Charles Matthews. executive director of the Texas Association of School Administrators, predicts 75 percent of the state's 1,080 school districts will have to raise taxes or cut back on

Matthews' assessment is disputed by the Texas Education Agency, which insists tax increases will not be necessary if school funds are maraged properly.

"They (school officials) are going to have to really look at every dollar they spend," says Raymon Bynum, TEA associate commissioner for

Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District receives 32.7 in new state aid, up from 21.6 for last year. The homestead and ag exemption losses are also 21.6 making a net gain of 11.1 at

the end of the second year. There is a mellower tone to the squawking over school finance this year. At the same time administrators carp about the dollars they are due, they also note the dispersal system is the fairest the legislature has devised.

For the first time, education experts say, a higher percentage of state aid will flow to property-poor school districts that need help

The plan is to narrow the spending disparities that have threatened to send the state's financing system into court for an overhaul.

Other area towns receiving increases were Benjamin, 52.7; Munday, 34.1; Goree, 18.7; Haskell, 58.7; Rochester, 23.1; Rule, 3.8; Crowell, 31.1; Seymour, 35.5; Aspermont, 65.9; and Throckmorton, 22.4.

Four one-week sessions of residential camping plus day camp for children in the WTRC Summer Recreation Program and a weekend session for young adults are scheduled this summer.

Residential camp will be June 24-30. mentally retarded children; July 1-7, hard of hearing; July 8-14, physically handicapped; and July 15-21, learning disabled. While each week is designated for a specific group, children in other categories may attend.

Cost for the camp is \$20 for a one-week session. Camperships are available for those who could not attend otherwise

This is the fourth year that the camp will be in operation. Sponsoring agencies this year are the West Texas Rehabilitation Center and Abilene Independent School District. AISD furnished and maintains the camp facilities which are at the Nike missile site 20 miles southwest of Abilene on Highway 277.

Knox County has been selected to participate in the Biennial Survey of Texas residents to determine where the greatest needs for human services lie. Conducted by the **Texas Department of Human** Resources, the survey is designed to find out what needs are peculiar to what areas of the state. It is also designed to identify barriers that prevent citizens of Texas from participating in human services programs that already exist.

In addition to Knox County, other counties have been chosen at random across the state to participate in the survey. A total of 112 counties will be sampled.

Knox citizens who will be interviewed have also been chosen at random and will include both clients of the Department of Humas Resources and the general population. All information is confidential. Names of participants will not be identified on questionnaires.

The survey will be conducted by Department employees, all of whom will carry identification cards and a letter of introduction, explaining the purpose of the survey.

Interviewing will begin June 14 and run through August 15. There will be 3,000 interviews in this region
