to Bethania. They waited.

About 12:30 a.m., the Reeves went to the basement at Wichita General where they tried to call Sheppard Air Force Base. A social worker, Paulette Kenisick, helped the Reeves for about two hours. Her husband is stationed at Sheppard AFB and she knew whom to call. After she made sure he wasn't at Sheppard, she personally checked out Wichita General. She then called Bethania. No Reeves listed anywhere. She even called the two funeral homes where tornado victims were being taken - and also the morgue.

At 3:30 a.m., LaRue and Arnold drove back to Vernon to start over in their frustrated search. They checked back with the hospital and Rev. Loeschman. They also called all the surrounding hospitals and even to Oklahoma City.

They then called their neighbors, Audrey and Lee Roy Leflar to please go to the Reeves' home in Munday in case they should receive any phone calls or messages from Lyndle or from any person having any knowledge of him. Mrs. Reeves' sister, Valerie Kinnibrough, called that they would meet them in Munday, and the Reeves, emotionally and physically exhausted, went home at daybreak to wait.

Jean and Rhoades Allen, parents of their daughter-in-law, had begun trying about midnight to reach the Reeves' other sons, Dwight and Randy.

Friends and neighbors began arriving at the Reeves' home to lend moral support and go out and call others whom they thought might be able to help locate Lyndle. The Reeves' pastor, Jack Mints, made several calls, too.

Soon, LaRue reported, two intercessory prayer chains were started - one through the Baptist Church, the other through the Believers' Chapel. Superintendent Douglas Myers called the sheriff's office, and several Munday residents went back to Wichita Falls to assist in the search.

Around 10:30 a.m., Lyndle's roommate, Wayne, called that he had been able to get through to Bethania from Vernon and Lyndle was in Room 715. Shouts of "Praise the Lord!" and "Yippee!" rang through the Reeves' home. Wayne said one out of every 25 phone calls was allowed to go into Wichita Falls during the emergency and he continued to call in an effort to get through.

In the meantime, friends from Gilliland, Kathy and Kenneth Carroll, had gone to the hospital to be with her grandmother and stayed with Lyndle until some of his Munday friends arrived. Of course Lyndle's parents were there shortly afterward, and Lyndle's roommates Jerry and Wayne and their sister Judy were already there.

Lyndle spent a week and six days in Bethania and has been a patient in the Knox County Hospital since that time. He will return to Bethania on May 21 for further x-rays and is in hopes that afterward, he will be able to return to his home in Munday.

Needless to say, this writer is joined by our readers to wish Lyndle a speedy recovery to good health and a long life! He's just bound to have a purpose on this earth after going through such an experience and living to tell about it!

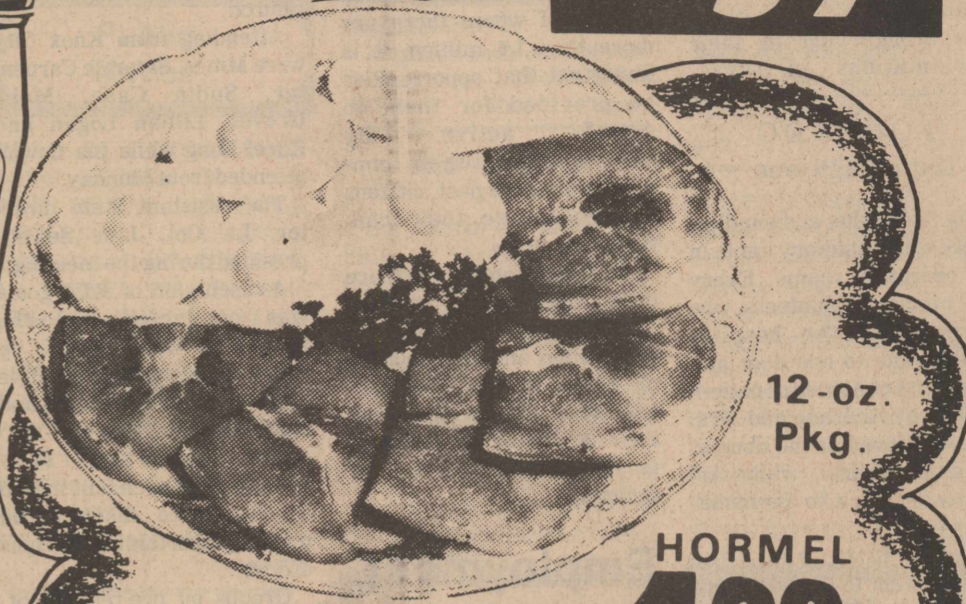
